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MEMORANDUM OF CONVERSATION

PARTICIPANTS:	President Ford General Alexander M. Haig, Jr., CINCEUR/SACEUR Brent Scowcroft, Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs
DATE AND TIME:	Wednesday, January 28, 1976

PLACE: The Oval Office

President: How are we doing in NATO?

<u>Haig</u>: We're doing fine, except for the concern over Congress. They all sat on their hands when we were in Vietnam because they didn't want us to focus on a peripheral area. But this intelligence business is having a devastating effect.

President: It should. Although they are not being too tough -- take Angola.

<u>Haig</u>: That is right. They are deeply disturbed about the anarchy in Congress.

<u>President:</u> We are, too. We will make a maximum effort to prevent a repitition of '75 -- especially in the defense budget.

Haig: They are delighted with the improvement of the consultative process. They have kept their defense budgets fairly high, even in the recession, except for Italy and Great Britain. The Norwegians, the Danes are fine. The Germans are great. Giscard is getting stronger and is growing as a constructive force.

President: What is this about the brigade in North Germany?

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<u>Haig</u>: We have an egregious shortage of forces in the North German plains. [Described the military situation].

The Germans are enthusiastic, but it costs money, and that has become enmeshed in the offset issue. He won't agree to pay for it until he knows what we will ask for for offset.

Leber has been disenfranchised by Schmidt on this issue because of our balance of payments and the fact that Nunn in effect put a pistol to his head.

President: How about the Greek-Turkey situation?

<u>Haig</u>: It is very worrisome. I spent time with Sancar at Christmas. I told him they had to move to get us back into the bases, or Congress would cut us off. The talks start February 17. But there are internal problems in Turkey.

<u>President:</u> If we don't get some movement by March 1, we will be in trouble because the legislation will be on the floor.

<u>Haig</u>: The military could step in in Turkey, and that would give us Hill problems.

President: How about MBFR? NATO finally bought our package.

<u>Haig</u>: Yes. They are very reluctant. And it didn't help to have DOD saying we would remove weapons in excess of 1000 in MBFR.

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President: How have developments in Spain been received?

<u>Haig</u>: They are delighted. But we shouldn't be too impatient about the NATO thing and risk getting a kick in the ass from moving too fast.

President: What about Portugal?

<u>Haig</u>: It is a very radical situation, but it is improving. We are trying to reorient the army away from colonialism and toward a NATO contribution.

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President: What is the condition of the Army?

<u>Haig:</u> It is in shambles. The Italian situation is worrisome. Only Henry has been talking of the dangers of the historic compromise. It is a good thing, although Schmidt is okay.

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
