## STATE SENATOR IN MOVE TO OBTAIN BAN ON SCHOOLS OF JAPANESE

J. M. Inman to Urge Law That Will Gradually **Abolish Institutions** 

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 11.— Japanese language schools are banned from operating in California after January 1, 1930, under the terms of an amendment which Senator J. M. Inman of Sacramento will seek to have embodied in the foreign language school law passed at the last session.

The proposed amendment of the language school bill provides for the gradual elimination of the Oriental schools. Under the plan a grade of the Nipponese schools would be eliminated each year so that students now in the schools may complete their courses

The first grade would be abolished in 1924, the second in 1925, the third in 1926 and the fourth in 1927. The remaining students would be given until 1930 to complete their courses, after which the schools would be declared illegal and closed.

**Debt Fund Board** Will Ask Congress For More Power

ASHINGTON, Jan.

11.—The American debt funding commission will wait until its negotiations with the Brit-

ish representatives are concluded before drafting a special report asking Congress to grant it broader powers in arranging for the payment of the billions of dollars owed the United States, it was announced officially at the treasury department today. The recommendations of

the commission will be drawn up for the guidance of President Harding, who will transmit a special appeal to congress to amend the funding act so that the commission may have wider latitude in fixing interest rates and dates of maturity.

Stanley Baldwin and Montagu Norman, the Britdebt commissioners, have informed Secretary of the Treasury Mellon that the \$5,000,000,000 British debt must be funded over a period considerably longer the twenty-five years provided for by congress in enacting the funding law.

United States Will Take No Part in Ruhr Valley Drama

being at least the United States settled back today in the role of an interested spectator in the great international drama being unfolded in the Ruhr valley - a drama whose end cannot be foreseen by President Harding and his chief advisers.

At both the White House and the state department, it was made clear today that this government has gone to the uttermost limit in endeavoring to peaceably bring about an adjustment of the critical situation abroad, and, having failed, because of the stubborn insistence of France on a policy of force, nothing remains for the United States but to stand by and wait developments.

### TAKE OVER ESSEN AND BOCHUM WITHOUT RESISTANCE; MIGHTY KRUPP PLANT CONTINUES WORK

Proclamations Warn People to Remain Calm and So Far No Hostile Demonstrations Result; Mine Leaders May Call Strike

ESSEN, Germany, Jan. 11.—The city of Essen today protested to the United States and Great Britain against occupation by the French.

PARIS, Jan. 11.-Via Radio.-Dr. Mayer, German ambassador to France, left at noon for Berlin. As he did not notify the foreign office, it is not regarded by French officials as a break of Franco-German diplomatic relations.

ESSEN, Germany, Jan. 11.-A state of siege was declared here today by the French. In declaring the state of siege, General De Goutte, commander of the French army of occupation, assured Lord Mayor Luther (who is also federal food minister) that German civil laws would be continued in force.

E SSEN, Jan. 11.—Supported with artillery, tanks and airplanes, French troops crossed the border of the Ruhr basin this afternoon and occupied Essen. Immediately afterwards French cavalry moved upon Bochum, five and a half miles northeast of Essen. These are the two most important industrial cities in all Germany.

There was no resistance and up to 11 o'clock there had been no disorder or any hostile demonstrations.

The main column of French troops swung out of the Dusseldorf sector before dawn. Soon the air was filled with the shouts of officers, the rumbling of tanks, the clatter of cavalry horses upon the frozen ground and the hoarse tooting of horns upon the officers' motor cars. It was a real war scene.

ALL OF FACTORIES ARE AT WORK, REPORT

Cavalry reached Essen shortly after 9 o'clock. They found the city quiet, but sullenly restive. The shades were drawn in most of the houses and there were few persons abroad in the streets. All the factories were at work.

The burgomaster had gone to the city hall to await the arrival of French officers to arrange for billets for the French

The march into Essen was slow, owing to the snail-like pace at which the tanks crawled along. When the suburbs were reached the tanks turned aside and halted and the cavalrymen proceeded into Essen, where they came to a halt in the public square. Germany had been invaded at last!

MOST OF HOMES ARE CLOSED UP TIGHT

The officers hurried away to make arrangements for food and sleeping quarters for the men while the troops stared curiously about them at the high gabled old houses and the shops. For the most part the houses were closed up tight but occasionally a curtain was drawn aside from an upstairs window and eyes peeped out at the soldiers.

Crowds of small children soon gathered, staring at the soldiers. There was considerable fraternizing with young

Shortly after 10 o'clock a column of cavalry moved out of Essen towards Bochum. Proclamations had been posted in public places warning the people to remain calm. The French likewise had been instructed to do nothing which might incite an outbreak on the part of the people.

#### 'German Carnegie' Says Military Occupation Will Eventually Mean Total Ruin for France

E SSEN, Jan. 11.—"Military occupation by France ends Germany's chances of resuming her place among the first class powers for centuries and perhaps forever," declared August Thyssen, 80-year-old Ruhr iron magnate, in an exclusive statement to International News Service this afternoon.

Herr Thyssen, who ranks in power and wealth with the Krupps and Hugo Stinnes, is known as "the grand old man of the Ruhr." He sat in his castle on the Essen-Dusseldorf road, overlooking the Rhine river as he spoke.

PREDICTS FRANCE WILL GO TO RUIN

"I believe," continued the German industrialist, "that occupation will be the ruin of France. France is about to eat the bread whereof she will die.

"It is heartbreaking to see a life's work wantonly taken from our hands and thereby from the country and to sit by silently and in impotent rage.

The "German Carnegie" revealed that recently the United States Steel corporation, through President James A. Farrell, proposed to renew the pre-war sales contract with the powerful Thyssen industrial group.

FINAL ACT IN TRAGEDY, CLAIM

Herr Thyssen said the proposition had to be rejected because France would have insisted upon equal privileges which would have meant eventual ruin of the German iron and steel industry.

"If we had refused to pay a single penny three or four years ago instead of following the stupid policy of former Chancellon Joseph Wirth, we would have saved more from the wreck than we are saving today," continued Herr Thyssen. "This occupation is the final act reducing us to France's economic vassal."


