As for the additional allocation of electric power, the first interim report (EIB No. 2,019, VII. Emphasis: E. Adequacy of Additional Allocation) and the second interim report (EIB No. 2,041, III. General opinion: 3. Additional allocation of electric power) were already presented by this office. To grasp the actual situation of the additional allocation of electric power in such a manner as to clarify the situation of the typical additional allocation business especially on those which were made by branch office and Haiden K.K. within the jurisdiction of the Nagoya Commerce and Industry Bureau for November, 1948, the administration inspection was made by the Nagoya Regional EIA. The results were summarized as follows:

I. Outline.

1. Business Functions on Additional Allocation.

Within the jurisdiction of the Nagoya Commerce and Industry Bureau, additional allocation was mainly managed by the Bureau itself while some part of business were entrusted to its branch offices the Haiden Company as follows.

(a) First class demand of above 100 KW of contracted KW -----

Directly allocated by the Hokuiku Branch Office, the Commerce and Industry Bureau.

(b) First class demand of less than 100 KW of contracted KW and all second class demand -----Entrusted to branch

offices of the Commerce and Industry Bureau.

(c) All third class demands and a part of the first and second class demands which were especially entrusted. (Flour mill, bakeries and factories under the influence of the Textile Cooperative Union) -----Entrusted to the Haiden K.K.

2. Additional allocation made directly by branch offices of the Commerce and Industry Bureau.

(A) The Commerce and Industry Bureau decided the additional allocation through the Electric Power Distribution Conference which was principally composed of the Chiefs of unit, section and Division of the Bureau and the Electric Power Adjustment Section. As to the standard and limit of the Assessment of additional allocation, however, no proper standard of allocation was clearly fixed.

(B) The source of the additional allocation was as follows:

- a. Reserve for adjustment use allocated by the ESB to the Commerce and Industry Bureau.
- b. Reserve allocated by the Ministry of Commerce and Industry for adjustment use on the basis of the Ministerial instruction.
- c. Balance of allocation arising from the assessment of provisional allocation.
- d. Returned allocation of consumers.
- e. Diversion of adjustment reserve available for allocation to small consumers.
- f. Estimated balance of consumers' allotment not to be used.

(hereinafter referred to as non-use estimation).

As stated later, the additional allocations to small consumers were already exceed their allotments from the beginning, therefore the diversion of reserved amount was no more than a false calculation. It was deemed improper, also, that the inaccurate figures of non-use estimation was being included into the course of additional allocation. On the whole, it can be said that the competent agency itself has ignored or slighted the present electric power allocation system. Similar situation was seen, as undermentioned, in the case of commission of business management to branch office and Maiden K.K. without allocating framework for adjustment use or source of additional allocation.

- (C) The records of additional allocation was not fully kept by the competent offices. The inadequate keeping of records was caused by the fact that the officials in charge of summarization of allocation neglected the recording of returned or minor allocation which were made immediately after the distribution conference, for they handled those allocations only based upon their memo-books without through the conference. The Bureau must establish the effective measures for careful management of the additional allocation
- (D) The fifth additional allocation for November, 1948 was decided to be made on Dec. 3, 1948, while the date of issuance of additional allocation coupon went back to Nov. 24, 1948. In view of the proper calculation of excess additional power charges, such retroactive issuance of the additional allocation was deemed extremely improper.

(E) Additional allocations made by the Bureau to consumers whose contracted amount were between 100 KW to 500 KW exceeded the limit of adjustment reserve over 1,000,000 KWH. The competent officials explained that the over-issuance of allocation coupons were made on the basis of non-use estimation (estimated balance of allocation not to be used).

3. Additional allocation made by branch office of the Commerce and Industry Bureau.

(a) The Commerce and Industry Bureau entrusted business of additional allocation to its branch offices concerning the allocation for consumers of less than 100 KW, but the was too irrational because no source for adjustment use was allocated to each branch office by the said Bureau.

(b) The Commerce and Industry Bureau took no positive measures for the negligence of reports notwithstanding each branch office had never presented reports on additional allocation to the said Bureau. As a consequence, the Bureau did not at all grasp the figures of additional allocations in respect to consumers of less than 100 KW and the second class consumers.

(c) As for the second class demand no framework of adjustment for additional allocation use was allocated by the ESB. Actually, however, the additional allocations were made. For example, the Aichi Branch Office of the Commerce and

Industry Bureau made additional allocation for November, 1948 as follows:

Number of cases demanded additional allocations by consumers .....	119

Additional allocation were made on above cases irrespective of the allocation standard was fixed and notified by the official Notification.

4. Additional allocation made by the electric power distribution company (Haiden E.K.)

(a) Same as the case of branch office, the Commerce and Industry Bureau entrusted a part of its business to the Haiden E.K. without allocating the adjustment framework of additional allocation.

(b) The Haiden E.K. neglected the presentation of reports on additional allocation to the Commerce and Industry Bureau which had never taken proper steps against the said negligence of reports. Consequently, the Bureau did not at all grasped the actual figures of additional allocation made by the Haiden E.K.

