INTRODUCTION.

The Cabinet of Roman Coins (mostly Large Brass) now offered for Public Sale has been collected under circumstances which perhaps entitle it to peculiar consideration.

In its formation, although rarity and fine preservation have never been disregarded, illustration of History, and of ancient Art and Science, has been the main object I have had in view. Thus in no respect has the Collection been formed indiscriminately or without a direct aim and object. It will be for the Numismatists of Europe to determine how far I have in this respect succeeded; but it may not be out of place here to append a letter from my friend Professor Donaldson, whose classical attainments render his opinion on so important a subject highly valuable; my late respected friend Mr. Burgon, has likewise expressed his opinion in a letter to me coinciding with the view of Professor Donaldson on the question, and others could be added.

I had fondly imagined that the labour bestowed over a long series of years in gathering together this Collection might have been appreciated by some one of the large and wealthy Institutions in this country, and that the Cabinet might have been preserved in its full integrity, with the descriptive Catalogue for the use of the student in History, Art, and Science. To these Institutions it was offered upon such terms as I considered would have secured it an exception from the ultimate fate of almost all such Collections. I have failed. I shall, therefore, no longer continue labours that are not appreciated, but let the Collection be dispersed by Public Sale, and that done, no sum of money, however large, or personal exertion, however great, will ever be able to form a similar Collection coin for coin. I have entrusted the arrangement of the Catalogue to Mr. Curt, well known for more than twenty years in the Numismatic world.

Julius Caesar, obv. DIVOS. IYLIVS. laureated Head of the Dictator, rev. CLESAR. DIVI. F. bare Head of Octavianus, his grand-nephew 3
 6 Julius Caesar, obv., as before, rev. Head, &c. of Octavian, as
 - before, but with the star or comet in front
 - *** The copper coins of Julius seem to have been minted after his death, to his honour, like this, by Octavian.
 - Augustus (Denarius), obv. Bust, with the oak wreath, and rev. the "Julium sidus," or comet, both fine 2
- 7 Julius Cæsar, obv. divos. ivlivs. in a capacious laurel wreath, bearing berries, rev. divi. F. bare Head of Octavian to right, and the Cæsaris astrum, or planet Venus

- 11 Julius, as before, but with a star on obv., above, the wing of Victory. Marcus Antonius, obv. Bust of the Triumvir in a wreath of ity, rev. an exquisite quiver or mystic cista between serpents, &c. Antony was worshipped as Bacchus at Ephesus in Asia, and afterwards also at Alexandria of Egypt (715-720 A.R.), from the Deconskire Collection size 9, 2
- 12 Brutus (Denarius) obv. Bust of the enthusiastic intolerant republican, rev. EID. MAR. Cap of Liberty between two daggers, from the Pembroke Collection wt. 53\(\frac{1}{2}\) grs. 1
- 13 Lepidus, obv. bare Head of the Triumvir, rev. unlaureated Head of Octavian, a desirable Denarius, from the St. Croix Collection wt. 59½ grs. 1
- 14 Marcus Antonius, Tetradrachm of the Cistophori type, rev. Bust of Octavia, &c., from the Twysdem Cabinet, vot. 1814 grs. M. Antonius, Octavianus, and Octavia, obv. their Heads, rev. Galley, &c.; this identical vave medal mentioned by Eckhel, v1. 56, is from the Pembroke Collection, lot 558
- 15 M. Antonius and Octavia, obv. their Busts face to face, rev. L. ATRATINVS. AYGVR. (PRAEF. CLAS. F. C.), two figures in a chariot drawn by four hippocampi; unfortunately the legends of this scarce and interesting Large Brass are nearly obliterated, but the portraits on obverse type are good, fine specimens are never met with, v. Cohen, "Cousulaires," p. 237, and pl. LXI. No. 7; from the Gwill Cabinet
- 16 M. Antonius (*Legionary Denarii*), usual types of the Roman Eagle, or chief standard, rev. Galley, all of varied legions, viz. II. III. IV. V. VI. VII. XI. XII. XIII. XIV. XV. XVI. 12
- 17 M. Antonius, Similar, legions VIII. IX. X. XVIII. XIX. XX. XXII. XXIII., also LYBICAE. PRAETORIARVM. and SPECVLATORVM., &c. 14

- 18 Augustus (Middle Brass), obv. Avgvstvs. Tribvnic. Potest. in a palm wreath, rev. P. 87010. III. VIR. A. A. F. F. and s. c. in centre, seems the earliest medal on which the "Tribunitia Potestas" occurs, v. Cohen pl. LVII., valuable 1

