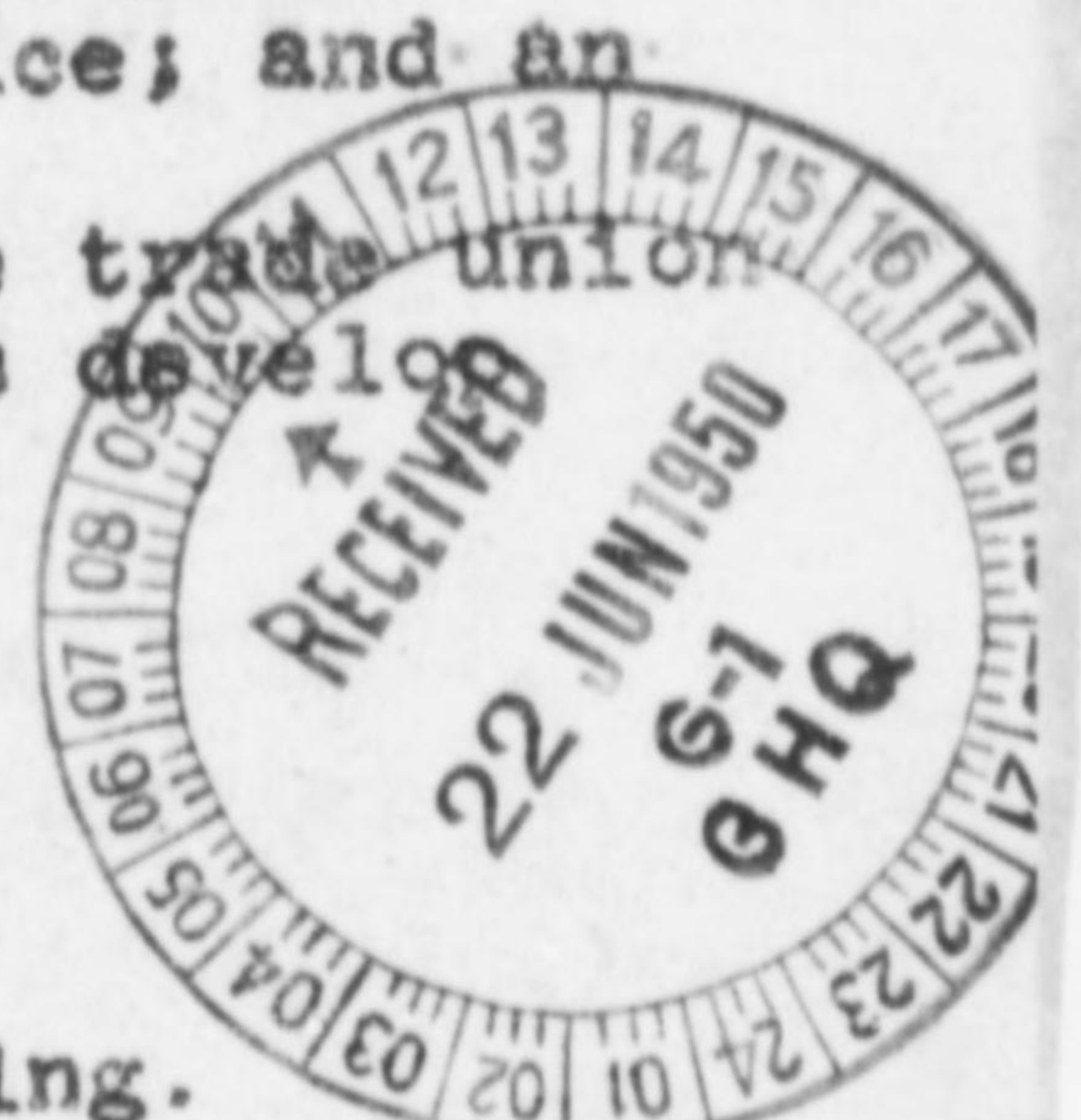

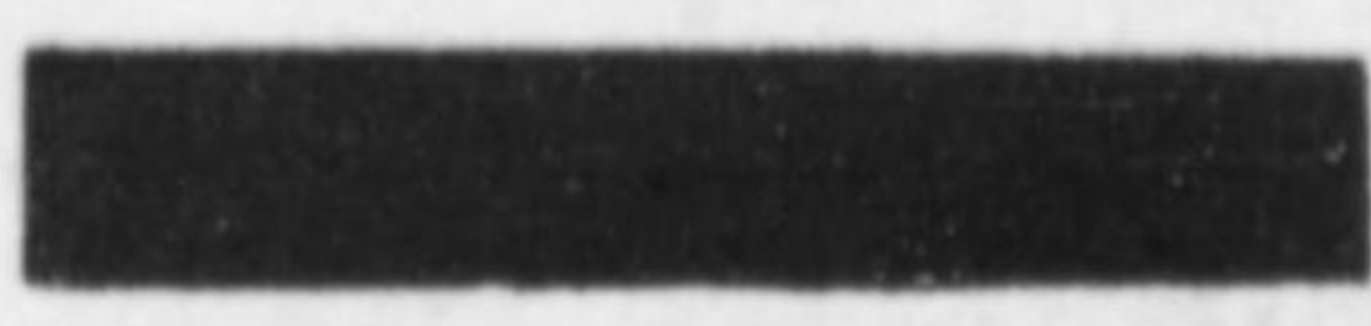

1. a. CG, MDW, has forwarded a request for entry clearance of Mr. John Brophy, CIO, and Mr. Gordon Chapman, AFL, to enter Japan as representatives of the ICFTU (Tab A).

b. The Belgian Mission in Japan has submitted a similar request on behalf of Roger Dekeyzer, Belgian national, (Tab B).

c. UKIM also submitted a request on behalf of Frederick William Dalley which was forwarded to the C/S on 21 June 50 (Tab C). In view of the fact that no official request had been received for this delegation, it was recommended that only an interim reply be made and that final action be deferred pending receipt of the official request.

