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Information

In accordance with ORS 251.154, your official 1980 primary election Voters' Pamphlet is divided into separate sections for Measures and Democratic, Republican and Nonpartisan candidates. Page numbers for these sections are listed under CONTENTS on this page, where you will also find a page number for the alphabetical index to candidates.

Material in the MEASURE section includes each state and county ballot title, the complete text of the proposed measure, an impartial statement explaining the measure and its effect, and any arguments filed by proponents and/or opponents. Oregon law allows the legislature to submit an argument in favor of any measure it refers to the people. Citizens or organizations may also file arguments on state measures by purchasing space for \$300 or submitting a petition signed by 1000 electors. **This year there were no arguments in opposition to any state measure filed with the Secretary of State.**

The order for candidate material alternates with successive primary elections. This year the DEMOCRATS appear before the REPUBLICANS. Statements and photographs are submitted by candidates themselves or their designated agents. The information required by ORS 251.085—pertaining to occupation, occupational and educational background, and prior governmental experience—has been certified by each candidate. Some spaces appear blank because Oregon law does not allow the placement of material relating to candidates for different offices on the same Voters' Pamphlet page.

The fourth section contains material provided by candidates for NONPARTISAN office. Oregon law relating to election to state nonpartisan offices was recently changed. Unopposed district attorney candidates are considered nominated and their names will not be printed on the ballot until the general election. For contested nonpartisan offices, two candidates will be nominated unless one candidate alone receives a majority of the votes cast. However, when a candidate for judge of the Supreme Court, Court of Appeals, circuit court, district court or tax court—other than a candidate to fill a vacancy—receives a majority of the votes cast, that candidate is elected. When a nonpartisan candidate for Metropolitan Service District Councilor—in Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington counties only—receives a majority of votes cast at the primary, that candidate is also deemed elected.

Although this is a combined Voters' Pamphlet, in the primary election only registered Democrats vote the Democratic ballot and only registered Republicans vote the Republican ballot. All electors, however, including Independents, vote on measures and nonpartisan positions.

Miscellaneous voting aids—including district maps, precinct and polling place lists, voting instructions, a complete listing of state-certified candidates and an absentee ballot form—follow the fourth section.

The Voters' Pamphlet has been compiled by the Secretary of State since 1903, when Oregon became one of the first states to provide for the printing and distribution of such a pamphlet. In 1909, the Legislative Assembly passed a law requiring pamphlets to include information on candidates.

One copy of the Voters' Pamphlet is mailed to every household in the state. Additional copies are available at the Capitol, post offices, courthouses and other public buildings.

VOTING REQUIREMENTS

You may register to vote by mail or in person if:

1. You are a citizen of the United States.
2. You will be 18 or older on election day.
3. You are a resident of Oregon.

IMPORTANT: You may register to vote if you meet the above qualifications, but you must be a resident of Oregon 20 days before you may vote. (The one exception to this provision occurs during a presidential primary or general election. The 20 day requirement is waived when a Certificate of Registration marked "Presidential only" is obtained from your county clerk.)

You must reregister to vote if:

1. Your address changes for any reason, even within the same precinct.
2. Your name changes for any reason.
3. You wish to change political affiliation.

IMPORTANT: You cannot change political party affiliation within 20 days of the primary election.

YOU MUST BE REGISTERED 20 DAYS BEFORE THE ELECTION IN ORDER FOR YOUR NAME TO BE INCLUDED IN THE POLL BOOK.

You may register to vote within 20 days of election day if:

1. You have been a resident 20 days prior to the election date.
2. You deliver to the appropriate county clerk or a person designated by the county clerk a completed voter registration form and obtain a "Certificate of Registration."

IMPORTANT: If the county clerk receives your application more than ten days prior to election day, your certificate will be mailed to you. During the final ten days before the election you must obtain the certificate in person. Certificates are issued by the county clerk or designated representatives until 8 p.m. on the day of the election.

3. You present and surrender your certificate to your new precinct on election day and sign it in view of the election board clerk. The certificate shall be considered part of the poll book and your name will appear at the next election.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 7—Referred to the Electorate of Oregon by the 1979 Legislature, to be voted on at the Primary Election, May 20, 1980.

BALLOT TITLE

1 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT LIMITS USES OF GASOLINE AND HIGHWAY USER TAXES

QUESTION—Shall gasoline, vehicle taxes be used for highways only, not policing, except recreational vehicle taxes also for parks, recreation areas?

YES

NO

PURPOSE—Proposed constitutional amendment would change present limits on use of gasoline and vehicle taxes and fees. These taxes are now available for highways, including their policing, and for parks and recreational and historic places. Change would limit tax use solely to highways, including rest areas but not policing. However, taxes on recreational vehicles could also be used for park and recreation areas, and taxes on commercial vehicles could also be used for weighmaster activities.

Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

Paragraph 1. Section 3, Article IX, Oregon Constitution, is repealed, and the following sections are adopted in lieu thereof:

SECTION 3. No tax shall be levied except in accordance with law. Every law imposing a tax shall state distinctly the purpose to which the revenue shall be applied.

SECTION 3a. (1) Except as provided in subsection (2) of this section, revenue from the following shall be used exclusively for the construction, reconstruction, improvement, repair, maintenance, operation and use of public highways, roads, streets and roadside rest areas in this state:

(a) Any tax levied on, with respect to, or measured by the storage, withdrawal, use, sale, distribution, importation or receipt of motor vehicle fuel or any other product used for the propulsion of motor vehicles; and

(b) Any tax or excise levied on the ownership, operation or use of motor vehicles.

(2) Revenues described in subsection (1) of this section:

(a) May also be used for the cost of administration and any refunds or credits authorized by law.

(b) May also be used for the retirement of bonds for which such revenues have been pledged.

(c) If from levies under paragraph (b) of subsection (1) of this section on campers, mobile homes, motor homes, travel trailers, snowmobiles, or like vehicles, may also be used for the acquisition, development, maintenance or care of parks or recreation areas.

(d) If from levies under paragraph (b) of subsection (1) of this section on vehicles used or held out for use for commercial purposes, may also be used for enforcement of

commercial vehicle weight, size, load, conformation and equipment regulation.

SECTION 3b. In no event shall the amendment proposed by this resolution become operative before July 1, 1979. This section shall expire and stand repealed on July 2, 1979.

Paragraph 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next election held throughout this state.

EXPLANATION

This measure repeals Section 3, Article IX, of the Oregon Constitution which specifies the permitted uses of monies derived from taxes on motor vehicles and motor vehicle fuels, and enacts in its place a new section which curtails the permitted uses of these tax revenues.

Presently, motor vehicle taxes and motor vehicle fuel taxes, after administration costs and any lawful refunds and credits, are to be used only for construction, reconstruction, operation, use and policing of public highways, roads and streets, including the retirement of highway-related revenue bonds and for the acquisition, development, care and use of parks and recreational, scenic or historic places.

This measure eliminates the use of these motor vehicle and motor vehicle fuel revenues for the funding of police, parks, scenic and historic places, permitting their use only for highways, roads, streets and roadside rest areas and includes administration costs, refunds and credits and repayment of bonds. The measure allows money from taxes on recreational vehicles to be used for parks and recreational areas and money from taxes on commercial vehicles to be used to enforce commercial vehicle laws.

The 1979 legislature limited the use of highway-related revenues in the manner prescribed by this proposed constitutional amendment. As a result, over \$60 million was allocated for highway maintenance and construction which might otherwise have been used for state police and parks, the costs of which were shifted to the General Fund.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

It's time to save our multi-billion dollar investment in our highway system. It's time to stop the raid on the Highway Fund. It's time to reduce gasoline consumption, reduce auto repairs, and make our highways safer.

The passage of Ballot Measure No. 1 can do all of these **WITHOUT RAISING TAXES**. Measure No. 1 will protect the Highway Fund; it will constitutionally dedicate the Highway Fund to streets, roads, and highways only.

Under the present law the Highway Fund can be used to pay for state police, parks, and other "highway-related programs." This has been done and the result has been to rob our highways of needed maintenance.

These so-called "highway-related programs" will still be funded but will be financed from the State General Fund—not from gasoline taxes, weight-mile taxes, and vehicle registration fees.

It is estimated that passage of Ballot Measure No. 1 will add a guaranteed \$60 million to the Highway Fund each biennium. These funds are badly needed for road repair and highway preservation.

Highway transportation is basic to the **ECONOMIC WELL-BEING** of all Oregonians. Our three major industries—timber, agriculture, and tourism—are all dependent on a good transportation system.

Ballot Measure No. 1 will also aid **MASS TRANSIT**. Both inter-city and intra-city buses need maintained streets, roads, and highways.

Passage of Measure No. 1 will not eliminate our **BICYCLE TRAILS** program as some contend. It would continue to allow funding of bicycle trails inside of highway rights-of-way.

A **POORLY MAINTAINED HIGHWAY SYSTEM** is costing all of us a lot of money. Over 58% of our highways have been designated moderately or extremely deteriorated by the Highway Preservation Study. This percentage will grow every year under our present funding system.

Our rough and crumbling road system is not just uncomfortable and inconvenient. It can lead to economic decline in our state. It will mean more costly rebuilding of our highways if timely repairs are not made. Rough roads bring greatly reduced fuel efficiency. Bad roads increase the number of costly automobile repairs. Highway deterioration also contributes to auto accidents and higher auto insurance costs.

Ballot Measure No. 1 says that the Highway Fund "shall be used exclusively for the construction, reconstruction, improvement, repair, maintenance, operation and use of public highways, roads, streets, and roadside rest areas in this state." **IT'S ABOUT TIME.**

Let's get our priorities right. For a better Oregon, for a more cost effective use of our tax dollars, and for a reduction in personal transportation costs, let's pass Ballot Measure No. 1.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

Oregon's roads are going to pot, yet at the same time few of us want to increase our taxes for any purpose.