19 Augustus (Middle Brass), obv. CAESAR. PONT. MAX. (new title), laureate Head to right, rev. ROM. ET. Avo., the altar of Augustus, usually called of Lyons, flanked on each side by Victories on columns, and dedicated to him by the Gauls near Lyons

Silver Medallion, struck in Asia, rev. com. asiae., hexastyle Temple of Pergamus in Mysia, and on the pediment rom(x) ET. Avgyst(o)., in desirable condition

- 20 Augustus, obv. Legend reading from the left, laureate Head to left, rev. as before, minted at Lyons, a valuable large brass, from the Gwilt Collection
- 21 Augustus, obv. and rev. as before in nearly most respects Another (Middle Brass), obv. Victory crowning the imperial bust, rev. M. MAECILIVS. TYLLYS. &c., Cohen, pl. LVII. fine and rare, from the Campana Collection, lot 156
- 22 Augustus, obv. Bust of the Emperor crowned by a Victory, rev. M. Salvius Otho. Inivie. Alah. F. F.; this fine large brass struck by Salvius Otho (as the two following, of same type, by Mæcilius and Lurius Agrippa), goes far to prove that these Triumvirs, masters of the Mint, were simultaneously in office, it is difficult to obtain the three varieties; from the Devonshive Cabinet
- 23 Augustus, obs. and rev. very similar to the above, but minted by Mæcilius Tullus, also a valuable medal, rare also for the size; from General Ramsay's Collection, lot 10
- 24 Augustus obv. and rev. very similar, but struck by Lurius Agrippa, not in Cohen's publications of this size; fine, rare, and valuable in all respects: obtained from Tunis
- 25 Augustus, obv. ob. civis. Servatos., rev. P. Licinivs., &c. Another, rev. c. cassivs, &c. both fine, v. Cohen, pl. Lii. and Lvii.
- 26 Augustus (Middle Brass), obv. Bust to left, radiated, rev. a beautiful Victory to left, with buckler, inscribed s. p. q. r. in field s. c., fine
- 27 Augustus (Middle Brass), rev. Victory; rev. s. c.; rev. Goddess (probably Vesta) in a sedent posture to right; rev. PROVIDENT, Altar or door of the Roman granary, interesting types

28 Augustus (Middle Brass), rev. s. c., circular Temple, with statue on its summit, pedestals at the sides, with an ox and a sheep, struck by Tiberius

Denarius, rev. Mar. VLT., round Temple of Mars the avenger, with the recovered standards, both fine 2

- 29 Augustus (Middle Brass) rev. Consensv. Senat., &c. robed Statue of the Emperor seated on the curule chair, with olive branch and globe, in fine condition, the large brass medals of this type are false in general: from the Gwilt Cabinet
- 30 Augustus (Middle Brass), rev. diva. avgvsta. Ceres or Livia seated, with long lighted torch and wheat; rev. Thunderbolt, fine 2
- 31 Augustus (Middle Brass), rev. Eagle on globe, one of the badges of consecration; rev. BILBILIS. and Horseman; rev. Ergavica., Bull; rev. B. Accio. Festo., &c., Bull to right, desirable coins
- 32 Augustus (Celtiberian Fabrie), obv. radiated Bust; rev. c. v. T. T. decorated square Altar, palm-tree in centre, &c., this rare large brass was probably minted at Tarragona
- 33 Augustus, rev. Scipione. Et. Montano. II. vir., winged Fulmen, and c.c.a., minted at Saragossa, v. Havercamp; Faillant considers this large brass rare; large, and coarsely executed, as those Spanish Colonia medals always are.
- 34 Augustus, rev. c. a. in a laurel wreath, minted at Cæsarea Panias Trachonitis, according to Eckhel, and not having a date. Others, rev. Altar, a restoration by Titus; rev. a Globe, &c., restored by Nerva, the two last are of middle brass

- 35 Augustus, rev. avgvsta. Emerita. (Merida), fortified Gate of the City, in rather excellent condition size 10. 1
- 36 Augustus (Middle Brass), rev. Col. A. A. Patterns, Priest tracing the limits of the colony, or a Colonist ploughing, two oxen, &c., a common reverse type of the Roman coins of Spain; from the Devonshive Collection, and, as some other coins now in this Cabinet, encircled with a tortoise-shell, or dark twory ring, a frequent occurrence with the late Duke's coins; rev. C. Vall. &c., Sacrificial Implements; rev. Temple, with animals on pedestals at its sides; this very scarce large brass, restored by Nerva, has unfortunately been over-cleaned 3

