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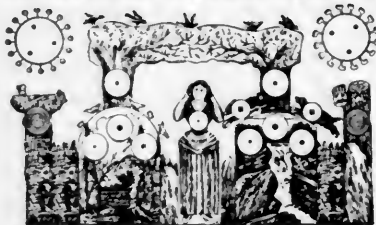

STORIES AND ANECDOTES

Notwithstanding the fact that Lawrence D'Orsay has been before the public a good many years, it was only last season that he suffered from his initial attack of stage fright, and, odd as it may seem, the spell did not come on during a performance. It developed in Washington, D. C., and, much to the chagrin of D'Orsay, in the presence of President Roosevelt. During his last appearance at the nation's capital, in The Embassy Ball, D'Orsay intimated to a friend who held an important position in the White House, that he would like to meet the President. The audience was arranged and the actor had the honor of shaking hands with the President in his executive mansion. As is his wont, Mr. Roosevelt greeted the Englishman with unusual enthusiasm, and said: "Mr. D'Orsay, this is indeed a pleasure, as I have always admired you as an actor." D'Orsay, whose face was as white as the White House, said not a word, but shook his head. Continuing, Roosevelt said: "At which theatre are you playing?" The actor was still speechless, and as the look on his face was a pitiful one, his friend escorted him out of the executive chamber.

When D'Orsay arrived at the theatre, the manager asked him what he thought of the President. "He's a great man," said the actor, "but I became so frightened by his democratic manner in receiving strangers that I could not tell him so."

Two dozen lively chorus girls and half a dozen dignified actors "stirred up things" between Broadway and City Park on Eighteenth avenue in Denver the other day. The excitement started at the stage entrance of the Broadway and continued on Eighteenth to the park until noon, and in the afternoon every picturesque section of the park was visited. Visitors to the city playground were amazed at the actions of the girls, who pursued a good-looking dude and finally chased him in automobiles. Then two police officers came up and joined in the excitement and finally arrested the entire bunch.

During the noon hour, when the actors rested for luncheon, the entire party loaded two of Linn Mathewson's monster cars and came down town to a popular restaurant. Everybody had on make-up and some wore the most lively costumes imaginable. As the two big autos rolled along the street there was much "rubbering" and wondering what the excitement was all about.

It was simply H. H. Buckwalter making another feature moving picture with the scene located in Denver and showing some of the beauty spots as well as giving a wonderfully good idea of February weather in Colorado. The feature was based on the struggles of a lot of silly girls for a popular matinee actor, and the parts were taken by almost the entire company then playing in The District Leader at the Broadway. Joe Howard, who is starring in the production, promised to come along and play the lead as the "matinee idol," but he overstept himself and missed connections, so the principal character in the picture was taken by C. R. Carpenter, formerly leading man at the Tivoli, whose robust build and actual experience as a matinee favorite especially fitted him for the part.

Miss Perry is an up-to-date society girl and is distinguished for her remarkably pleasing personality, charming deportment and exquisite in dress. When she decided to enter the theatrical profession she enrolled at Prof. Ridge's Great Western Stage School, 127 LaSalle street, Chicago, Ill., where she had the advantage of strictly professional training in all the branches of stage-craft, and in a short time Miss Perry was sufficiently proficient in singing, dancing and acting to secure an engagement through the Western Dramatic Agency with the above-named company, where she has an important role, and is featured in a song and dance specialty.

Several blocks of wonderfully pretty residences on Eighteenth avenue were caught in the background of the picture and a most interesting scene was

located at the entrance to the park, where the solid granite portals made a most attractive background for a piece of comedy acting.

Since the first of the year Buckwalter has made a dozen feature films in and around Denver and the fact that they were made in the middle of winter has been extensively advertised through the technical and theatrical papers, some of the journals commenting on it very favorably and at considerable length, and this will help spread the news of Denver's attractions as a winter resort.