Ballot Measure #1 gives us an opportunity to fix some of our city streets, county roads and state highways **without** increasing taxes one cent.

Currently, Oregon's constitution allows our road user taxes to be spent for certain parks, police, recreational and historic purposes. In recent years our Legislature has appropriated about \$30 million each year from our gasoline taxes, vehicle registration fees and the truckers weight-mile taxes for these non-road programs.

At the same time, we keep running into chuck holes that cities, counties and the state say they can't afford to fix.

Ballot Measure #1 solves a great many of those problems. Voter approval of this amendment to our state constitution will mean our road user taxes **must** be used to fix our roads. The needs of parks and police will be met from "general fund" revenues, not "road fund" taxes.

The transfer of these funding obligations to the state's general fund will not create a problem. In recent years the state's general fund has always received more money than was actually needed for the budget approved by the Legislature. Last year, for instance, we witnessed a direct refund and a property tax relief program that resulted because the state collected more income taxes than it actually needed to run the state government.

But still, street, road and highway maintenance suffered because those needs far exceeded the money appropriated from road users.

We want our gasoline tax to be used for the roads upon which we drive. We think most Oregonians agree with us. Three out of every four state legislators voted in favor of this measure, and we believe they represented the wishes of their constituency.

Vote YES on Ballot Measure #1. Make your road user taxes fix your roads with no increase in your taxes.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 18—Referred to the Electorate of Oregon by the 1979 Legislature, to be voted on at the Primary Election, May 20, 1980.

BALLOT TITLE

2 AMENDS LIQUOR BY THE DRINK CONSTITUTIONAL PROVISION

QUESTION—Shall constitution authorize laws allowing off-premises liquor service by food-serving licensees, and licenses for additional passenger common carriers?

YES

NO

PURPOSE—Constitution now limits passenger common carrier liquor-by-the-drink licenses to railroads; requires commercial liquor licensees to cook and serve food where liquor is served. Proposed amendment would authorize laws permitting liquor licenses for other passenger common carriers (bus, airline); and allowing commercial liquor licensees cooking and serving food to also serve liquor by the drink at another location where food is not cooked and served, subject to requirements to be established by law.

Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

Paragraph 1. Section 39, Article I of the Oregon Constitution, is amended to read:

Sec. 39. The State shall have power to license private clubs, fraternal organizations, veterans' organizations, *[railroad corporations operating interstate trains]* **companies operating common carriers of passengers** and commercial establishments where food is cooked and served, for the purpose of selling alcoholic liquor by the individual glass at retail, for consumption on the premises, including mixed drinks and cocktails, compounded or mixed on the premises only. **The license privilege conferred upon a commercial establishment where food is cooked and served may be extended beyond the premises of the establishment to allow the mixing, service, sale and consumption of alcoholic liquor where cooked food might not be available. Such licensing shall be administered in a manner consistent with the promotion of temperance and the purposes of the Oregon Liquor Control Act.** The Legislative Assembly shall provide in such detail as it shall deem advisable for carrying out and administering the provisions of this amendment *[and shall provide adequate safeguards to carry out the original intent and purpose of the Oregon Liquor Control Act, including the promotion of temperance in the use and consumption of alcoholic beverages, encourage the use and consumption of lighter beverages and aid in the establishment of Oregon industry]* **including determining when food must be served in conjunction with the serving of alcoholic liquor at licensed commercial establishments.** This power is subject to the following:

(1) *[The provisions of this amendment shall take effect and be in operation sixty (60) days after the approval and adoption by the people of Oregon; provided, however,]* The

right of a local option election exists in the counties and in any incorporated city or town containing a population of at least five hundred (500). The Legislative Assembly shall prescribe a means and a procedure by which the voters of any county or incorporated city or town as limited above in any county, may through a local option election determine whether to prohibit or permit such power, and such procedure shall specifically include that whenever fifteen per cent (15%) of the registered voters of any county in the state or of any incorporated city or town as limited above, in any county in the state, shall file a petition requesting an election in this matter, the question shall be voted upon at the next regular November biennial election, provided said petition is filed not less than sixty (60) days before the day of election.

(2) Legislation relating to this matter shall operate uniformly throughout the state and all individuals shall be treated equally; and all provisions shall be liberally construed for the accomplishment of these purposes.

Paragraph 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at a special election held in conjunction with the next state-wide primary election.

EXPLANATION

This measure updates the provisions of Section 39, Article I, of the Oregon Constitution, relating to the licensing of outlets selling liquor by the drink. Presently, the state can grant a license to a railroad corporation operating interstate trains. This provision is broadened to include all common carriers of passengers. This means, any bus operated by common carrier could be licensed to serve liquor on board the bus.

This measure further permits the license conferred on commercial establishments to allow service of liquor where cooked food may not be available if consistent with the purpose of the Oregon Liquor Control Act.

The measure permits the Legislature to determine when food must be served in conjunction with the serving of alcoholic liquor at licensed commercial establishments and deletes the present requirement that the state encourage the use and consumption of lighter beverages and aid in the establishment of Oregon industry.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

Liquor by the drink was authorized in Oregon by an initiative adopted in 1952 that amended the Oregon Constitution. The drafters of that initiative limited passenger carriers that might be licensed to serve liquor by the drink to railroads. With the anticipated use of buses to provide commuter service, that limitation now seems dated. The status of air carriers, whether regulated by state law or federal law, is also resolved by the proposed amendment which makes clear that air carriers are subject to state regulation in serving liquor.

The original provision also limited liquor service to places where food is cooked and sold. The proposal recognizes that there are occasions where it is proper to allow liquor service where there are no kitchen facilities. It also allows the legislature to require food service when that seems necessary.

The proposal is an update of the liquor by the drink provision. It reserves the right for the legislature to continue to fix licensing requirements. It does not affect the method by which liquor by the drink sales are now regulated.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 24—Referred to the Electorate of Oregon by the 1979 Legislature, to be voted on at the Primary Election, May 20, 1980.

BALLOT TITLE

3 STATE BONDS FOR SMALL SCALE LOCAL ENERGY PROJECT LOAN FUND

QUESTION—Shall state sell bonds, backed by credit of state, for loan fund for small scale local energy projects?

YES

PURPOSE—Constitutional amendment would authorize state to sell bonds, backed by state credit, up to one-half of one percent of value of taxable property in Oregon, to create a loan fund to finance small scale local energy projects. All loans from fund must be secured. If loan repayments are not enough to repay debt, measure requires annual levy on property in Oregon, or other funds made available by legislature, to repay bond principal and interest.

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL EFFECTS—Based on the Department of Revenue's certified statement of Oregon's 1979 taxable property this constitutional amendment would establish a maximum bonding limitation of \$295.1 million to provide for the Small Scale Local Energy Project Program.

Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

Paragraph 1. The Constitution of the State of Oregon is amended by creating a new Article to be known as Article XI-J and to read:

ARTICLE XI-J

SECTION 1. Notwithstanding the limits contained in sections 7 and 8, Article XI of this Constitution, the credit of the State of Oregon may be loaned and indebtedness incurred in an amount not to exceed one-half of one percent of the true cash value of all the property in the state for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Small Scale Local Energy Project Loan Fund. The fund shall be used to provide financing for the development of small scale local energy projects. Secured repayment thereof shall be and is a prerequisite to the advancement of money from such fund.

SECTION 2. Bonds of the State of Oregon containing a direct promise on behalf of the state to pay the face value thereof, with the interest therein provided for, may be issued to an amount authorized by section 1 of this Article for the purpose of creating such fund. The bonds shall be a direct obligation of the state and shall be in such form and shall run for such periods of time and bear such rates of interest as provided by statute.

SECTION 3. Refunding bonds may be issued and sold to refund any bonds issued under authority of sections 1 and 2 of this Article. There may be issued and outstand-

ing at any time bonds aggregating the amount authorized by section 1 of this Article but at no time shall the total of all bonds outstanding including refunding bonds, exceed the amount so authorized.

SECTION 4. Ad valorem taxes shall be levied annually upon all the taxable property in the State of Oregon in sufficient amount to provide for the payment of principal and interest of the bonds issued pursuant to this Article. The Legislative Assembly may provide other revenues to supplement or replace, in whole or in part, such tax levies.

SECTION 5. The Legislative Assembly shall enact legislation to carry out the provisions of this Article. This Article supersedes any conflicting provision of a county or city charter or act of incorporation.

Paragraph 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at a special election held throughout the state on the same date as the next regular primary election.

EXPLANATION

This measure amends the State Constitution. Voter approval would permit sale of state general obligation bonds to establish a fund from which to make secured loans to finance the development of Small Scale Energy Projects. The total bonded indebtedness for this purpose may not exceed one-half of one percent of the true cash value of all taxable property within the state.

SUPPORTING LEGISLATION

The 1979 Legislative Assembly enacted chapter 672, Oregon Laws 1979, to carry out the provisions of this proposed constitutional amendment. If this ballot measure is approved by the voters, the law would govern the loans and their repayment. Mortgages or other security for repayment are required in all cases before a loan can be granted. These security requirements are designed to insure that the borrower repay the principal and interest on the loan.

OBLIGATION OF THE STATE

The state is obligated to repay the bonds if, for any reason, they are not otherwise repaid. In this case, the state guarantees to repay the bonds through revenues provided by the legislature from state taxes or by taxes levied on all taxable property.

