Mrs. Edson, who spoke first, took up what she considered to be the falsity of the statements which are being put out by the opponents of Johnson, particularly referring to the statement of Mrs. Cable as published in a Los Angeles newspaper to the effect that Johnson only "acquiesced in the women's suffrage amendment and in legislation for the benefit of women and children" and that "it is amusing to see him annexing all the credit for a condition he could scarcely have prevent-

Mrs. Edson declared she had been attending the legislature for years before and since Johnson was governor of California; that until he came to the governor's chair the women who went to Sacramento with measures for the benefit of women and children were treated with contempt. She told of approaching him when a candidate for nomination on the question of equal suffrage and his assurance that he could conceive of no democracy in which men and women would not have equal voting rights and how it was written into his platform. She then told of the appeal to him when the amendment was before the legislature and how he summoned to the executive chamber the senators and assemblymen elected with him on the ticket and declared to them that every pledge in that platform must be made good and they must vote for that amendment whether they personally sympathized with it or not, and how, umphantly. Under Johnson's administration the state had been cleaned up she declared before the suffrage vote was taken and it had a square deal, with every vote honestly counted.


