

New York May 14. 1824

Respected Friend

The first vessel, since the arrival of our friend W. Farman sailed last evening, on board of which I shipped the articles you order, as ~~the~~ copies of the bills inclosed. I received this week ~~fr.~~ Trotter & Daug-
lass line 6 Lines blown to do Linn Seed, for which there is no immediate sale, have therefore stored it; also rec^d. 14 Tons of seed which I have sold at 8^{cts} tons marked 22^{cts} for profit for cash. The article of No 1 Sea has considerably improved in price since you left here. The Americas cargo sold yesterday at 74 to 84^{cts} average about 78^{cts}. I will send you our price current tomorrow which will probably give particulars.

W. Farman has paid over to me the 2000^{lbs} sent by Richem. Cotton yarn is scarce, he informs me he cannot purchase under 24^{cts} 2^{cts} and that not assorted as you wish, he therefore prefers sending an order to the factory, the price will be 25^{cts} and ^{it} will probably be sent next week.
