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DELIGHTFUL AUTO TRIP PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH MASS MEETING CONCERNING P. E. SCHEDULE IN RACE FOR ASSEMBLY SOCIAL AND OTHERWISE

MOTOR TO SANTA BARBARA AND ENJOY CAMPING BY THE WAYSIDE

Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Eastman, Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Maranville, Mr. Glenn Stanton and Miss Anna Bode were the participants in a most enjoyable week-end motor and camping trip to Santa Barbara last week.

The jolly party left on the morning of the Fourth ere Old Sol had put in his appearance and as the new seven-passenger Studebaker of Mr. Stanton's swiftly glided up the San Fernando road through Burbank and San Fernando, it was but a moment apparently until the fog of the San Fernando valley was left on this side of the Newhall tunnel and passing out the other side into the bright morning sun, it seemed as if a new world was before them.

After a few miles of beautiful mountain scenery, the towns of Newhall and Saugus were passed and by this time all had an appetite for breakfast. So stopping on a bend in the Santa Clara river, a campfire was kindled and soon the fragrance of coffee and hotcakes filled the air. After breakfast a long drive through Piru, Fillmore and Santa Paula, they arrived in Ventura. Here several photos of the old Mission were made and taking on a new supply of gasoline, once more were on their way toward Santa Barbara, by the way of the Ceditas canyon pass.

A few miles up in this beautiful canyon camp was again set up and dinner prepared. The afternoon was spent here in a jolly good time and a rest. As the cool hours of the evening drew on, all were ready for another meal, cooked over the open fire, after which by the lights of the machine the early evening was spent in cards and later refreshments were served in the form of baked potatoes roasted in the hot coals and sand under the campfire.

Then rolled up in their blankets with the sky for a roof and the little river murmuring its lullaby, they slept the care-free sleep of the primitive man, notwithstanding the fact that some of the party talked in their sleep.

After an early breakfast they were once more on their way, reaching Santa Barbara about ten o'clock and after seeing the principal attractions of the city and beach and making a few photos of the old Santa Barbara Mission, the return trip was started by the coast route to Ventura and thence by the way of the Chatsworth grade and back past the San Fernando Mission to the San Fernando road, and then back to Glendale, arriving late that evening after a hurried trip to Los Angeles. Later a tamale supper was served at the home of Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Maranville on Maryland avenue, then the party finally dissolved, each thinking it about the best time they had ever had.

RESIDENTS OF NORTH GLENDALE HOLD MASS MEETING TO HEAR LETTERS FROM PACIFIC ELECTRIC OFFICIALS IN REPLY TO PROTESTS AGAINST CUTTING THE SERVICE IN TWO ON BRAND BOULEVARD NORTH OF BROADWAY

The citizens of Glendale residing north of Broadway and the citizens of North Glendale assembled in mass meeting at Butler's hall on Brand boulevard Friday evening at eight o'clock for the purpose of considering the question of car service north of Broadway. Beginning Thursday, July 2, 1914, and continuing until Tuesday of this week, only one-half the number of cars were being run north of Broadway as formerly, and this change was not satisfactory to the people in the parts affected.

The meeting was called to order by Oliver Clark, who resides at the corner of Louise and First streets. He stated the object of the meeting and asked that a chairman of the meeting be elected.

Mattison B. Jones of 106 Orange street was elected chairman. Mr. Jones restated the object of the meeting and assured those present that the citizens of Glendale who for a few days had been deprived of full car service north of Broadway do not wish the car service taken from Broadway to Glendale avenue. He said the railroad company has been paid for giving that additional service, and it should be given without in any way interfering with the service north of Broadway.

On motion, J. H. Southard of 1441 Sycamore avenue was elected secretary.

Prof. A. C. Brown of 1311 Milford street asked the privilege to submit a communication from Paul Shoup, president of the Pacific Electric railway. Mr. Brown explained that the communication had been addressed to his brother, Luther G. Brown, in reply to a conference he and other citizens of Glendale had held with Mr. Shoup. The letter reads:

July 6, '14.

Luther Brown,
Los Angeles, Cal.

Dear Sir: Referring to conversation this morning, it is planned with reference to Glendale service to split the trains at junction of Broadway and Brand boulevard, thus keeping the old service to the end of the line. The only exception to this will be that when there is only a one-car train, which is during a small part of the time, this car will cover the whole territory. It is unnecessary to go into details, especially as the plan as arranged might have to be modified slightly, though I believe this will entirely satisfy the North Glendale people.

Following the reading of the letter, John Robert White, Jr., of 101 Orange street, said the conditions as set forth in Mr. Shoup's letter were not entirely satisfactory to the committee, hence the committee visited the P. E. officials Tuesday forenoon and after holding a conference with Mr. McMillan, the following letter was received, which explains itself:

Mr. John Robert White, Jr.,
Glendale, California.