5. Conclusion.

To sum up the above, the adjustment of allocation of electric

power was generally going made actively through additional allocation, as a consequence, it may be estimated that the total wattage consumed for additional allocation must be an enormous one. The total wattage, however, could not be computed accurately on account of negligence of reports and bad record keeping. Therefore, it was deemed very doubtful that to what extent the present electric power allocation system was being enforced.

II. Additional allocation made by the Commerce and Industry Bureau for large scale industries (above 500 KW).

During November, 1948, the Commerce and Industry Bureau made five times of additional allocations.

1. The first additional allocation.

ii) The total of the "Framework for adjustment use", 1,451,900 KWH, was a planned figure of the Bureau which was calculated in anticipation of the non-use estimation. The actual framework allocated to the Bureau was 11,290,000 KWH.

Remarks:

a) The first additional allocation was decided as above, but the available source was as follows. (Consequently, the issuance of allocation coupon was exceeded over the available amount).

Therefore, the over-issuance of allocation coupon was as follows:

Even if 63,870 KWH of unavailable amount was included in the source of additional allocation, the allocation was still over the available amount as follows.

b) In the above table, the additional allocation for machine industries exceeded 60,000 KWH of the available allocation amount. The reason for the over-allocation was due to official in charge of machine industry had mistaken the available framework of adjustment amount, or 150,000 KWH, and actually allocated 210,000 KWH.

c) Officials of the Commerce & Industry Bureau explained that the over-allocation was made in anticipation of non-use estimation amount of 100,000 KWH or so which were calculated into the source of additional allocation.

d) Immediately after the decision of the first additional allocation, 166,000 KWH were returned by paper and pulp industries, therefore the officials in charge made supplementary additional allocation together with the first additional allocation as follows.

Remarks: The source of the third additional allocations of the above table was returned amounts including 63,090 KWH of diversion of adjustment framework for small consumers. The balance between the third additional allocation and the returned amounts, consequently, was 7,765 KWH. (1,539,505 - 1,531,740).

The figure of diversion of adjustment framework for small consumers, of 63,090 KWH above, however, was obviously fictitious considering the fact the additional allocations for small consumers were made through over-issuance of allocation coupons from the beginning.

134,000 KWH ..... Adjustment framework instructed by the Ministry of Commerce and Industry;

1,000,000 KWH... Diversion of special electric power as ordinary electric power based on the instruction given by the said Ministry.

In view of the nature of special electric power, it was not proper to make such diversion of electric power.

Remarks: The additional allocation and returned amount shown above were handled by the competent officials on the basis of their memo-book, and the figures were not entered on the ledger book of Summarization Unit of the Bureau.

The reserve for sanitary goods industry, of 11,000 KWH of the above, was not included in the source of the first additional allocation.

Remarks: 18,000 KWH and 46,000 KWH, in the columns of Daily necessities and Fertilizer (Ishiwara Sangyo) of the returned amount respectively, were not actually returned by the concerned industries but were estimated by the Commerce and Industry Bureau.

In December, 1948, notification for alteration of allocation was issued by the Bureau. The Ishiwara Sangyo who did not know the alteration of allocation had come to such a pass that it would be handled as an over-allocation consumer, therefore, it submitted a petition, hurriedly, to the Bureau on Jan. 25, 1949. The allocation was again altered on Jan. 28, 1949 and additional issuance of coupon was made on the same day, with the date of Nov. 27, 1948.

6. Summary.

To sum the above, the totals were as follows.

Total additional allocation .....	7,313,450 KWH
Total amount used for additional allocation .....	7,436,775 KWH
Balance of allocation .....	123,325 KWH

However, as mentioned above, the source of additional allocation, of 7,436,775 KWH, of the above included unreasonable diversion of adjustment framework for small consumers, non-use rationing, alteration of special electric power into ordinary electric power, thus barely avoided inconsistency.

The balance between the total additional allocation stated on the above table, on 4,460,473. KWH, with the reserve amount, or 3,306,910 KWH, was 1,153,563 KWH which was over-issuance of allocation coupon.

3. The officials of the same Bureau in charge of additional allocation explained the reason of over-issuance of allocation coupon that they made allocation in anticipation of non-use situation.

IV. Additional Allocation made by the Branch Offices of the Commerce and Industry Bureau for Small Consumers (less than 100 KW) and 2nd Class Consumers.

1. The Commerce and Industry Bureau never made allocation of adjustment reserve available for small consumers to its branch offices. In addition, it entirely neglected to take necessary reports there from in connection with the actual situation of additional allocation. Accordingly, the EIA could not make effective administrative inspection on the said Bureau, for lack of necessary records or data of the additional allocation. The EIA, therefore, inspected the Aichi Branch Office of the said Bureau on additional allocation of November, 1948 as an example. The results was as follows.

2. Regarding additional allocation made by the Aichi Branch Office of the Nagoya Commerce and Industry Bureau.

Remarks:

1) As above table, only the Aichi Branch Office made additional allocation of 408,875 KWH for small consumers and 145,792 KWH for 2nd class consumers. The wattage allocated for additional allocation, however, had no available source which was never allocated by the Commerce and Industry Bureau to each branch office from the beginning. It was estimated that considerable KV of additional allocation were made by all branch offices without being allocated any available source. By what source were the

additional allocations made?