2. a. The ICFTU has previously, through DA, submitted a proposal to send a delegation to Japan. Reply to this request was made on 25 May 50, and indicated that if the other nations in the Far East permitted the entry of such a group, no objection would be raised to the delegation coming to Japan. (Tab D)

b. The DA now makes reference to our reply to the previous request, and quotes a State Dept Airgram giving the itinerary and the make-up of the delegation (Tab E). This delegation consists of the individuals mentioned in par 1 above, and an Asian representative not yet named. The object of this mission is to obtain a first hand picture of trade union organizations, economic status of labor in South East Asia, determine means to develop ICFTU's Asian activities and strengthen non-Communist trade union movements. The State Dept ascribes great importance to the purposes of this delegation and has so advised the American Consuls. Further, it is indicated that the various South East Asia nations have granted entry clearance for the purposes listed above and no additional conditions of operations have been prescribed.

c. By C/N 2 (Tab C), ESS endorses this delegation and recommends favorable action on the entry of the individuals concerned.

3. a. Since the hq has informed DA that if the other nations of the Far East would permit entry of a ICFTU delegation, no objection would be raised to entry Japan, under similar prescribed conditions of operations, and in view of the fact that subject individuals have apparently been granted entry clearance to other countries of the Far East, and no additional conditions of operations have been prescribed by those countries, it appears that favorable action on the request should be taken. This conclusion is further strengthened by the recommendation of ESS.

b. If entry clearance is granted, it is considered that the activities of subject individuals should receive staff supervision by the Hq. It is suggested, therefore, that an appropriate staff section be assigned the responsibility of coordinating the visit of the delegation. It is further considered

1. It has been determined that Mr. Richard L. G. Deverall was granted entry into Japan as a house guest on 27 June 1950. This was a routine clearance, which was forwarded to the American Consul, Bombay, India. Mr. Clinton W. Allen made the usual guarantees as host.

2. a. On 28 June 1950 G-1 was informally apprised of the fact that Mr. Deverall was a persona non grata with ESS, and that his primary purpose in coming to Japan would be in connection with the activities of the work of the delegation proposing to enter Japan in the interest of the International Confederation of Free Trade Unions. It was further indicated that information was available that Deverall has intimated that he was coming to Japan as a member of this delegation, and it was known that he would not be a member of the delegation. Accordingly it would be entirely possible that his presence in Japan while this delegation is here could be embarrassing.

b. This possible embarrassment is further brought out by the fact that Mr. Deverall in 1949 attempted entry as a member of the Free Trade Union Committee of the AFL for a one year period (Tab A). Reply to this request was made by the C/S on 23 Apr 49 (Tab B).

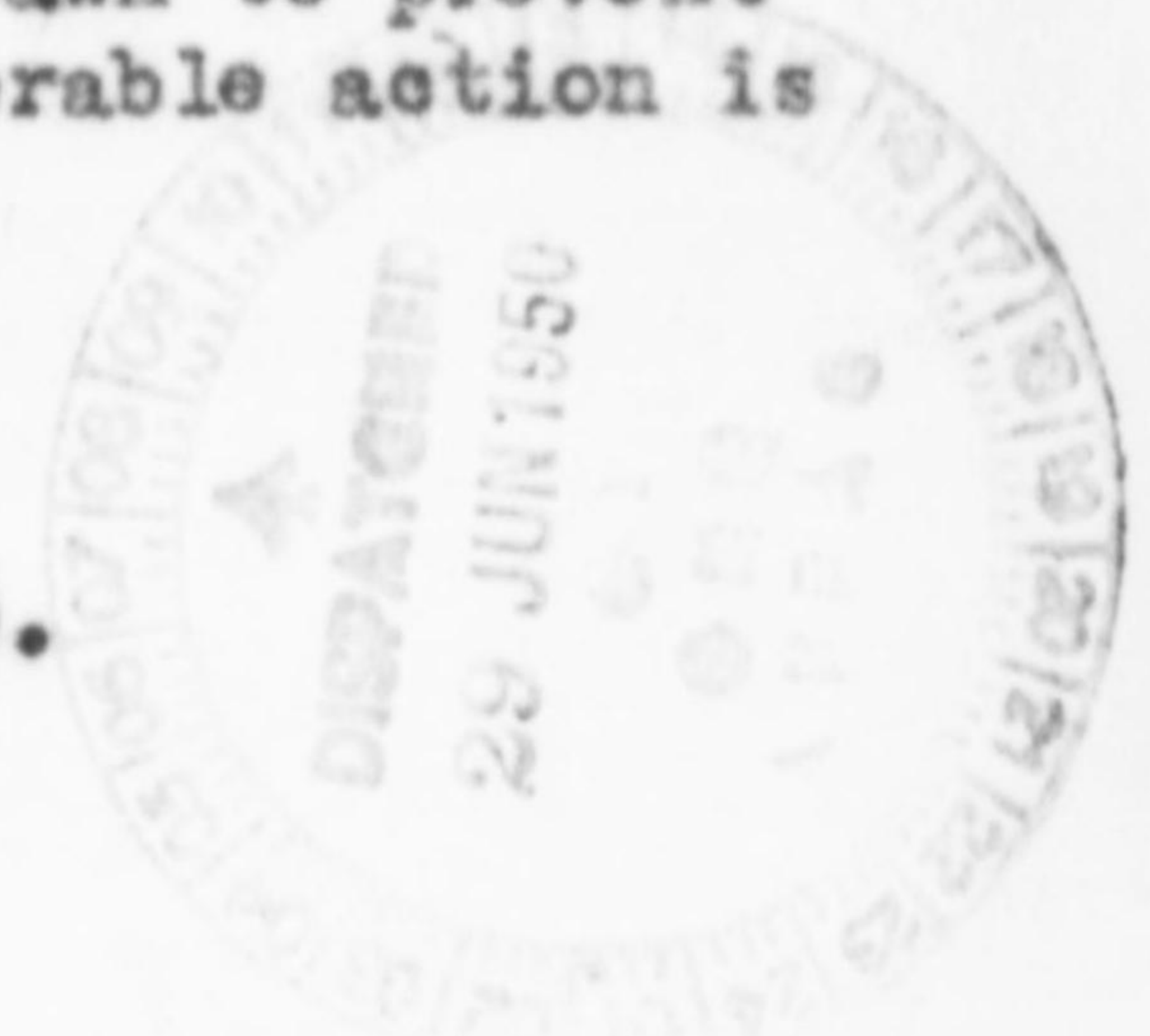
3. a. If Mr. Deverall was formerly associated with the ICFTU and it is known that he is entering Japan in the guise of a house guest for participation in the official procedures of the delegation, such action would prove embarrassing, even though house guest regulations prohibit the guest from engaging in business and provides that he must comply with local applicable directives. To attempt to curb his activities under the provisions of the house guest policy might prove very difficult.

