



Ralphs' Grocery Company celebrates its fiftieth anniversary. Just one-half century ago, the late George A. Ralphs started in the grocery business in Los Angeles at the corner of Sixth and Spring streets, where the Hayward hotel now stands.

Ralphs is one of the few firms that was here fifty years ago. After operating for two years, Walter B. Ralphs purchased one half interest with George A. Ralphs. The firm was then known as Ralphs Brothers. It has always enjoyed a reputation of selling quality goods at low prices.

In early days to draw trade, they installed stables in the rear of the property. Farmers would drive in to town from all directions and put up their teams free of charge at Ralphs. Many of them would leave large orders of groceries to be filled while they were attending to other shopping. The regular fee for weighing loads of hay, etc., was 25 cents Ralphs Brothers installed a large platform scale and only charged 10 cents per load for weighing. This also made Ralphs corner very popular. The landlord, noticing business continually increasing, would advance the rent \$25 per month at frequent intervals. This caused the Ralphs Brothers to try and buy the property, which they soon did. They improved the property and rented parts to a


