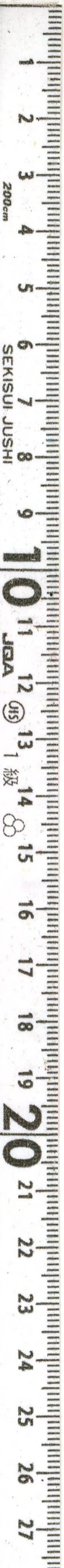

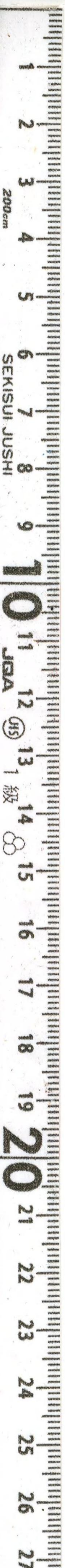

1. Reference letter, Office of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G2, Intelligence, Department of the Army, file G2, TMP, subject: "Motion Picture Coverage of Counter Intelligence Corps Combat Activities in Korea," dated 14 August 1951.

2. Referenced letter initiated filming of background scenes to be used for a training film of CIC in combat, Project 22029.

3. A review of a draft scenario to be used by the Signal Corps as a technical guide for the training film by CIC personnel presently in Korea produced the following comments which are submitted for your consideration:

a. Reference page 3, Scenario: CIC detachments with divisions do not have Korean guards. In most locations the detachment CP is included in territory covered by the post of an American sentry.

b. Reference page 4, Scenario: CIC personnel in Korea do not address the commanding officer as "Chief". Since many of the agents now entering the Corps are young and have just completed basic training, use of terminology such as this for the commanding officer does not seem conducive to furtherance of military courtesy gained by addressing the commanding officer as "Sir" or his appropriate rank. Also, the listing of three (3) people as clerks for a seventeen (17) man division detachment is a departure from the true situation in Korea. Division detachments, almost without exception,

have only one (1) clerk due to the shortage of clerical and administrative personnel in Korea.

c. Reference page 8, Scenario: Present policy on wearing of US insignia calls for only agents in special cases to wear them. This includes such criteria as daily contact with Republic of Korea officials and such other UN Armies that enlisted rank would be a liability. Other officer and enlisted personnel wear the standard rank designations. Permission for wearing of US insignia is granted by name on an individual basis for each agent and may be granted only by the Army CIC Officer.

d. Reference page 28, Scenario: The Korean in the interrogation is sitting. Koreans normally will not sit in an interrogation of this type, but will squat and "sit on their heels", which is their native custom.

e. Reference page 47, Scenario: Throughout the operation, considerable emphasis is placed on the use of radio for communication. All division detachments in Korea have discovered that the radio is largely ineffective as a communications medium during the current Korean campaign due to the rugged Korean terrain and the rough, unconditioned roads which injure radios during moves. All detachments have turned in their radio equipment as unsatisfactory after unsuccessful attempts to use it. At present no radio equipment is in use by CIC in Korea and its use does not appear practicable in the current situation.

f. Reference page 63, Scenario: Projector PH 222 is not on hand in the field CIC detachments in Korea. It is believed that equipment not commonly on hand in Korea should not be shown in a training film.

g. Reference page 67, Scenario: The minister mentioned in the story, if an American, would not have been allowed to continue his activities in enemy territory. If a Korean theologian who had studied in the United States, he could logically be in enemy territory when friendly forces arrived.

h. Reference page 74, Scenario: The interpreter should not be portrayed as getting angry. Normally in an interrogation, nothing is gained by anger on the part of the interrogator, much less on the part of the interpreter. The interpreter acts only as the medium through which the CIC agent interrogates a suspect and as such should not be permitted to express his personal feelings during the interrogation.

i. Reference page 82, Scenario: Clay asks for and gets a bag of rice from a Korean girl. There is no interpreter there and no

indication that Clay can speak Korean. If the enemy has been in the region recently, they would probably have taken all the available rice with them when they withdrew, and in any event it is doubtful if the store would be open for business so soon. Besides, such a setup would immediately attract everyone's attention since American personnel are not permitted to buy food from indigenous sources in Korea.

j. Reference page 88, Scenario: As the agent finishes the security lecture, he tells the men to give only their name, rank and serial number. In Korea, it has been found that a captive refusing to give more than this to the Communists is likely to be killed as an uncooperative prisoner. It has been found that a soldier can escape death by talking freely of his home, his schooling, etc., but at the same time answering "I don't know" on military information. The enemy are apparently more interested in finding candidates for Communist indoctrination than in military information.

k. Reference page 93, Scenario: It was noticed that a truck was used at this point to haul informants, etc., to the rear. Division CIC detachments in Korea do not have such facilities for transportation and if the truck were available, a Korean driver would not be permitted to drive with a trip ticket. Military Police pick up Koreans driving other Koreans; they would be especially quick to do so if they saw a Korean in a vehicle with a USA number.