b. While Deverall's clearance as a house guest is clearly within policy and denial could not be substantiated on the possibility that he might do something in a business way, it is felt that under existing circumstances in Japan at this particular time, entry clearance granted could be withdrawn on the grounds that the uncertain factors present in Japan at this time made it mandatory that clearance be withdrawn.

4. G-1 considers that entry clearance should be withdrawn to prevent possible international criticism of the ICFTU, provided favorable action is taken on the request of that delegation.

5. Recommend approval of:

a. Proposed letter to Mr. Clinton W. Allen (Tab C).

1. Inclosed is the entire file concerning sales of vehicles by insurance companies (Incl 1).

2. The C/S, per C/N 3 (Incl 1), dated 3 May 1950, directed three actions, i. e.

a. Withdraw from insurance companies the privilege of selling cars. (Compliance Incls 2, 3, 4, and 5).

b. Clarify SCAP Cir 4 and SCAPIN 1970. (Compliance Incl 6. The circular requires no further revision at this time.)

c. Call upon AIU to explain Koike case. (Compliance Incls 7 and 8).

3. The reply of AIU in explanation has been received and is attached Incl 9. Reference this reply, it is noted that AIU memo of 5 Jan 50 (Exhibit J to CID report of investigation, Incl 1) represents the subject vehicle as being the property of Koike rather than AIU. Also, subsequent investigation by the Chief, CID, on 29 May 1950 discloses that no accident or damage to the vehicle was reported to occupation or Japanese authorities during the period of ownership by AIU, i.e. 14 Dec 49 to 5 Jan 50.

4. Request review of this matter and your comments and recommendations together with proposed implementing action as appropriate, be forwarded to G-1. Further request coordination be effected with PM and LS prior to reply.

  - a. Application from Mr. Jack M. Philpott for permission to enter Japan (TAB A).
  - b. Radio from CG USARPAC, Number M 12950 dated 23 May 50 (TAB B), and CINCPAC reply thereto dated 25 May 50 (TAB C).
  - c. SCAP Radio Z-46619 to CG USARPAC, 26 May 50 (TAB D), and USARPAC reply thereto, dated 26 May 50 (TAB E)
  - d. SCAP Radio O-56416, 29 May 50 (TAB F).
  - e. CID report 21-0-96 M, dated 18 March 50, (TAB G).

2. On 14 April 1950, a Jack M. Philpott applied through the Governor of Hawaii for permission to enter Japan as a semi-permanent resident for the purpose of accepting employment with the Nani-Laau Manufacturing Co., a firm contemplating the transacting of export-import business with Japanese merchants. (TAB A). A security check of subject individual revealed no information which would, from a security point of view, preclude granting permission to Philpott to enter Japan. The application for entry was approved and forwarded to the Governor of Hawaii on 3 May 1950.

3. On 23 May 1950, a radio received from the CG USARPAC (TAB B) requested information as to whether the services of a SFC Jack M. Philpott, RA19324929, formerly with the 21st CID in Japan, could be utilized in the Far East Command. Upon receipt of this radio, a question arose as to whether the Philpott referred to was the same Philpott who had applied for authority to enter Japan as a commercial entrant. The CG USARPAC was queried on the matter (TAB D) and his reply (TAB E) indicated that the two actions pertained to one and the same individual and that SFC Philpott was requesting separation from the service. Further investigation of the matter revealed that SFC Philpott may have been involved in extortion activities during his tour in Japan (TAB G). Consequently, a radio was dispatched to CG USARPAC requesting that the Governor of Hawaii be advised that clearance to enter Japan as a commercial entrant in the case of Jack M. Philpott is suspended pending further investigation (TAB F). The CG USARPAC had been advised on 25 May that services of SFC Jack M. Philpott could not be utilized in the Far East Command (TAB C).

4. In view of Philpott's possible implication in extortion activities during his tour of duty with CID in the Far East Command, and the fact that he failed to reveal in his application that he is on active duty and thereby ineligible for entry into Japan as a commercial entrant, it is recommended that SCAP approval for authority to enter Japan as a representative of the Nani-Laau Manufacturing Co. be revoked, and that the Governor of Hawaii and CG USARPAC be so advised (TAB H).

