



COLLECTIONS FOR TULIP BEDS

The arrangement of the following beds will give very striking results. The beds are 6 feet in diameter and require 156 bulbs, planted 5 inches apart each way. These combinations can be changed, if desired.

come into bloom at the same time. A good method is to remove about 4 inches of the soil, level the bed carefully and plant the bulbs 6 inches apart each way, pressing the earth firmly and evenly over the bulbs.

Culture in Glasses. Special glasses are manufactured for the culture of Hyacinths, the bulb fitting in the top. These glasses should be filled with fresh water, also some gravel, and, if at hand, some charcoal.

Culture in Pots. Hyacinths are grown successfully by planting in pots. Use good, rich soil, with plenty of manure. Place some pieces of broken pots in the bottom for drainage, and use 4- or 5-inch pots. Firm the bulb well in the soil, allowing the top of it to stand just a little above the soil. If flowers are wanted for Christmas the bulbs should be planted in September.

The season of the Tulip has been extended THOS. MOORE greatly in recent years. It is now possible to

have them in bloom from the time the last snow disappears up to the middle of June.

The list of varieties in recent years have multiplied very rapidly and are most confusing to the average customer; hence, we have very carefully condensed our list so as not to confuse, and to give you the best, and also the advantage of recent improvements.

In order to still further assist the customer, we are giving the height of the flowers in figures, so the planting can be correctly arranged; also, the time of blooming, so you can have the beds harmonize, using varieties of the same height and that flower at the same time, allowing you to choose your color scheme.

Culture. The beds for Tulips should be treated the same as for hyacinths, except that the bulbs

should be set close together, 5 inches instead of 6 inches, and covered by 4 inches.

Culture in Pots. Tulips are one of the most satisfactory bulbs to force. Place a half-dozen bulbs in a 6-inch pot and they will begin blooming between Christmas and Easter. They are treated otherwise, the same as the hyacinth.

The flowers are larger than those of any other perennial, and are borne on strong, stiff stems.

Our list comprises the cream of the newer and best old varieties.

When to Plant. Plant Peonies in September or October if you wish them to bloom the following June. The plants should be set with their eyes two or three inches below the surface of the ground. Place the clumps about three feet apart.

LAWN SEED

HE days of laboriously making lawns by sodding are rapidly passing away. The best lawns are now made from good grass seed. The essentials are a careful blending of varieties adapted to producing a thick turf with velvety appearance. Each variety in this composition has a special purpose. Some make strong, fibrous roots that take hold on the earth and hold it in position; others, of a creeping nature, quickly fill up the vacant spots; yet other sorts are used for their color value, and other kinds are able to withstand heavy or excessive rains. A lawn secured from pure seed is more satisfactory than one made by sodding; noxious weeds are apt to get a foothold in sod, but this is almost impossible when good seed is used.