WHO CAN APPLY

Chapter 672, Oregon Laws 1979, allows the following to apply for loans: (1) individuals, (2) small businesses, defined as those employing fewer than 100 persons as a partnership, corporation, cooperative or sole proprietorship, (3) nonprofit corporation or cooperative, or (4) a municipal corporation, such as a city.

ELIGIBLE PROJECTS

The law limits projects eligible for loans to those that are located in Oregon and use renewable resources. According to the law, "renewable resources" expressly includes solar, wind, geothermal, biomass, water resources and waste heat when used to create energy such as direct heat, electricity and substitute fuels to meet a local community or regional energy need within this state.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

BALLOT MEASURE 3 offers Oregonians an opportunity to address our own energy needs and at the same time offer leadership to the nation. By encouraging the development of small scale projects which produce energy from renewable resources, we can lead the way toward energy independence.

Just as Oregon's highly successful veterans' loan program has—at no cost to the taxpayer—made low-interest money available for needed housing, BALLOT MEASURE 3 will provide financing for projects which help solve our energy needs.

These projects will develop energy from renewable resources in our own backyard, resources such as solar, wind, geothermal, biomass, water power and waste heat. They will also include facilities which produce alcohol fuels for use in gasohol. These projects will be owned and operated by Oregonians.

Individuals will be eligible to apply for the funds as well as cooperatives, non-profit corporations and small businesses. A "small business" is one employing fewer than 100 people and can be a sole ownership, partnership, cooperative or corporation.

The borrower must repay the loan, and security such as a mortgage will be required to assure repayment.

The need to develop new sources of energy to encourage Oregonians to find alternatives to energy imports through reducing our dependence on others all points to the need to pass Ballot Measure 3.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 23—Referred to the Electorate of Oregon by the 1979 Legislature, to be voted on at the Primary Election, May 20, 1980.

BALLOT TITLE

4 VETERANS' HOME AND FARM LOAN ELIGIBILITY CHANGES

QUESTION—Shall home and farm loan eligibility requirements be made the same for all veterans?

YES

NO

PURPOSE—Proposed constitutional amendment standardizes veterans' home and farm loan eligibility requirements. Requirements are: 210 days active duty, or earlier release for service-connected disability; any service between September, 1940 and December, 1976; honorable discharge or separation to reserve; and Oregon residence at enlistment or for five years after separation from active duty, and at loan application. Eligibility expires 30 years after separation, or January 31, 1985 if later, extending already expired WWII veterans' eligibility.

Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

Paragraph 1. Section 3, Article XI-A of the Constitution of the State of Oregon is amended to read:

Sec. 3. No person shall [be eligible to] receive money from the Oregon War Veterans' Fund except the following:

[(1) Any person who resides in the State of Oregon at the time of applying for a loan from said fund, who served honorably in active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States, for a period of not less than 90 days any part of which occurred between September 15, 1940, and July 25, 1947, who was either at the time of his enlistment, induction, warrant or commission a resident of the State of Oregon or who has been a bona fide resident of the State of Oregon for at least two years between the date of his separation from aforementioned service and December 31, 1965, and who has been honorably separated or discharged from said service, or who has been furloughed to a reserve. No loans shall be made to persons justified under this subsection after January 31, 1980.]

[(2) Any person who resides in the State of Oregon at the time of applying for a loan from said fund, who served honorably in active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States for a period of not less than 90 days any part of which occurred between June 25, 1950, and January 31, 1960, who was either at the time of his enlistment, induction, warrant or commission a resident of the State of Oregon or who has been a bona fide resident of the State of Oregon for at least two years between the date of his separation from aforementioned service and December 31, 1965, and who has been honorably separated or discharged from said service, or who has been furloughed to a reserve. No loans shall be made to persons qualified under this subsection after January 31, 1988.]

[(3) Any person who resides in the State of Oregon at the time of applying for a loan from said fund, who served honorably on active duty in the Armed Forces of the

United States for a period of not less than 210 days, any part of which occurred subsequent to January 31, 1960, or who was, prior to completion of such period of service, discharged or released from active duty on account of service-connected injury or illness; who was either at the time of his enlistment, induction, warrant or commission a resident of the State of Oregon or who has been a bona fide resident of the State of Oregon for at least two years between the date of his separation from aforementioned service and May 1, 1977; and who has been honorably separated or discharged from said service, or who has been furloughed to a reserve. No loan shall be made to a person qualified under this subsection unless application for the loan is made within 20 years after the date the person separates or is discharged from the service or is furloughed to a reserve.]

(1) A person who:

(a) Resides in the State of Oregon at the time of applying for a loan from the fund;

(b) Served honorably in active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States for a period of not less than 210 days, any part of which occurred between September 15, 1940, and December 31, 1976 or who was, prior to completion of such period of service, discharged or released from active duty on account of service-connected injury or illness;

(c) Was a resident of the State of Oregon at the time of enlistment, induction, warrant or commission or has been a bona fide resident of the State of Oregon for at least five years since the date of discharge, separation or release from active duty;

(d) Has been honorably separated or discharged from the Armed Forces of the United States or has been furloughed to a reserve; and

(e) Makes application for a loan either within the 30-year period immediately following the date on which the person was released from active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States, or not later than January 31, 1985, whichever occurs last.

[(4) (2) (a) The spouse of a person who is qualified to receive a loan under subsection (1)[, (2) or (3)] of this section but who has either been missing in action or a prisoner of war while on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States even though the status of missing or being a prisoner occurred prior to completion of the minimum length of service or residence set forth in subsection (1)[, (2) or (3)] of this section, provided the spouse resides in this state at the time of application for the loan.

(b) The surviving spouse of a person who was qualified to receive a loan under subsection (1)[, (2) or (3)] of this section but who died while on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States even though the death occurred prior to completion of the minimum length of service or residence set forth in subsection (1)[, (2) or (3)] of this section, provided the surviving spouse resides in this state at the time of application for the loan.

(c) The eligibility of a surviving spouse under this subsection shall terminate on his or her remarriage.

Paragraph 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at either the next special election to be held throughout this state or at a special election held throughout this state on the same date as the next regular primary election, whichever occurs first.

EXPLANATION

Measure 4 changes the state Constitution to make home and farm loan eligibility requirements the same for all veterans. Under present law, veterans are in three groups, with three sets of standards.

If this measure is approved, Oregon residents who served 210 days in active duty may get loans if any part of their active duty was between September 15, 1940, and December 31, 1976, and they meet the other requirements. At present, veterans who served in the World War II and Korean War period need only have served 90 days and veterans who served between July 25, 1947, and June 25, 1950, cannot get loans.

Measure 4 waives the 210-day active duty rule for veterans released because of service-connected injury or illness. Present law waives that rule only for veterans who served after January 31, 1960.

Present law contains three different deadlines for application for loans. The World War II veterans' eligibility expired January 31, 1980. Measure 4 would give World War II veterans another five years in which to apply. All veterans, if Measure 4 passes, will have until 30 years after discharge or until January 31, 1985, whichever comes last, to apply for loans.

Measure 4 also creates uniform residency requirements for all veterans. As in present law, those who were residents at the time they entered the service qualify for loans. Measure 4 also allows an otherwise qualified veteran who did not enter the service from Oregon, but who has been a resident of Oregon for at least five years following discharge, to apply.

This would replace present law which requires two years of post-discharge residency, but requires that the residency be prior to December 31, 1965, for World War II and Korean War veterans, or May 1, 1977, for veterans who served after January 31, 1960.

Measure 4 does not affect existing loans or the rights of veterans' spouses.

Establishes uniform eligibility requirements

Ballot Measure 4 expands the current successful Veterans Farm and Home Loan Program to assure that all veterans will receive equal treatment for equal service. Under current law, veterans of World War II, the Korean War and the Vietnam era have been treated differently when seeking farm and home loans. Those veterans who served between July 1947 and June 1950 have in the past been completely excluded from participation in the existing program.

The measure will authorize the participation of 17,000 previously ineligible veterans.

A "yes" vote on Ballot Measure 4 assures that all veterans who served 210 days of active duty between September 15, 1940, and December 31, 1976, will be eligible for loans up to 30 years after their date of discharge. This affords the Vietnam era veterans an additional 10 years of eligibility.

A "yes" vote on Ballot Measure 4 will extend eligibility to veterans who have made their home in Oregon for 5 years. Under current law, many of these veterans would never be able to receive home and farm loan benefits.

A "yes" vote on Ballot Measure 4 will also allow all veterans who were released from active duty because of a service-connected disability or illness to qualify for loans without having to serve the minimum 210 days of active duty required for loan eligibility. Under current law, this waiver exists only for veterans who served after January 31, 1960.

Extends eligibility of World War II veterans

As of January 1980, 148,000 Oregon World War II veterans lost their eligibility to participate in the program. A yes vote on Ballot Measure 4 will reinstate and extend to January 31, 1985, the ability of World War II veterans to buy homes and farms at reduced interest rates.

Aids Oregon's economy

During period of high interest rates and tight housing markets the Department of Veterans' Affairs is the major source of mortgage money in the state. The home building industry is a vital part of a healthy Oregon economy, and a yes vote on Ballot Measure 4 will pump nearly \$22 million into that part of Oregon's economy in the next 12 months alone.

Ballot Measure 4 provides benefits for deserving veterans and continues a successful self-supporting farm and home loan program that benefits all Oregonians.

5 CONTINUES TAX REDUCTION PROGRAM

QUESTION—Shall tax reduction program adopted in 1979 be continued after 1980?

ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL EFFECTS—

Passage of this measure will establish both an expenditure limitation and an ongoing tax relief program that will have the following effect in fiscal year 1982: it will reduce personal income tax revenues by \$80.0 million; it will authorize \$168.4 million in property tax relief payments for homeowners and renters; it will increase Homeowner and Renter Refund Program (HARRP) payments by \$9.0 million; it will refund to qualified taxpayers excess revenues collected during the 1979-81 biennium, if the revenues collected are more than 2% greater than the official revenue estimate.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

Section 1. Section 12, chapter 241, Oregon Laws 1979 (Enrolled House Bill 2540), is amended to read:

Sec. 12. [Unless] As continued by the voters at the [next] 1980 primary election, sections 1 to 8 and 23 and the amendments to ORS 311.505 by section 9 [of this act], chapter 241, Oregon Laws 1979 (Enrolled House Bill 2540), apply to assessment years beginning on or after January 1, 1979[, but prior to January 1, 1981]. Section 27 and the amendments to ORS 310.060 and 310.395 by sections 28 and 28a [of this Act], chapter 241, Oregon Laws 1979 (Enrolled House Bill 2540), apply to assessment years beginning on or after January 1, 1980[, but prior to January 1, 1981].

Section 2. Section 19, chapter 241, Oregon Laws 1979 (Enrolled House Bill 2540), is amended to read:

Sec. 19. [Unless] As continued by the voters at the [next] 1980 primary election, the amendments to ORS 310.631, 310.640, 310.642, 310.657 and 310.677 by sections 14 to 14c and 18 [of this Act], chapter 241, Oregon Laws 1979 (Enrolled House Bill 2540), and sections 16 and 17 [of this Act], chapter 241, Oregon Laws 1979

(Enrolled House Bill 2540), apply to property taxes billed and contract rent and rent constituting property taxes paid in calendar years beginning on or after January 1, 1978[, but prior to January 1, 1980].

Section 3. Section 30a, chapter 241, Oregon Laws 1979 (Enrolled House Bill 2540), is amended to read:

Sec. 30a. [Unless] As continued by the voters at the [next] 1980 primary election, sections 29 and 30 [of this Act], chapter 241, Oregon Laws 1979 (Enrolled House Bill 2540), apply [only] to [the] each biennium beginning on or after July 1, 1979.

Section 4. Section 50, chapter 241, Oregon Laws 1979 (Enrolled House Bill 2540), is amended to read:

Sec. 50. [Unless] As continued by the voters at the [next] 1980 primary election, sections 32 and 48 and the amendments to ORS sections relative thereto contained in sections 33 to 47 and 49 [of this Act], chapter 241, Oregon Laws 1979 (Enrolled House Bill 2540), apply to assessment years beginning on or after January 1, 1980[, but prior to January 1, 1981].

Section 5. Section 4, chapter 240, Oregon Laws 1979 (Enrolled House Bill 2589), is amended to read:

Sec. 4. EXPLANATION

Limits on Assessed Value Growth—The tax plan imposes limits on growth of assessed value in 1980. Under the plan, property is divided into two classes. One class is owner-occupied homes. The other class is all other property. Under the limits, the value of the homes as a class and the value of all other property as a class cannot increase more than five percent in 1980.

This measure keeps the same limits on increases in assessed value for years after 1980.

Reduced Property Tax—The tax plan requires the state to pay part of the 1979 and 1980 property tax on a residence. The amount paid by the state is 30 percent of the tax on the home except:

- (1) The tax used to pay bonds.
- (2) The tax used to pay for public buildings and land.
- (3) Any property tax levied outside the tax base that has grown more than inflation plus population.

If the owner lives in the home, the most the state pays to the owner of the home is \$800. If the home is rented, the most the state pays to the renter of the home is \$400.

The measure requires that the state continue this program after 1980.

Homeowner and Renter Relief Program—In addition to the above property tax relief program, the state may pay all or a portion of the property tax on a person's residence based upon household income. The legislature increased the amount of tax relief paid at each income level. It also increased the top income level at which tax relief is paid to \$17,500. This measure keeps these increases for years beyond 1980.

Reduced Personal Income Tax—The personal exemption was increased from \$750 to \$1,000 for tax years 1979 and 1980. The measure keeps the \$1,000 amount after 1980 and requires that it increase each year for inflation.

The top amount of federal income tax that a person may deduct was raised from \$5,000 to \$7,000. The measure retains the increase.

Limit on State Spending—The tax plan limits state spending during the two-year budget period ending June 30, 1981. State spending in those two years may not grow more than the rate of growth in state personal income. If at the end of the two-year period, state revenue has increased more than two percent over the amount estimated, the state must return the surplus to the income taxpayers.

The measure keeps these limits on state spending for the next two years and thereafter.

Local Spending Control—The tax plan controls local spending outside the tax base by:

- (1) Not paying a portion of any property tax increase greater than the growth of inflation plus population.
- (2) Requiring that any tax increase greater than the growth of inflation plus population be approved by a ballot that explains that the State of Oregon will not pay part.
- (3) Limiting the number of elections that seek approval of an increase greater than the growth of inflation plus population.

The measure keeps these controls.

6 DEFINITION OF MULTIFAMILY LOW INCOME ELDERLY HOUSING

QUESTION—Shall "multifamily housing" bond program allow unit ownership or purchase, as well as rental or lease, by low income elderly?

PURPOSE—Provides definition of multifamily housing in elderly housing bond program previously approved by voters in May 1978.

Allows bonds to be used to finance structures or facilities which include but are not limited to apartments, cooperatives, mobile home parks and congregate care facilities, in which the units are rented, leased, owned or purchased by low income elderly households.

Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

Paragraph 1. Section 1, Article XI-I of the Oregon Constitution, as set forth by House Joint Resolution 61 (1977), is amended to read:

Sec. 1. In the manner provided by law and notwithstanding the limitations contained in section 7, Article XI of this Constitution, the credit of the State of Oregon may be loaned and indebtedness incurred in an amount not to exceed, at any one time, one-half of one percent of the true cash value of all taxable property in the state to provide funds to be advanced, by contract, grant, loan or otherwise, for the purpose of providing additional financing for multifamily housing for elderly households of low income. **Multifamily housing means a structure or facility designed to contain more than one living unit, which units may be rented, leased, owned or purchased by elderly households of low income. The structure or facility may provide spaces for common use by the occupants.**

Paragraph 2. The following shall be the ballot title for the amendment proposed by paragraph 1 of this resolution pursuant to ORS 254.073:

DEFINITION OF MULTIFAMILY LOW INCOME ELDERLY HOUSING

Provides definition of multifamily housing in elderly housing bond program previously approved by voters in May 1978.

Allows bonds to be used to finance structures or facilities which include but are not limited to apartments, cooperatives, mobile home parks and congregate care facilities, in which the units are rented, leased, owned or purchased by low income elderly households.

Paragraph 3. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next state-wide primary election.

Measure No. 6

STATE OF

EXPLANATION

This measure amends the State Constitution. It defines "multifamily housing" for the elderly housing program. The program was approved by the voters in 1978, but the term "multifamily housing" was not defined. This definition lets the State Housing Division finance either structures or facilities with more than one living unit.

Living units can be rented, leased, owned or purchased by eligible households. For example, cooperatives, condominiums, and mobile home parks could be financed, as well as apartments. A structure or facility may have common space for the residents' use.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR

Measure #6 makes a minor technical change in the Oregon Constitution in order to provide a great deal of assistance to the elderly.

Article XI-I of the Oregon Constitution allows the State of Oregon to issue general obligation bonds to finance multiple unit housing for the elderly. However, the Attorney General has ruled that multiple unit housing in the context of Article XI-I means only rental housing. It does not mean a variety of other types of multiple unit living situations which may provide a broader choice of reasonably-priced housing for the elderly citizens of this state.

Measure #6 expands the definition of "multifamily housing" contained within Article XI-I of the Oregon Constitution to include structures or facilities other than apartments. Additional types of structures or facilities which could be financed if Measure #6 passes include cooperatives, condominiums, mobile home parks, and other retirement facilities offering a range of services. For example, if Measure #6 is passed, the state could issue general obligation bonds to finance the construction of multiple-unit dwellings in which units are leased or owned. It could finance the construction of new mobile home parks in which spaces are rented to elderly persons owning their own mobile homes. In all of the structures or facilities, the state would be in a position to assure that unreasonable profits were not extracted by the developer and that rent gouging did not occur as market conditions tightened.

Measure #6 does not add new bonding authority not previously granted under Article XI-I. It does not increase taxes. It simply allows the State of Oregon to use existing bonding authority in additional ways so as to provide elderly citizens of the State of Oregon with an opportunity to find the type of living situation most comfortable for them.

Authorizing the Directors of the Salem Area Transit District to levy a special tax in a sum not exceeding \$2,356,000 for a period of one year beginning July 1, 1980, for the purpose of providing revenue to finance and maintain the operation of a Salem Area Transit District bus system.

THE SALEM AREA TRANSIT DISTRICT DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

BE IT ENACTED BY THE ELECTORS OF THE SALEM AREA TRANSIT DISTRICT:

Section 1. For the purpose of providing revenue to finance and maintain the operation of a bus system for the Salem Area Transit District, the Directors of said Salem Area Transit District shall, for the 1980-81 fiscal year which begins July 1, 1980, levy a tax in a sum not exceeding \$2,356,000.

Section 2. The maximum rate of levy necessary to raise said sum of \$2,356,000 is 92 cents per \$1,000 of true cash value of taxable property within the limits of the Salem Area Transit District.

Section 3. This act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the day of its passage.

DEMOCRAT FOR Precinct Committeeperson

QUALIFICATIONS:

Electors of the Democratic party may elect at the primary election a Precinct Committeeperson of each sex for every 500 electors, or major fraction thereof, within each precinct.

In any event, electors of the Democratic party in a precinct shall be entitled to elect not less than one committeeperson of each sex in the precinct.