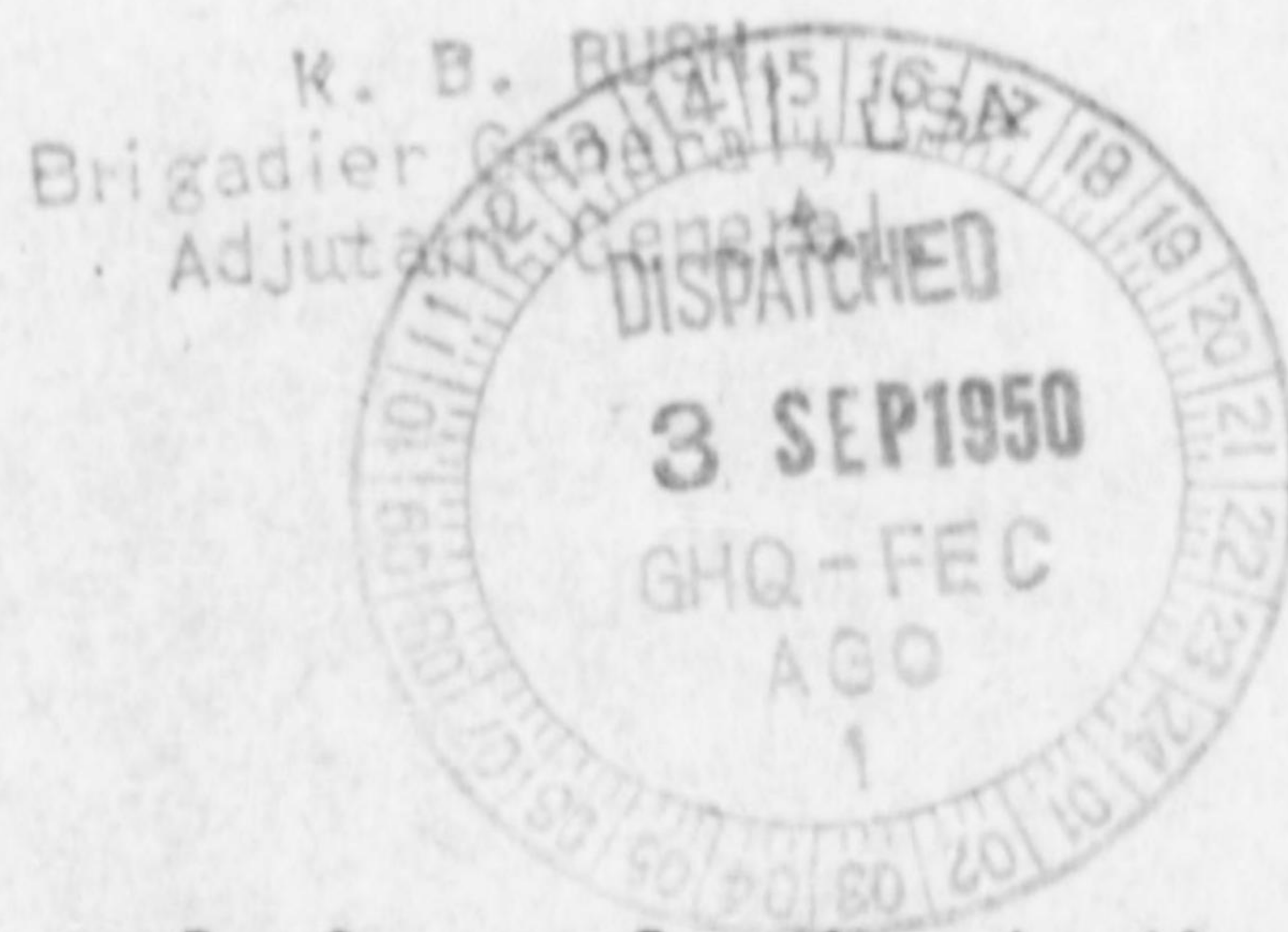

1. a. The Hong Kong Trade Representative was authorized to sponsor commercial entrants on behalf of the Governor of Hong Kong (Tab A). This authorization was based on a memo from the Department of Supplies and Distribution, Hong Kong (Tab B) which outlined in detail the screening and processing which would be taken by that Dept on applications received from individuals for entry into Japan as commercial entrants from Hong Kong.

b. In view of the unprecedented number of requests from individuals in Hong Kong and Formosa for entry into Japan in various categories, the headquarters adopted the policy that all requests from these areas after being processed as required by SCAP Cir 3, would be referred to the American Consul in those localities for a thorough check to determine if the individual was a security threat and to determine if his bona fides were in order. This processing, of necessity, prolonged the time necessary for the headquarters to take final action on applications.

2. The Hong Kong Government representative by Memo to the headquarters (Tab C) requests that in view of the thorough screening action taken by the Hong Kong Government that clearance of commercial entrants by him be expedited. Further, that this action be taken in order to facilitate the number of commercial entrants for which licenses have been granted as a result of the Hong Kong-Occupied Japan Open Account trade agreement.

3. a. As indicated in C/N 3, subject clearances require an average time of five weeks for processing. The American Consul in Hong Kong has been requested to expedite these clearances but to date no positive results have been achieved. The Consul's views have also been requested concerning the advisability of changing the procedure of referring applications to him. Reply to this proposal has not been received. However, the Consul has indicated that individuals holding Hong Kong re-entry permits can be cleared by local authorities (Tab D).

b. An indication of unfavorable reaction to this procedure is contained in a memo from the Trade Promotion Section, UKLM (Tab E) pointing out that there is unreasonable delay in granting clearances.

c. ESS in C/N 5 concurs in a change of procedure for commercial entrants. Further, simplification is recommended in granting clearances for tourists as well as commercial entrants. It is not considered desirable to eliminate the Consul's screening of non-commercial entrants since many of these probably desire political refuge in Japan or are otherwise undesirable. Further, the tourist can usually wait for a clearance while a long delay in the case of commercial entrants undoubtedly has an adverse effect on the individual and on Japan's economic recovery.

4. G-1 concludes that commercial entrant applications submitted through British diplomatic channels should be acted on without reference to the American Consul, Hong Kong.

