RIT, Regional Transit To Study Campus Bus Service

RIT and the Regional Transit Service may provide hourly bus service between the Henrietta campus and downtown Rochester if faculty, staff and students indicate a need for it, Institute officials said last week.

A questionnaire regarding the need for expanded transportation service will be circulated to all faculty, staff and students during the next week.

If the campus community indicates the need, Institute officials will attempt to route buses between Henrietta and downtown once an hour or once every two hours.

Fine Arts Dean To Speak To NRS

A slide presentation of archaeological "digs" in Afghanistan, Jordan and Cyprus will highlight the October 28 meeting of the Nathaniel Rochester Society of RIT.

Society members will meet at the Inn on the Campus, beginning at 3 p.m., to hear Dr. Robert H. Johnston, dean of the College of Fine and Applied Arts, show slides and discuss his part as a ceramic specialist in the "digs." Johnston is a professional archaeologist and spent this past summer on his seventh archaeological expedition in the Middle East under grants from the Council of Learned Societies, the American School of Oriental Research at Harvard and the American School of Oriental Research in Amman, Jordan.

Following Dr. Johnston's presentation, cocktails and hors d'oeuvres will be served.

People Solve Problems Of World, Says Biology Prof

"Reliance on science and technology without the long-range sight of their potential for good and evil has created some of the problems we have before us now."

So believes Elizabeth J. Arthur, the newest addition to the biology faculty at RIT and one of five female faculty members in the College of Science.

"People solve the problems of the world, not science and technology," continues Dr. Arthur, an associate professor. "My arm's utterly useless without the rest of me. Facts are useless without emotions."

Such feelings result in her strong interdisciplinary approach in the classroom.

Dr. Arthur comes to RIT from the University of Pittsburgh, where she taught such varied subjects as neurophysiology for undergraduates, writing research papers (with a team of professors) and "Order as a Biological Principle."

The last course questioned whether man knows enough yet to identify unifying principles in science.

"I strongly feel order is one of these principles," says Dr. Arthur. "The answer to the question, 'What is life all about?,' lies very much in understanding order."

Dr. Arthur had her first sense of that order at the age of 10, and the experience motivated her to go into science.

After listening to her seventh grade science teacher talk about fossils, she split open a rock and found a fossil inside.

"It was the first rock I had ever split, and there was a fossil," she recalls. "The feeling I had was indescribable to me then. I was awed that this rock was millions of years old, but that thing in it had been alive just as I was alive. Now I know it was probably a feeling of continuity."

A native of Angola, N.Y., Dr. Arthur attended high school in the Buffalo suburb of Kenmore. She received a bachelor's degree with an interdisciplinary major in geology and a double minor in chemistry and biology from the University of Buffalo.

After teaching high school at Portville two years and Arcade six years, she went to Brown University for a master's degree in teaching physics and to Purdue University for a Ph.D. in biological science. She was a teaching assistant for two years at Purdue and taught at the University of Pittsburgh for six years.

At RIT Dr. Arthur is teaching advanced cellular biology and part of an introductory biology course this Fall Quarter,

and will teach anatomy and physiology the Winter and Spring Quarters.