A person who has been registered to vote as a member of the Democratic party for at least 180 days before filing may become a candidate for Precinct Committeeperson of the precinct in which the person is a resident, or of a precinct within the same county adjoining that precinct.

The name of a candidate for Precinct Committeeperson is placed on the ballot when the candidate files a declaration of candidacy. No filing fee is charged.

A person who has been registered to vote as a member of the Democratic party for at least 180 days before the primary election may also be elected by write-in votes in the precinct of residence or in a precinct within the same county adjoining that precinct. A committeeperson elected by write-in vote must file an "Acceptance of Office" form with the county clerk within 24 days after the primary election.

A qualified person must receive at least three votes to be elected Precinct Committeeperson. When the office is deemed vacant, it may be filled by appointment pursuant to ORS 248.026 or 248.043.

Rules of the Democratic National Party require that a candidate include on the filing form the name of the individual the candidate supports for U.S. President, or the words "uncommitted" or "no preference." Oregon election law recognizes this requirement and permits the printing of this information on the official primary election ballot.

The term of office for a Precinct Committeeperson is from the date of the organizational meeting of the County Central Committee following the primary election until the next following organizational meeting.

SPECIFIC DUTIES:

Precinct Committeepersons constitute the County Central Committee of their party. This is the highest party authority in county political matters.

Precinct Committeepersons are the voting delegates to the appropriate congressional district conventions of the major political party with which they are affiliated. Delegates to national conventions and presidential electors are selected at the district conventions.

DEMOCRATIC PARTY RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. A Precinct Committeeperson is a member of the County Central Committee, the highest party authority in county political matters.
2. A Precinct Committeeperson represents the Party to the Democrats in his/her precinct and represents the Democratic voters in his/her precinct to the Party.
3. A Precinct Committeeperson will participate in the open elections at the County Reorganization Meetings (June 5 - July 9) and will participate in the Congressional District Conventions on June 14 to choose a majority of Oregon's delegates to the Democratic National Convention, August 11 - 14, in New York City.

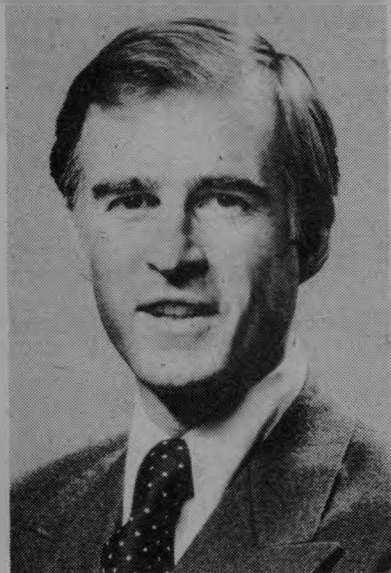

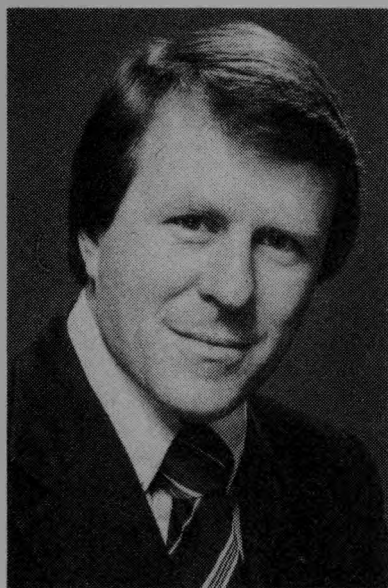

It would be wrong to go to war over Mideast oil and use the blood of young Americans to write the corporate profit sheets of the big oil conglomerates.

If the draft comes, it will be the sons and daughters of the nation's working people who will be asked to fight our wars.

The real issue today is whether we need the draft. I say NO.

ON CREATING MORE JOBS:

If we as a nation are willing to accept 5 or 6 percent unemployment then we're condemning millions of Americans to poverty and loss of their dignity.

If you want to reduce the welfare rolls, if you want to cut taxes, then support a national program of FULL employment.

ON THE NEEDS OF OLDER AMERICANS:

It's morally wrong, in the economic circumstances we're in, to spend public money on whatever the military-industrial complex asks but nothing for a national health insurance program.

It's wrong that our government is talking about reducing or taxing Social Security benefits.

ON OUR NATION'S FUTURE:

The fundamental long-term question facing us is what price—in more inflation and in American lives—our nation wants to invest in order to continue as a country that has 6 percent of the world's population but consumes 40 percent of the world's resources.

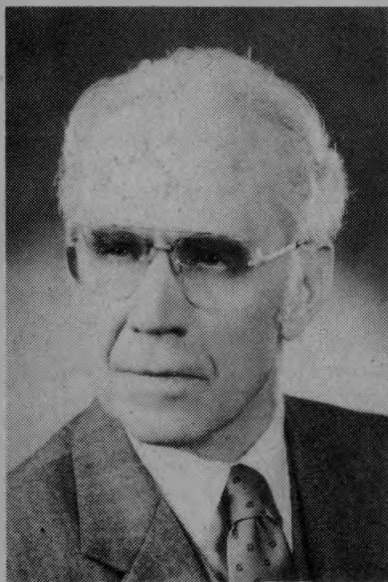

We have many problems plaguing our society today, and the solutions to these many problems are long overdue. There is a lot of money spent on our problems, and most of it is spent in the wrong direction. We must stop just pouring money into our problems and do some real planning.

CRIME SUPPRESSION: We spend millions of dollars every year on the police, who do their best in the fight against crime, and the court system which is improving. The real weakness is in the Prison system. Our prisons are overcrowded and failing to serve their purpose. The purpose of a Prison system is to: (1) Protect society, (2) Rehabilitate, and (3) Punish. Studies have revealed that it is the certainty of punishment rather than the severity of punishment that deters crime. What I propose is a "Seniority Force Out System." This would insure confinement of convicted criminals. The system would be simple, cheap, and effective, and would work like this: Diversion plans for first offenders would still be in existence. First arrivers (First confinement sentence) to serve one third of the sentence or seven years, whichever is the shorter. Those with the crime habit serve their sentence less the maximum capacity of prison space available on a "Seniority Force Out" basis. A case of one in the front door and one out of the back door by seniority.

DRAFT FOR MILITARY SERVICE: I favor, and we need, the Draft. It would give us a far better National Defense System. By getting us higher caliber people to operate the complex defense systems of our Active, National Guard, and Reserve Forces. As citizens we all have a duty to serve our country to insure our freedom.

HEALTH PLAN: We need a National Health Plan. We now provide health services to those on Welfare. People employed by progressive employers and/or with Union Contracts have health plans for themselves and their families. However there is a great void of those who are uncovered. I am not proposing socialized medicine, nor will I support it. However, insurance companies do have health plans for employers with as few as four employees. By passing such a law we would fill the void of uncovered workers.

MILITARY FORCES: We must enlarge the size of our military services, the Army from 750,000 to 1,000,000 people, and the other branches in a like manner to make us stronger, and possibly almost wipe out unemployment in this country. A great combination, security and jobs!

TAXES AND NATIONAL DEBT: Our tax system needs a complete overhaul, to be simplified for equality for all of us taxpayers. One of the greatest flaws in our tax system is that almost \$1,000,000.00 a week is spent on the interest on our national debt. Reducing and finally eliminating the national debt would allow us to get more for our tax dollar. There is much talk about "Tax Cuts"—Did your taxes go down? It is much easier to add benefits than cut taxes, so beware.

RENEWABLE ENERGY DEVELOPMENT. We must develop our RENEWABLE ENERGY sources: solar, wind, hydro, wood waste, co-generation, and conservation. We must implement Oregon Constitutional Article XI-D with the "Oregon Renewable Energy Development and Conservation Act of 1980" initiative petition. This, along with Ballot Measure #3 (See my Argument In Favor Of Measure #3) will break the logjam blocking renewable energy development.

FEDERAL REGIONAL POWER BILL. A total disaster for consumers. Ullman is a key sponsor of this Chrysler-style bailout for the private utilities and energy-intensive aluminum industry. Originally a public power supporter, Ullman now works against consumers' interests by supporting the federal REGIONAL BILL that damages the "Preference" for low-cost power for consumer-owned utilities. Ullman is undermining efforts of consumers in Klamath, Umatilla, Deschutes, Linn, Marion, and Clackamas Counties to form non-profit PEOPLE'S UTILITY DISTRICTS. THE REGIONAL BILL IS THE #1 REASON I AM RUNNING FOR CONGRESS IN 1980. The Marion County Democratic Convention unanimously demanded Ullman repudiate his support for the bill.

PETER COURTNEY ON LEGISLATIVE SESSIONS: Favors limitation on the number of consecutive terms of office in the Legislature.

PETER COURTNEY ON CAMPAIGN COSTS: Legislation to keep costs down for individual candidates for office is needed to insure Oregon keeps her "Citizen Legislature."

