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Gasser Lecturer to Speak on U.S. Monetary Policies

The effects of U.S. monetary policies on domestic and international investment markets will be analyzed by Herbert Evers, president of ContiCommodity Services, Inc., at the sixth annual William D. Gasser Distinguished Lecture in Business. The Gasser Lecture, in Webb Auditorium on Wednesday, April 21, at 11 a.m., is open to the public. It is hosted by the College of Business as a continuing forum for distinguished members of the business world.

Evers is the first executive with a banking background in a company that has long been involved in the grain trade. (ContiCommodity, in Chicago, is a subsidiary of Continental Grain Company.) Evers will draw on that back-

ground in banking and international economics for his address, 'Is a Stable Monetary Growth Rate Feasible?'

Early in his career, Evers was a foreign exchange, bank note and gold trader for the Hamburgische Landesbank in his native Germany. He immigrated to the United States to join Marine Midland Bank in 1966 as a currency trader and was named executive vice president in 1974. He joined ContiCommodity Services as president in 1980.

Following the 11 a.m. lecture, Evers will address a private luncheon in the Henry Lomb Room, where he will be presented with the William D. Gasser Award, designed by silversmith Hans

Christensen, the Charlotte Fredericks Mowris Professor in the School for American Craftsmen.

The Gasser Lecture is funded by RIT trustee John Wiley Jones and Jones Chemicals, Inc., as a tribute to William Gasser's contributions to RIT, as a professor in the College of Business, and to Jones Chemicals, as a director and financial advisor. Gasser began teaching at RIT in 1967 after retiring as partner-in-charge of the Rochester office of Haskins & Sells (now Deloitte Haskins & Sells). Named Outstanding Teacher of the Year in 1971, he taught accounting and tax courses at RIT until his death in 1977.

New Director Sought

A search committee has been formed in the College of Graphic Arts and Photography to locate a new director for the college's School of Printing.

According to Dr. Mark Guldin, dean of the college, the committee will meet for the first time on April 26 to establish criteria for the selection process and to elect a chairman. "We anticipate that this will be a nationwide search," explained Guldin.

Alumna Shows Pro Throws

When Betty Woodman, an alumna of the School for American Craftsmen (SAC), returned to campus recently as a visiting artist, she demonstrated her distinctive throwing technique to ceramic students.

A graduate of the first SAC class at RIT (1950), Woodman has her own production studios in Colorado and Italy and is known for her large, fanciful, "functional" pieces and her unconventional use of the wheel.

"When I begin a piece, it does not have a predetermined form," she told the ceramic students. "I am not concerned about making an 'ideal' pitcher, for instance. Sometimes my pieces look like I have taken them too close to the edge, but that is what I strive for."

During her day-long demonstration, Woodman talked about her use of the wheel as a beginning in the clay process, not as a defining element but as a technique that can be built on to form a larger piece. For example, she began the platter pictured above on a wheel, but then removed it and flung the piece to the floor several times to achieve the oval dimension she sought.

Woodman currently teaches at the University of Colorado at Boulder and has conducted visiting artist workshops at many colleges and schools of art and design across the country. In 1980 she received a Craftsman's Fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts and was awarded a Fulbright-Hays Scholarship for study in Italy in 1966.

Student Project to Highlight City's Upper Falls Area

"A Genesee Falls Celebration" will be held by RIT students from April 23 through 30 at the City Center. An interdisciplinary urban design project inspired by the visit to Rochester of internationally known artist and author Professor Gyorgy Kepes, "A Genesee Falls Celebration" explores the potential of the upper falls area from the visual, physical, psychological and sociological points of view.

Kepes has long been interested in the urban environment and man's response to its character. He is the founder and former director of MIT's Center for Advanced Visual Studies and a leading figure in the development of 20th century art. This year he holds the Kern Institute Professorship in Communications at RIT, a chair funded by Rochester Telephone Corp.

At the City Center students from the colleges of Science, Fine and Applied Arts, General Studies, Graphic Arts and Photography, and NTID will exhibit their designs for enhancing the falls area. Some of the designs are for a pedestrian park on the Platt St. Bridge, a walking route around the falls, and a museum and information center in the old Water Works Building.

The celebration will culminate with "Fall For It," a special event at the Upper Falls Terrace Park on April 24 that will feature performances by the Borinquen Dance Company, the Rochester Juggling Club, the Dady

Brothers and the Mime Workshop. "Fall for It" will occur from 2 to 7 p.m. (Sunday, April 25 is the rain date).

Both the exhibit at City Center and "Fall for It" are free and open to the public.

Kearse Lecture, Student Awards Next Week

The 1982 Henry and Mary Kearse Distinguished Lecture and student honor awards ceremony will be held on Monday, April 26, at 4 p.m., in Room A-100 of Wallace Memorial Library.

"Ways of Knowing," the title of the Kearse Lecture, will be delivered by Dr. Ernan McMullin, professor of philosophy, University of Notre Dame, at ceremonies honoring the five students who will receive Kearse awards for excellence in research in General Studies courses.

The Kearse Distinguished Lecture and Student Awards were established in the College of General Studies to honor Henry J. Kearse and his wife Mary Geirin Kearse, long-time friends of the Institute.

Conference Focuses on Older Women

A two-day conference focused on the special problems women face as they grow older will be held at Eisenhower College this Friday and Saturday, April 16 and 17.

Designed for senior citizens, for those who work with senior citizens and for the general public as well, the conference will deal with economic, social and health care issues of particular concern to older women. All conference events are free and open to the public.

Dr. Helena Znaniecki Lopata, professor of sociology at Loyola University, will deliver the keynote address, "Social Roles and Relations of Women in Middle and Later Years." Her talk will begin at 7 p.m., Friday, in Delavan Theatre.

Lopata, director of Loyola's Center for the Comparative Study of Social

Roles, is the author of the landmark sociological study *Occupation: Housewife*, one of the first books to scientifically examine the social role of the housewife.

Other topics for discussion during the conference will include Medicaid and Medicare, Social Security, prevention care and health planning, and loss and bereavement.

The conference is sponsored by the Community Services degree program at Eisenhower and the Gerontology Committee, College of General Studies. Dr. Murli Sinha, professor of sociology at Eisenhower, is conference coordinator.
