

Human Hearts closed a successful season at Davenport, Ia., April 20. The Shannons (Harry Shannon, Manager) will close at Decatur, Ill., May 16. Raymond Chase has joined A Child Wife to portray the role of Old Griswold. Emma Dunn opened with the Woodward Stock Company at Kansas City, Mo., May 3. The Van Dyke & Eaton Company closed a successful season at McKeesport, Pa., April 25. Melvill Hunt has signed with An Orphan's Prayer Company to enact the leading juvenile role. Henry Miller intends to tour the Pacific Coast this summer, presenting The Taming of Helen. Francis Ring succeeds Minnie Dupree in the support of Amelia Bingham, in The Frisky Mrs. Johnson. The production in which Weber and Fields will star Willie Collier next season is entitled Personal. A Ragged Hero closes May 23 at Buffalo, N. Y., and opens August 16 at the Bijou Theatre, Pittsburg. Next season the Chase-Lister Company will present A Runaway Match, featuring Clint and Beale Hobbs. Mark Fenton recently closed with Elizabeth Kennedy and joined the Woodward Stock Company at Kansas City, Mo. The Chester De Vonde Company closes the season May 30 at St. Louis, Mo. They re-open at Jersey City, N. J., August 16. The Minister's Son closed its second successful season April 25, at Middletown, O. It will open next season in Chicago, August 9. The Van Dyke & Eaton Company will appear in a Shakespearean production next year. She has not yet decided which heroine it is to be. It is reported that Viola Allen wants to appear in some Shakespearean role. The report does not state any particular one. Mr. George Bowles, who recently joined the Barnum Great Ballet, also has written a melodrama entitled, The Secret Marriage. Stuart Robson, the eminent comedian, died April 29, in New York City. A sketch of his career is published in our obituary column. Mrs. F. H. Burnett has commenced the dramatization of the "Widowhood of Claim," to be used by Robert Hilliard next season. Wm. A. Brady has presented his wife, Grace George, with the profits of her New York engagement. She will go abroad this summer. The Bennett-Moulton Company's Clara Turner Co. closed April 25, J. M. Tarr, the manager, can be addressed Box 86, Salem, Mass., until August 1. Liebler and Company have purchased the train used by Prince Henry during his recent visit, for the tour of their Romeo and Juliet company. Mrs. Craigie is adapting a play by Jean Richepin for the use of Olga Netherwile. During her recent trip to India she completed the writing of a comedy. The new four-act melodrama, The Johnstown Flood, by Edward Houghton, will be produced the latter part of August and is booked solid up to January 1. Miss Rachel Lewis, who has been meeting with success in her tour of the South, will open in Newport News, Va., May 17, for a six week's season of repertoire. Henry Miller will spend his vacation at Marlon, Mass., with Richard Harding Davis, who is writing a new play to be produced by Mr. Miller next season. Orrin Johnson will leave the Frohman management for the second time in his career. The last time he left the fold, it took him fourteen years to get back into it. Messrs. Leiswyn & Co. have purchased Cumberland 61, a play written by Franklin Fyles, they will produce it next season and send it on tour through the South. Malcolm Williams, formerly leading man at Keith's Bijou, Philadelphia, Pa., has resigned to accept a similar position with Keith's Stock Company, Providence, R. I. When Viola Allen shaves the Eternal City to appear in a Shakespearean role next season, Messrs. Liebler & Co. will star E. J. Morgan as David Ross, in the production. Thomas Q. Seabrook has declined several offers to star next season. He says he would rather work under a salary for another year before taking to the road on his own account. The Harcourt Comedy Company will be well equipped with new scenery and new plays for the repertoire season. W. C. McKay will continue as the manager of the company. Dolce, the one-act play which Mrs. Fiske recently added to her repertoire, will be used by her in conjunction with Ibsen's Hedda Gabler, which she will present next season. The third edition of "At the Stage Door," by Ada Patterson and Victory Bateman, containing the histories and interesting facts concerning leading members of the profession, is out. Betsy Ross, the revolutionary drama which proved a miserable failure when produced in Philadelphia several years ago, has been re-written and will be put on the road next season.