Some of the pictures were made in and around Golden where there are a number of old-time houses and mountain backgrounds especially fitted to such pictures as "The Bandit King," and similar features. In one of the big productions based on the idea of "The Girl of the Golden West," Miss Pansy Perry, a local society girl, who rides a horse as well as any cowboy, took the principal part, and private views of the film have aroused much astonishment at not only the photographic excellence but the wonderfully vivid action as well.

The production of feature moving pictures is likely to become an established Colorado enterprise. Negotiations are about concluded by Buckwalter to make for one of the largest Eastern picture firms a series of feature subjects that will require at least a year to finish. As the expense for actors and "props" for each of these pictures will average considerably more than \$100, the amount of money distributed in doing this work will mean the bringing of quite a satisfactory sum of Eastern capital to this state. Some idea of this can be gained from the fact that nearly or quite \$1,000 has been spent in Golden alone since the first of the year in making the pictures mentioned.

JULIA MARLOWE PLEASES AUDIENCES IN WASHINGTON

Metropolitan in Minneapolis Breaks Record

Scores of Workmen Busy in San Francisco Preparing Auditorium for Norris & Rowe Opening—News of the Amusement Week in Several of the Biggest Cities in the Country.

BELASCO THEATRE.—Miss Julia Marlowe's new play, *Gloria*, which was produced in Philadelphia a couple of weeks ago, is the attraction at the Belasco Theatre this week. Although the papers of that city were unanimous in the denunciation of the play and the manner in which it was played, we were naturally of the opinion that we would again be forced to witness another one of this season's unfortunate ventures. To our amazement and satisfaction we saw one of the best comedies that we have witnessed for years.

The piece is well composed, rich in purest comedy, and decidedly poetic. Miss Marlowe's beauty, naturalness and musical voice all lend a hand in making a beautiful dialogue. Her work is so convincing that we sympathize strongly with the lover when he administers a thrashing to the beautiful coquette. Her humble demeanor and penitent attitude in the last act are intensified by occasional flashes of anger. The reconciliation at the end of the act is a fine bit of work and does credit to the author, yet its value is entirely due to the clever acting of Miss Marlowe. The supporting company is up to the requirements of their respective parts. Mr. White Whittiesey, Mr. Frederick Lewis, and Mr. John C. Dixon are among the better known members of the company. It is our prediction that the play will prove a success, which it well deserves. Next week: San Carlo Grand Opera Company.

National Theatre.—*Classmates*, by Wm. DeMille and Margaret Turnbull, with Robt. Edson, appeared at the National Theatre last night before a large audience, which applauded enthusiastically. Mr. Edson plays Duncan Irving, one of "nature's noblemen" sprung from a humble family, but filled with native chivalry.

Classmates is a good strong, clean play with a plausible plot, well worked out in its details and with its climaxes consistent with the general situations. During the third act one of the finest bits of realistic stage effect ever seen in Washington, is the counterfeit of a primeval South American jungle at the break of day. The entire effect in this scene is marvelous, and rarely do we ever see a prettier stage picture. Mr. Edson is supported by Frank McIntyre, Sydney Almsworth, E. M. Dresser, Macey Harlan, Miss Flora Bowley, Marjorie Wood, and others. Tuesday night was *Army Night*, the event having been arranged as a compliment to the West Point graduates, now in Washington, as well as to prominent army officers and attaches of the War Department. KANSAS CITY, MO.

It was the impression here that all the theatres would be closed on Sunday, January 5, and would then stay closed, but with the exception of the ones that were closed the previous Sunday, the Willis Wood, the Grand and the Majestic, all the others were open and did an immense business.

opens at the New York Theatre, January 28,
does a daily amount of pedal exercise that
makes Edward Payson Weston's pedestrian
stunt look like he had been sitting still.

for good behavior on Sunday.

Manager Head, of the Aldrome Summer Park,
Hot Springs, Ark., is going to offer a hand-
some gift to the first young man who will pro-
pose marriage on the stage of his theatre, to
a young lady in the audience to take place the
opening night of the coming season. He will
also present the couple with a handsome bed-
room set if the marriage takes place on the
stage.

