# NEW FLOWERS

The following list of shrubs consists of some of the more recent introductions. They are much superior to most of the older varieties, and should have a place in the garden or shrub border.

#### THE BEAUTYBUSH—Kolkwitzia amabilis

This hardy shrub is without fault and considered the most noteworthy of recent introductions. The whole plant is graceful and beautiful. It comes from the mountains of Northern China and stands New England conditions admirably. Plants, bushy,  $2^{1}/_{2}$  to 3 ft \$1.00

#### THE SHOWY GOLDENBELL—Forsythia intermedia rpectabilis

Best of all the Forsythias in free flowering and general habits. A grand shrub completely covered with flowers. Plants 3 ft. 60c; 4 ft., 75c.

#### KOREAN SPIRAEA—Spiraea trichocarpa