Flora Fairchild, leading lady of the Stroke of Twelve company, has written two songs which are in the hands of the publishers and will soon be on the market. Her first name is Lehman. Robert Dowling, the well-known tragedian, has just returned to the San Francisco Theatre, California, after a tour of \$13,000 and no assets, according to Eugene Blair's husband. Benjamin Thompson was taken seriously ill in Cleveport, N. H., and his physicians forbid him to go on the stage, further recommending that he rest all further dates. Heart trouble is the malady. Willis Grainger's Gypsy Jack Company closed at Worcester, Mass., April 25. Mr. Grainger will be started next season in a new play and will continue under the management of Edward C. White. A Japanese version of Othello was presented at the Mizjizj Theatre, Tokyo, early in March. While the best part of the play was lost in the adaptation, it was greatly enjoyed by the audiences on the polite side. Rose Coghlan, known in private life as Mrs. Rosamond Marie Sullivan, is suing for divorce in the courts at Helena, Mont. Her husband is John C. Sullivan, a well-known actor. They have not lived together for over five years. The arrangements for the appearance of Mrs. Leslie Carter in a revival of Macbeth are being made by David Belasco. It has been rumored that Mr. Belasco is also at work on an immense spectacular production of Humpty Dumpty. The success of the new season will star Ada Rehan's sister, Hattie Kussel, next season. She is at present appearing with Blanche Walsh in the resurrection. She will appear in Shakespearean roles formerly portrayed by Ada Rehan. Charles E. Hamilton, William Gillette's representative, will direct the production of "Mafeking" by Charles Bradley, business manager of the Bostonians, at the Garrick Theatre, London, next season. Mr. Bradley has also written a play of social life in Virginia during 1855, for Robert Edeson. Messrs. Weber, Rush and Brennan have engaged Jacob P. Adler, manager of the Hebrew company at the Grand Theatre, New York City, to appear in a production of The Merchant of Venice. Adler will portray Shylock in "Yiddish," while the rest of the characters will speak English. A short Spring tour will be made.

PLAYHOUSES.