5. Recommend approval of:

1. a. CO, MDW, has forwarded a request for entry clearance of Mr. John Brophy, CIO, and Mr. Gordon Chapman, AFL, to enter Japan as representatives of the ICFTU (Tab A).
- b. The Belgian Mission in Japan has submitted a similar request on behalf of Roger Dekeyser, Belgian national, (Tab B).
- c. UKIM also submitted a request on behalf of Frederick William Dalley which was forwarded to the C/S on 21 June 50 (Tab C). In view of the fact that no official request had been received for this delegation, it was recommended that only an interim reply be made and that final action be deferred pending receipt of the official request.
2. a. The ICFTU has previously, through DA, submitted a proposal to send a delegation to Japan. Reply to this request was made on 25 May 50, and indicated that if the other nations in the Far East permitted the entry of such a group, no objection would be raised to the delegation coming to Japan. (Tab D)
- b. The DA now makes reference to our reply to the previous request, and quotes a State Dept Airgram giving the itinerary and the make-up of the delegation (Tab G). This delegation consists of the individuals mentioned in par 1 above, and an Asian representative not yet named. The object of this mission is to obtain a first hand picture of trade union organizations, economic status of labor in South East Asia, determine means to develop ICFTU's Asian activities and strengthen non-Communist trade union movements. The State Dept ascribes great importance to the purposes of this delegation and has so advised the American Consuls. Further, it is indicated that the various South East Asia nations have granted entry clearance for the purposes listed above and no additional conditions of operations have been prescribed.
- c. By C/N 2 (Tab C), ESS indorses this delegation and recommends favorable action on the entry of the individuals concerned.
3. a. Since the hq has informed DA that if the other nations of the Far East would permit entry of a ICFTU delegation, no objection would be raised to entry Japan, under similar prescribed conditions of operations, and in view of the fact that subject individuals have apparently been granted entry clearance to other countries of the Far East, and no additional conditions of operations have been prescribed by those countries, it appears that favorable action on the request should be taken. This conclusion is further strengthened by the recommendation of ESS.
- b. If entry clearance is granted, it is considered that the activities of subject individuals should receive staff supervision by the Hq. It is suggested, therefore, that an appropriate staff section be assigned the responsibility of coordinating the visit of the delegation. It is further considered

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

2. a. G-1 is unaware of any request for the entry of Mr. Brophy and Mr. Chapman.

b. The ICFTU has previously, through DA, submitted a proposal to send a delegation to Japan. Reply to this proposal was made on 25 May 50 and indicated that if the other nations in the Far East permitted the entry of such a group, no objection would be raised to the delegation coming to Japan.

3. a. As indicated in C/N 2, ESS recommends favorable action on instant request and on any future request for the entry of other members of this mission. This recommendation is based on the fact that the ICFTU is counteracting the propaganda directed toward Asian labor by the Communist-dominated World Federation of Trade Unions. Further, the General Council of Trade Unions of Japan to be formally inaugurated on 11 July 50, has strong ties with the ICFTU.

b. Although G-1 is unaware of a request for the entry of the mission itself, it may be expected that such request will be presented in the near future which should fully outline the aims of the group and whether or not the mission is acceptable to other nations of the Far East. When such application is received, entry clearance will no doubt be granted in view of the hq previous reply (Tab B).

c. It is G-1's opinion that Dalley's request should not be given final consideration until an official request from the mission has been received and acted on.

4. G-1 concludes that an interim reply should be made to UKLM, pointing out that action on Dalley's request cannot be taken until such time as an official request is received for the entry of the ICFTU delegation.

5. Recommend approval of proposed reply to UKLM (Tab C).

2. The General Council of Trade Unions of Japan (Sohyogikai), to be formally inaugurated on 11 July 1950 in Tokyo, represents the sentiments of at least 85% of Japanese labor and has strong ties with the ICFTU. The General Council is being established to unify the anti-Communist unions and is considered to be the most important Far Eastern arm of the ICFTU. Many of its components are already affiliated with ICFTU and the General Council itself will affiliate after its formal organization.

3. The arrival of Mr. Frederick William Dalley as a member of a mission representing the ICFTU and of the mission itself is considered by ESS to be highly desirable at this time.

4. ESS recommends favorable action on the request of UKIM for Mr. Dalley's entry and on any future request from the United States or the ICFTU itself for the entry of other members of the mission.

With reference to the conditions under which Mr. Leslie Bray was appointed, the following information is furnished: Radio G 14295 GSACP, 17 July 1948 (Tab A), requested authority for assignment of Leslie J. Bray, Australian national, to headquarters Ryukyus Command as Department of Civilian Organizer and Methods Examiner; our radio Z 16395, 19 July 1948 (Tab B), authorized Philippines Command to employ Mr. Bray only for such period as required for zone of the interior recruitment and arrival in Okinawa, and advised that concurrence of Australian Consulate was required; Ryoom radio C 10437 AIAP, 15 September 1948 (Tab C), stated Australian performing duties in outstanding manner and requested authority to retain rather than recruit replacement; our radio Z 23336, 17 September 1948 (Tab D), advised that earliest possible discontinuance of employment of Australian national was required and requested expeditious replacement of subject Australian; Ryoom radio C 11223 AIA-P, 28 September 1948 (Tab E), stated that travel orders received for replacement for Bray and return transportation had been arranged.

2. It is evident that General Sheetsz is not aware of the contents of this last radio, C 11223 AIA-P, 28 September 1948.

S. citizens. Through cited correspondence, paragraph 1, it was learned that Mr. Bray was still employed in RYCOM without knowledge, on your part, of contents of radios cited above.

Through information furnished in your letter, the qualifications and

abilities of Mr. Bray are recognized and his highly satisfactory service as outlined by you have been given consideration. However, to continue employment of non-citizen employees when United States citizens are or may be available is considered inadvisable and is in itself inequitable to United States citizens.

In view of the Department of the Army policy as expressed in WOL 43764, 14 September 1946 and in a restatement of the Department of Defense personnel policy as published in Civilian Personnel Circular No. 5, 2 December 1949, it is believed that an all-out effort should be made to replace foreign nationals with United States citizens when available. It is therefore desired that recruitment be initiated to replace Mr. Bray through the following in turn: local sources, major commands, USARPAC, and the ZI.

Based upon your determination that a qualified United States citizen replacement is not available, this headquarters would then be in a justifiable position to authorize an exception to present policy and authorize continued employment in the case of Mr. Bray.



A further condition requires that tourists have passport valid for return to country of issue or visa valid for entry country other than Japan. In addition, at point of entry Japan tourists must have return trip ticket or ticket for tvl to country other than Japan on coml carrier. Believe this procedure will satisfy all conditions of tvl documentation. Program for 60 day visitors is abolished as of 1 Jul but with provision that appl under these programs will be honored and processed until 31 Jul.