The fact might be explained that there were considerable KW of non-use estimations. It was suggested by SIA.

(1) The ratio of the additional allocation to the basic allocation was very large.

V. Additional Allocation made by the Electric Power Distribution Company. (Maiden K.K.)

1. The Maiden K.K. was entrusted by the Commerce and Industry the business of additional allocation for the first class consumers and flour mills, bakeries and factories under the influence of the Textile Cooperative Union of the second class consumers (under certain fixed allocation standard) and business of additional allocation for the third class consumers (under allocation standard indicated by (2) of annexed table (II) of the Notification).

2. The Commerce and Industry Bureau had never allocated any adjustment framework of electric power of allocation for small consumers to Maiden K.K. as well as branch offices of the Bureau, therefore the Maiden K.K. must have made additional allocation by diversion of non-use estimation consumer.

3. No report on the actual situation of additional allocation and its results was presented by the Maiden K.K. to the Bureau.

4. Additional allocations were made by branch and sub-branch offices of the Heiden E.K. merely perfunctorily and the Company itself had never grasped the actual situation of additional allocations. as a consequence, the EIA could not grasp their actual situation.

1. The deficiencies listed in the attached sheets have been assembled from those commonly encountered by the Army Commander's inspection team in their semi-annual inspections of directly assigned and attached units at this headquarters.



5. BRIEF SUMMARY OF RESULTS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THIS TRIP:

- A brief study was made of the use of straw in the production/paper, paper board, and corrugated boxes. Problems concerning the use of additional straw and straw products were discussed with plant officials. Experimental work by individual concerns indicates a great increase in the use of straw as additional equipment and electrical power is made available. The problem of collection and storage of straw within economic limits will solve itself as the price scale is adjusted and straw balers are obtained.

- Manufacturing processes were discussed with plant officials and methods were suggested for improvement in quality of pulp and paper.

- Methods of testing pulp and paper were discussed in effort to improve the standard of papers being produced in view of eliminating the variation of papers produced.

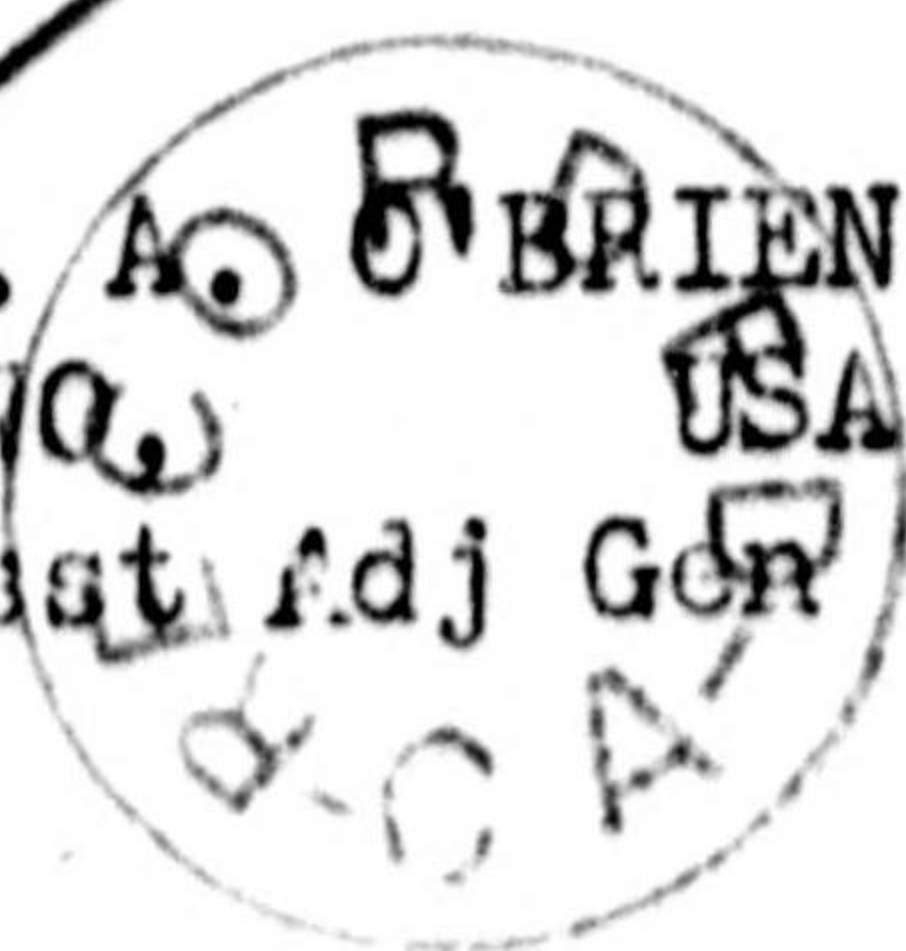