l. General Comment: Interrogations are being conducted in the office tents. Experience in Korea has indicated that interrogation wherever possible is better accomplished in Koreans buildings or in the open air. Bringing many natives into the quarters or office tents results in infesting the tents with vermin and lice and exposing the agents unnecessarily to serious flea and louse borne diseases. This threat is not eliminated but is lessened by keeping prisoners out of offices and quarters. Confidential funds were mentioned as being approved by the G2. As an economy measure and one calculated to eliminate as many separate funds as possible by both G2 and CIC, EUSAK G2 approves confidential supplies on an Army-wide basis. These are issued to the CIC detachments by the Army CIC Detachment. If a Division G2 desires funds or supplies, he contacts EUSAK G2 who authorizes the necessary amount and encourages the Division G2 to use CIC fiscal facilities. Thus in most cases, C/F reaches the Division G2 through CIC confidential supply distribution channels.

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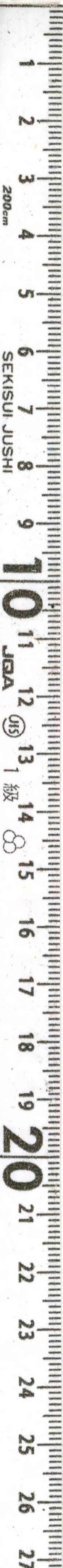

1. Reference: Letter, file G2, TMP, subject as above, Office of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G2, Intelligence, Department of Army, 14 August 1951.

2. Referenced letter and subsequent correspondence between the Signal Corps Photographic Center and the Signal Officer, GHQ, FEC, initiated the making of motion picture footage in Korea to be used as background scenes for a training film (Project #22029).

3. A photographic copy of a draft scenario to be used as a Signal Corps technical guide in the filming of these background scenes was transmitted to Signal Section, GHQ, FEC by the Photographic Center on 6 September 1951.

4. Review of the scenario by personnel of this headquarters who served in appropriate capacities in CIC in Korea has resulted in the following constructive comments which are submitted for your consideration:

a. Reference Page 3 of scenario. The policy of emphasizing the theory of the Division CIC Detachment Commander being formally designated as the Division Counter Intelligence Officer does not agree with actual practice. It is recognized that the Commanding Officer must assist in this matter, but CIC work is only a portion of the counter intelligence duties in a division. It is much more desirable for an officer of the G2 staff to be delegated the duties of CI officer which includes the processing of clearance requests and the many strictly tactical phases of counter intelligence work. In this way the

detachment commander can whole-heartedly assist in those phases involving CIC and yet be available to command his detachment and more closely supervise its activities.

b. Reference Page 4 of scenario. At division level -- and for that matter at all tactical levels -- the CIC detachment is a military unit and personnel assigned thereto must primarily be good soldiers before being "specialists." There appears to be no justifiable grounds for the Commanding Officer being customarily called "Chief." In fact, considering the comparative lack of military background of recently procured personnel it is felt that such a custom will only be prejudicial to the proper understanding of the relationship between the Commanding Officer and his agents. It is not intended that the Commanding Officer of a small group of intelligence personnel should stand on protocol or be overbearing; however it appears that acceptance by one individual of the title of "Chief" could best be left to the discretion of each Commanding Officer and agent rather than being included in a training film.

c. Reference Page 5 of scenario. In Korea, the division G2 did not approve confidential supplies, as this was done at Army or Theater level and such supplies were forwarded through CIC channels. By the same token Confidential Funds were furnished by the Army CIC Detachment and not from division G2 allotments.

d. Reference "US" Insignia, Page 8 and 9 of scenario. It would seem this provides an excellent opportunity to emphasize the heavy responsibility each agent must bear when wearing this insignia. The standards of appearance, discipline, conduct and courtesy without groveling are important considerations. It is considered to be a mistake for the administrative NCO and two clerks to wear the US's. They are not agents and the only reason for US's is to facilitate operations. Further, in a division detachment, if the Commanding Officer is able to state that he has three (3) enlisted men and fourteen (14) officers or individuals of officer status it helps materially in the acceptance of an unusual situation. The Commanding Officer should wear his rank, whereas all the other officers, warrant officers and enlisted agents should be in US's. Some detachments kept officers in rank and enlisted agents in US's which defeats the purpose intended for their use.

e. General Comment: The use of CIC teams without support for the seizure of targets is a commonplace calculated risk in smaller towns; however, such a practice in larger cities requiring agents to enter or travel across uncleared sections of the city calls for careful analysis of the situation; the possibility of obtaining a few troops from the tactical unit in the area; or the organization of a task force as was used in the exploitation of Pyongyang. (See TF Indianhead report for details.)

f. Reference Page 65 of scenario. Even with two (2) agents and one (1) interpreter the basic raid principles of sealing off other

exits should be observed. It is hard to imagine the proprietor awaiting the arrival of our agents when he could have easily slipped out a back or side door or window. This is where the CIC agent must quickly assess the situation and make the logical decisions which will protect himself and insure the seizure of all personnel targets without allowing them to escape.