Weber & Field's new house at Boston, Mass., will be known as the Globe. Work has commenced on Bixman & Co's new opera house at Clinton, Mo. Fulton Opera House at Lancaster, Pa., will be completely renovated during the summer. The Columbia Theatre, Cincinnati's vaudeville theatre, will close for the season May 15. L. E. Dozier, Mayor of Leesburg, Fla., has leased the Leesburg Opera House for one year. B. C. Whitney, of Detroit, Mich., is looking for a site for a new opera house at Owosso, Mich. The Casino, Paducah, Ky., (new summer theatre) is nearing completion and will open May 15, with vaudeville. The Okemah (I. T.) Commercial Club has just completed a hall in that city with a stage 12 x 20 feet and a seating capacity of 300. Improvements will be made on the Huntington Theatre at Huntington, W. Va., to the extent of \$5,000. The season closed May 30. J. L. Smith, formerly manager of Smith's Opera House, Ashtabula, Ohio, has assumed the management of the Auditorium of that city. Wm. A. Brady has subscribed \$1,000 toward the establishment of a National Theatre. This is the most substantial move yet made in that direction. Work has commenced on Burgin's new opera house at Harrodsburg, Ky. The house will be known as Burgin's Opera House and will be completed by next September. S. H. Chase, for twelve years manager of the Old City Hall at Greenville, Me., will manage the new Opera House in that city. The seating capacity of the house is 1,200 people. Manager Thatcher has renewed the lease on the Gem Theatre at Somerset, Ky., and will institute several improvements. Several new drops are being painted, besides some scenery. Fred, Felton, the new manager of the Bell Opera House at Bowling Green, Mich., is sending out a printed circular to traveling managers describing his house and his city and their advantages. Arrangements are on foot to enlarge and improve the P. O. S. A. Opera House at Berwick, Pa. The town is rapidly increasing in size and the theatre is now too small to accommodate the population. It was recently reported in the daily newspapers that the opera house at Centralia, Mo., had been destroyed by fire. This was a mistake. The house that was burned had been closed for several years. Messrs. Hays & Egan will book the attractions for the Capital Theatre Company which occupies the Capital theatre at Little Rock, Ark. The company is having the house remodelled and the latest style opera chairs installed. A company, composed of business men of East Toledo, Ohio, has been incorporated with a capital stock of \$25,000 for the purpose of building a theatre in East Toledo. The house will have a population of forty thousand to draw on. James D. Burbridge will build a new opera house at Jacksonville, Fla., which will be known as Burbridge's Theatre. The site has been purchased. The building will be 75 x 120 feet, and will have two large entrances fifteen feet wide. Manager G. F. McDonald of the McDonald Theatre at Montgomery, Ala., is able to be about after several weeks' confinement on account of illness. The work of remodeling the playhouse has commenced. He has some good bookings for next season. Three New York Theatres will be remodelled this summer almost to the extent of giving them entire new interiors. The estimated expenditure on each is as follows: New York, \$100,000 to \$150,000; the Empire, \$80,000; the Metropolitan Opera House in the neighborhood of \$200,000. Stair & Havlin have added another new playhouse to their circuit. The new theatre will be built in Patterson, N. J. It will have a seating capacity of about 2,000, and will be accommodated with all up-to-date improvements. The intention is to make it a so-called family theatre, with reception rooms, maids in attendance, and so forth. Harry Beeson has closed a contract for the erection of the West End Theatre at Uniontown, Pa. The building is to cost \$15,000, which does not include the site. The entrance will be fourteen feet wide and forty-five feet high. The lower door and balcony will seat about 1,300 people, including six boxes. The stage will be 65 x 40 feet, 50 feet high, with a

proscenium opening of 34 feet. Green, old-gold and white will be used in decorating. The dressing rooms will all be under the stage. The contract calls for completion by November 15.

MUSIC AND MUSICIANS.

Blanche Ring's new production will be called The Gibson Girl. A Country Christmas, George Adela's new production, will be given its premier at Chicago some time this month. Stanislaus Stange denies the report that he is writing a new comic opera for Lulu Glaser, and adds that she intends to continue in Dolly Varden for three more seasons. Julian Mitchell has secured Isabelle D'Armand who is playing the leading soprano role with Frank Daniels, to portray Dorothy, the Kansas heroine in The Wizard of Oz, next season, in company Number Two, which will tour the country. The Liberator Band has just closed the most successful winter season at Tabor Harlem, New York, since its organization, and has opened the spring and summer season in St. Louis. Following this they will play extensive engagements in Kansas City, Louisville, Pittsburg and Philadelphia, returning to New York season, they have been re-engaged for the winter season. J. Leslie Spain has just closed contracts for 118 one-night stands over the Texas Independent Opera House Circuit. At the end of that time Helen May Butler and her Ladies Military Band will have put in 304 consecutive days work. Mr. Spain is now considering an offer for 200 days on the Lyceum Circuit at the close of the Texas season. The band has played The Billboard March over 1000 times.

MINSTRELS.

Primrose & Dockstader closed the season at New York City, April 25, and dissolved a partnership of four years. Although Primrose has announced his intention of retiring, he is thinking seriously of entering vaudeville, doing a specialty with the Foley Bros. Dockstader will have his own troupe out next season.

VAUDEVILLE.

