THE REGIMENT NOW IN CAMP

ACTUAL TRAINING WILL BEGIN TO-DAY

Local Corps Marched in Yesterday Well Up to Strength Presenting Fine Appearance

The Fifth Regiment yesterday morning commenced their annual training. mustered at the drill hall and paraded 250 strong, an increase over last year's strength of ten or fifteen

At about 10:45 they were in marching order, and, starting from their headquarters, proceeded by way of Government street and the Indian reserve along Craigflower, road to the

The men on the march presented a most soldierly appearance. Of course, it continues true that her happiest days are those of her childhood, when she can frolic with her brothers, and fly kites or play games in the courts of ancient temples or on the hills; but at 15 or 16 she must begin to learn cooking and how to make and mend her own and her prospective husband's clothes, for now she may at any favorable moment be matched by her parents with some austere lord, when her childish castles of fancy tumble and her freedom usually vanishes as a dream.

When they left the enclosure, however, Johnson assumed the lead and gradually drew away from his opponents. Spangler and Paxton drew out from the remeinder. In this order they re-entered the enclosure, Johnson in the lead by about 50 yards Some 100 yards separated Spangler and on, while nearly a quarter of a behind came Redfern, a Victoria representative, and the only other con-testant who by this time had not drop-ped out of the gruelling race.