Dear Sir: Referring to Mr. Shoup's letter July 6th to Mr. Luther Brown and to the conference today between Mr. Brown, Mr. Leppelman, yourself and myself regarding service on the Glendale line north of Broadway:

As stated in my talk to the people in front of the city hall at Glendale on the afternoon of July 2nd, the service arrangement which was put into effect on that date and under which we have been working until today, while it had been accepted as satisfactory to the city officials of Glendale, and we supposed all the people of Glendale, we considered it more or less experimental, and as stated by me at that time, we were giving it a try-out and were at the same time trying to figure out a more satisfactory schedule to the people of the northern part of Glendale and of North Glendale, as the undersigned had some misgivings, being a resident and property owner myself of North Glendale, that it might not be entirely satisfactory to that neighborhood.

Therefore, beginning this evening, the former frequency of service on the line between Broadway, Glendale, and Mountain avenue, North Glendale, will be restored practically under the plan outlined in Mr. Shoup's letter of yesterday, except that instead of operating a single car during the light travel periods, mid-day and late at night, by having the same make the side trip between Brand boulevard and Glendale avenue, in going back and forth to the north end of the line, it has been decided

to use one of the cars during such period as a shuttle car between Glendale avenue and the north end of the line, connecting at Broadway and Brand boulevard with the through trains alternately. That is, when the single car through train going to the north end of the line reaches Brand boulevard, the local car, which has been cut out of one of the trains, which is started at the north end of the line for Glendale avenue, via Broadway, will connect at Broadway and Brand boulevard with such through single car train, and vice versa, when the alternate through train from Los Angeles for Glendale avenue, Glendale, reaches Broadway and Brand boulevard, the same local car enroute from Glendale avenue to the north end of the line will connect with the Glendale avenue train for taking passengers for points on the line north of Broadway and this same arrangement will apply during the single car train operating period in both directions.

Single car train periods Glendale line: First train in early morning each way, is single car train. Then two or three car trains until 8:30 (North Glendale) and 8:45 (Glendale avenue). After this time single car trains are run until 3:30 p. m. train from North Glendale, which is two-car train. After that time all trains from Glendale avenue are two-car trains. This continues until the 7:00 p. m. train from Los Angeles, which is a one-car train, and single cars are run until end of schedule at midnight.

This arrangement as you will note gives the people of North Glendale the advantage of local service without transfer between North Glendale and points in the northern part of Glendale along Brand boulevard into the business center of Glendale, which service they have not heretofore enjoyed and which we sincerely hope will meet with sufficient patronage to compensate us, to some extent at least, for the additional operating expense.

When there are two cars or more in a train during the multiple unit train operating heavy traffic periods mornings and evenings, the train will be split at Broadway and one car, or whatever number is necessary to properly accommodate the travel to and from points north of Broadway, Glendale, will go through to and from the north end of the line by uncoupling from the Glendale avenue train northbound and coupling onto same southbound, and this same arrangement will apply when the main train is going to and coming from Glendale by uncoupling or coupling on the car going to and coming from Glendale avenue.

The enclosed map may aid you and your committee in explaining the matter satisfactorily to all concerned in line with our understanding today.

E. L. Payne of 323 North Central avenue then read the following resolution and moved the adoption of the same:

WHEREAS, the citizens of Glendale, residing in the northerly and westerly part of the city of Glendale, and also citizens of North Glendale, were misinformed as to the proposed change in the schedule of the Pacific Electric Railway Company, which went into effect on Thursday, the 2nd day of July, 1914, to the extent that they had been informed that the service of the said railway company from Broadway north in the city of Glendale would not be in any way changed or diminished, when, as a matter of fact, the change of schedule cut the service north of Broadway down one-half; and,

WHEREAS, the officials of the Pacific Electric Railway Company had been misinformed as to the attitude of the people of Glendale living in the northerly and westerly part of said city, and the people of North Glendale, concerning said change of schedule and had been led to believe that the said change of schedule would be satisfactory; and,

WHEREAS, a committee of the Municipal League, an organization composed of the citizens of Glendale living in the northerly and westerly part of said city, met with the railway officials of the Pacific Electric Railway Company as soon as the said citizens became informed of said change in schedule, to-wit: On Wednesday, the first day of July, 1914, and presented the dissatisfaction of the said citizens of Glendale and North Glendale to said schedule as

GLENDALE ATTORNEY IN RACE TO REPRESENT DISTRICT AT STATE CAPITOL

At a meeting of Democrats of the sixty-first assembly district held Saturday evening of last week, Mr. Frank L. Muhleman was endorsed as the Democratic candidate for the assembly in that district. Mr. Muhleman has consented to make the race.

Mr. Muhleman was born in Monroe county, Ohio, and was raised on a farm. He attended the public schools and later attended German Wallace College and Baldwin University at Berea, Ohio. He studied law in the law office of John S. Ducker of Newport, Ky. Graduated from the Mc-

He has been a resident of Glendale for eight years and during that time has been actively interested in all civic affairs.