The Beans Flexible Marvels have signed with the Will S. Heck Carnival Company. James E. Rome and Marguerite Ferguson open at the Orpheum, Kansas City, Mo., May 10, and go East. The Musical Kleimners go with Charles A. Taylor's Minstrels for the summer season, opening May 4. The Wilson Trio of Dutch comedians will play parks after the close of the Rose Hill English Colly Company in Detroit, Mich. John R. Rogers has announced that he will appear next season on the vaudeville stage in a sketch entitled, Seven Days in Bellevue, in which he will portray the experiences of an inmate of the insane pavilion. Hayward & Hayward have closed their vaudeville dates and joined The Ethel Tucker Stock Company for six weeks, after which they will play western and southern parks for ten weeks.

FARCE COMEDY.

Maloney's Wedding Day closed its tour, May 2, at Kewanee, Ill., after a most successful season. The Alphonse & Gaston company closed in Philadelphia, April 25. The managers report a successful season. Peck's Bad Boy (Leroy J. French, proprietor) closed this season at Detroit, Ill., and will reopen at Rumbold Falls, Mo., May 10. Fred E. Wright, manager of York State Folks says that he will put out a new show next season, entitled, The Beauty Doctor. There will be fifty people in the company. Klaw & Erlanger's new comedy by George Hart and Edward E. Rose, entitled John III, will be produced in Philadelphia, May 11, with Dan Daly in the title role. Co. S. Edgers will go in advance of the Goddin Comedy Company next season. The company is booked solid for all next season in the best cities of the Middle-west. At the close of the tour next year, the aggregation will play a park engagement of ten weeks. Notes from Conroy & Mack's Comedians, P. P. Craft, Mgr.—Business continues good and for this time of the season is beyond our expectations. At several towns in the past week the houses were sold before the doors opened. We have purchased a few productions for next season and will play large cities only. We have awarded contracts for the scenery and property. Louis L. Comstock has been engaged to compose the musical numbers, consisting of twenty or more. We close this season—it has been the highest in the history of the attraction—May 16.

BURLESQUE.

Crow, who is manager of Ellery's Royal Italian Band, Music Hall and Coliseum, St. Louis, and press representative of the Columbia Theatre, St. Louis. He was born in Marion, O., in 1875, and started his business career with the "Daily Star," of Marion, on which paper he held a prominent position until 1900, when he engaged as agent of Ellery's Band. In 1901, he was made business manager by Mr. Ellery, a position he at present holds. In the moving of their permanent quarters to St. Louis, August 1st, 1902, he first became known generally in St. Louis. Mr. Clark Brown, then press manager of the Columbia Theatre, resigned his position, and the appointment of Mr. Crow immediately followed. Having been equally as successful here as with the band, Messrs. Middleton and Tate immediately installed him as manager of Music Hall and Coliseum, which they have leased and will operate. His executive ability has been proven by the extraordinary success of the various enterprises he has been connected with. Ellery's Band is having the most successful season in its history, and Mr. Ellery gives his manager credit for his success. The Music Hall and Coliseum will show the results of his skill in the near future. Sure-ly, for a man of 29 years, his success has been remarkable.

MARRIAGES.

Minette Naomi Price, whose professional name is Leslie Hunter, was recently married to Eugene St. Henry at Newark, N. J. At the time of the wedding Miss Price was thought to be dying and Mr. Henry insisted that they should be wedded so as to give him the right to be near her. She is now all recovered. Miss Elizabeth O'Brien, of Baltimore, Md., who recently joined James K. Hays' circus company in The Crisis, was married to Charles F. Randolph, of Boston, Mass., March 2. The marriage has just been announced. On April 9, at Boulder, Colo., Miss Marie Clifford and Mr. Jacques Caldwell, both of the Sandy Bottom Company, were wedded. They received many flowers and handsome presents. Miss Annie Thompson was recently married to Mr. J. W. Gunkel, of West Alexandria, Ohio, and will remain permanently with the circus business.

OBITUARY.

