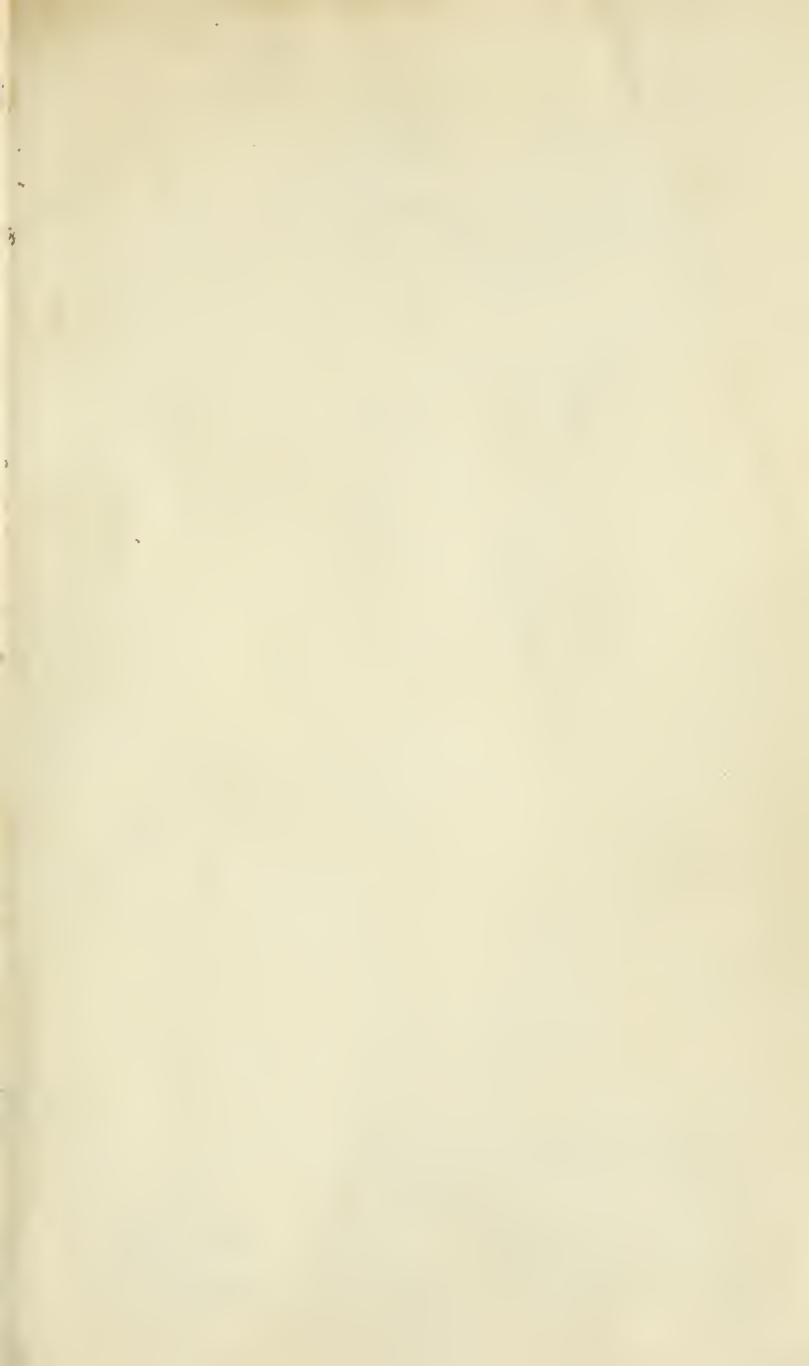

12. Narcissus admiring himself in a Fountain. *Philautia.* Self-Love.

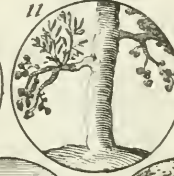
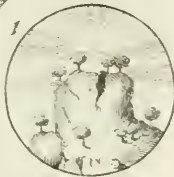
13. Several Birds flying to a Cherry-Tree loaded with Fruit. *Parasiti.* They are Parasites.

12. An Elephant playing with a Lamb. *Mansuetis Grandia cedunt.* The most Exalted stoop to the Humble.

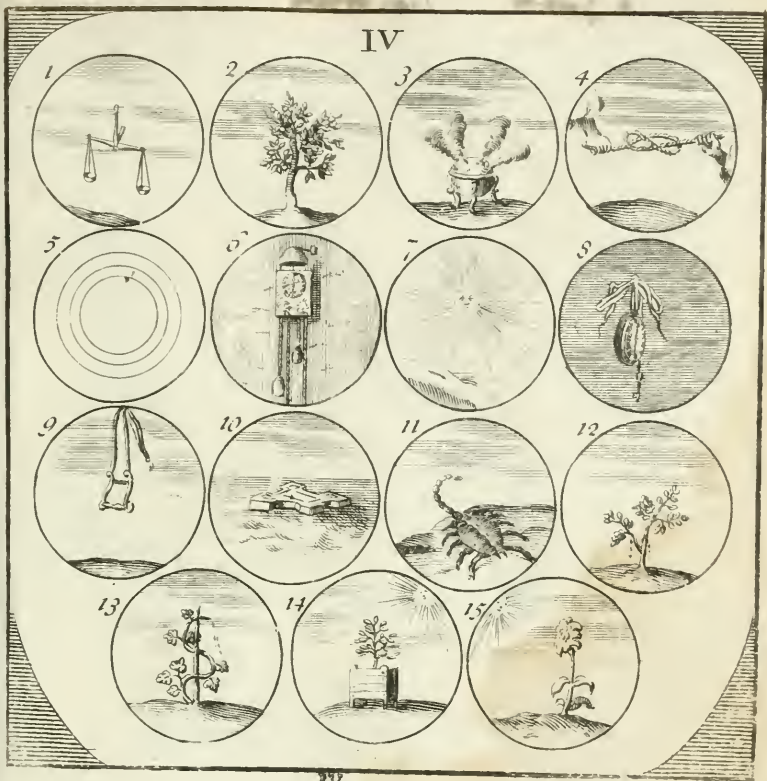
13. A Rhinoceros killing a Bear with his Horn. *Vim suscitatur ira.* Anger renews my Strength.
