**NEW-ORLEANS.**

A schooner arrived from Havana from which place she sailed on the 28th ult., has brought an account of the capture of two piratical vessels on the coast of Cuba—one of them was captured by a Spanish gun-brig after a severe action, in which all the pirates were killed. The other was taken by an English ship of war, after an action less sanguinary than the former, as many of the crew were taken alive.

**DONALDSON, April 4.**  
A schooner rigged barge, yesterday in attempting to get out of the bayou, drifted against a sang on the point near the town, and soon filled. There were thirty nine hhds. of sugar on board, most of which may be considered as lost. Mr. Songy Reynand was the owner. (Creole.)

**Horrible Piracy—**A gentleman of this city has put into our hand the following letter from Havana and certificate from Matanzas:—

**HAVANA Feb. 26.**  
It is with regret I inform you of the capture of the brig New Priscilla—statement made by John Corrigan, master of the brig Mary Jane, of New-York. On the 14th Feb. inst. the wind at S. W. entered on the Key-Sail Bank, in sight of the Dog Keys, at 2, 30. P. M. saw a herm. brig and schooner apparently in company, living to the wind, at P. M. not wishing to leave the Bank, tacked to the southward, when they immediately filled away. At 4, 15, finding we were coming up with them they both tacked for about fifteen minutes, when the schr. again filled away and left the brig in the situation last mentioned. At 5 P. M. being close aboard the brig, The New-Priscilla, of Salem, on her stern, observed that her stern boat tackles were hanging in the water, her boat gone, and not a soul to be seen on board—hailed three or four times but received no answer—tacked and stood off. Not a vessel of war of the U. S. had been in port for more than three months. Last evening, Mr. — received a letter from the Commercial Agent at Matanzas, containing news of the capture by pirates of the brig Attentive, Grover, of Boston. We had recently a tremendous gale of wind several vessels were much damaged on the Banks, which of course gives us some business. We have this day, in consequence of the above mentioned vessels, raised by subscription about \$1200 to fit out a small armed vessel, in which I expect to go, provided permission can be had from the Captain General—application will be made in the morning. What a shame our commerce should be so much exposed, or protected by foreigners. A number of vessels now being ready for sea, application was this day made to the French Consul for a brig of war, now in port to convoy them through the Gulf.

**P. S.** I send you a true and perfect copy of the capture of the brig Attentive, &c. What think you?—we got the expedition all-ready, shipped 35 men, provisions, &c; ready for sea, when the Commandant would not permit us to sail. Did you ever hear of such rascally conduct? The new Administration it is to be expected will do something for the protection of our commerce.

**MATANZAS, Feb. 24th, 1829.**  
Be it known, that on this day, before me, Lewis L. Shoemaker, Consular Commercial Agent of the U. States of America, at the port of Matanzas, and residing within the same, personally came and appeared Alfred Hill, who being duly sworn, according to law, doth depose, declare, and say—That he was second mate of the brig Attentive, [the name is Atlantic in one instance,] Capt. Caleb W Grover, of Boston, which vessel sailed hence on Sunday, the 22d days of Feb. instant, bound to N. York, having on board the following named persons, viz: Caleb

Grover, master; Josep Jordan, first mate; this appearer, Alfred Hill, second mate; John Robinson, Joseph Blaseday and Potter, seamen; & cook, a black man, name unknown. That off Pont Yaco, was boarded and brought to by a piratical schooner, about sixty or seventy tons burthen, full of men, armed with cutlasses, and having two large guns, who ordered the boat to be lowered and sent on board the schr., which was done, leaving on board Capt. Grover and two men, Joseph Blaseday and John Robinson; that as soon as the boat got alongside of the schooner, a number of her men jumped on board, took out the two seamen, and immediately shoved alongside of the brig and boarded her, and ordered all hands, except the captain, into the forepeak. After shutting the scuttle over, they waited about ten minutes, and ordered all hands on deck again. That at this time, he, said Alfred Hill, was stowed away among the cargo, for the purpose of secreting himself, that they were called on deck separately, that he then heard a heavy groan from the captain, and heard him distinctly repeat these words "Lord, have mercy on my soul," and heard a scuffling on deck, and groans of the people; that after the noise had ceased, they commenced searching as he supposes for money, that about 4 o'clock in the afternoon, she knocked out her low port, when she immediately began to fill with water—bearing a noise on deck at the time, he supposed that the pirates had not left her, and was afraid to go upon deck; that having discovered the noise to proceed from the flapping of the sails, after having remained below until twilight, he went upon deck, and got some blankets, with which he endeavored to stop up the bow port, but found it of no use, as the force of the sea washed them in again that he then filled the topsails, to endeavor if possible, to get her back into the harbor. That about three miles and a half from the shore, with the assistance of a plank, he succeeded in getting ashore about 4 o'clock the following morning, and continued walking along shore as far as he could; that he then went to a house, where they gave him an order to go to Mr. Robert's ferry, where he dined.

That from thence he went to the plantation of Mr. Echevarria, where he slept last night, from whence he this morning came to town. That the brig was over-hauled and boarded between twelve and one o'clock of the day of their leaving port, and that the pirates left her as he supposes, between four and five o'clock in the afternoon. That after coming on deck, he discovered marks of blood near the rail, and pieces of watches, &c. and wearing apparel strewn about the cabin and deck. That he has no doubt, from the noise, and the appearance of blood, that the capt. and crew were murdered.

**Voyages of Discovery.**—According to a statement in a French paper, there are at present no less than thirteen vessels actually employed in voyages of discovery. Of these, France has three, England five, Russia two, Sweden one, Holland one, and the United States one. It remains to be seen whether the last mentioned expedition will ever put to sea. We want yet the example of Spain, Portugal and the small Italian States.—*Southern Patriot.*

**PORTUGAL.**—It appears, by a letter from Lisbon of the 3d of January, that the state of affairs in that city is anything but satisfactory. The regular troops, whether from want of pay, or a partiality to the Constitution, or a mere love of disorder, have lately displayed a feeling of hostility to the Royalist Volunteers, which has been rendered on their part, and produced some disagreeable scenes in the capital. Two of the volunteers were found dead in the streets on the 3d. One of them was supposed to have met his death from a sabre wound, and the other from the stab of a bayonet. Some misunderstanding, too, had taken place between the Viscount Santarem (the Minister for Foreign affairs) and the French Naval Officer on the station, on account of the Constitutionists finding shelter on board the French ships. A complaint was first made to the French Consul, who referred the Minister to the Commanding Officer. Two boats, with a detachment of police, were sent out, when, after some trifling quarrel, the party retired without receiving any satisfactory answer. The Queen Mother, since the illness of her son, has indirectly taken possession of the reins of Government; and though the Ministers, from the difficulty of their situation, have found it necessary to adopt more moderate principles than formerly, she has, by her ability and indefatigable activity, contrived to render them in general of no effect.
