The republic of China. which is fourth in area (Mongolia and Tibet not included), has already nevered diplomatic relations with the imperial German government.

"In studying the trend of events in Brazil it is interesting, to mote that one of the most significant movements during 1916 was the organization of the League in Favor of the Allies, formed by many of the leading men of the nation to express sympathy with France and abolition of the vodka fraffic. None her allies. At the close of the year there was agitation for the taking over of all the German shipping in Brazidian ports."
