Voyages of Discovery .- According to a statement in a French paper, there are at present no less than thirteen vessels actuelly employed in voyages of discovery. Of these, Frence has three, Englmercial Agent at Matanzas, containing and five, Ressia two, Sweden one, Holland one, and the United States one. It remains to be seen whether the last mentioned expedition will ever put to sea. We want yet the example of Spain, Portugal and the small Italian States .-Southern Patriot.

PORTUGAL,—It appears, by a letter from Lisbon of the 3d of January, that the state of affairs in that city is any thing but satisfactory.
