1. Final arrangements were made for compilation of statistics and other information from the KENSETSU DAN. The 48 leading companies will be consulted and all available statistics submitted by November 10. A preliminary report will be given October 25. Mr. OTA was chiefly responsible for clearing a way through the jungle and getting work started.

2. On the ministerial level, Mr. ITO will see that a copy of our questionnaire is submitted to each department concerned, and filled out by November 10, with an accompanying explanatory essay.

It is evident now that the information bottleneck of the contractors is broken, and that all available information will be forth coming by November 10.

3. The questionnaire was discussed, and Mr. ITO, offered the following information:

- (a) Cement was controlled by govt. after 1939. Information prior to this year will be rough guessing. Cement was distributed by the various ministries, and not handled by a central govt. agency. The Ministry of Commerce and Industry, however, handled most of it.
- (b) Steel was controlled after 1936; various ministries handled steel, as was the case with cement. The sub-control association (operating under the main Steel Control Ass'n) had complete records on allocation and consumption of steel, but these records were destroyed.
- (c) Wood was controlled after 1941; before this date, Statistics are scarce.
- (d) Labor statistics will be more general than we prefer, but such as they are, they will be made available.
- (e) The inventory of construction machinery presents no special problems.
