## LIGHT HOUSES.

Board of Commissioners for the several Light Houses in the Bay of Fwidy.-Robert W. Crookshank, Johm Ward, Isaac Woodward, Johu James Kobinson, R. N., and Donald Clark, Esquires.

Isaae Wnodward, Fisquire, Surveycr of those Light Honses in the Bay of Fundy belonging to New Brunswick, and also of those belonging to Nova Scotia which are partly supported by this Province.

Cape Sulite Scal Island Light.-The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A yery daugerons rock, under water, but upon which the sea always hreaks, called Blonile Rock, lies about 31 miles $S$. by W. by compass, from the Light House Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers-the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, olight not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.-In advancing up the Bav, the next Light is situated on BrierIsland, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof. A plain white light

Dighy Gat Light.-The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed on the west side of Digby Gut-from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented ; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Dighy Basin -A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light.-This Light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerons range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a fiush light-white-twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, hlack and white
Bearings and Distance by Cimpass from tha Gannet Rock Light House. This Light bears from the Light house on Brier Island, N.N.W. 電W. 22 miles.
From the Gamnet Rock to the OId Proprietor $\because$ : S. distance 7 miles. From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, of White Head Island, N. E. $\frac{d}{2}$ E. 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N. N. W. $6 . \frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges; N. W . $\frac{1}{2}$ N. $2 \frac{1}{2}$ miles.

To the Sonthernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, W S. W. 2 miles.
From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W and by N. N: 13 miles.
Notr.-Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Mury Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extends Westward frwm the Light House abont four miles; from this range, farther Westerly; about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous brepter called the Bill. This may be avoided by keeping three reparmble theadlande near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, opeu.
 181 miles

The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Cape Sable, Seal Islands S. and by W. $3 \frac{1}{3}$ miles distant.
Machias Seal Isinnd Lights.-There are two fixed achite lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E.S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, (British or Ainerican) Both the Buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz:

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly. " Gannet Rock Light E. by S. 4 S. 13 miles.
" Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.
". Northern Head of Grand Manan. N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.
" N F. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.
" Little River Head, N. by W.
" Libby Island Light House, (American,) N. W. by W.
Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three fnurths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the lights.
[1t is recommended that the Ship's Compasses should he well compared and adjusted (particularly in new ships), before they leave l'artridge Island, as serlous errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point ; and as the variation in the Bay of Funly is seventeen degress Wezterly, or ( $1 \frac{1}{2}$ points) it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course from Partridge laland down the Bay (South Channel) between the Old Proprietor and N. W. Ledge, is S. W. ${ }_{1}$ S., but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Head Harbour Light.-Next in order after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light, (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquody ; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour-it is a fixed wohite light. The building is painted White, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preau Lights.-Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet-Both lights can be seen from every point of the comphss. where they may be useful-both are fixed and wohite. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each. horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.-This light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed white light, and tbat the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes.

Beacon Light.-Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light ia established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed white light. The House is white and black, in stripes vertically.

Cape Enrage Light.-On the point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly upposite A pple River Harbour, N. S. A plain wohite light. The House is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark.

West Quoddy Light. -This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light-On Cape Forchu, on the western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova-Scotia), in lat. 43,39, N. long, 66,8. W. It extibits a plain revolving light-visible one minute and o yuarter, and invisible half a minute The building is painted white and is elevated 135 feet above the level of the sea.