- 37 Augustus (Struck by Tiberius), obv. DIVVS. AVGVSTVS. PATER., radiated seated Imperial Xoanon to left, near an altar, rev. TI. CAESAR., &c., S. C. in centre, minted A.D. 22, the portrait is beautifully delineated, a remarkably fine large brass medal
- 38 Augustus, as before, obv. divo. avgvsto. s. p. Q. R., Quadriga of elephants, with statue of the Emperor, with olive branch, &c., rev. TI. CAESAR., &c., struck A.D. 34, (cf. Cohen's excellent recent work on the Medals of the Roman Empire, Paris, 1859, like all his productions it is replete with sound knowledge, well digested, and skilfully arranged); in splendid condition
 - 39 Augustus, as before, rev. ob, cives, ser. on a votive, shield in a garland, supported by two capricorns, minted A.D. 35, fair; rev. Altar, a middle brass, restored by Domitian
 - 40 Augustus, obv. laureate Head to right, rev. IMP. NERVA., &c., s. c. in the centre, with green patina, in almost perfect condition, rare and valuable as being a restoration; from the Ramsay Cabinet, lot 10
- 41 Augustus, Moneyers, or Duumviri, and Triumviri Monetarii viz. Lamia, Nævia, Piso, Sanquinia, Sulpicia, v. Cohen, " Consulaires," all desirable, as many Roman families struck only in brass 42 Augustus, as before, Asinia, Gallia, Marcia, Sempronia, Plotia,
- all varied as usual with every lot throughout this sale; equally good, some rare
- 43 Augustus (Middle Brass), Asinia, Gallia, Luria, Mæcilia, Nævia, Plotia, Salvia, Sanquinia, &c., in excellent state
- 44 Augustus (Middle Brass), Asinia, Cassia, Gallia, Marcia, Nævia, Plotia, Salvia, Sempronia, Sulpicia, &c., equally desirable
- 45 Livia, obv. her portrait, as IVSTITIA., rev. TI. CAESAR., &c.: this middle brass is a gem of high value, as are many of the coins in this collection
 - *.* A fine and apparently unique silver medallion (Whittall's, size 6.) minted at Byzantium in Thrace; has a bust of Livia. The portrait being perfectly like the above, seems sufficient evidence, and fully to justify the attributions of Justice, Health, and Piety, personified in Livia herself. v. Cohen. vol. I, p. 107, and engraving.

It is respectfully suggested that the description of the exact state of preservation of these medals is such that Collectors will not be disappointed in making purchases, even at high prices, without a previous inspection of them.

- 46 Livia, as salvs. avgvsta., this middle brass is as beautiful and perfect as the former 1
- 47 Livia, as the last, countermarked NCAPR., rare, but not fine 1
 48 Livia (Middle Brass), obv. her Portrait, with veil, as PIETAS.,
- rev. DRVSVS., &c., with green ærugo, a desirable and valuable gem
- 49 Livia (Middle Brass), obv. DIVA. AVGVSTA., veiled Head to right, rev. Bust of Augustus; from the Ramsay Collection 1
- 50 Livia, as before, but PIETAS. inscribed behind the bust,

 desirable and scarce 1
- 51 Livia and Augustus, obe. IVILA. AVOYSTA. GENETIK. ORBIS., her Bust on a globe, crescent above, rev. col. Rom., &c., head of Augustus deified, star, and fulmen, minted by Tiberius at Romula in Hispania Bootica; this coin fills up a honeless blank for the larve brush.
- 52 Julia, the "too celebrated" daughter of Augustus (or rather of Livia herself.) struck by Tiberius, placed here only in deference to the late Mr. Burgon's opinion, &c., obs. s.p. q. R. IVLIAE. AVGVSTI., Carpentum drawn by two mules, rev. TI. CAESAR., &c., in centre s. c., in almost perfect preservation
- 53 Agrippa (Middle Brass), obv. fine but stern Portrait, with rostral crown, rev. usual Neptunian type, with dolphin and trident (enclosed in a tortoiseshell ring); from the Deconshire Collection
- 54 Agrippa (Middle Brass, probably unique), obv. as before, rev. Neptune to left, feeding a dolphin, supported by a rudder, sun and star above, crescent and star beneath, in excellent condition, quite unknown, and unpublished; from a Sate of Coins from Tunis, 21 Dec. 1852, lot 173, at £10.5e.
 - * This Collection is remarkable for the historical interest and extreme rarity of many of the reverse types.
- 55 Agrippa and Augustus (Middle Brase), obv. Busts, rev. col. NEM. (AYSYS.), Crocodile chained to a palm-tree, &c., in commemoration of the subjugation of Egypt by Julius or Augustus, beautiful varieties
- 56 Tiberius (Middle Brass), obv. bare Head to right, rev. Pontifex. tribyn. Potestate. XII. and s. c., fine.
- Another, rev. Vesta, with long sceptre, seated; rev. Altar (usually called) of Lyons 3