THEATRICAL APPARATUS PRO- TECTED BY PATENT.

It will no doubt be of interest to the pro-
fession to know that the courts will sustain pa-
tents upon theatrical appliances and other ap-

paratus used by it, one instance of which ap-
peared in 1902, when the court (121 Fed. Rep.
123) sustained the patented device used by
Lois Fuller in her dance, consisting of an ap-
paratus in which currents of air were directed
against streamers, and means employed for
illuminating the streamers.

During the present month in a suit brought
by J. Williams Curson, the patents,
the patent for the apparatus used by the Curson
Sisters in their Flying Butterfly Act, was
likewise sustained and held infringed by the
La Frere Sisters, and a restraining order is-
sued, which stopped their further performances
after the first performance at the Brooklyn
Fair, where they had a contract for \$300 for
four days' exhibition, and compelled them to
file bond.

A few days later the court further enjoined
the La Frere Sisters from using their appa-
ratus during the pendency of the suit, al-
though it appeared that they had gone to Cuba,
and did not intend to again attempt its use in
this country.

It is not only gratifying to know that the
profession may obtain patents upon novel ap-
pliances and secure injunctions against fur-
ther infringements, and, much more, restrain-
ing orders on short notice, but this even when
the patent has been granted a very few months,
as was the case in both of the suits above re-
ferred to, and which is an exception to patents
upon other devices, are of fleeting, momentary
value, because, as was proven by the above
suits, the novelty of and public demand for,
the performances, for which they are specifi-
cally made, ceases long before the expiration
of the seventeen years for which the patent is
granted.

The difficulty of identifying, as defendants,
a few members of the "perfected" for the pur-
pose of legal proceedings, is amusingly illus-
trated in charging the defendants in the suit
of the Curson Sisters to be:

"Jane Doe and Ann Roe, trading and de-
ing business and publicly known as the La
Frere Sisters, migratory gymnastic perform-
ers, constantly traveling as such, having no
permanent place of abode, and whose legal
business and individual and legal names are
unknown to a certainty by this complain-
ant."

The injunction against the LaFrere Sisters
was granted in the United States Circuit Court,
in Boston, in a suit prosecuted in behalf of the
Curson Sisters by John G. Elliott, an experi-
enced patent lawyer, of Chicago.

PHILADELPHIA LETTER

WHEN the new year chimes started to clang and the mummings started to parade our streets, the theatrical profession were a little dubious as to what the new year had in store, and numerous pessimists made the prediction that business would be worse than ever after the holiday season was over. Happily their dismal howls were premature, for 1908 has started in royally for theatrical people in this city and hereabouts. Business confidence has been restored, mills are resuming work, the financial stringency has been relieved and best of all, people are spending money freely for amusement.

The theatres were all packed on New Year's day, the matinees being especially good, and this week there is not one manager who complains about business. In fact the openings on January 6 were the biggest of the season and business has kept up to the same standard ever since. Reports from the road indicate that there is a decided improvement in business on one-night stands. So many weak shows have fallen by the wayside that the good organizations have a chance to live and they are now making a little money. Over-booking had as much to do with bad business on one-night stands as shortness of cash, and many managers of opera houses are beginning to see that and claim that they will curtail their bookings for next season.

Chestnut Street Opera House. The event of the week was the first production of *A Waltz Dream*, at this house, on January 6. This opera, the music of which was written by Oscar Straus, made a decided and emphatic hit and everybody claims that it will implicate the success of *The Merry Widow*. It is full of catchy music, the book is clever and the mounting superb. The newspapers all huzzled over with enthusiasm in describing it and the theatre has been jammed every night since. It will only run two weeks and will be succeeded, on January 18, by another opera, *The Waltz King*, with Genee, the dancer, as an added attraction.