Grindstome Island Light.-An Octagonal Tower, sixty feet above the level of high water on Grindstone Island, in Chignecto Bay, in Lat. 45د 4313 ' N, Long. $61^{\prime} 37^{\prime} 251 \mathrm{~W}$. The Tower is painted white, as is iliso the Keeper' $;$ house, one story, situate about 50 feet to the Eastward of the Tower.
Bearings and distances of several places from the above Light House, as follows: Cape Enrange Light. by compass, S. $61 \frac{1}{2}$ W., $101-7$ miles.
Highest Point of St. Mary's Ledge, by compass, N. 40 W., 6-10 mile.
The point of low water off the Light House, by compass, $5.78 \mathrm{~W}, 2-10$ mile.
Jones' Ledge, N. 10 W., $3-10$ mile, it dries at low springs and has about 2 1-2 fathoms on it at half tide.
A Sand Bank, $\mathrm{S} .15 \mathrm{~W} ., \mathrm{C}-10$ mile, it has $1 \boldsymbol{z}$ fathoms on its shoalest part at lower water springs.
Grand Manan.-There is a Light Honse and Keeper's House being erected nt the "Swallow Tail" on the North Eastern part of the Island of Grand Manau, in the Bay of Fundy, which will be lighted next season The Light is 45 feet from Base to Deck ; the point on which it stands is 103 feet above high water, making 148 feet elevation. This is a conspicuous mark in the South Channel between Brier Islahd und Grand Manan. Both Houses are painted White.

## RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Established by a Lavo or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Saint John-passed 3d August, 1848.
Five Shillings per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the Wharves; and Five Shillings per foot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel ont of the Harbour.
In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, under and by Virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitied to demand and receive from Masters of such Vessels, the sum of T'en Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, at not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above meationed.
For renoving Vessels froin any mooring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to another Wharf, and seeing thein properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding One Hundred Tons, Seven Shillings and Sixpence; for Vessels over One Hundred and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, Ten Shillings; for Vessels over Two Hundred and not exceeding Three Hundred Tons, Fifteen Shillings; and for all Vessels over Thiree Hundred Tons, the suin of Twenty Shillings.
First Distance.-From Patridge island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing North West, Five Shillings por foot.
Second Distance.-From Musquash Hend to Point LePreaux, bearing North West, Six Shillings and Threepence per foot.

Third Distance.-From Point Lepreaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West-or North Channel, bearing Sonth East, Seven Shillings and Sixpence per foet.

## Fourth Distance.-From the North Head of Grand Manan-or

 North Channel as afuresaid---to Machins Seal Island,hearing Snuth, or Brier Island bearing South South East, Fight Shillings and Ninepence per fort.Fifth Distance....Any where outside the aforesaid distance, Ten Shillings per foot.

## AGIFIOUIMMURLAI.

Surzp Hubbandry.-The wool trade is getting to be one of the most valuable brauches of American industry, so much so that all information in respect to the mauagement of sheep, must be reekoned important by a large proportion of agricultural readers.

The following hints from my practice may be useful:
It has been distinctly shown by experiments, that sheep are exceedingly sensitive of any sudden change, either in food or temperature ; and that these circumstances, as well as any disturbance, are very disadvantageons to their feeding. If it is wished to secure the full benefits of their food, and the greatest profits of their keep, exposure to the sudden changes of the weather must be avoided. In the keeping of sheep, temperature is of much more importance than is generally imagined ; both with regard to quantity of food consumed, and the benefits derived from it. Any one can ascertain this fact by keeping one lot of sheep in a ware but well ventilated inclosure and allowing another lot to rest and feed in the open air, exposed to the weather. It will be found that those kept under cover will consume onequarter less food and still improve in flesh and growth of wools double to what those will let out of doors.

The practice universally prevails amongst farmers in this region, of feeding their sheep on the snow, ice, or bare ground, as the weather may be. There is a great loss experienced in this way, as an ordinary flock will waste enough by trampling under foot and otherwise, to more than pay the expenses of putting up racks and cribs for them under sheds or in a part of the barn. The greatest loss of out-door feeding is in rainy or thawy weather, which occasionally happens in winter, and the most of the two last months before going to pasture. Sheep will not touch hay that has become wet. At this last season of feeding, flocks will tread under foot and waste as much hay as would, if fed, keep them in good condition. It is not a good practice to give sheep hemlock boughs to cat at this season of the year, as owing to their astringent qualities, when eaten liberally of by ewes with lamb, their effects would be injurious rather than otherwise. Better feed roots of some kind three times a week with a handful of beaus or oats daily. The roots will prevent a too costive habit, while both will serve to promote a flow of milk.