Internal processing of indivs within govt of Formosa re exit reentry there is not matter within purview of SCAP to require or determine. However would be most helpful to SCAP under present procedures that when names of indiv applicants are forwarded by this hq to the embassy that the embassy in addition to ascertaining any derog info also ascertain if possible the feasibility of indivs acquiring right to depart and reenter. Based on these considerations SCAP can more intelligently approve or disapprove indiv applications.

1. Application for Passport No. 1505, dated 19 June 1950, submitted on behalf of Shidzue I. Kato is returned herewith.

2. It is noted that the financial sponsorship apparently is not motivated by the primary purpose of subject's travel and other motives may be inferred which are not in consonance with the travel of Japanese abroad. Such sponsorship, therefore, is not considered adequate.

3. It is further noted that the subject application was submitted to and acted upon by the Ministry prior to the outbreak of hostilities in Korea. Accordingly, in view of the applicant's status and the present world situation, the Ministry may desire to review its approval since it would appear in this case that travel abroad at this time may be inopportune.

4. During the current situation it is suggested that the Ministry carefully screen the applications of national leaders desiring to travel abroad under private sponsorship to insure that the absence of the individual from Japan may not prove inimical to the best interests of Japan.

1. Reference is made to informal memorandum from SGS to G-1 (Tab I) which outlines the limitations on action to be taken with regard to the application for travel by Mrs Kato. The following sub-paragraphs discussing proposed action correspond to the sub-paragraphs of Tab I:

a. It is the considered opinion of CIE and G-1 that there exists no ideal solution to prevent Mrs Kato's travel to the U.S. Her travel will in fact be impossible in this case unless the Japanese Government is authorized to issue a passport. This may be accomplished in a number of ways:

- (1) Disapprove the application in a routine manner. This method has been recommended but not approved, and as indicated by par b of Tab I, this action is not to be considered further.
- (2) Return the application without action. This method is considered unsatisfactory since it places the hq in a position of failing to take any action, when instructions to the Japanese Government state that the hq will take some action.
- (3) Hold the application in the hq without action. This measure at best would be nothing more than a delaying action, since it may be anticipated that Mrs Kato will inform her sponsors, and particularly, Mr Baldwin, that no action has been taken for a considerable period of time. This would probably result in the hq justifying to Mr Baldwin the delay in the travel of Mrs Kato in the interest of the American Civil Liberties Union.
- (4) A letter to Mrs Kato denying her travel. This procedure was previously recommended but not approved, and as indicated in par c, Tab I, further action along this line is not desired.
- (5) Attempting to persuade Mrs Kato to withdraw her application. As indicated in C/N 3, she will not be persuaded that the trip is unwise. Further verbal persuasion in this matter is felt to be inadvisable since she may distort the remarks and place the hq representative in a most embarrassing position.
- (6) Similarly informing the Japanese Government that the travel is inopportune would probably lead to unforeseen complications and no assurance that the Japanese Government would be satisfied with this action. This is particularly true since both Mrs Kato and her husband are politically powerful.

(7) A letter to the Japanese Government as indicated in par d, Tab I, is considered as a possible solution, provided a reasonable basis may be found for denying travel.

b. Disapproval of Mrs Kato's travel in any but a routine manner will necessitate a basis and reasons therefor. Denying her travel on the main issue, i.e., planned parenthood, would place SCAP in a position of apparently endorsing the stand taken by the opponents of birth control. In this connection it is felt that Mrs Kato's application meets the requirements for the travel of Japanese abroad and were she traveling only in the interest of civil liberties and assurance could be given that she would not indulge in planned parenthood activities no objection would be interposed to her travel. However, since her travel is to be denied without raising the main issue, other reasons must be advanced to delay, if not finally resolve the action.

c. Although a letter to Mrs Kato denying her travel is not desired, it is felt that a letter to the Japanese Government would to all intents and purposes be the same and have the same effect as a letter to Mrs Kato, in view of the fact that it may be anticipated that the Japanese Government will either provide her with a copy of the hq memo or a letter giving the gist of the denial of her travel.

d. A letter to the Japanese Government is normally a high level matter and certain to receive considerable publicity. Likewise a memorandum to the Japanese Government usually involves policy matters and is an official SCAP directive. Accordingly, if desired action on this case is to take the form of a letter or memorandum, it is considered that a memorandum to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs signed by the AG should be the vehicle used. If this proposal is adopted as the vehicle in denying her travel, the reasons set forth therein must be capable of being defended as a delaying action until such time as:

- (1) Mrs Kato realizes the futility of continued efforts in this matter.
- (2) There is a firm and definite denial by the hq.

2. G-1 feels that any reason advanced for denial of travel, other than the main issue, may be rendered invalid by subsequent action on the part of Mrs Kato or the Japanese authorities. However, possible reasons for denial, other than the main issue, are discussed in the following sub-paragraphs.

a. In examining the letter from the financial sponsor (Tab C), there is no indication that the Nichimei Kinema Co. is in any way interested in civil liberties or planned parenthood as such. Rather the basis of the sponsorship

appears to be the fact that Mrs Kato is a very close friend of an official of the Daiei Motion Picture Co. in Tokyo. 