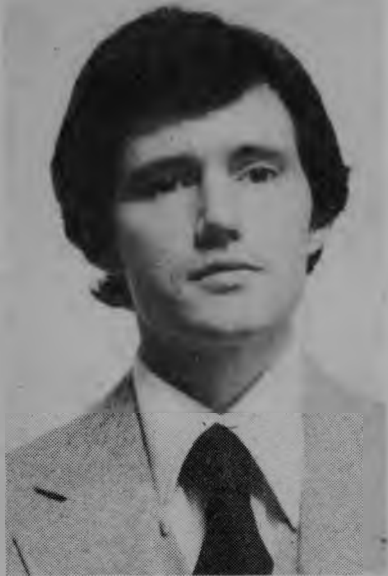

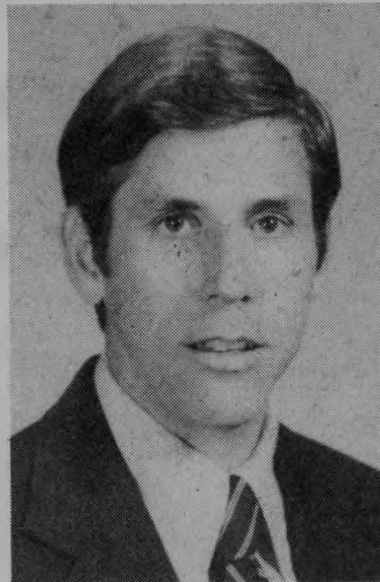

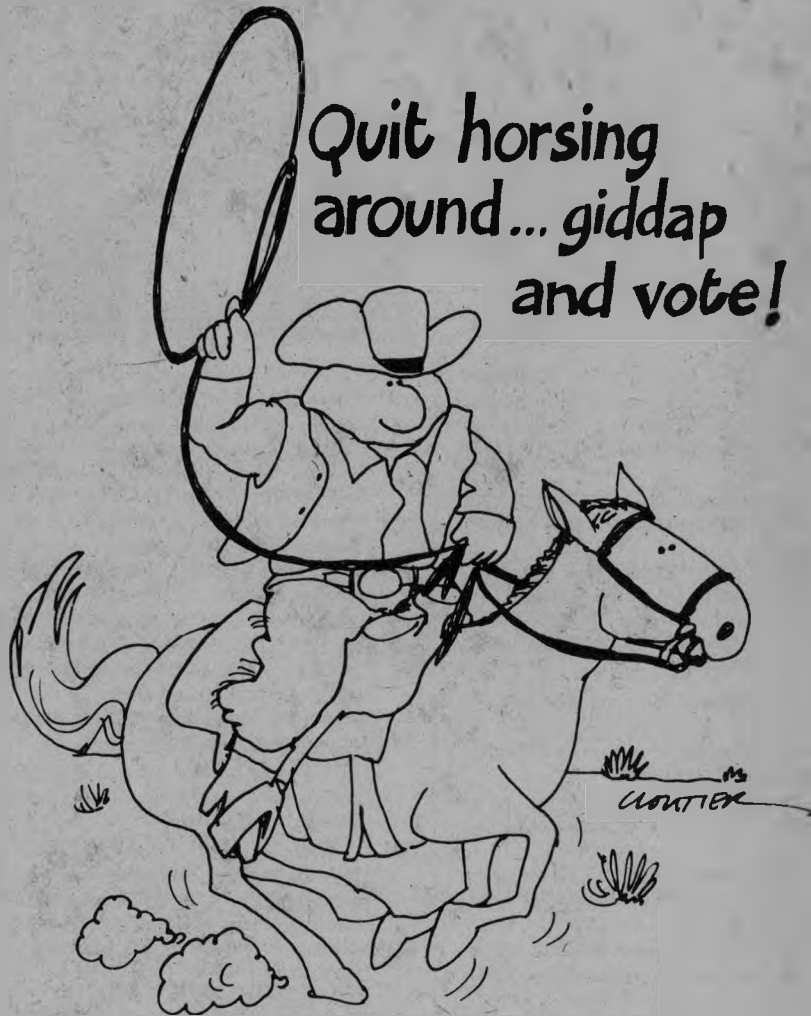

REPUBLICAN FOR Precinct Committeeperson

QUALIFICATIONS:

Electors of the Republican party may elect at the primary election a Precinct Committeeperson of each sex for every 500 electors, or major fraction thereof, within each precinct.

In any event, electors of the Republican party in a precinct shall be entitled to elect not less than one committeeperson of each sex in the precinct.

A person who has been registered to vote as a member of the Republican party for at least 180 days before filing may become a candidate for Precinct Committeeperson of the precinct in which the person is a resident, or of a precinct within the same county adjoining that precinct.

The name of a candidate for Precinct Committeeperson is placed on the ballot when the candidate files a declaration of candidacy. No filing fee is charged.

A person who has been registered to vote as a member of the Republican party for at least 180 days before the primary election may also be elected by write-in votes in the precinct of residence or in a precinct within the same county adjoining that precinct. A committeeperson elected by write-in vote must file an "Acceptance of Office" form with the county clerk within 24 days after the primary election.

A qualified person must receive at least three votes to be elected Precinct Committeeperson. When the office is deemed vacant, it may be filled by appointment pursuant to ORS 248.026 or 248.043.

The term of office for a Precinct Committeeperson is from the date of the organizational meeting of the County Central Committee following the primary election until the next following organizational meeting.

SPECIFIC DUTIES:

Precinct Committeepersons constitute the County Central Committee of their party. This is the highest party authority in county political matters.

Precinct Committeepersons are the voting delegates to the appropriate congressional district conventions of the major political party with which they are affiliated. Delegates to national conventions and presidential electors are selected at the district conventions.

REPUBLICAN PARTY RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. A Precinct Committeeperson communicates with neighbors in his or her precinct and tells their concerns to Republican officeholders and candidates.
2. A Precinct Committeeperson attends the County Organization Meeting and elects county Republican leaders. This meeting occurs not more than 50 days after the election.
3. A Precinct Committeeperson helps register new Republicans.
4. A Precinct Committeeperson helps turn out Republican electors on election day.
5. A Precinct Committeeperson attends the Congressional District Convention, held every four years, at which National Convention delegates are selected.
6. A Precinct Committeeperson helps organize the county Republican activities and works for Republican candidates at the national, state and local levels.

John B. Anderson, 58, has been widely regarded as one of the most able and articulate members of the U.S. House of Representatives. After 20 years as a congressman, Anderson has entered the presidential campaign with the firm conviction that the Republican party should widen its political base by attracting moderates of all persuasions. He intends to appeal to the conscience of the party as well as its pocketbook.

Congressman Anderson is a native of Rockford, Illinois who received his bachelor's degree (Phi Beta Kappa) and his law degree from the University of Illinois. He entered the United States Army in 1942 and subsequently won four battle stars in the European campaign. After the war, Anderson practiced law for two years in Rockford and then received his graduate degree in law from Harvard in 1949.

Anderson returned to Europe in 1952 where he served as Staff Advisor to the U.S. High Commission in West Berlin. He married Keke Machakos in 1953, returned to Rockford in 1955 and was elected State's Attorney, a post which he held until he entered Congress in 1960.

Anderson believes that inflation and energy are two of the most important issues in the 1980 campaign. In these economic areas, he has always remained staunchly conservative. "I do not believe in the quick-fix, the \$50 rebate, the huge surge of spending as a way of suddenly reversing the economy," he has stated. "We cannot launch another spending spree to try to cure inflation." Accordingly, Anderson has continuously fought to hold down massive federal spending and has introduced legislation which would require the President to submit a balanced budget to Congress.

In the area of energy, where the rising price of foreign oil is a major component of inflation, Anderson warns that the time has come for personal sacrifice. In order to reduce consumption, he has proposed a 50-cent per gallon tax on gasoline coupled with a plan to use these revenues to significantly cut the ever-growing social security tax which is borne by the working men and women of this country. Similar innovative tax measures would be used to stimulate development of alternative energy sources and the creation of an oil-purchasing cartel to deal with OPEC.

John Anderson believes in a strong, yet wise, defense for America. As the former ranking minority member of the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy, he has played a major role in shaping strategic doctrines and arms control policies. This experience has enabled him to understand that weakening our economy through excessive defense spending is not in the long-range interests of American security. Because of this view, he has voted against the MX strategic missile which in his opinion is a waste of money. Instead, Anderson favors the improvement of our conventional forces. He has therefore stressed the wisdom of being able to move quickly to the world's trouble spots or to the defense of our allies. He has supported immediate efforts to improve this capability. Yet, Anderson also believes that we must help our allies to do more in their own defense than they have done in recent years.

Anderson has been described as a Republican who dares to wear his wallet on the right and his heart on the left. During the past twelve years he has been in the forefront of progressive Republican reform. In 1968, he cast the deciding vote that sent a controversial open housing bill to the floor. Several days later he argued passionately for its passage and won credit for swinging over several crucial Republican votes for the civil rights bill, which eventually became law.

In the area of women's rights, Anderson states that today, more than ever, a woman has the opportunity to choose the way she wants to spend the rest of her life. "The government," he says, "should ensure that a woman's choice is not hindered in any way." This is one of the reasons why he is a strong supporter of the ERA. On the issue of abortion, Anderson, a devout Christian, strongly believes that the choice is a matter "to be decided by a woman in conjunction with her God and her physician. The state simply cannot be allowed to interfere with this intimate choice."

While John Anderson has long supported financial assistance for those in need, he has, at the same time, been a strong advocate of welfare reform. "Americans have every right to expect able-bodied welfare recipients to work if a suitable job is available, and when appropriate, to enroll in job-training. On the other hand," he states, "we can hardly deny assistance to those unable to work." Anderson further argues that it is a mistake to adopt dead end public work programs. Instead, he favors private sector job training run in cooperation with employers in the private sector. Such a training program, taken in conjunction with tax incentives for private industry, will have the added effects of reducing long run unemployment and increasing the productivity of American business.

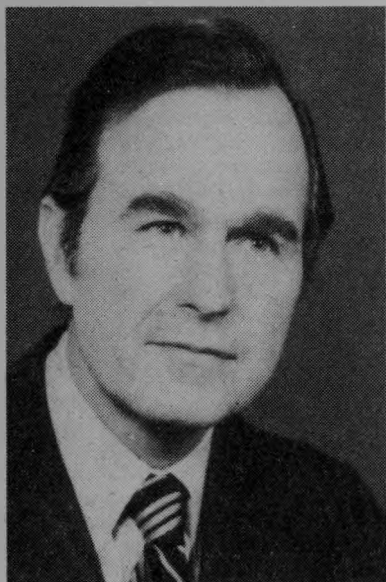
Anderson's strong views favoring environmental protection, national health care, housing, and farm assistance are all characterized by a balanced approach which couples efficient use of public funds with a disdain for unchecked federal regulation.