Before turning out your sheep in the spring, every one should be "tagged" Any one who has not practiced it will find it a great improvement, as at shearing time they will find that the most vexatious part is done; besides a saving is effected of no small importance in both time and wool, especially where large flocks are kept. In this way the wool is saved which is frequently shed, or becomes so coated with monure that it is worthless, except for the manure heap, and the sheep are kept clean, affording a good clean fleece to sell the manufacturer.

Buaxing Bees.-After having a trial of burying bees together with other methods, I think it is a superior method for small families. If they are buried as they should be, in a dry place, the
combs will not mould, and the quantity of honey taken to supply their wants will be exceedingly small, while scarcely any bees are lost. The way 1 buried mine, was to dig a hole in the ground the depth of which was equal to the height of the hive, and place two sticks in the bottom: I then inverted the hive on these, with the holes open in the top, and put a few sticks over it, covering it six or eight inches with straw ; the object of covering it with straw, was to absorb the moisture, that would otherwise accumulate in the hive and cause the combs to mould; upon the straw were put a few old boards, and the same quantity of earth thrown on that was taken out of the hole. Any one keeping a few bees, will find that it is a good plan to bury the weak stocks, although it is some trouble, yet it is better than to lose them, and one extensively engaged in the business will find it advantageous to construct a house especially for wintering.

Propit of Manuring. - In one of the hilly towns in NewHampshire, a man purchased a farm of about $\bar{j} 0$ acres, which was pretty well worn out, but naturaliy productive land, paying but a small portion of the cost down, as he had but a few hundred dollars to begin life with. One of the first things he did was to draw manure from the village, full two miles up hill; at which the neighbors predicted his speedy tankruptcy. But such was not the result; on the other hand, he still continued to buy manure, and in consequence got the best crops of any man in town, and to-day he has the richest and most productive farm in that vicinity, all paid for, and his neighbors say it is worth at least ten thousand dollars.

Food and Trratmbat of Hine-Linseed meal Ihave found to be a great promoter of egg-laying. Mixed with scalded meal or shorts, or with sour milk, it is readily eaten, and is a good substitute for animal food and insects. Henslike Indian corn better than any other grain, and it is their cheapest food. For confiniug hens, a covered room with a dry earth floor, is much better than an open yard, which the rains keep in a filthy state much of the time. With sand to roll in, hens may be confined under covcr the whole season. Half an hour before sunset they should be let out to range over the yard and garden. They will then be too busy picking grass, gravel, \&c., to scratch and do miscinief, heing always in a hurry to return to the ronst before twilight. Hens thuskept will more thon twice pay for their kecping, if not too old to lay well. Two or three days imprisoument in a coop will break up Black Spaaish heus from sitting, and they soon commence laying again if properly fed. It is only profitable for a villager to raise a few early chickens to renew his laying stock, as chickens are great and increasing feeders, eating when half grown, much more than old fat heng.

Tas Cont of Nbaligence.-It is a notorious fact that there are more losses from negligence of acknowledged duties, among all classes, than from almost any other cause. Of farmers is this most astoundingly true.
"I am fully persuaded that farmers lose more annually by neg. ligence or procrastination than would pay the entire taxes of the

