Public notice is hereby given that the Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale on the 30th day of Nov., 1914, did, at its meeting on said day, adopt a Resolution of Intention, No. 764, to order the following improvement to be made, to-wit:

First: That Burchett Street from the Westerly line of Central Avenue to the Westerly line of Columbus Avenue, including all intersections of streets and alleys, be graded, oiled and macadamized in accordance with Map Number 183, Profile Number 67, and in further accordance with Specifications Number 21 for the paving with crushed rock, screenings and asphaltic oil of streets and avenues in the City of Glendale.
