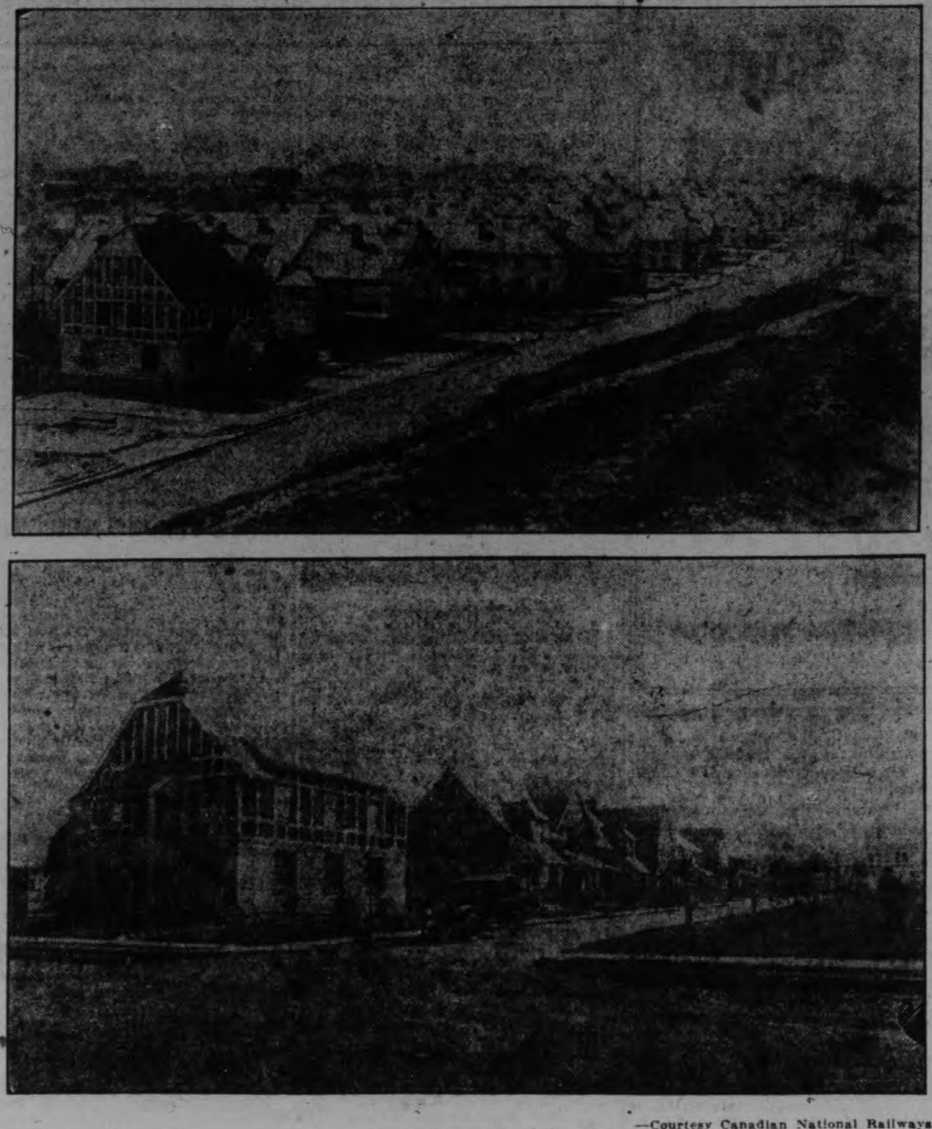
EMPERESS OF RUSSIA WILL SAIL TO-NIGHT

"BEER CLAUSE" POPS UP AGAIN. Will Likely Be Introduced After All Next Week; Liquor Holds House. That the "beer clause," after all, will be introduced as an amendment to the act as now before the committee of the House is almost a certainty, but just who will introduce it remains a secret. Government members had hoped that H. H. Pooley, Conservative member for Esquimalt, would introduce a motion along this line. Mr. Pooley was thought to be in favor of the sale of beer. It is now known that no such step will be taken by any member of the Opposition. The latest rumor or "guess" is that Capt. Ian Mackenzie, second member for Vancouver, will bring in an amendment asking for the sale of beer. Capt. Mackenzie said he was quite certain that the "beer clause" would be brought in and likely at the first of next week.

Liquor Holds Up House. There is no possibility of the Liquor Control Act being passed this week, and it is not expected that the beer issue will reach the committee before Monday or Tuesday. With the commencement of night sittings on Monday, an effort will be made to clean up before Easter, but since that would mean an adjournment on Wednesday, March 23, it is hardly likely that adjournment will come before the holiday. While there is little business still to be disposed of insofar as new legislation is concerned, still the liquor act is a long way from being law, while the budget debate and the passing of the estimates may be expected to require two weeks. Sergeant-Major Pessimistic. Sergeant-Major Jimmy Robinson was busy at the Builders' today in the interests of the clubs that want beer so they can keep going. Despite all his efforts, however, the Sergeant-Major announced this morning that there is now practically no chance of the beer clause passing the House, even if it is introduced. "I'm afraid it is all up with the beer clause, no matter what is done," said the Sergeant-Major. Commissioners Not Decided Yet. Despite reports in Vancouver, it has not yet been decided whether A. M. Johnson, K.C., at present Deputy Attorney-General for B.C., and Major-General Leckie are to be two of the liquor commissioners to administer the new act, Premier Oliver said to-day. "I have not the least idea of who is going to be liquor commissioner," the Premier said. "The matter has not been discussed by the Government, no matter what is said to have been done outside or what you hear outside as to what has been decided inside." The Vancouver reports have it that Mr. Johnson is to be appointed because of his familiarity with the liquor laws and their enforcement, and General Leckie because he is a returned soldier, commanding universal confidence. Distillers Offer Help. R. T. Ferguson, of Winnipeg, counsel for the distillers of Canada, arrived at the Parliament Buildings today to promise Premier Oliver and members of the Government the full co-operation of all distillers in assisting to make the new law for the distribution of liquor effective. Mr. Ferguson also made the suggestion that Government vendors might take orders for liquors from persons who have permits and place these orders with wholesalers and distillers, who would ship the liquor direct to the consumers. Premier Oliver replied that he did not think that sort of thing would work or prove acceptable. Templars Against Beer. Chief Templar F. C. Harrison, of the West Lodge, No. 94, International Order of Good Templars, Vancouver, to-day informed the Premier that his lodge has formally taken a stand against the Government inserting any clause in the liquor bill permitting the sale of intoxicating liquors in clubs, hotels and other public places. Presbyterians Also Opposed. The Westminster Presbytery, which has been in session at St. Andrew's Church, Vancouver, sent the Premier a resolution saying that the reasonable interpretation of the plebiscite contains any mandate to frame a law permitting the sale of liquor, wines or beers in hotels, restaurants and clubs or the consumption of such liquors on the premises where sold, and that the Government liquor bill permitting the sale of intoxicating liquors in clubs, hotels and other public places.

James Ramsay, fifth member for Vancouver, made it clear to-day that he was not the "Mr. Ramsay of Vancouver," who accompanied brewers before the Premier yesterday and asked that beer drinking places be opened up all over the Province under the Government. The Imperial Veterans of Vancouver sent a delegation to-day to the Attorney-General advocating the beer clause. Introduced by Sergt-Major Robinson, it was composed of President Griffin, Secretary Thomas, and E. Aspinall.
