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THE FRUIT SITUATION

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U. S. Department of Agriculture

Summary

Strawberry and lemon prices at market centers were generally lower in mid-April than a month earlier while prices of other fruits were practically unchanged, reports the Bureau of Agricultural Economics in the April issue of its Fruit Situation.

The estimate of the winter orange crop from the bloom of 1938, reported as of April 1, was increased slightly in California and Arizona over that of a month earlier, but crop prospects for other citrus remained unchanged. A relatively large Valencia orange crop is indicated, although it is not so large as that produced from the bloom of 1937. Market supplies of all citrus fruits were heavy through March and the first half of April, and the prospect is that supplies through the summer months also will be large.

Marketings of apples from storage holdings were smaller during March than a year earlier but slightly larger than normal. Mid-April prices at eastern markets were slightly higher than a month earlier but slightly lower in mid-western centers.

Market supplies of strawberries were relatively scarce during most of March because of a delay in the harvest of the Louisiana crop, but by mid-April supplies were increasing sharply. As a consequence strawberry prices in mid-April were considerably lower than a month earlier, and the lowest for the season to date.

CITRUS FRUITS

April 1 indications of the citrus crops from the bloom of 1938 show little change from those a month earlier. The California navel and Arizona orange crop prospects were increased slightly and added approximately 600,000 boxes to the winter supply of oranges. Crop prospects for all other citrus remained unchanged from that reported as of March 1.

Although additional moisture is needed in important producing areas of California growing conditions there were relatively favorable. The Florida citrus areas received fairly heavy rains during March but more is needed. In Texas favorable conditions are reported. In nearly all areas the 1939 bloom is indicated to be relatively heavy except for Florida grapefruit.

Market prices of most citrus fruits showed only small changes from the middle of March to the Middle of April. California lemon prices declined fairly sharply, however, under the pressure of increased shipments. Although the California navel and Florida orange shipping season will be over in another month or two, the prospect is for continued heavy marketings of oranges through most of the summer months as the California Valencia orange crop is indicated to be large.

APPLES

Cold storage holdings of apples on April 1 totaled 9.1 million bushels or about 3 million bushels less than a year earlier but about 800,000 bushels more than the 1928-37 average for April 1. The out of storage movement for March is indicated to total 5.9 million bushels, considerably less than the 7.5 million moved out in March 1938 but slightly more than the 10-year average March movement of 5.6 million bushels. The March 1939 out of storage movement was larger than usual in the eastern States but smaller in the West.

Mid-April prices of eastern and mid-western varieties of apples were slightly higher than a month earlier at New York City but slightly lower at Chicago. Auction prices of western boxes of apples were also slightly lower at Chicago.

STRAWBERRIES

Market prices of strawberries rose sharply during March but by mid-April had declined to the lowest level of the season to date. The sharp advance in prices in mid-March is attributed to a lull in marketings occasioned by a delay in the Louisiana harvest. Shipments from Florida were practically completed before those from Louisiana attained volume. The recent decline in prices reflects the heavy marketings from Louisiana since the first of April.

Owing to the indicated large production of strawberries in Louisiana and in the second early States, relatively heavy shipments are in prospect for the balance of April and most of May. Production in Louisiana is indicated to total 1,400,000 crates this season compared with 1,100,000 crates in 1938, and the crop in the second early States is indicated at 3,665,000 crates in 1939 compared with only 2,787,000 crates a year earlier. Excluding the Florida

crop which has been largely marketed, the 1939 supply for the early and second early States totals 5,482,000 crates compared with 4,270,000 crates in 1938 and 4,872,000 crates, the 1928-37 average.

Although no information concerning production in the intermediate and late States is available at this time, the acreage available for picking in 1939 is indicated to be substantially larger than a year earlier in both areas.

FROZEN FRUITS

Supplies of frozen fruits as of April 1 totaled 91.1 million pounds compared with 103.1 million a month earlier and 102.0 million pounds a year earlier. As compared with holdings on April 1, 1938, stocks of blueberries and cherries were substantially lower while those of strawberries were larger.