Broad Street Theatre. John Drew's third week was as big as the preceding ones, and it is safe to say that this is the most profitable engagement he has ever played in this city. *My Wife* made a big hit and could have been continued for at least two weeks longer with profit. Forrest Theatre. The *Follies of 1907* is the hit of 1908 and this beautiful theatre is packed to the doors at every performance. It will be continued for at least two weeks more.

Adelphi Theatre. Viola Allen, in *Irene Wycherly* opened to fair business January 6, and the offering pleased. Business has been fair and same attraction will play week of January 13.

Lytic Theatre. The *Great White Way* had a big opening and the theatre is practically sold out for the week. *Blanche Ring* made a big hit, and Jefferson de Angellis and Alex Carr were well received. The production is in for a run.

Walnut Street Theatre. This is the centennial year of this house, it being first opened in 1808, and it started off with renewed vigor by a jammed house, to see *McIntyre and Heath* in *The Elm Tree*. Business has been very large all week and the sale for the same attraction for next week insures a big attendance.

Grand Opera House. C. Lee Williams is making things hum at this big theatre, where *Wine, Woman and Song* is playing a return engagement to almost double the business it did earlier in the season. Week of January 13, the same attraction.

Park Theatre. Cecil Spooner had a good week, starting January 6, with *The Dancer and the King*, for first three days, and *The Girl Refuses* for the last three. She will stay another week and produce both plays.

Girard Theatre. The Original Cohen had a fair week, starting January 6, and *Hunco* in *Arizona* is announced for January 13.

National Theatre. The Shoemaker did fairly well, opening January 6, and *Tony the Bootlicker*, will be the attraction for week of January 13.

Chestnut Street Theatre. The Orpheum players gave a splendid production of *Granstark*, starting January 6, and business was very good. Week of January 13, *The Boys of Company B*.

Forepaugh's Theatre. The stock company pleased week of January 6, with *The Middleman*.

Standard Theatre. Business is very good at this house, where the stock company is producing *Uncle Tom's Cabin* this week, and will put in *Lured From Home* week of January 13.

Business could not be better at this house unless they made the four walls elastic.

Empire Theatre. The stock company is still doing well and announce for week of January 13, *Our Jim and Cumberland* '01.

German Theatre. The stock company has caught on in great shape and business is immense with changes of plays twice a week.

Casino Theatre. The *Lid Lifters* are doing great this week, opening to the largest matinee of the season, on January 6.

Bijou Theatre. Williams' *Ideals* are smashing records this week with an excellent show as the main reason.

Museum. After the marvelous business done during the holiday, Manager Hopkins looked for a falling off, but instead of that, business has increased since then. A long list of curios and a big vaudeville bill in the theatre, are the magnets that are pulling the people to this cozy playhouse.

Word comes from Baltimore, that Colonel Sam M. Dawson, of the Monumental Theatre, has again embarked on the sea of matrimony. The Colonel managed the Bijou Theatre here, two seasons, and made many friends.

The stockholders of the Wm. Penn Theatre, have organized a new company, and will endeavor to complete that house.

George M. Smith, for many years, financial secretary for Fred G. Nixon Nirdlinger, has retired from the theatrical business, and is doing well in commercial lines.

Will Jennings, manager of the Bijou Theatre last season, is now manager of Edmund Hayes' (Wise Guy) Jolly Girls Company.

Thursday evening, January 9, was a gala night at the Treasurers' Club. It marked the first series of events that will make the club the talk of the city. Every two weeks there will be a special night for different theatres at which the members of the company playing there will act as hosts. Sam Specks, the genial manager of the Standard Theatre, was the originator of the idea and his theatre had the honor of inaugurating the "special nights."

S. Labin, the well-known manufacturer of moving picture films, has arranged to have reels made of everyone of the presidential candidates. He has two large studios in this city and a force that he can send anywhere at a moment's notice. Business with his new enterprise is better than it has been for sometime. All of his theatres in this city are playing to capacity.

The Original Cohen closed in this city on January 11, and the production was sent to the store house.

