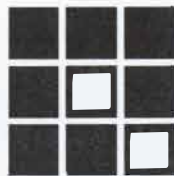

## INSTITUTE TO HOST NATIONAL SEMINAR ON NIXON ECONOMIC POLICY

RIT has been chosen as the only educational institution in the country to receive a special closed-circuit television program outlining Phase II of President Nixon's economic policy. The Oct. 28 program, which will be offered by invitation to more than 500 business leaders within a 150 mile radius of Rochester, is sponsored nationally by the National Association of Manufacturers and locally by the Industrial Management Council.

## COMPUTER SERVICES SCHEDULES SEMINARS

The Institute's Office of Computer Services has scheduled two seminars to introduce faculty, staff, and students to the time-sharing capabilities of the new Xerox manufactured XDS Sigma 6 computer currently being installed on campus. Seminar A, to be held Oct. 25 through 29 from 1 to 2 p.m., will be an introduction to the basic computer programming language as it is implemented on the XDS Sigma 6. Seminar B, to be held Nov. 1 through 5 from 1 to 2 p.m., will be an introduction to the time-sharing capability of the XDS Sigma 6. ## COMPOSITION SYSTEMS SEMINAR SET FOR OCT. 27-29

RIT's Graphic Arts Research Center will conduct a Composition Systems Seminar Oct. 27-29 as part of its continuing program of consultation, special education and research for the printing industry. The program will provide a survey of composing methods with special emphasis on computers - how they work, their advantages and limitations, and their role in contemporary type-setting, on phototypesetting, and on developing an understanding of the importance of the systems concept in solving a particular company's typesetting problems. The program, designed for middle and upper management, will provide a basis for making intelligent, well-informed decisions with respect to applying current technology to composition problems.

## RUSSELL CLARIFIES TELEVISION POLICY

Television Center Coordinator, Thomas L. Russell, issued a statement Oct. 4 clarifying TV Center policy on course "replays." According to Russell some misunderstanding has arisen lately among students concerning "replays" of missed televised lectures.

Russell stated "Televised courses are usually transmitted several times, allowing the student to tune into any or all of the broadcasts. If the student misses all broadcasts of a given lecture, he can ask his instructor to contact the TV Center for an additional play."

In addition, Russell stressed that instructors, not students, should call the TV Center to request additional showings of a particular lecture; that "replays" will be scheduled based on channel availability; and that each instructor requesting a "replay" provide assurance that there will be a large enough audience to justify the added costs involved.

## RIT RECEIVES HEW GRANT

Dr. Todd H. Bullard, provost and vice president for academic affairs, announced Sept. 30 that RIT has received a \$39,000 grant for the study of a "Baccalaureate Program for the Training of Biomedical Communication Professionals," to be conducted by the Institute's College of Graphic Arts and Photography.

The grant was awarded by the Public Health Service Division of the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, in accordance with the recommendations of the National Advisory Health Professions Council.

Dr. Bullard stated that "if the Bachelors Degree program is ultimately recommended, it will be an extension of our highly successful Associate Degree offering in Biomedical Photography, which started in 1968 and is the only degree program of its kind in the nation."

Under the terms of the grant, funding will be used to develop the program's curriculum for new communications techniques in the fields of biomedical television, cinematography and audio-visual instruction, and would represent a multi-media involvement beyond the curriculum now offered in the Associate Degree program in Biomedical Photography.

Coordinating the study will be John F. Trauger. Trauger, associate professor in the College of Graphic Arts and Photography, has served as director of the Associate Degree program in Biomedical Photography since it started in 1968.