1. Information is requested as to the feasibility and practicability of obtaining motion picture coverage of Signal Corps cameramen of Counter Intelligence Corps Combat Activities in Korea for use in conjunction with the production of training film "CIC in Combat" (P22029).

2. Specific types of photographic coverage requested are as follows:

a. Physical facilities of detachments (interiors and exteriors of buildings and tentage) utilized as billets, administrative and operational installations. This category should include special facilities required to accommodate the indigenous Korean personnel utilized by the CIC detachment.

b. Location of such facilities included in a. above in relationship to the G-2 or S-2 of the units to which assigned or attached.

c. Coverage of operational activities of the detachment under typical combat conditions, with emphasis on the division detachment. The following activities are of special interest for instructional purposes:

- (1) Security surveys, inspections, and lectures.
- (2) Investigation of subversion or espionage and sabotage incidents.
- (3) Activities in connection with tactical security measures. (Camouflage, light and noise discipline, communication security.)
- (4) Liaison with other security units, both military and civilian.
- (5) Interrogations at the various echelons, illustrating the actual conditions under which they are conducted and the difficulties encountered in the use of interpreters.
- (6) Counter Intelligence Corps activities in connection with infiltration and refugee problems. This would cover measures which are the responsibility of and effected by other units, as well as the ultimate results of such controls, which develop counterintelligence.

