The Admiralty Programme For Year Includes Building of Three Battleships.

## Two of Them Will Be Called Dominion and Commonwealth -New Cruisers.

London, July 5.—Arnold Foster, the secretary of the Admiralty, in the House of Commons to day announced that the year's shipbuilding programme includes three battleships of a new improved class, six cruisers of the Monmouth class, and ten improved torpedo boat de-surovers.

From Stable Boy to Prime Minister at Parma With a Title.

Parma With a Title. 
