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From Stable Boy to Prime Minister at Parma With a Title.

Perhaps the most extraordinary rise of fortune in the nineteenth century (outside military heroes, who are a class apart) was that of Thomas Ward, who commenced life as an English stable boy and became Prime Minister of Parma, with the title of Baron Ward, recognized by the court of his native land.

The Grand Duke happened to notice the intelligence of the young stable boy, and made him his personal groom, to ride with him always.

Naturally Ward's influence did not decline with his advance in dignity. One day he was attending the Grand Duke at a review, and when the latter asked his opinion about the troops and their efficiency, he replied favorably.

With all this flattering success, Ward had the tact to preserve his balance, and on the Grand Duke's abdication in the Italian troubles, Ward placed on the throne his master's son, Duke Charles III, who had married Louisa Maria-Theresa de Bourbon, sister of the Comte de Chambord.

In March, 1854, Duke Charles III, was assassinated in the gardens of his own palace at Parma, and that was the end of Baron Ward's rule in Parma.