In his pledge to the people of Oregon printed on these pages in 1976, Jimmy Carter said:

"The American people are tired of inflated promises which cannot be kept, of programs which do not work, of old answers to new problems."

As we enter the decade of the 1980's, the question before the people of Oregon and the Nation is whether American interests at home and overseas can withstand four more years of a Carter Administration that has failed to keep its inflated promises, has saddled our Federal Government with unworkable programs, and has produced no new answers to meet our country's new problems.

In short, Jimmy Carter has failed to meet the challenge of the Presidency or the times.

These are not mere partisan words. Whether Republican, Democrat or Independent, Oregonians can measure the gap between Jimmy Carter's promise as a candidate and his performance as President by considering two fundamental issues affecting your daily life, as well as that of your family and your community.

ASK YOURSELF: How well have Jimmy Carter's programs dealt with the overriding domestic problem of inflation that now threatens to wreck the American economy?

ASK YOURSELF: How well have our country's vital interests overseas been protected by a Carter foreign policy that has faltered and fumbled because of inexperienced leadership at the very top?

Jimmy Carter's failure as President, both at home and overseas, can be traced to the fact that, while he came to the White House with high intentions, he lacked the experience necessary to get the job done.

And now, in the wake of these failures to cope with inflation and produce an effective foreign policy, we hear some skeptics say that no President is capable of dealing with the challenges of our times.

This is not true. I KNOW I will do better. We CAN get control of our economy. I built my own business, so I understand the impact of continued deficit spending—and I know it's got to stop NOW.

Having served as U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations, our first diplomatic representative to the People's Republic of China and as Director of the Central Intelligence Agency, I know that a successful American foreign policy must be based on the reality of world power, not mere wishful thinking.

The challenges that confront us are indeed difficult. But I know we can take charge of the resources of this country to meet and solve them. Real leadership means working WITH people to get things done. Leadership means not being afraid of tackling the tough jobs or making the hard decisions. That's what I have done in every position I have held—and that's what I will do as President.

Nor do I accept that there has been a failure of national will. As President, I would have the experience and the confidence to know we have the ability to meet and master the challenges facing us. As President, I would provide stable, responsible leadership through the 1980's. As President, I would move this country into an era of stability and prosperity at home and peace—through greater strength—overseas.

Here at home, Jimmy Carter blames the problems of inflation on the high cost of energy. Yet, Japan and Germany, which import more oil from the OPEC nations than the United States, have been able to keep their domestic inflation rate below 5 percent.

As President, I would, therefore, put into effect stringent programs and policies to strike at the real source of inflation—an ever-growing Federal bureaucracy that the Carter Administration, for all its rhetoric and promise, has failed to curb.

I believe that the economic policy best designed to deal with the economic problems of both inflation and unemployment is one that looks to the private sector of the economy, rather than the Federal Government, for solutions.

Here in Oregon, the economic policies of a Bush Administration would recognize and deal effectively with your State's unique problems such as:

- Exorbitant interest rates that adversely affect your housing and timber industries.
- The need for regional power and energy resource development to meet the needs of Oregon's growth in the decade of the 1980's.
- The need for tax reform that would encourage increased savings and capital formation, which are absolutely essential if Oregon and the country are to improve their productivity and ability to compete in world markets.

In America's relations overseas, we need a President in charge of foreign policy; who from the moment he takes office will understand that Soviet designs have been the same from the earliest days of Lenin's revolution. We must have a President who needs no lessons regarding the fact that Communist Russia is an aggressive, expansionist nation, a world power whose leaders recognize strength alone.

As President, I would give highest priority to restoring America's military, naval and technological power to the levels necessary to safeguard our country's vital interests around the world.

My pledge to the people of Oregon as I seek the Presidency is:

- A sound, stable economy at home, based on increased self-reliance in the field of energy;
- The preservation of peace and American freedom, based on a strong American defense establishment and a realistic approach to our dealings with friends and adversaries alike.

I believe the American people must look to the future, not the past, in their choice of a President who will meet the challenge of the 1980's. I believe all Americans seek to be united, to be brought together, to confront and solve the problems we face.

I believe the support I have enjoyed from the people of Oregon, from people all across the country, and from all points of the political compass, demonstrates I have the best opportunity to be elected President. As President I will work with you to carry out the pledge I have made today. I ask for your support in Oregon's primary on May 20. Thank you.

Yen and Prime Minister Fukuda of Japan; Helmut Schmidt of West Germany and the leaders of Australia, France and Indonesia.

In short, Reagan has first-hand knowledge of how to deal with problems on the domestic front as well as a broad acquaintanceship with foreign leaders.

On announcing his candidacy for President, Reagan called for new and better communication as well as cooperation between the U.S., Canada and Mexico through a program he calls the "North American Accord." This imaginative proposal won immediate acclaim from those who have watched with dismay our neglected and deteriorating relationship with these nations.

RONALD REAGAN ON THE ISSUES

TAX CUTS: He believes in an across-the-board income tax rate cut for all the people, which could be phased in. Ronald Reagan knows that inflation and the rising income of many is now automatically pushing them into higher tax brackets, so an increasing share of their income goes for taxes. To compensate for the loss of tax money to the federal government he would crack down on waste and place a ceiling on spending.

THE ENERGY CRISIS: Reagan knows the U.S. must become self-sufficient in energy. He believes we can reach this goal by ending restrictive controls and using the resources now available to us. He favors the use of all of our technology including the development and prudent use of coal, greater use of nuclear power with strict safeguards and accelerated development of such energy sources as solar and wind.

THE ENVIRONMENT: Reagan believes we must strike a balance, neither blindly seeking growth at terrible cost to the environment, nor excessively pursuing environmentalism so that we endanger job opportunities and the economy.

INFLATION: Reagan believes we must control inflation by restraining federal spending, boldly committing ourselves to a program of solid economic growth, solving our energy problem and bringing the growth in the money supply in line with the economy's ability to increase the output of goods and services.

GUN CONTROL: While none of us will deny we are facing a serious crime problem, Ronald Reagan believes that gun control is simply an unrealistic and dangerous panacea. He believes that a reduction of crime must be accomplished through swifter and stronger enforcement of the laws and stiffer and more certain punishment, including the imposition of mandatory sentences for persons convicted of using firearms in the commission of serious crimes.

Clean air advocates should be aware that some so called "dirty air" contains soil enriching particulates that will otherwise have to be replaced artificially at much expense.

Compensation for innocent victims of crime should be set up with public funds obtained from industries and those responsible for the cause. Alcohol, drugs, etc.

Obvious criminals should not be coddled. When in jails, they shouldn't be allowed to run them. Those who earn a chance for more freedom should be allowed to be free of those who don't want to change. But still properly supervised.

Young people should be encouraged to learn how to avoid running into problems with the law through street law courses taught in some high schools.

Shirley Field was presented with the Alumnae Recognition Award for outstanding achievement and service to Stephens College and has been given an honorary membership in Delta Kappa Gamma Society International. (Honor Society for Women Educators)

As your District Court Judge, Shirley Field tried to be fair and open with the public and inexperienced lawyers. She tried to teach the inexperienced lawyers some manners. Their reaction was to convey their unlimited imagination to the press (who will print anything without checking facts) and to the Judicial Fitness Committee, chaired by a person who had made prejudicial statements prior to the hearing and would not disqualify himself.

As a matter of fact, most of the testimony at that hearing before Judicial Fitness which subsequently led to her removal came from inexperienced lawyers and some law students.

This criticism and pressure became so intense that she knew she wasn't functioning well so she voluntarily took herself to the hospital. It was hoped that some senior members of the Bar would understand this. Instead, some who had never even been in her courtroom furnished additional fodder to the press.

Is this right?

They don't like her because she wouldn't let them run her courtroom. That wasn't their job; the people had elected her to oversee the courtroom.

The Supreme Court (281 Or. 623) ratified the Judicial Fitness report but kept changing the issues so they could not be met head-on. They failed to address some of the major constitutional and legal issues raised in her brief.

In the oral argument, she would have answered any questions put to her since she had nothing to hide, but none were asked.

It was agreed that the weight of evidence should be "clear and convincing." Yet, the Court quoted from the testimony of only one of the three presiding judges whom she served under who did not have his facts straight. The other two presiding judges indicated that she did a yeoman-like job.

This erroneous presiding judge indicated she was "uncooperative" because she would not let another judge use the furniture in her courtroom. The facts are that she brought that furniture from her own law office and she told them she was taking it home because the courtroom was to be remodeled and the possibility existed of her losing track of it.

The Supreme Court also said they had to remove Shirley Field because of incompetency due to her emotional instability. Shirley Field is just as stable as most of them. The Supreme Court had no testimony or evidence about her stability except for her statement that she had voluntarily taken herself to the hospital.

In November of 1978, Shirley Field had surgery for the removal of a massive non-malignant brain tumor. The operation was a success.

The operation did leave Shirley Field with some physical disabilities such as some facial paralysis and a loss of equilibrium. However, she has been assured by her doctors that these symptoms will disappear with the passage of time.

Shirley Field believes it to be a good thing we elect judges in this state, because voters don't want lawyers telling them what to do. Voters both in the courtroom and as jurors can make just as good a judgment as to who should be a judge as can lawyers.