How many farmers neglect to keep their furms clear of burrs, or turn their sheep in ${ }^{\text {i }}$ a stock-field or to the woods, and let them become covered with burrs, and sell the wool from tive to ten cents per pound less on that account. As a wool-buyer, I know the number to be quite large. Again, by neglecting to separate their sheep, thousands of lambs die annually by coming in mid-winter, yet by very little attention this all could be remedied."
"Another fault is by ueglecting to trim their stock; by noglecting to alter a calf till it is two or three months old the lcss is about three dollars per head. I know, as a stock-dealer, that thousands of dollars are lost annually by such negligence. They also lose by not trimming their hogs and sheep in due time. I go to $A$, and his two-year old steers are worth but ten or twelve dollars, while the same year his neighbor B's are worth from twenty to twenty-five dollars. Why is it $i$ a keeps common stock, he takes no care of it ; in winter he piles up straw out of doors, aud lets the cattle run to it. In the summer, perhaps he salts them once a month, if at all, while B keeps improved stock; if not he pays his neighbor C fifty cents or one dollar for each calf, trims them in time, they have nice horns, then he saves hay, fodder, etc., to feed them in winter, or feeds the straw if scarce of feed, as he should do by hauling it out to them fresh every day, then gives a little corn, hay, or meal, in the spring when the grass first comes, and his cattle get a good start, and he is careful to see that they have salt two or thres times each week, and all the water they need. I can tell cattle that are salted, by looking at them, from those that are not."
Let teachers and parents weigh well the signilicance of the following extract:-"A gentleman in Englend was walking over his farm with a friend, exhibiting his crops, herds of cattle, and flocks of sheep, with all of which his friend was highly pleased, but with nothing so much as his splendid sheep. He had seeu the same breed frequantly before, but had never scen such noble specimens, and with great earnestness he asked to know how he had succeeded in producing such Hocks. His simple anewer was, - I take care of my lambs, sir.' Here was all the secret of his large, heavy-flecced, fat sineep-he took care of them when they were lambe."

Central Heat of thr Earth. - The rate of merease of heat is equal to one degree of Fahrenheit for cvery forty-five feet of descent. Looking to the result of such a rate of increase. it is easy to see that at seven thousand two hundred and ninety feet from the surface the heat will reach two hundred and twelve degrees, the boiling point of water. At twenty-five thousand five hundred feet it will melt lead; at seven miles it will maintain a glowing red heat; at twenty-one miles melt gold; at seventyfour miles cast iron; at ninety seven miles soften iron; and at one hundred miles from the surface all will be fluid as water-a mass of seething and boiling rock in a perpetually molten state, doomed possibly never to be cooled or crystallized. The heat here will exceed any with which man is acquainted; it will exceed the heat of the electric spark, or the effect of a continued voltaic current. The heat which melts platina as if it were wax is as ice to it. Could we visually observe its effects, our intellect would afford no means of measuring its intensity. Here is the region of perpetual fire, the source of earthquake and voleanic power.-Recreative Science.

An Aars Maue.-The Arab mare cost me nine hundred and fifteen company's rupees, that is about ninety-two pounds in English money. She was the most expensive horse I ever hunted, and was not purchased for that purapit. She was the most beautiful mare I have ever seen, of the pure nejid blood, gray, with flea-bitten spots, eyes too large for her head, nostril thin and expanded, throat of a game-cock, the hair of her mane and tail so fine and soft, that the most beautiful woran might have been proud of such a texture, and her skin so thin and soft, that the thorn bushes through which I rode her used to tear it; and after many of my runs through jungle, I have had her, bleeding from the thoms, looking as if she had been practiced upon with a light sabre. She was what you would consider in England a pony, fourteen hands one and a half inches high; but she was as broad almost as a dray horse, and her tail was set up so high that, as she moved about her lonse boz, you could, stooping. walk between it and the ground. Her feet were black and hard, and the tendais below her hocks and linees were like herp strings. Add to this, that her head was so lean that you might have boiled it without obtaining any flesh from it, and you have a picture of what this desert-born mare was.

The Prince of Walrs-Origin of the Titly-The Motyo "Ich Drbn."-Bdward, the first Prince of Wales, was born at Cærnarvon Castle, in Wales, on the 25th of April, 1223 ; he was created Prince of Wales when he was but a few days old; ever since that period the eldest sons of the Kings of England have borne that title.
His father had conquered the Welsh, but they refused to own him as their monarch, alleging that the King was unacquainted with their language, manners, and customs; whereupon the King having assembled the Welsh Chieftains, asked them if they would receive a Prince born in Wales, who had never been in Bnglend, and no desire to change their laws or cuntoms; they cousented; the King then called upon them to do homage to his con, born a few days previous, at Cærnarvon Castle.
Edward, Prince of Wales, (surnamed, the Black Prince,) at the battle of Cressy, fought August 26th, 1346, adopted the motto eomprising the German words, "Ich Dien." "I serve," which motto was found under the Three Ostrich Feathers, which the King of Bohemia (slain in the battle) wore on his helmet, and which Enwaud at the time adopted, and it has ever since continued to be the mutto of the Prine of Wales.

