Send cash by registered letter, P. O. money order or bank check. 2-cent stamps accepted for amounts under \$1.00 if received in good condition.

We pay the postage on seeds by the packet, ounce or ¼ pound. Quantities over that require 5 cents per pound or 7 cents per quart extra in the 1st and 2nd zones. Packages over one pound require 1 cent for each additional pound.
