

OUR HOME ON THE RANGE


What is now one of the finest primary training schools in the country, Corsicana Field, a year ago was little more than a bare semblance of a flying field with a hangar and an excuse for a runway. But in the short space of fifteen months, under the direction of the government, the field has mushroomed into one of the chief western contributors to the ever growing might of the Air Force.


Located in a southerly direction from the town of Corsicana, the field now boasts of complete training facilities, including adequate hangars, a series of ranch type barracks, a hospital, mess hall and administration building. It's a pleasant place to look at and live in. The buildings form a geometric pattern on a wide expanse of very green grass; varicolored flowers in beds edge the many broad, white sidewalks. The cadet quarters are finished in gray and green, each bay a soldier's dream, complete with boxspring bed, a desk, chair and a huge wall locker for each man.

On the serious side of this country club atmosphere, there is the fact that the field has one of the stiffest flying courses known in primary flying circles, a ground school par excellence and a proud record of over seventy thousand flying hours without a fatality. The large group of civilian instructors who give the Cadets their first introduction to the air and Army flying methods are the cream of the crop and the planes flown the very best that money could buy for the purpose.

The field is owned and managed by Air Activities of Texas and through their efforts and close cooperation with the Army a constant expansion has kept the field abreast of the demands of the war effort. Today, instead of one field, there are five; new barracks are constantly being built and the hangars enlarged. Almost every week new planes join the fast growing fleet of training ships that are wheeled out in smart military alignment every morning on the flying line. Every ten weeks a class of Cadets is turned out ready for the next rung in the flying ladder—each man with the knowledge that he "got the works" and has learned his lesson well at Corsicana Field.

The time passes quickly as is always the case when there is a minimum of spare time, but when a class leaves the field many memories go with them— Those nights they sat under the stars and saw moving pictures, the Diesel roar of the streamline streaking down the tracks past the gate on the way to Dallas and Waco as they did calesthenics, the red morning sun throwing the oil derricks in bold relief on the horizon at reveille as the motors began to roar on the flying line, days rich with excitement and new and thrilling experience—In short, ten weeks that were more than just another post to a soldier and which he will remember vividly long after the uniform up in the attic has ceased to fit him.




MAINTENANCE DEPARTMENT G. C. McGEE, Superintendent








WALTER G. LEWIS Chief Flight Dispatcher


GROUND SCHOOL

Just as modern wars are largely won by organization behind the lines, so is the modern airplane flown to a great extent from the classroom blackboard. Understanding of Navigation, the intricacies of Aviation Mechanics, the basic principles and theories of flight, and the science of meteorology is a prerequisite of the Army flier. Through daily classes in these subjects at Ground School, Cadets learn how to find their way in uncharted skies, how to get the best performance out of the planes they will fly, how to make good and faithful servants out of the instruments in the cockpit and how to make an ally out of the elements.




FLIGHT DEPARTMENT

Physical training plays an important position in the present training program for Air Corps pilots. Since physical condition is an important phase in this present speeded-up program to train scores of thousands of pilots annually, over-emphasis on their physical condition cannot be made. This fact is borne out by the decision of the Air Corps general staff to place in each training school in the United States a well-qualified director of physical training.

Each young man before being accepted as an aviation cadet must pass a rigid



physical examination. As a result of this, the aviation cadets are far above the average from a physical standpoint. To Mr. John Keel and Mr. Alvin Chrisman has fallen the job to maintain and even improve this physical well being.

Predominant in the training program is the teaching of co-ordination, the primary pre-requisite of a pilot. Following closely in line with co-ordination is the building up of stamina necessary for the physical endurance and nervous tension accompanying this type of duty. To





accomplish this end various activities are included in the training program which lay particular stress on these points.

The primary function of this training detachment is to teach cadets to fly an airplane and it is with this view in mind that their physical activities are regulated and supervised.

Physical training at the detachment takes place every day except Sunday with the majority of the work being carried on outdoors where the bright Texas sun puts us in the pink. Provisions are also made for physical training indoors during inclement weather. Although the physical training department has been in operation only a short time, there is quite an extensive layout covering nearly all types of games. Plans now call for a still further development in the form of hard-surface areas for tennis, baseball, and other such games, as well as handball courts. Probably the most interesting development as far as cadets are concerned is the possible construction of a swimming pool.

The work of the physical training department tends to increase morale as well as increase each aviation cadets' physical well being and it is to that end that Mr. Keel and Mr. Chrisman extend their efforts to "Keep Us Fit" in order that we, the future pilots, may "Keep 'Em Flying."