Throughout Oregon's 111-year history there has never been a woman on the Supreme Court. Don't you think it's about time?

Shirley Field believes it is that time.

MY VIEWS ON JUDICIAL CAMPAIGNS:

Point One. Voters should be entitled to read the candidate's own words about the candidate's beliefs and record. While it may be more politic to have a campaign media specialist compose the statement and a committee to submit the statement, it is the candidate, if elected, and not the campaign personnel, who will write decisions for the Supreme Court.

Point Two. I am neither soliciting nor accepting contributions in this nonpartisan judicial campaign for nomination to the office of Associate Justice, Position No. Three (3) despite conventional campaign wisdom and expediency that suggest a candidate should raise tens of thousands of dollars and use the funds for massive political advertising. While the practice of accepting and using contributions is neither illegal nor immoral, the

practice does tend to create suspicions and doubts in the minds of noncontributing litigants who appear in court in cases where the opposing parties and their counsel may have been contributors to a sitting judge's campaign.

The people embodied in section 10, Article I, Oregon Constitution, these words: "... justice shall be administered openly and without purchase, completely and without delay, ...". My opinion, based upon experience and reflection, is that a judge should not appear to be beholden to any person or special interest by virtue of accepting contributions if the judge is to render equal justice under the law to all parties. Judges, like jurors, must be impartial in appearance as well as in fact. The need of the public to have confidence in the integrity, the untouchability and the fairness of the judicial system justifies this self-imposed limitation in judicial campaigns.

REASONS FOR NOMINATION:

1. The breadth of understanding, knowledge and insight gained from nearly thirty-two years as practitioner, circuit judge and referee in this state has produced awareness of the legal needs and problems of Oregon's people.

2. I have had the unique opportunity to observe, evaluate and weigh the kinds and scope of trial work problems and responsibilities of bench and bar in the adjudication of the competing and conflicting interests of my fellow Oregonians.

3. Circuit judge and referee experience for twenty-two years is a valuable asset on the Supreme Court in exercising discretion in selecting the cases to be reviewed and in deciding complex legal and equitable issues, substantive and procedural, that arise in cases in courts and administrative agencies.

4. I have always been prompt in resolving cases, after submission, upon and by deliberate and rational consideration of the evidence without fear, favor, prejudice, bias or personal obligation to special interests.

5. I am aware of the need and right of all persons to expect and receive from the judiciary maximum commitment, concern, hard work, serious and conscientious study and reasoned and prompt judgments.

6. If elected to the Supreme Court, I pledge faithful performance of the responsibilities of an Associate Justice to the best of my ability.

Because of my feeling that our government shows a lack of interest in the individual citizen, I have chosen to run for City Council.

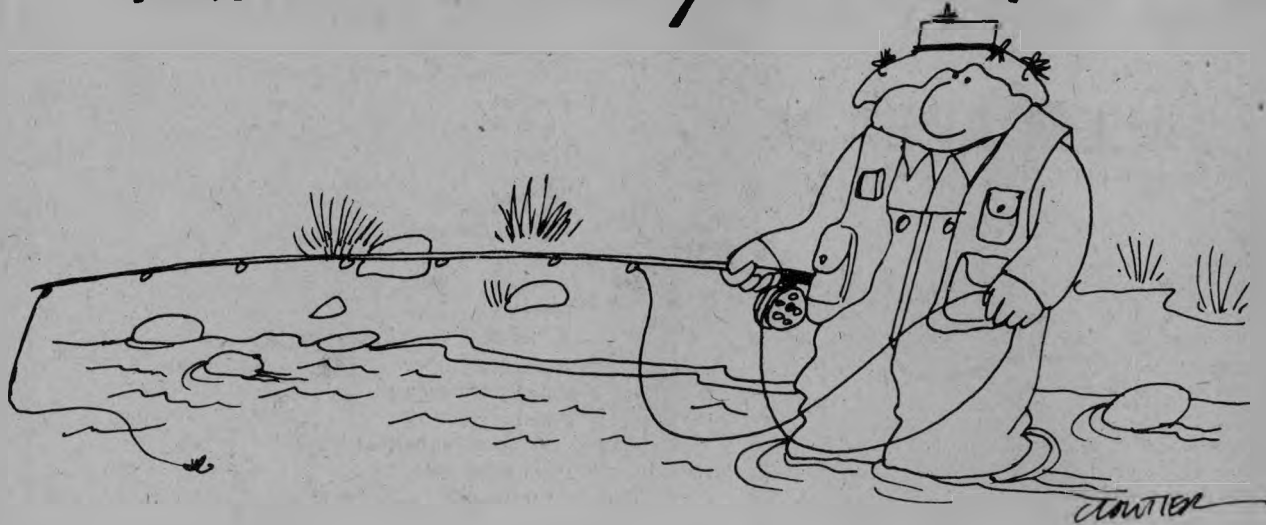


District Map

Absentee Ballots

IN STATE ABSENT VOTER

You may apply for an absentee ballot with your county clerk if:

1. You are a registered voter, and
2. You have reason to believe you will be unable, for any reason, to vote at the polling place on election day.

Your application must be in writing and must include:

1. Your signature. (This is imperative, for comparison purposes.)
2. A statement as to why you will be unable to vote in person.
3. Your residence address.
4. The address to which the ballot should be mailed, if different from your residence.

YOUR APPLICATION MUST BE RECEIVED BY YOUR COUNTY CLERK NOT LATER THAN 8 P.M. THE DAY OF THE ELECTION.

If an elector is physically handicapped, the application is valid for every election held during the calendar year for which the application is received.

The first day county clerks could accept an absentee ballot application for the May 20 primary was March 21, 1980. The ballot will be delivered to you as soon as your signature is verified and the absentee ballots are printed. It may be returned to the office of your county clerk by any appropriate means, but, if application is made by mail, be sure enough time is allowed for receiving the ballot and returning it to your county clerk by 8 p.m. on the day of the election.

LONG TERM ABSENT VOTER

You may apply for long term absent voter status with your county clerk or the Secretary of State if:

1. You are a resident of this state absent from your place of residence, or
2. You are serving in the Armed Forces or Merchant Marine of the United States, or
3. You are temporarily living outside the territorial limits of the U.S. and the District of Columbia, or
4. You are a spouse or dependent of a long term absent voter. A spouse or dependent of a long term absent voter, not previously a resident of this state who intends to reside in this state, is considered a resident for voting purposes and may vote in the same manner as a long term absent voter.

Your application must be in writing and must include:

1. Your name and current mailing address.
2. A statement that you are a citizen of the U.S.
3. A statement that you will be 18 or older on the day of the election.
4. A statement that your home residence has been in this state for more than 20 days preceding the election, and giving the address of your last home residence.

5. A statement of the facts that qualify you as a long term absent voter.
6. A statement that you are not requesting a ballot from any other state and are not voting in any other manner than by absentee ballot.
7. A designation of your political affiliation if you wish to vote in a primary election.

The U.S. Department of Defense provides Form 76 that complies with the above requirements. It is recommended that long term absent voters use this form—available at embassies and military installations—whenever possible.

Your long term absentee ballot application will be valid for all elections held within the calendar year for which it is received.

Special absentee voting instructions and a ballot return envelope will accompany each absentee ballot.

REMEMBER, YOUR ABSENTEE BALLOT MUST BE RECEIVED BY YOUR COUNTY CLERK NO LATER THAN 8 P.M. THE DAY OF THE ELECTION.

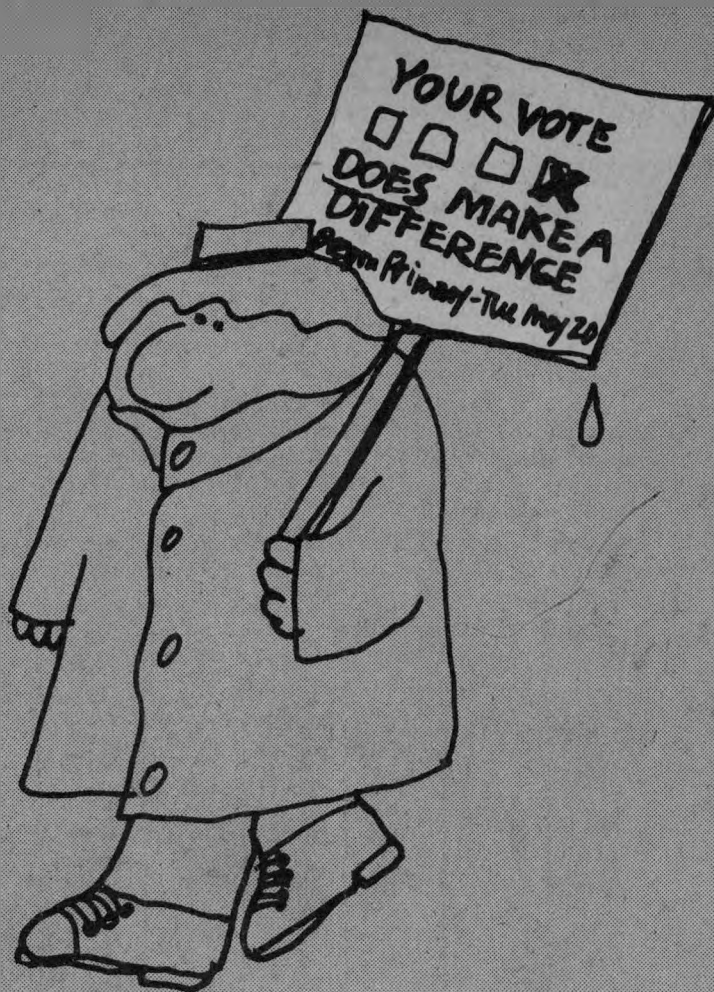
