Suspicion fell upon Sanschagrin, who had been seen to enter the office with deceased, and practically every man in the town joined search parties to track down accused, who escaped to the woods immediately after the murder.

Coroner Bachand, of Sherbrooke, was notified and opened an inquest yesterday afternoon. The evidence pointed clearly to Sanschagrin as the murderer, and witnesses were called ed accordingly.

RUSSIANS STUBBORNLY DEFEND DVINA

Should Germans Cross River They Would be Compelled to Evacuate Riga

THAT BOMBARDMENT IN WEST MEAN EARLY AD-YANCE OF ALLIES.

FIERCE STRUGGLE AT DIVINA RIVER

London, September 4.—The Germans in their official report yesterday claim to have carried by assault the fortified bridge-head at Lennewada, on the Dvina River, between Friedrichstadt and Riga. This is considered for the Russians the most critical point on their whole front, for, should the Germans succeed in crossing the Dvina, the Russians would be compelled to evacuate Riga, and their position between the Dvina and Vilna, and even southwest of the latter city, would be jeopardized.

However, the Germans do not yet claim to have crossed the river, which is being defended by a reinforced army under the command of General Ruzsky, who has proved himself to be one of the greatest strategists of the war and who brought the previous German advance to a stop on the Bzura River in front of Warsaw. It is believed by military critics that the Russians will make a stubborn defence on the Dvina the op nion being expressed that should they fail here, the German fleet would gain command of the Gulf of Riga and by landing troops at Pernau would considerably shorten the protracted march to Petrograd, which is understood to be the ultimate objective of the German higher command.

In view of the importance of the battle raging along the lower Dvina, the fighting elsewhere loses some of its interest, for, wherever they are, the Russians must keep their eyes on corner of the map. this which the Russians evacuated, parently proved an empty shell to the Germans, as they captured only four hundred prisoners after street fighting. To the northwest of Vilna, the Russians are on the offensive, and

Rosebery Says He Will Act on Compulsory Servcie When the Moment Is Ripe

WOULD NOT SCRUPLE TO ASK THE COUNTRY TO GIVE POWER REQUISITE FOR SUCH MOVE.

London, Sept. 4 .- The Daily Chron-

"Lord Rosebery, in a speech at Glasgow yesterday, referred to the subject of compulsory service. We had established, he pointed out, after great effort, a national government in which we might put unlimited confidence, positively because it was a collection of the most able men, and negatively because there was no other government to take its place.

"We know, also, the disadvantage of swapping horses when crossing a stream, and our only course as patriotic citizens is to put unlimitable confidence in the Government. Surely we should have confidence in the Government, which alone had the necessary information as to the question of compulsory service.

"Of course, in this respect, the Government was mainly Lord Kitchener. Why this wrangle about it in the newspapers? Those who argued could not know half as much as the Government. If we did not put our trust in the Government and Lord Kitchener we were representing, indeed, a lost cause."

Lord Rosebery believed that if Lord Kitchener found the moment ripe and the need imperative he would not compulsory service into effect.
