THE general features of the trade of the present year, in the most important articles of export and import, do not differ much from those of 1845; yet there are some variations to which it will be well to call the attention of our readers.

LIVE ANIMALS.—The number of live cattle imported shows a great increase upon former years; and it appears now to have acquired the uniformity of a regular trade, arrangements having been made to ensure a steady supply from a greater circle of country than hitherto. Great complaints have been made in different parts of Germany particularly of the increased price of butcher's meat caused by this trade. The following table shows the comparison of cattle imported in the first three months of each of the last three years:—

PROVISIONS.

In this trade, with the exception of a considerable increase in the import of salt pork, being 10,368 cwt against 7,631 cwt in 1845, and 518 cwt in 1844, there is nothing to remark upon.

BUTTER AND CHEESE.—The import and consumption of butter shows rather a decrease in comparison with last year. Of cheese, in both there is an increase, as the following table shows:—

FOREIGN AND COLONIAL PRODUCE.

COCOA.—The import of cocoa is larger than in the corresponding period of last year. The exports are also larger than 1845, but much less than 1844. The consumption shows a steady increase. The following are the particulars:—

COFFEE.—The importations for the whole kingdom, both of colonial and foreign coffee, exhibit a considerable decrease upon those in the corresponding periods of 1845 and 1844. In the port of London alone the import of British plantation shows a diminution, while of Ceylon the increase is large, but together for the whole kingdom there is a considerable reduction. The following are the quantities:—

The consumption of coffee is as nearly as possible the same as that of last year, being about 1,200,000 lbs greater than in 1844. The consumption of colonial coffee is a little more, while that of foreign coffee is somewhat less than last year. The export of coffee exhibits a great decrease upon both the two former years. The entire deliveries of coffee during the period under review, show a very large excess upon the imports, and the stocks on hand must have diminished in the same proportion between the 5th of January and the 5th of April. The following is the comparison:—

The stock, therefore, of coffee in bond in the United Kingdom, between the 5th of January and the 5th of April of the present year, must have diminished by 6,955,500 lbs.

SUGAR.—There is no article which, at this moment, excites so much interest as sugar. The great change in the duties last year, and the approach of the most important discussions which have ever taken place on the sugar duties, as far as determining the principles on which our colonial production shall in future be conducted, give to every fact connected with this important article an unusual interest, both political and commercial. The following are the quantities of sugar, distinguishing colonial, foreign, free labour, and other foreign, in the period under review, and the corresponding periods of 1844 and 1845:—

The quantity of sugar duty paid in the first three months of the present year, shows a large increase upon either of the two preceding years. It must, however, be borne in mind that last year, up to the middle of March, the trade was entirely at a stand-still, pending the introduction of the new reduced duties; which stagnation lasted until the 14th of March, so that the period before us embraced only three weeks of the deliveries after the trade again assumed its ordinary course under the new duties. The deliveries were, consequently, very large in April and May of last year; and, as we shall show hereafter, there is reason to believe that, up to the present time, the deliveries of the year exceed those of 1845 only by a very limited quantity.

The following table shows the quantity of sugar cleared for consumption and exported, and the comparison between the total imports and deliveries in each of the three last years:—

It is, however, so essential at this moment to ascertain the exact progress of the consumption of sugar to the latest date as compared with last year, that we have adopted a plan, which cannot fail to be perfectly satisfactory as the closest approximation which can be made for the whole kingdom until the official accounts are completed. We have the deliveries for the ports of London, Liverpool, Bristol, Hull, and the Clyde, up to the 5th April, corresponding with the official accounts, and also up to Saturday last the 23rd of May, for the present year, and for the corresponding dates of last year. In looking to the increased consumption of the present year, compared with 1845, it must be borne in mind that the price is at least 6s to 7s per cwt. higher now than last year; so that we are warranted in concluding that, had the stocks been abundant, and the price equally low, as it was then, the consumption of the present year would have exhibited an important increase upon that of last year. It is evident that the habits of the country tend rapidly to an increased use of sugar, which even a considerable advance in price has not reduced thus far.

TEA.—The import of tea in the present year shows a very large increase upon that of the two preceding years. The following are the particulars:

MANUFACTURERS' RAW MATERIALS.

SHEEP'S WOOL.—Of this staple there is a large increase in the import of the present year, with rather a diminution in the re-export of foreign wool, leaving an increased supply for home consumption of about 1,500,000 lbs more than last year. The export of British wools, also, is very considerably less than last year. In the face, however, of these increased supplies of foreign wool, it is on all hands agreed that the stocks of home-grown wools, both in the hands of the growers and of intermediate dealers, were never on any former occasion so low. The increased importation of foreign wool may now be considered as permanent, and arising from an increased production, and not from the import of accumulated stocks abroad, which it appeared to be two years ago. This table shows a decrease to the 1st of May of more than 2,000 bales of colonial wool, but an increase of foreign wool of about 12,000 bales. The whole increase, however, is more than represented by that of South American wool, which of itself shows an increase of about 16,500 bales, while of German and Russian there is a considerable decrease. In noticing the decrease of colonial wools compared with last year, it is but proper to bear in mind that in 1845 the arrivals from Australia were unusually early, which we believe to be the only reason for the apparent falling off this year. It will be observed that the present year's imports include 790 bales from the United States.

SILK.—Of Raw Silk there has been a very large increase in the present year, compared with 1845, and compared with 1844, the quantity is considerably more than doubled. For the first time, we have now the exports of silk included in these monthly tables, which cannot fail to be of interest. The following are the quantities of Raw Silk imported, exported, and retained for home use, to the 5th of April in each of the three years:
