At least 31 dead and 35 missing after loss of Indonesian passenger ferry

At least 31 people have died and 35 more are missing after wooden passenger ferry Acita III sank off the coast of Sulawesi, Indonesia. At least 125 more have been rescued.

The vessel capsized and sank at approximately 9pm local time last night, going down near the port town of Bau Bau. It has been suggested that bad weather was the cause of the disaster, but Bau Bau mayor Amirul Tamin has told reporters that he believes overcrowding was a much more likely cause.

An alternative explanation was offered by local police chief Mochammad Badrus, who says that the ship capsized after large numbers of passengers clambered onto an upper deck in attempts to gain mobile phone signals as the ferry neared land. Local residents and fisherman say they could hear people screaming for help as the accident unfolded.

Passenger manifests are rare and usually inaccurate when they are available in Indonesia, so passenger numbers are unconfirmed, but the ship was thought to have been carrying 150 - 200 people. However, Tamin has said that the ferry should only have been carrying a maximum of 30 passengers.

It is Indonesia's most serious ferry accident since the Levina 1 caught fire in February, which, in turn, came after MV Senopati Nusantara sank during a storm in late December.

All other likely contenders have ruled themselves out.

But he withdrew from the contest and gave his support to Mr Clegg, citing the "huge cost" to his family if he became leader and his confidence in Mr Clegg's abilities.

Blast kills 8, injures 126 at a mall in Manila, The Philippines

An explosion rocked an upscale mall in the main financial district of the Philippine Capital Manila. The explosion damaged the Glorietta Mall in the financial district of Makati and killed at least 8 people and injured at least 126 people, 98 of these needing hospitalization and the other 28 given first aid at the blast site for minor injuiries.

The explosion happened past 1:30 pm just after employees of the different companies in Makati just finished their lunch breaks.

The popo initially said that the cause of the explosion is from a leaking Liquified Petroleum Gas Tank, but after a few hours the Chief of the Philippine National

Police, Director General Avelino Razon Jr., ruled out the possibility of an LPG leak and saying that a bomb could be the cause of the explosion because investigators say that the blast site smelled of gunpowder and not of a leaking LPG tank.

Philippine president Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo meanwhile is now on her way to the blast site. Currently, the explosion is still under investigation and the PNP bomb squad are inside the mall to check if there is any bomb debris or human remains.

Cousins sacked by West Coast in AFL drug scandal

Ben Cousins, the former West Coast Eagles AFL team captain has been forcedly removed from the West Coast Eagles and is 'no longer a registered player', according to an AFL spokesperson.

Cousins was pulled over by police on Tuesday for erratic driving. Police charged the player with one drug charge and failing to provide a blood test. The drug charge was dropped today but the blood test charge still lingers, after police had found the drug Valium solely in pill form - the drug is only illegal in the liquid form (for injection).

Cousins had already been temporarily suspended by the West Coast Eagles prior to the 2007 season but has never actually tested positive to illicit drugs. Cousins then underwent rehabilitation in the USA in early 2007 and agreed to return to the club under a number of conditions, including a 'zero-tolerance clause', according to The Sunday Times this morning.

West Coast still stands in its decision to sack Cousins.

Amazon loses "1-click patent" suit

Today, New Zealander Peter Calveley successfully defeated internet bookseller Amazon.com in a suit brought over Amazon's patent for "1-click shopping". The technique, which allows a customer to purchase product without repeatedly entering personal information such as name \$180,000 per year would be and address, was seen as a valuable resource to ease customer frustration.

Amazon filed a patent application for 1-click shopping in early 1997 and was awarded the patent in September 1999. Twenty-three days later Amazon sued rival Barnes and Noble for alleged infringement by its "Express Lane" ordering which was introduced in 1998. In December 1999 Amazon won an interim injunction against Barnes and Noble but the USA Court of Appeal lifted this injunction in February 2001. Amazon has successfully licensed the technique to other e-sellers such as Apple.

The Auckland man who won the case in the United States Patent office used internet archives to show that defunct company Digi Cash used the technique prior to Amazon. Despite costing a substantial sum of cash and requiring donations to pursue the case, Calveley said he did it as a game and hopes that his success inspires others to play the same game.

Amazon announced its intent to appeal.

