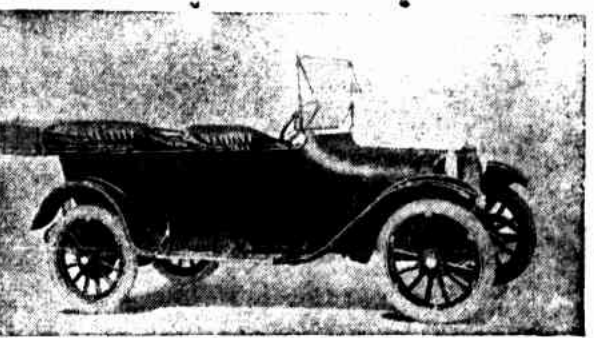

EXTRA BURDEN ON PRODUCERS.

PROTEST BY FARMERS AND GRAZIERS' ASSOCIATION.

The managing director of the Farmers and Graziers' Co-operative Grain, Insurance and Agency Co., Ltd., writes: "When, early in December, it was learned that the Railway rates were to be increased, I immediately got into touch with the Government, objecting to producers being harassed by having to pay extra for the carriage of their produce; and, on December 12 I sent the following communication to the Minister for Railways—

Dear Mr. Ball,—a notice in today's press that the Railway Commission contemplate increasing the rates on the carriage of various commodities. In view of the fact that for many months, now the carriage of wool has been restricted, and many clips have been held up on account of the scarcity of trucks, I think it would be very unfair, at the present time for the Government to sanction any increase in the rates for carrying primary produce, particularly if the charges are to operate at a comparatively early date.

As you well know, the man on the land has had a very bad time lately, and any increased burden to be imposed by the Government might very well be postponed—Yours faithfully,

As no reply was forthcoming from the Minister, on December 17 I further wrote—

Dear Mr. Ball,—On the 8th instant I wrote you in respect to the proposal of the Railway Commissioners to increase their charges on the carriage of goods. I notice by today's press that the proposal has been referred back to the Commission. I would be glad to be advised as to the consideration as being set upon the behalf of the producers. I have received no communication of my communications to you truly,

On December 19 the Minister replied—

Dear Mr. Tretowan,—I duly received your letters of the 8th and 17th instants, respecting increased railway charges for the carriage of goods. On receipt of the first mentioned your representations were sent on to the railway Commissioners for their consideration and report.—Your truly,

On January 5 the Minister advised that the Executive Council had approved of the issue of the following by-law—

Wool available for transport during the year ended 31st December, 1919, and which could not be despatched by rail, owing to the embargo placed on the conveyance of wool, will be carried at the rate specified in by-law No. 554, less 5 per cent. A declaration must be made in each case, on the consignment note, that the wool would have been despatched prior to 31st December, 1919, had the embargo not been in operation."

By-law 554 is the new goods rate book. Any unbiased person, I maintain, cannot truthfully state that the request, received sympathetic consideration. My opinion maintains that the time was not opportune for a big advance in the rail charges, and a 5 per cent. allowance on a small proportion of the wool clip, coming on top of an imposition of 10 per cent., may be characterized as a clumsy and irritating action, calculated to cause resentment amongst already heavily-handicapped producers.

It was recently called that rates on the railways of England were increased, but that primary products were exempted, from which it will be seen that the perspective of the English authorities is not clouded. Apparently, there is not much sincerity in the appeal of this country's administrators for increased production!

It is to be regretted that this company's efforts on behalf of the producers, have met with such little success, but the 5 per cent. allowance should, at all events, be available of by the wool growers generally, who can comply with the conditions, which, it is presumed, will also apply by rebate to those who have already sent their wool at the increased rate."
