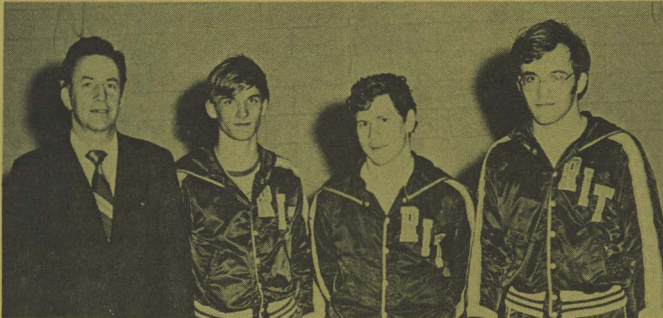
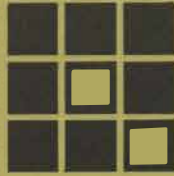

Ray Ruliffson has been named RIT Athlete of Week for the second time this year, after winning the 134 pound championship and Most Valuable Wrestler award of the New York State Collegiate Invitational Wrestling Championships.

The sophomore industrial engineering major, who also won MVP honors in the RIT Invitational, advanced his career tournament record to 16-4 and now has an overall career mark of 33-10-1.

New 'ChemTech' Program Unveiled

A new RIT Associate degree program in chemical technology, designed to meet the current needs of industry for well-trained chemical laboratory technologists has been announced by Dr. Ralph L. Van Peursem, dean of the College of Science.

Dr. Van Peursem stated that "in addition to providing well-trained technologists for the diverse operations of industrial chemical laboratories, graduates of our new Associate degree program will be knowledgeable in the complex and increasingly sophisticated instrumental techniques, and related content from other areas of the sciences."

The program will be administered by the Chemistry Department of RIT's College of Science, which is now accepting applications for September 1972 admission from high school seniors.

offering the new Associate degree as a result of the critical need, both locally and nationally, for well-trained chemical laboratory technologists who are prepared academically, as well as by actual work experience, for the daily demands of industrial laboratory operation.

"Therefore, an important feature of the new program," he said, "is that it will operate under RIT's cooperative plan of education, beginning in the freshman year."

Under the co-op plan, students alternate their classroom study with appropriate industrial work experience. Aside from making their education more relevant, the co-op opportunity also allows the student to earn an average of \$3,000 per year to help finance their education. Traditionally, the co-op experience qualifies graduates for higher starting positions and salaries, due to their work-study experience.

Dr. Wallace emphasized that included in the new program's unique features, is "exposure of the students to the science and mathematics courses designed specifically to prepare them for the specific and routine duties of the laboratory technologists. In addition, the students will spend a greater number of hours in actual 'hands-on' practical laboratory experience, than currently offered chemical technology programs."

During the last two academic quarters of the RIT program, students will specialize in a number of areas related to the day-to-day objectives of industrial chemical technologists. These specialities will include scientific instrumentation, organic synthetic procedures, and the development of biological laboratory techniques.

media production. Entitled "Israel and Her People," Segelman's project grew out of nearly two years of "independent study."

After Segelman's production, which will be staged in the GARC Auditorium followed by a question and answer period, the professional staff of the Graphic Arts Research Center will present a demonstration of color printing, utilizing the outstanding facilities of a four-color web offset press.

The formal program will be followed by a social period, with refreshments provided by Bob Day, RIT director of catering. Mr. and Mrs. Marcus Barbour, Hospitality Committee chairmen, and Mr. and Mrs. Whitaker will serve as hosts and hostesses; other hospitality committee members include Mr. and Mrs. Preston A. The Nathaniel Rochester Society was established in October of 1967 to formalize and extend the close relationship of RIT with the community.

Representing a major source of leadership and financial support for the Institute, the Society is sponsored by the RIT Board of Trustees. The gifts made by members of the Society represent leadership support, and through their generosity they encourage others to join in the efforts to expand and enhance the educational opportunities provided by RIT. In commenting on this purpose of N.R.S., Mr. Whitaker said, "Membership contributions by the Nathaniel Rochester Society in the year just past, from 139 individuals and couples, totalled \$82,500. This represents the equivalent of the return on an endowment of approximately \$1,650,000. In addition, many members of the Society made extra gifts, which totalled more than \$6,000."

The Graphic Arts Research Center at RIT serves the printing and graphic communications industry through research, continuing education, and the dissemination of information. It acts as an interface between RIT's academic programs and the commercial world of production and research.