Australia Votes 2007: Labor releases tax plan

Labor has released its tax plan, following the announcement from the Liberal/National coalition that they would provide tax cuts

costing \$34 billion if re-elected. The government has placed pressure on Labor since their announcement on Monday, urging Mr Rudd to release the opposition's education tax refund for the better tax plan.

Under Labor's system, the government's planned tax cuts for Australians earning more than scrapped, saving \$3 billion. The savings would be spent on health and education for working families.

Speaking in Canberra today, Mr Rudd announced that if elected he would spend \$2.3 billion on tax primary and secondary schools. The refunds would be available to those who are eligible for Family Tax Benefit A. Mr Rudd claims the plan would be available to around two million children.

A Rudd government would offer a 50 percent education rebate to parents, up to \$750 per child for primary school aged children and up to \$1500 for children in be used for a variety of purchases but not for school fees. Mr Rudd said the rebate would help to equip children for the digital age.

"If mum and dad are spending money on buying a laptop, computer, spending money on ... purchasing internet connection, education software printers and books, those expenditures, (they) will be eligible to claim the 50 per cent education tax refund that we are putting forward," Mr Rudd said.

"We need to equip our young people with the skills necessary to participate in the digital economy of the 21st century."

Mr Rudd vigorously denied that he rushed the plan out after the government's announcement. "We have been working on this part of four, five months," Mr Rudd told reporters.

Labor would spend \$400 million of the savings on Labor's national health reform plan, while the remaining \$200 million would go to the budget surplus.

Under the health reform plan, an elective surgery strategy would be implemented with the aim of reducing waiting times. Mr Rudd rebates for parents with children in said the waiting times experienced by some Australians were unacceptable.

> "We intend ... to establish through the use of other funds as well a plan which would create a national elective-surgery strategy to reduce waiting times across the nation," Mr Rudd said.

About 25,000 Australians are on waiting lists for elective surgery secondary school. The rebate could despite having passed the clinically acceptable waiting period, he said.

"That's unacceptable," he said.

Mr Rudd also said that Labor would embrace tax reform by flattening the number of tax rates from four spending money on buying a home to three, at 15, 30 and 40 percent by 2012-13. This contrasts to the government's planned tax cuts bringing rates to 15, 30, 25 and 40 percent.

> If Labor is elected, those paying the highest tax rate would pay around \$10 a week more than they would under a Howard government. Mr Rudd said that he was not waging a class war and belueved those paying the top tax rate wouldn't mind investing in the country.

"If you're on \$180 grand and more, as people like myself are, I don't think you really need it just now," said Mr Rudd.

"What I say instead is that most people in that bracket wouldn't mind an investment going into bridging the digital divide for the whole country."

"If we were waging some sort of class warfare, we wouldn't be in the business of outlining the long term goals that we've put forward - a flattening, prospectively, of the tax system down to three rates rather than four with a top marginal tax rate of 40."

The government has criticised the plan, with Treasurer Peter Costello claiming that Mr Rudd copied "91.5 percent" of their tax policy. He accused the opposition of never having a tax plan.

"Mr Rudd talks about education - if he'd have brought his exam paper in after copying 91.5 per cent of the answers from the student sitting next to him, he would have got an F for fail."

The Treasurer said that it would be unlikely that a Rudd government could deliver tax cuts as it could not manage the economy well enough to deliver them.

"Unless you can manage the Australian economy, these tax cuts will not be deliverable," he said.

"Mr Rudd and Mr Swan do not understand the Australian economy. This is entirely clear from the fact they have spent four days copying 91.5 per cent of our tax plan."

Mr Costello said that a Rudd government would have a dillema

if elected, in that he could not follow the coalition's policies.

"He never had a tax policy," Mr Costello said.

"He hadn't done the work, five days after our tax policy, his great contribution to the tax debate in this country is to say 'me too, but'."

"The trouble with 'me too, but' is, it's OK for Mr Rudd to say 'me too, I'll be like Howard and Costello and adopt their policies', but if he gets in Howard and Costello won't be there writing the policies."

Mr Costello said that when Kevin Rudd runs out of ideas, the union movement would step in to provide guidance. "So who is going YouTube held launch and site to say 'me to, but' to them?
