Toronto, March 10.—The standards set for moving pictures by the Ontario Board of Censors provide for the exclusion of the "degrading, the immoral, the improperly suggestive, the harmful and the indecent." Shocking and unnecessary details of deeds of violence and struggle scenes will be cut out. Pictures which deal with firearms or display of knives or guns may be eliminated or cut to a flash, as the Board thinks best.

Some pictures of the "wild and woolly West" variety, where there would be no possibility of reproduction or incentive to imitation, will be allowed at the discretion of the Board.







Large Contracts for Aircraft Laid or Planned by

Japan and China According to advices to hand re

According to advices to hand recently, the Japanese and Chinese governments and nations are both taking very keenly to the modern development of aviation. During the war period contingents of both Japanese and Chinese officers went to England and other Allied countries to watch progress in aeronautical matters, and also to receive instruction in all branches of the science of flying.

It was the general opinion of the leading aeronautical experts then that neither the Japanese nor the Chinese would be very efficient as flying men, but the trend of latter day developments points, or would seem to point, to the existence of at least a very keen interest on behalf of both these nations in the Far East.

Showing Real Interest

Since the cessation of hostilities almost every firm in England has sent representatives to both Chima and Japan, and some very large contradits for aircraft have been obtained recently whereby the nations of the Far East are taking Old Country aircraft, for the development of air lanes in **those lands.

Japan has now a \$10,000,000 equipment contracted for by the Vickers firm, and several large Handley Page machines have been operating a mail and passenger route there, for some time past. British aviators, it was understood, acted as pilots for these services, but the Japanese are learning to take care of their own machines.






