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Twelve lessons in reed weaving, giving materials, tools, preparation of materials, and various weaves.

Collier, D.

Basket making. 151 p., illus. Published by Funk and Wagnalls, New York, 1919.

Gives in detail the making of bushel baskets, hampers, clothes baskets, waste baskets, etc., from willow.

Couch, O. P.

Basket pioneering. 168 p., illus. Published by Orange Judd Publishing Co., New York, 1933.

A hand book containing concise directions for basked making; also gives instructions for preparing vines, runners, and willows in addition to information on weaving with reed and raffia.

Instructions for making a variety of baskets from paper rope.

Contains instructions for making pine needle, honeysuckle vine, willow, and oak splint baskets. Includes preparation of materials, stitches, and finishing.

Jinks, J. H.

Manual training in the rural schools. 22 p., illus. Hampton Normal and Agricultural Institute Bulletin Vol. 7, No. 1, Pt. 2., Hampton, Va., 1918. 5 cents.

Pages 14 to 22 are devoted to white oak basket making. The selection and preparation of oak splints and weavers precede detailed directions for making round baskets, a square bushel basket, and the melon basket.

Ladies' Home Journal

Weaving the new baskets. 78 p., illus. Published by Ladies' Home Journal, Philadelphia, 1929. (Price 25 cents. Order direct from company publishing booklet.)

This booklet covers basic steps in reed weaving and processes of finishing woven baskets, together with many designs for trays and baskets. Sections on weaving cane and rush seats and pine needle basketry are included.

Gives directions for making baskets from pine needles and from reed.

Illustrates and gives directions for weaving reed baskets and trays, either with or without a wooden base.
