



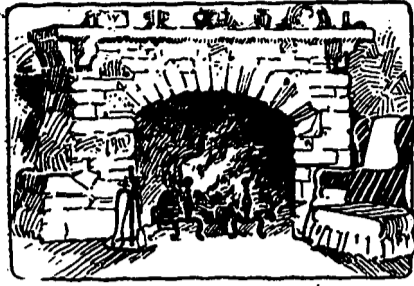

## BELGIAN CHILDREN'S RELIEF FUND

The members of the committee who are canvassing Narberth for money for the Belgian Children's Relief Fund desire to thank the citizens of the town for the courtesy they have received, and to urge upon each household the consideration that even a small amount of money from every home will mean a large sum in the aggregate.

To the women of the town we would especially speak. It is they, rather than the men, who turn a deaf ear on pleas that money is better spent at home. That argument is so hard to answer, not because one finds it convincing, but because one feels unable to penetrate the self-righteous armor that it reveals. We have little need to fear that our own homes and our own children will not be the first provided for. They should be and will be.

Let us try to imagine what a whole and desolate and helpless must mean. It means you and me, and our children hungry and homeless, and perhaps orphaned; and it means our neighbors' children hungry too, and our neighbor's neighbor's children. It means Narberth and many Narberth's waiting for help from across the sea, for help from people who may fail them. And these people, in whom the Belgians must trust, are not cruel or hard, but they do not visualize the pale, old, sick faces of little children. We have all passed children in the city streets whom our hearts yearned over and whom we momentarily long to help. We needed only to have continuously before us those some pathetic, delicate little shoulders and tired face, and we would act, we would help. And these Belgian children, who are starving, are not the children of misery and sin and degradation who must later be a burden upon the State. They are, rather, the once bright, sturdy boys and the refined, delicately-reared little girls, children well-bred and well-born, on whom rests the hope of an entire people.

## FREEDING OF MONTGOMERY AVE.

Jury Will Decide Amount of Damages. Revenue Increased and Expense Has Been Lower

The freeing of the Bala and Bryn Mawr turnpike, better known as Montgomery avenue, in Lower Merion township, and its condemnation as a toll road was left to a jury Tuesday, after a final hearing held in Norristown.

The master, Irvin P. Knipe, asked the jury to consider the fact that a possible freeing from tolls of the Lancaster turnpike by this parallel road becoming State property might have an effect on the future earnings of this road, and also asked that the Bala and Bryn Mawr Turnpike Company be properly compensated.

It was pointed out by the master that the tolls from the road had gradually increased from \$16,000 in 1910 to \$33,000 in 1916, while there had been a gradual decrease in the expenditures from \$20,000 in 1910 to \$7,000 in 1916. These expenditures did not include a nominal dividend in each of the six years from 1910 to 1915, and a 40 per cent. dividend in 1916, but did include the reconstruction of portions of the road each year, except 1916. Witnesses for the company put the damages at from \$90,000 to \$125,000, while those for the court fixed them at \$80,000.

Mrs. Oakley will tell how to get rid of dirt and rubbish by the use of a "Destructor," and how flies and other insects may be exterminated or prevented from breeding.

We understand the Woman's Club is to take charge of Clean-Up Week this year, and we bespeak for them the active co-operation of Council, Board of Health and all other organizations in Narberth.

Female servants	121
Male servants	14

Total 3060

There are 773 completed houses in the borough.

**FIGHTING THE FLY**

Timely Letter From Joseph H. Nash

The subjoined letter, dated March 31, has been received by the president of the Civic Association:

Dear Sir:—Our minds are so filled at the present time with war and its preparations, that we are liable to forget that we must wage an increasing war against the menace of disease.

Philadelphia has started a war on flies. Hershey, a town about the size of Narberth, started last year with a successful campaign against the fly, and will continue it this year. Surely there is much that could be done in Narberth, and the sooner we start, the better.

Your association should father a movement so that proper fines will be levied against open garbage pails, and particularly against open manure pits or piles of rubbish. Stables should be screened, manure pits screened, and any fresh manure treated with lime.

Surely every father and mother would feel more resigned should the dread infantile paralysis visit us again, did they know every precaution was being taken to avoid its spread by flies.

Mr. Nash enclosed with the foregoing letter a clipping from the Philadelphia Public Ledger, referring to the appointment of a committee by the Chamber of Commerce to co-operate with the authorities in the warfare on the fly, by exterminating the breeding spots. The city is being divided into districts for inspection; owners of stables will receive instructions, and refuse and garbage heaps will be abolished. A circular is being prepared, showing the infant mortality caused by the fly and kindred insects.

The Civic Association will be glad to co-operate with Narberth Council, the Board of Health, the Woman's Community Club, and any other organization or individual, in this war against flies, mosquitoes, dirt, rubbish, etc. This is a common cause, in which everyone should enlist, to save the lives of the little ones.

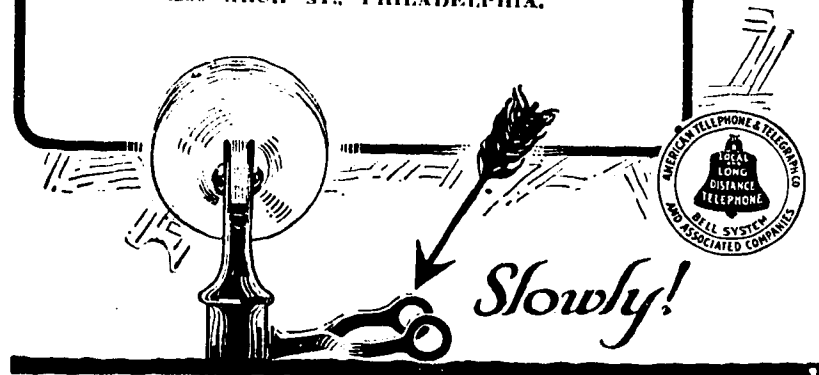
### Work the Hook Slowly to Recall the Operator