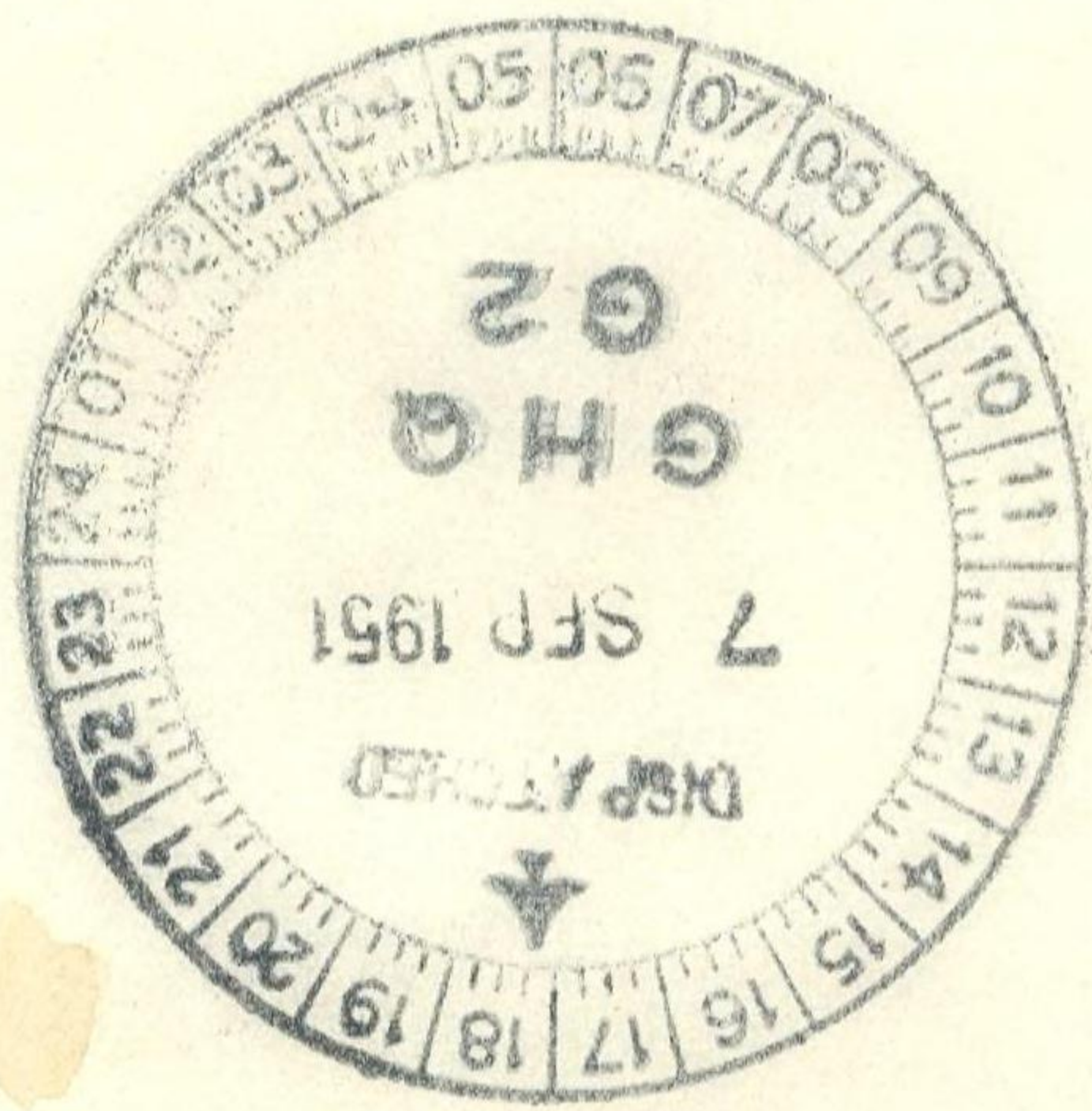

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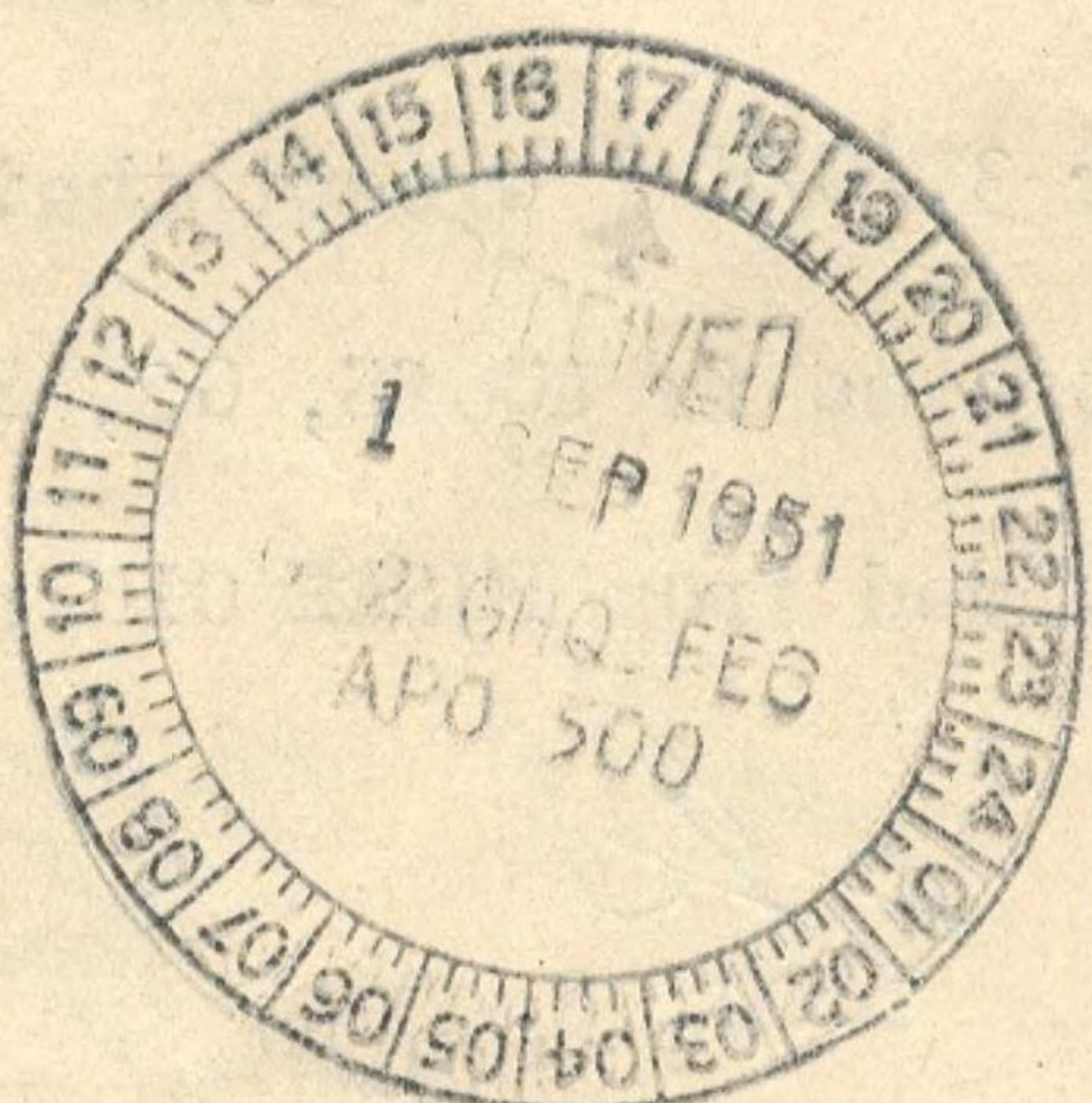
