 point of interest and here it is seen how carefully safeguarded are the processes of milking. There is a wooden floor for the nannies to stand on and their heads are held by stanchions. The remainder of the floor is of concrete, and the entire floor is scrubbed daily. A wire brush is used to clean the animals' coats of every bit of trash and their udders are thoroughly washed. The milk strains through four thicknesses of cheese cloth. It is poured from the milking vessel into a large receptacle and strained from that through several thicknesses of cheese cloth, then carried to the cooling device, from which it is bottled. There is a sterilizing plant for bottles and tin vessels used, in this milk house. Surely with all these precautions required by the city's health department, our milk supply should be absolutely pure.

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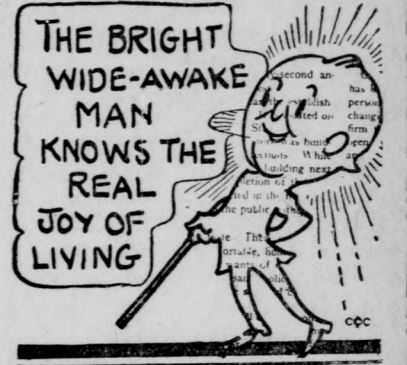

cia, and the notable horn Alexander the Great. Out of these four divisions of the Grecian Empire after Alexander's death sprang up the mighty Roman Empire which truly filled the earth with a desolation culminating in the dark ages.

The burden of Daniel's mind in the entire prophecy, continued the evangelist, was to understand the "two thousand three hundred days then shall the sanctuary be cleansed." This most interesting portion of the prophecy is not explained until the ninth chapter and the 21st verse. "Yea, while I was speaking in prayer, even the man Gabriel, whom I had seen in the vision at the beginning, being caused to fly swiftly, touched me about the time of the evening oblation. And he informed me, and talked with me, and said, O Daniel, I am now come forth to give thee skill and understanding. Seventy weeks are determined upon thy people, and upon thy holy city. Know therefore and understand that from the going forth of the commandment to restore and to build Jerusalem unto the Messiah the Prince shall be sixty-nine weeks."

Mr. Prout showed from Ezekiel 4:5, 6 that in prophetic symbols a day stands for a literal year, and that the twenty-three hundred days would represent actually twenty-three hundred literal years. "The angel makes this long time period clear to Daniel by these two periods in the previous verses." The 70 weeks or 490 years, and the 69 weeks or 483 years. By means of a diagram he showed that these two periods began with the twenty-three hundred years, all three beginning with the decree of Artaxerxes to restore and build Jerusalem. According to Ezra 6:14 and 7:7-9 this was in 457 B. C.

With this starting point the evangelist subtracted and added dates

before his interested audience and proved beyond question that the 69 week period ended with the baptism of Jesus in Jordan in A. D. 27, and the 70 weeks ended in A. D. 34, when the Jews finally rejected Stephen's powerful defense, in favor of Jesus Christ as the Messiah.

and all the lunch, so naturally I rushed madly on to catch her and passed her, the Mantel Piece and every other landmark. You see the water makes so much noise that you can't hear anyone calling fifty feet away. Well finally at 12:30, after going (they tell me some five miles) I decided to saunter back and let her catch up to me, not having the least idea I was so far down the stream. We had left our shoes at what is known as Fish Camp, just a level place up one of the tributaries, and put on rubbers so we would not slip so badly. Finally I gave up finding her and started for Fish Camp, but I had depended too much on her and had not taken any note as to how to get back. I went on and on hunting the Fish Camp trail. About five o'clock I realized I was lost. I went up the hill like a jack rabbit calling madly thinking she would hear and answer and I could follow her voice. All the time she was calling frantically a little above. I was lost, just one way out and that was impossible until morning. There I was miles from civilization, without a coat or matches and only two sandwiches. Plenty of wild animals. I can easily understand how people go crazy or get gray in a night, or are found unconscious from exhaustion. I sat down, so tired I was trembling, to decide what to do. Whether to be a real woman and lose my head, try to make the dam at the risk of my life in the dark or be content to stay calmly in one place, on as much of a trail as I could find, until morning. I decided on the latter, and began gathering sticks to keep warm, and incidentally kidding myself into thinking I might be able to start a fire by rubbing two sticks together, when all of a sudden I spied a man's coat lying on a rock, and in the last pocket I felt, were six matches. Then I very near did cry. Under another rock I found a can of beans, some sugar and salt. It sounds like a story or a movie, but every word is honest truth. I decided to save the beans for breakfast and content myself with sandwiches. I built my fire and lay down to think, and hear, and listen. I thought the owner of the coat might come and prove to be the Prince Charming. Then I decided if there was a man in Bear Valley who thought enough of me to come out over that trail in the dark I'd marry him; but lo there were eleven of them and the owner of the coat never came, so my marriage still remains uncertain. About 12 o'clock, long after I had given up all hope of anyone coming after me, Jim Stoker came out of the woods. I never heard a more welcome sound than Jim's 'hello.' There were 11 men out over the canyon with stretcher, brandy and 'Search.' Jim's dog, to trail me. We got in about five the next morning. Tired? Oh, say, I hope I'll never be half so tired again. You see, I never got

back past the Mantel Piece, where she fished. I was two and one-half miles from Fish Camp. Be assured mama there is not one bit of danger of it ever happening again. I am a hardy mountaineer now. 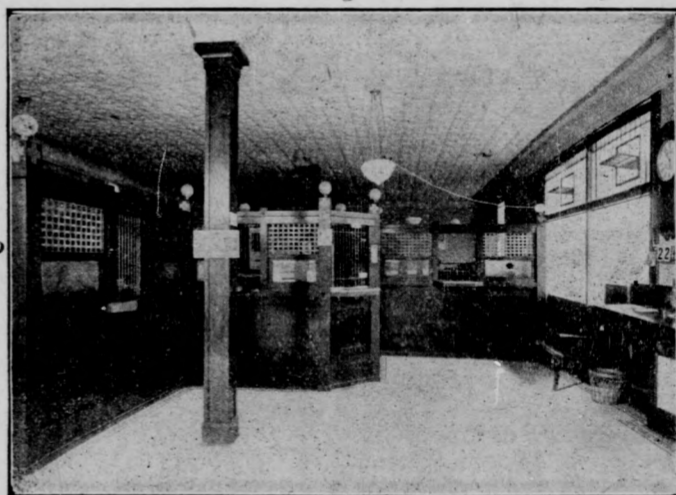