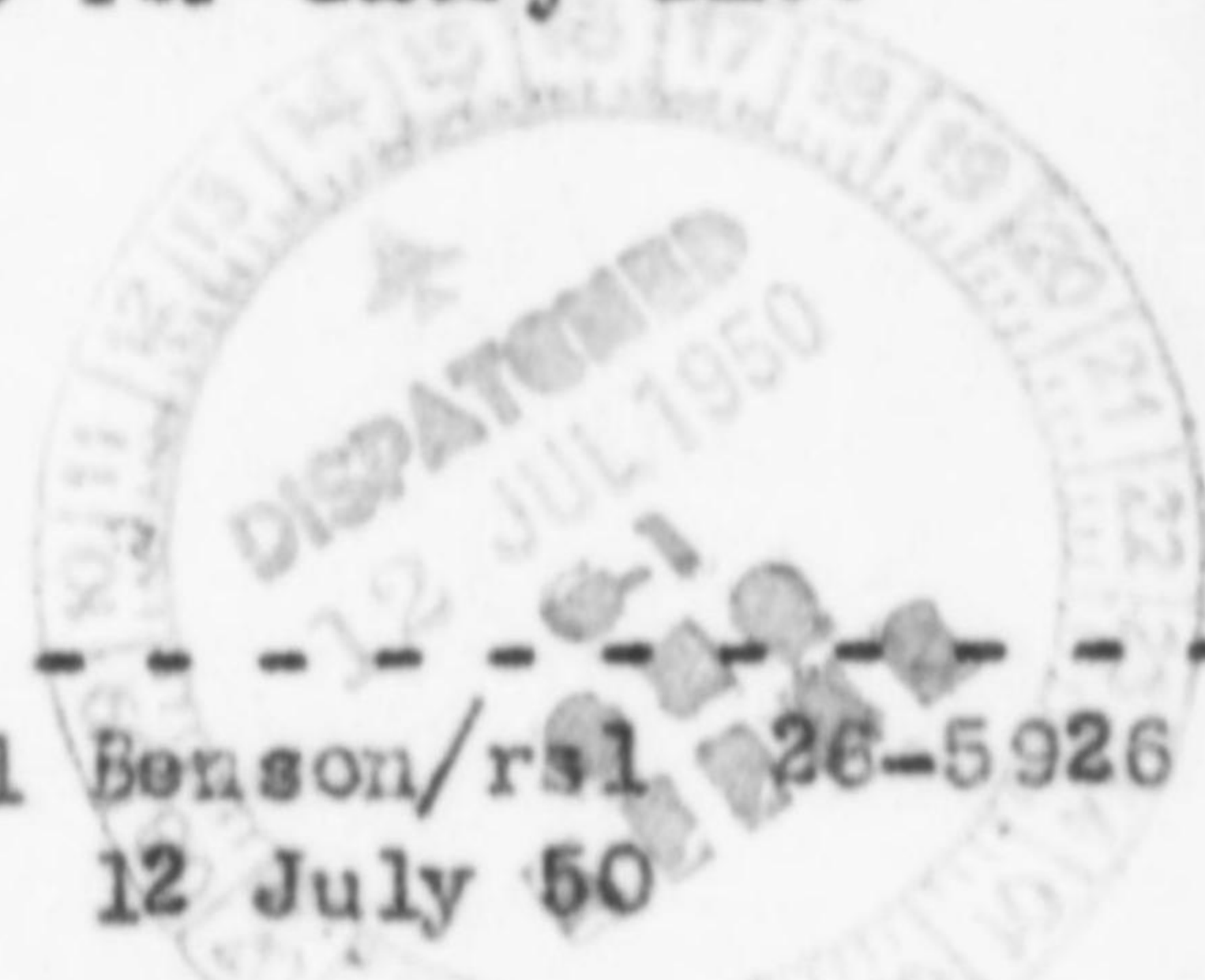

MEMORANDUM TO: General Fox

SUBJECT : Utilization of Manpower

1. Attached radio (ECA action) requested their comment regarding the laying of groundwork for current operations and post-hostilities relief and reconstruction needs in Korea. Your memo, dated 14 July 1950 suggested the possibility of "freezing" personnel until such time as definite requirements for non-military activity in Korea could be determined. Pursuant to your suggestion, G-1 recommended and DC/S SCAP approved issuance of Checknote to SCAP sections providing for:

- a. Retention of surplus DACs during the first quarter (approximately 100 in each quarter) until Korean requirements are better known.
  - b. Intensive screening of surplus DACs for employment either with non-military operations in Korea at a later date, or for transfer to other FEC agencies in Japan and subordinate commands to provide assistance as a result of increased activity and the release of military personnel.
  - c. Submission to CPS of list of personnel who could be temporarily released for other assignment to assist in the emergency.
3. Action taken as described above is considered as contributing to the maximum utilization of available manpower and places into effect the suggestions of the DC/S SCAP.
4. CPS will submit summary reports of progress in this connection which will be forwarded to you for information.
5. Advice received from CPS indicates that ECA is screening its own personnel and has declared over 100 employees surplus to their needs requesting their return to the U.S. Almost all these employees are in the highest grade brackets of SCAP-type work not readily applicable to FEC needs. With the exception of a handful of these, all desire to return home. However, intensive screening will be effected by CPS to assure retention of all those desiring to stay and likely to be used in the foreseeable future. It appears likely that the majority of these employees will return to the ZI. Clerical personnel can of course be utilized without question. A better evaluation of this problem will be possible in the next 30 to 60 days and will be submitted accordingly.
6. With reference to General Sams' memorandum attached, setting forth a plan for administering Public Health and Welfare problems in Korea. Although

SUBJECT : General Sams' Memorandum on PHW Problems in ROK

1. Earlier this week General Sams conferred with me regarding the PH&W problems bound to arise in ROK and inquired as to where the responsibility would rest for meeting these problems. I told him that thus far the decision is not to establish MG/CA activities under our military. I suggested he talk to Dr. Bunce which he has done.

2. General Sams suggests that some 38 persons are needed to supervise the use of supplies and render other assistance. A number of these could be obtained from personnel scheduled to be discharged from PH&W Section. The remainder would have to be recruited.

3. General Sams states that the necessary medical supplies are available from Japanese sources.

4. I believe General Sams' memorandum and recommendations merit consideration.

5. Dr. Bunce asked for a copy of General Sams' recommendations. I will send him a copy unless you have objections.

1. Approved action relating to utilization of surplus SCAP personnel directs as follows:

"To provide for retention of those (surplus) DACs during the first quarter, until the requirements for non-military activities in Korea become better known, and still make maximum utilization of their services," G-1 will:

a. "Request sections to submit immediately a list of incumbents which will be released during the first quarter" . . . which" personnel will be screened for other employment by CPS.

b. " . . . in conjunction with CPS and staff sections concerned, screen the list for those personnel (1) which may subsequently be required for non-military operations in Korea and (2) which may be immediately transferred to FEC agencies (GHQ or 8th Army) for necessary augmentation to cover increased activities as a result of the Korea operations . . . thereby reducing the requirement for augmentation by military personnel."