Stuart Robson, the eminent comedian, died at the Hotel Savoy, New York City, on the night of April 29, from heart disease. Mr. Robson was taken ill in Auburn, N. Y., several days previous to his death, and was removed to New York City, where his attack was pronounced severe, but was not considered fatal up to within a few hours of his passing away. He was born at Annapolis, Md., March 4, 1836, being sixty-seven years old at the time of his demise. He made his stage debut at Baltimore in 1852, scoring an instant success in his portrayal of the character of Captain Crosstree in Black-Eyed Susan. After a number of years in stock, he contracted a partnership with Wm. H. Crane, their first joint appearance being in Our Boarding House, in 1870. The Comedy of Errors and Merry Wives of Windsor followed but it was six years later that the two made their greatest success. In The Henrietta in which Stuart Robson appeared as Bertie, the Lamb, Robson and Crane separated in 1889, the former subsequently appearing in a number of legitimate comedy roles. He was somewhat

unfortunate in the selection of vehicles, however, some of his costliest productions proving failures financially. His last artistic success was in Oliver Goldsmith, in which he played the title role. Recently Mr. Robson had been playing the one-act stand in a revival of The Henrietta to large financial success. So ends a bright career which started with running away from home and becoming a page in Congress. He later returned to Baltimore and became associated with such eminent players as Edwin and John Wilkes Booth and John Slesper Clark who, no doubt, inspired him with the determination to go upon the boards. He did not marry until 1894 when he joined hands in matrimony with his leading lady, May Weidron, who with a son and daughter survives him. In her late husband's palatial home, on the grounds of Navesink, N. J. interment was made at Cohasset, Mass., May 1.

George W. Fursman, for many years connected with circus and theatrical business, died at his late residence 103 East 25th street, at 11 A. M., April 27. He was born in Nassau, N. Y., in 1842, and was one of his most famous show business with O'Brien's Circus. He was afterwards connected for many years with the John Murray Circus and then was manager of the privileges with the Burr-Tobolsky Shows. A partnership was then formed with George Peck under the firm name of Peck & Fursman and many companies were managed in their management. In 1895-'96-'97 he managed the privileges of The Buffalo Bill Wild West and then retired from active business. Twenty-two years ago he married Georgia Millson. His daughter Eugenia was married a few months ago to William Sweeney, band master of The Buffalo Bill Wild West. He leaves a wife and two children and many friends who will mourn his loss. The funeral took place from his late residence, Friday, May 1.

Senor Luigi Arditi, the well-known composer and for many years musical director of Her Majesty's Theatre, London, died May 1, at Home, England. He was one of his most famous compositions, better known as "The Kiss." He was born at Crescentino, Piedmont, Italy, in 1822, and studied music at the Conservatory of Milan. He spent many years in America, leaving for England in 1877. He directed the orchestras when Mrs. Patti, Nordica and Nevada made their debuts. He was eighty-one years of age.

Mr. Ed. Emrich, correspondent for The Billboard from Pittsburg, Kas., and one of the most popular men of that city, died April 20, from pneumonia. Mr. Emrich had only been ill five days. Interment was made at Portsmouth, O. The funeral was largely attended by the many friends of the deceased.

Miss Florence Gladstone, a member of the Louis James-Frederick Warde Theatre Company, died April 14, in San Francisco, Cal., from injuries received in a fall at the theatre in Logansport, Ind.

Mabel Benson Hollow succumbed in London, England. She played before the King and Queen and was quite popular. No reason can be assigned for her act.

Blavolo's understudy, who was injured while looping the loop with the Forepaugh-Sells Show at St. Louis, Mo., died Monday morning, April 27.

The infant child of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Fagan, died the night of April 29, being but three hours old.

Now all is different, there is no telling when a season shall end, and the prospect continues in their successes from spring to spring, while those whom misfortune has eluded as its own, take fresh heart and promote new plays right in the face of the approaching winter weather.

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