Dan Fishell, who made the steam roller hum along merrily at the Forrest Theatre, and also made advanced vaudeville popular and profitable, is resting up in New York. He has had many offers but is hiding his time until the right thing comes along. The chances are that he will assume the management of a theatre in St. Louis, Mo.

John Love has returned to the Forrest Theatre as treasurer, after being away for two weeks. He has had more than his share of trouble lately as death claimed his wife and aunt within two days.

Issac Kaufman, of Kaufman and Miller, of Gerard and Forepaugh's theatres, has just returned from New York, where he went to meet his wife on her return from an extensive European trip.

It is announced that the death of Charles H. Porter, who owned the controlling interest in Woodside Park, will put that place on the market before the summer season opens.

Miss Pinkie Sheetz won first prize for the most artistic costume and good skating. Mr. Louis Grimm, second prize, for the most comical costume and good skating. Mr. George Woodward, third prize, for the most novel costume and good skating. When the midnight hour came the management had a surprise in store for all those present and announced that refreshments would be served to all desiring them. Business has been so good at this rink that Secretary J. Henkel and his associates will build another rink at Martinsburg, W. Va., 22 miles north. The new rink will be completed about the middle of December, 1908.

Earle Reynolds, who has been connected with the Anna Held Parisian Model Company for the past two years, left this show during the Toronto engagement and had booked himself and Nellie Donegan for a number of weeks in the rinks. Manager Ziegfeld, however, could not see his way clear to lose the services of the two greatest skaters, without any doubt, this country has ever seen, and sent his representative to Bradford, Pa., paying for the cancellation of the three weeks that this team was booked and signing Mr. Reynolds and

Nellie Donegan for another season at the largest salary. It is said, ever paid a dancing or skating team in this country.

The Senior member of the Moe and Goodrich team, comedy skaters who have been engaged with the Anna Held Parisian Model Company for the past two years and who have had an exceptional sensational hit on Broadway with their bumpy bumps falls, was taken quite ill last Tuesday afternoon and unable to appear the rest of the week. Mr. Moe, assisted by Mr. Goodrich, performs one of the most sensational feats ever seen upon the stage. Going at full speed this great acrobat skates off of the stage and into the orchestra pit.

Master Tuno Wagner, the Little Wonder, from Canal Dover, O., who does an exceptionally fine juggling act on skates, who made application some time ago to become a member of the Association of Expert Skaters, was accepted by the Committee of Admission as a member of the Professional Roller Skaters Association of America. There has been many applications received and another meeting has been called by the Committee of Admission for next week, when it is expected that three or four more skating acts will be admitted.

The Electric Emerson paid New York a visit last week and has been booked for many engagements throughout New York State. This is a most unique act and was quite a novelty to a skating audience.

The Famous Taylor Twin Sisters, fancy, trick and skatorial queens, played a week's engagement at the Arcade Rink, Trenton, N. J., last week. The Taylor Sisters have been well booked for the season.

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TILYOU AND FRIEDE GLOBE TOWER AT WAR.

George C. Tilyou, owner of Steeplechase Park, Coney Island, has obtained from Judge Ferguson, in the Fifth District Municipal Court, Brooklyn, an order to dispossess the Friede Globe Tower, which is now being constructed on Mr. Tilyou's property. The allegation is that the company has defaulted in the payment of rent for the quarter ending in January to the amount of \$6,500. Alonzo Grover, a city marshal, served the notice on the Friede Company.

In speaking of his action in dispossessing the company from his property, Mr. Tilyou said the land had been leased to the Friede Globe Tower Company for a period of twenty-five years, at an annual rental of \$25,000. It is three hundred feet square. The rental is payable quarterly.

Until the present month there had been no trouble over rental, but when January's installment was not paid promptly, Mr. Tilyou said he asked for a reason, and was told the company did not have the money. To protect himself, he said, he obtained the disposssession petition.

At the office of the Tower concern, it was stated that the officers were surprised at the action taken by Mr. Tilyou. It was declared that the company knew of no reason why such an action should have been begun.