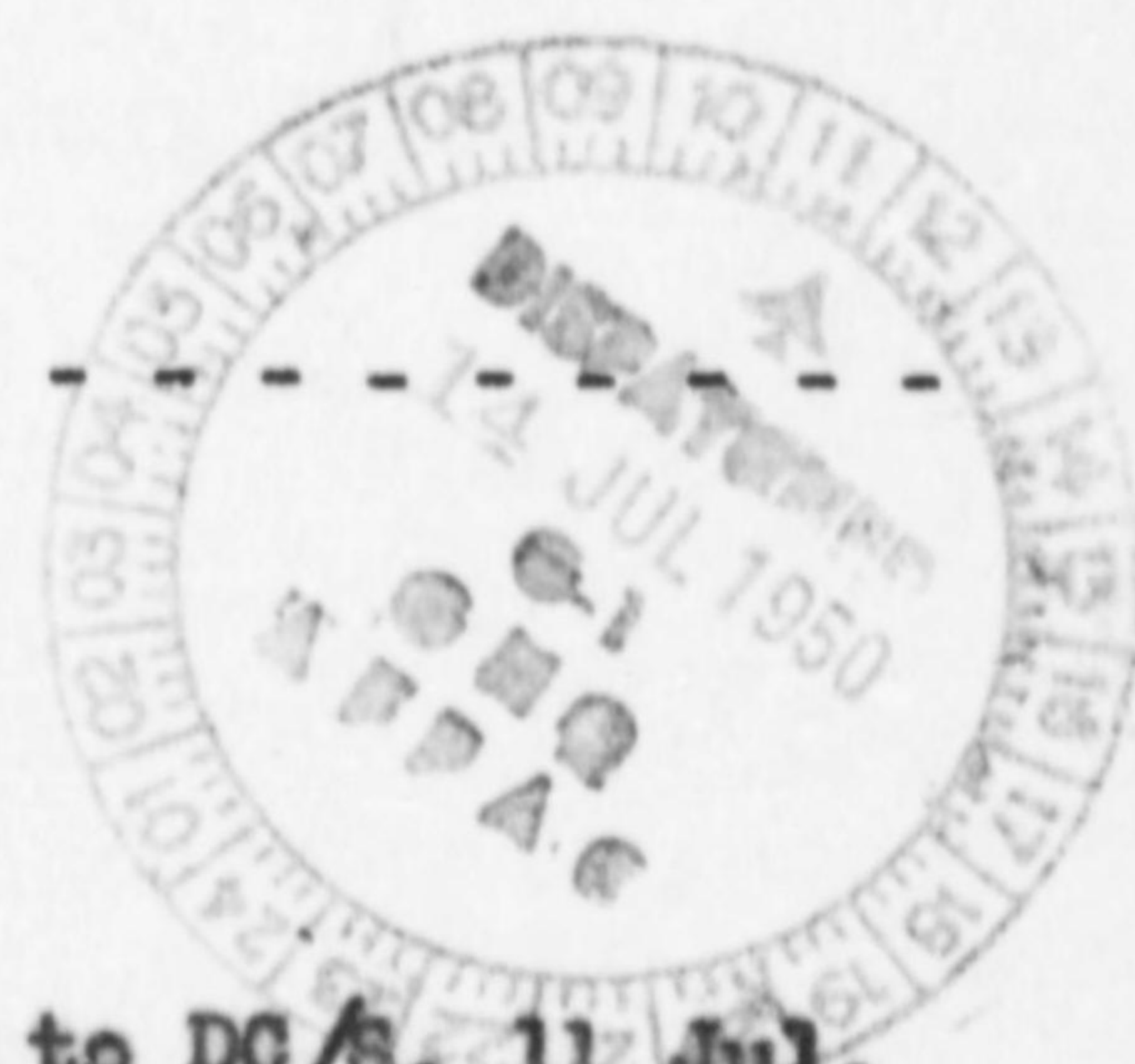
2. Tentative personnel authorizations for FYs 1951 and 1952, as determined by the Committee on Missions and Functions of SCAP Organizations have been transmitted to you by separate check note.

3. Bearing in mind the critical need for personnel, - particularly in clerical grades though technical skills are also urgently needed, - request that a list of personnel that can be permanently, and those temporarily released, be submitted to CPS as soon as possible. It is desirable that dates of availability be specified.

1. The GARIOA DAC strength on 1 July 1950 in GHQ was 1713 (1997 less 284 which are to be transferred from GARIOA to FSA effective that date): The budgetary figures for FY 1951 as approved by the Committee on Missions and Functions of SCAP Organizations of GHQ provide for an average strength of 1518. To meet this average, it will be necessary for reductions to be made at the approximate rate of 100 DACs per quarter.

2. To provide for retention of these DACs during the first quarter, until the requirements for non-military activities in Korea become better known, and still make maximum utilization of their services, G-1 proposes the following:

- a. Proceed with notification of FY 1951 and 1952 tentative manning levels as approved.
- b. Request sections to submit immediately a list of incumbents which will be released during the first quarter stating that this personnel is to be screened for other employment by CPS.
- c. G-1 personnel, in conjunction with CPS and staff sections concerned, to screen the list for those personnel (1) which may be subsequently required for nonmilitary operations in Korea and (2) which may be immediately transferred to FEC agencies (GHQ or Eighth Army) for necessary augmentation to cover increased activities as a result of the Korea operations. Sections could be authorized temporary overstrength for retention of personnel under category (1); personnel under category (2) could be reassigned (particularly in clerical grades), thereby reducing the requirement for augmentation by military personnel. All others should be separated as scheduled.

3. By separate action, G-1 has submitted a proposed Check Note to notify the affected sections of reduced FY 1951 manning levels. If the procedure in paragraph 2 is approved, a conference of representative of interested sections will be called to permit immediate implementation of this plan.

4. Recommend approval of proposals contained in paragraph 2.