ORDINANCE NO. 236

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GLENDALE CALLING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF GLENDALE ON THE 21ST DAY OF JULY, 1914, AND SUBMITTING TO THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE SAID CITY THE PROPOSITION OF INCURRING INDEBTEDNESS FOR THE ACQUISITION AND CONSTRUCTION OF A CERTAIN MUNICIPAL IMPROVEMENT, PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS THEREFOR, SUBDIVIDING THE CITY INTO ELECTION PRECINCTS, DESIGNATING THE POLLING PLACES AND APPOINTING ELECTION OFFICERS FOR SAID ELECTION.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the city of Glendale at its regular meeting held on June 22nd, 1914, by a vote of more than two-thirds of all its members duly passed and adopted a resolution determining:

That the public interest and necessity demand the acquisition and construction by the city of Glendale of a certain revenue producing municipal improvement and utility, to-wit: Water works and system for the purpose of supplying water to said city and its inhabitants, including lands, water rights, rights of way, reservoirs, distributing lines, pipes, pipe lines, conduits, aqueducts, hydrants, meters, machinery, equipment, apparatus and all other things required to provide a complete water works and system for said city.

That the estimated cost of said municipal improvement and utility is Two Hundred Forty-eight Thousand (\$248,000) Dollars, and is and will be too great to be paid out of the ordinary annual income and revenue of the municipality. Said improvement would require an expenditure greater than the amount allowed for the same by the annual tax levy; and whereas said resolution was duly signed and approved by the President of the Board of Trustees of the said city on the 22nd day of June, 1914, and was attested and certified to by the city clerk and was duly published on the 23rd day of June, 1914, in the Glendale Evening News, a daily newspaper, printed, published and circulated in the city of Glendale:

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Trustees of the city of Glendale do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. That a special election be held and the same is hereby called to be held, in the city of Glendale on Tuesday, the 21st day of July, 1914, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said city the proposition of incurring indebtedness and issuing bonds of said city in the amount hereinafter set forth and for the purpose set forth in said resolution, and hereinafter stated.

SECTION 2. That the objects and purpose for which said indebtedness is proposed to be incurred and bonds issued therefor, are as follows, to-wit: The acquisition and construction by the city of Glendale of a certain revenue producing municipal improvement and utility, to-wit: Water works and system for the purpose of supplying water to said city and its inhabitants, including lands, water rights, rights of way, reservoirs, distributing lines, pipes, pipe lines, conduits, aqueducts, hydrants, meters, machinery, equipment and apparatus and all other things required to provide a complete water works and system for said city.

SECTION 3. That the estimated cost of said proposed municipal improvement and utility described in Section 2 hereof, to-wit: The acquisition and construction of water works and system for the purpose of supplying water to said city and its inhabitants, including lands, water rights, rights of way, reservoirs, distributing lines, pipes, pipe lines, conduits, aqueducts, hydrants, meters,

machinery, equipment and apparatus and all other things required to provide a complete water works and system for said city, is Two Hundred Forty-eight Thousand (\$248,000) Dollars; that the amount of the principal of the indebtedness to be incurred therefor is the sum of Two Hundred Forty-eight Thousand (\$248,000) Dollars, and that the rate of interest to be paid on said indebtedness shall be five (5%) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually; that if the proposition for incurring said indebtedness for said purpose so submitted at said election receives the requisite number of votes, to-wit: Two-thirds of the votes of the qualified voters voting at such election, bonds of said city in the amount of Two Hundred Forty-eight Thousand (\$248,000) Dollars shall be issued and sold for the purpose of acquiring and constructing said municipal improvement and utility; both principal and interest of said bonds shall be payable in gold coin of the United States of the present standard weight and fineness.

changed, and urged upon said officials of the Pacific Electric Railway company reasons why said changed schedule was unsatisfactory; and,

WHEREAS, the said railway officials, because of said representations and in answer thereto by two letters have agreed to immediately put into effect a new schedule, according to which more than one car trains will be split at the junction of Broadway and Brand boulevard, one car proceeding easterly on Broadway and the balance of the train proceeding northerly on Brand boulevard, and when a one-car train only is operated during the day, then they will operate said one-car train alternately from said junction north to the end of the line, and east to Glendale avenue, and issue transfers alternately east or north according as said one-car train may go north or east; and a car will be at the same time run east or north for those who have to transfer; and,

WHEREAS, the people of Glendale and North Glendale in this mass meeting assembled recognize the courtesy of the officials of the Pacific Electric Railway Company, who

as soon as they learned they had been misinformed so promptly endeavored to relieve the situation created by their first change in schedule above referred to; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that this meeting receive and file the communication of the Pacific Electric Railway Company whereby it manifests its intention to put said latter schedule into effect and take no further action concerning the same until the people affected by said schedule have an opportunity to observe the working of the same and to see whether or not it shall prove sufficient for the needs of the people of Glendale and North Glendale.

The resolution was adopted and on motion the chair, the secretary and Mr. Payne were instructed to convey a copy of the same to the Pacific Electric company.

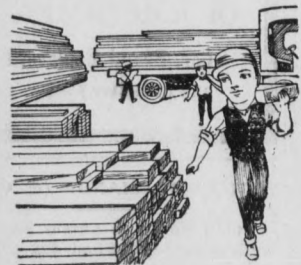
