Keep the soil mellow and free from weeds during the summer, and in the fall or spring the plants may be set out in beds about a foot apart each way with the crowns four inches below the surface. fore winter cover the transplanted beds with four inches manure. Sow a little salt on the surface in the spring and it will keep down the weeds.

# BEANS, GREEN SORTS.

### DWARF OR BUSH.

One Quart to 100 Feet of Drill or to 200 Hills; Two Bushels per Acre in Drills.

Culture. The soil best adapted to Beans is a light, rich, well-drained loom, which was manured for the previous sensitive to both cold and wet, and it is useless to plant them before the ground has become dry and warm. The largest return will result from planting in drills from two to three feet apart and leaving two to six plants to the foot of row. Up to the time of blossoming they should have frequent shallow cultivation, but any cutting of the roots after the plants come into bloom is liable to cause the blossoms to blast and so cut off the crop. Remember that beans should always be cultivated very shallow, and that it is useless to expect a crop from a field so poorly prepared as to need deep stirring after planting.

Form hills from three to four feet apart; plant five or six beans in a hill, about two inches deep, leaving space in the center for the pole. When the beans are well started, they should be thinned to 2 or 3 plants in a hill. One quart makes 100 to 200 hills, according to size of beans.

# BEET.

Culture. A rich, deep, light soff is particularly necessary for a successful growth of beets. For early supply sow very early in Spring, soon as ground can be worked, in drills 18 inches apart, 1 inch deep and three to four inches in row. For autumn and winter crops, sow later in the season—from the middle of May to the last of June. In October the roots may be taken up and stored in cellar or in pits outside, like potatoes. When young, the leaves make excellent green.

Extra Early Egyptian Blood Turnip. The earliest, and excellent in quality. Deep crimson in color. The best variety for forcing and excellent for first early crop out of doors, being very early, with small top. Leaf stems and veins dark red, leaf

dark green, dotted with red; roots very dark red, rounded on top, but flat beneath with



The results from their use are clearly seen in the improved health and condition of animals, the increased flow and quality of milk from cows, and the saving in fodder. Mangels yield enormously if the soil is rich, and can be grown at trifling cost. Everyone who keeps even one cow should grow a patch of Mangels for winter feed.

Sugar beets are not as heavy yielders as Mangels, but they are of better quality, abounding in saccharine matter. For sugar producing purposes these beets are grown exclusively in Europe and in some localities in our own country.

Culture. Both Mangels and Sugar Beets require deep, well enriched soil. Sow in May or June in rows eighteen inches to two feet apart, and three to eight inches in the rows. As soon as frost occurs, dig the crop. About 4 lbs. are required for an acre.

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



## CUCUMBERS.

THE Cucumber is a tender annual and should never be planted in open ground until settled weather arrives, for general crop about the middle of May. MUSK MELONS thrive best in a warm, rich, sandy loam. After thorough spading or plowing, make hills 6 feet apart each way and mix with the soil of each two shovelfuls of well-rotted compost. The hills should be 18 inches in diameter, 15 inches in depth, and raised about 3 inches above the surface of the land. As soon as warm weather becomes established, plant 12 to 15 seeds in a hill. When plants are well up and all danger from bugs has passed, thin gradually, leaving finally 2 or 3 of the stockiest vines to hill. 1 oz. to 60 hills. Use Slug Shot to kill bugs.







# MUSHROOM

Considering the ease with which the great luxury of fresh mushrooms may be obtained, it is only a question of time when mushrooms will be as common as onions. They may be grown in an ordinary house cellar, shed or out-of-the-way place. Caves are well adapted for the purpose. Fermenting horse manure at a temperature of about 70 degrees, mixed with an equal weight of fresh sod loam, is made into beds the size required, eight inches deep. See to it that the bed is packed very solidly and evenly. In this bed plant the broken pieces of spawn six inches apart, covering the whole with two inches of light soil, and protect from cold or rain. One brick will plant eight to ten square feet of bed. The mushrooms will appear in about six weeks. Water sparingly and with lukewarm water.

# Flowering Plants.

CARNATION. Well known to all lovers of flowers. They are very desirable for window gardens in the winter, as they produce their pretty, fragrant flowers in great abundance. Plant them in the garden in spring, so as to get a strong, healhty growth: take up carefully and pot about the first of October.

DIELYTRA. Bleeding Heart.—These pretty spring bloomers, with their graceful, drooping sprays of heart-shaped pink and white flowers are very ornamental and bloom freely early in season. The plants being hardy, increase in size and bloom from year to year and should have a place in every garden.

**DELPHINIUM.** Should be planted extensively even in the smallest garden. Its long spikes of (Perennial Laykspur.) bright blue flowers make a show from June until frost. (Perennial Larkspur.)

HOLLYHOCKS. These handsome, showy plants are at present great favorites, having won a popularity almost exceeding that of the Dahlia. 