Codrt Liph Undbr tas Eiohte Hbnry.-A very curious manuscript was presented to the Antiquarian Society of Yorkshire in 1818. It contains sundry rules to be observed by the household of Fenry VIII, and enjoins the following singular particulars: None of his Highness's attendants to steal any locks or keys, tables, forms, cupboard or other furniture, out of noblemen's or gentiemen's houses where he goes to visit. No herald, minstrel, falconer, or other, to bring to the court any boy or rascal, nor to keep lads or rascals in court, to do their business for them. Master cooks not to supply such scullions as go about naked, nor lie all night on the ground hefore the kitchen fire. Dinner to be at ten, and supper at four. The Knight Marshal to take care that all such unthrifty and common women as followed the court be banished. The proper officers are between six and seven o'clock every morning to make the fire in, and straw his Highness's privy chamber. Officers of his Highness's privy chamber to keep secret everything said or done, leaving hearkening and inquiring where the King is, or goes, be it early or late, without grudging, mumbling, or talking of the King's past-time, late or carly going to bed, or any other matter. Coal only allowed to the King's, Queen's, and Lady Mary's chambers. The Queen's maids of honor to have a chet loaf, a manchet, a gallon of ale, and a chine of beef for their breakfasts. Among the fishes for the table is a porpoise, and it it is too big for a horse loud, a further allowance is made to the purveyor. The manuscript ends with several proclamations. One is to take up and punish strong and mighty beggars, rascals, and ragabonds who hang about the court.

Genifa and Labor.-Alexander Hamilton once said to an intimate friend: "Men give me some credit for genius. Johnay Cakr.-A recipe for those who, like ourselves, prefer Johnny-cake without the addition of eggs and flour. We make our pumpkin pies without those condiments, substituting a cup or two of cream. If cups sweat cream ; 5 cups buttermilk; 1 small tablespoonful granulated or other good sugar ; 2 small teaspoonfulls saleratus and a little salt. Add corn-meal to make a batter as stiff as can be conveniently stirred with a spoon. It should be briskly stirred, turned into a well buttered dripping. pan, and baked in a quick but not too hot oven.

Remedy for Bed Boas.-Take a cup one-third full of tarput in candlewick, (say about four feet in length to each bed,)-when properly saturated, wind two or three times around each foot of the bedstead in the smallest part, or on the castor just above the roller ; tic loosely, so that it will retain the tar. Cleanse the bed thoroughly several times during the first week. Apply the tar as uften as necessary to keep the wick properly saturated, with a brush or feather, and the bugs will soon disappear.

Sorb Throat.-I have been subject to sore throat, and have invariably found the following preparation (simple and cheap) highly efficacious when used in the early stage: Pour a pint of boiling water upon twenty-five or thirty leaves of common sage; let the infusion stand for half an hour. And vinegar sufficient to make it moderately acid, and honey according to the taste. This combination of the astringent and the emolient principle seldom fails to produce the desired effect. The infusion must be used as a gargle several times a-day. It has this advantage over many gargles-it is pleasant to the taste, and nasy be swallowed occasionally, not only without danger, but with advantage.

Domestic Yaast.-LLadiea who are in the habit (and a most laudable and comfortable habit it is) of making domestic bread, cake, 8 cc ., are informed that they can easily manufacture their own yeast by attending to the following directions:--Boil one pound of good flour, a quarter of a pound of brown sugar, and a little salt, in two gallons of water, tor one hour. When milk warm, bottle it, and cork it close. It will be fit for use in twentyfour hours. One pint of this yeast will make 181bs. of bread.

Ink-Spors may be taken out of mahogany by applying spirits of salt.
Sinc Aptiolss should not be kept folded in white papers, as the chloride of lime used in bleaching the paper will impair the oolor of the silk.

7. To prognosticate correctly, eopecially in those eanes where the wind is concerned, the observer showld be in sight of a good seme, where the foar cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.
