WAR ON COWS

Milk Suppliers Are Tubercular, Says Health Officer.

DR. J. P. RIFFE ACTS

Test Shows Disease Exists, According to Report.

Active war on tubercular cows furnishing the milk supply of Covington was declared Thursday by Dr. James P. Riffe, Covington health officer, following the results of tests of a number of heads near Erlanger last week.

A large number of the animals were taken to the slaughter house and slaughtered during the past week by Dr. Riffe and his assistants.

Out of four 15 or 16 one herd reported to the test for tuberculosis, 10 out of 20 in another herd reacted in the last herd tested. Milk from all these cows was being sold in Covington, according to Dr. Riffe.

Fortunately, the doctor declared, the milk from some of the animals had been pasteurized, thereby minimizing the dangerous possibilities, but a large quantity of it was "raw" milk.

Modern science has shown conclusively that tuberculosis in human beings is frequently directly transmitted to drinking milk from tubercular cows. Active steps must be taken to combat the evil.

The proposed ordinance providing for the regular inspection of all milk from all counties within the city of Covington, and providing means for the regular inspection of milk from tubercular animals, was adopted by the board of commissioners at their meeting Thursday, but action was postponed.

HEADQUARTERS VISITED