- 57 Tiberius, rev. Rom. et. avg., Altar, as before, countermarked Rant. (in. mon.), a genuine large brass, but rather defaced; from the Devonshire Collection
- 58 Tiberius (Lead), obv. Bust, rev. the civitatibys. Asiae. Restitytis. type, rare in lead, found at Bath

Middle Brass, rev. Caduceus between cornucopia

- 59 Tiberius, rev. CIVITATIBUS., &c., with s. c. (the obverse is an incuse of the reverse), thin, but appears "indubitata fidei"; v. Admiral Smyth's Collection, No. XXII; rev. Temple, no legend
- 60 Tiberius, without bust, rev. civitatibus., &c. type of the statue of the Emperor seated, an excellent specimen 1
- 61 Tiberius, rev. MODERATIONI., beautiful Shield, with full-faced bust of Concord on its centre, a valuable middle brass of faultless beauty 1
- 62 Tiberius, rev. sine epig., beautiful Temple of Concord, numerous figures, &c., green ærugo, highly valuable 1
- 63 Tiberius, rev. very similar to the preceding, slightly cleaned 1
- 64 Tiberius, obv. richly-decorated triumphal Quadriga, rev. ti.

 CAESAR., &c., s. c. in field, a fine yellow unpatinated brass
 medal; from the Gwilt Cabinet

65 Tiberius, very similar types, not quite so fine

- Tiberius (Middle Brass), rev. ornated Rudder, Globe, &c.;
 rev. Ægypto-like figure (Vesta), seated, D.D.P.P., minted at Utica, according to Vaillant, both desirable
 Tiberius, obv. Xoanon of the Emperor seated to left, legend
- obliterated, rev. LEG. IV. LEG. VI. LEG. X. in field, vertically inscribed between three standards; legend, c.c.a., &c., as in Vaillant, minted at Cæsarea-Augusta in Spain, rather poor, but scavee size 9. 1
 68 Tiberius (Middle Brass), generally assigned to Jol or Cæsarea
- in Mauretania, obv. bare Bust to left, eaglet, olive, and palm, rev. Bust of Julia, or of Apollo, lyre, and four Punic letters, all within a coronet of olive, of singular beauty, nay almost perfect

- 69 Tiberius (Middle Brass), obv. fine relief Bust to left, rev. Caduceus; restored by Titus, rare and desirable
- 70 Drusus junior (Middle Brass), obv. beautiful Bust, rev. PONTIF., &c., splendidly preserved, ærugated, &c.

71 Drusus junior, obv. Busts of his twin sons, Drusus and Tiberius, rising from two winged cornucopia, caduceus, &c., rev. Drusys, &c., a desirable gene of fine yellow bronze, and slightly gilded, as in ancient times was customary in many instances with medals, statues, &c., v. Bonarotti "Medaglioni"; from the Thomas Collection

72 Drusus junior, obv. and rev. as before, with dark green ærugo, also desirable, being sharp of outline and well finished 1

73 Drusus senior, obv. dignified Bust, rev. TI. CLAYDIVS., &c., togated figure of Drusus (v. Vaillant), seated on and surrounded by armour and arms, lightish green patina, a perfect medal

74 Drusus senior, same types, nearly as desirable

75 Drusus senior, triumphal arch, with his equestrian statue,
rev. Bust of his son Claudius, in good state 1

76 Antonia, obv. fine Bust of the Empress, the portrait is identical with one engraved on a cornelian in the Stosch Collection, rev. the same, habited as Vestal or High Priestess, of yellow middle brass, and with the tortoiseshell circlet; from the Devonshive Cubinet

77 Antonia, nearly as before.
