

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
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THINGS WORTH SEEING

THEATRES, PARKS AND TROLLEY TRIPS

One of the most important events in Miss Hunt's stock season at the Majestic is this week's production for the first time on any stage of a play by G. Humbert Westley, entitled "The Man's Game." The

play deals with the subject of woman's suffrage. "Bingville Bugle," by Newton Newkirk, comic writer on one of the local papers, is presented for the first time on any stage this week at the American Music Hall by the Lindsay Morison Stock Company. Because of its excellent location for summer amusement, Paragon

Park at Nantasket is known as "The City of Festivity by the Sea. Wonderland at Revere Beach is entertaining great crowds of visitors with many startling features from 1 to 11 P. M. daily.

Norumbega and Lexington Parks are reached by long cool electric

rides through the country and there is entertainment provided for all. One of the most delightful of the many trolley trips which one can take is along the Atlantic coast where the landscape and shore views are unequalled. From Boston to Lynn, Salem, Gloucester and around Cape Ann, through the witch country and attractive resorts of the shore, the colonial and provincial history of the shore towns seen on this trip is well preserved. POINTS OF INTEREST

Old North Church.-More properly Christ Church. Salem Street, foot of Hull Street. Dedicated 1723. From its steeple were displayed Paul Revere's signal lanterns, April 18, 1775. Opened by sexton on application. Fee, 25 cents.

The New Court House, a massive granite structure completed in 1893, at a cost of \$1,000,000, stands at the head of Pemberton Square, two blocks from the State House.

The collections of the Museum of Fine Arts are among the first in the world, and illustrate the art of Egypt, Greece, Rome, the Orient, and modern Europe and America. The galleries contain paintings, sculpture, textiles, ceramics, iron and wood work, prints, together with

examples of precious objects. There are also numerous reproductions and an art library.

The Boston Public Library in Copley Square is one of the foremost architectural monuments of America, costing \$2,500,000. The architects were McKim, Mead & White; the sculptures by Augustus St. Gaudens and D. C. French. The mural paintings by Puvis de Chavannes, Edwin A. Abbey and John S. Sargent attract thousands of visitors to this beautiful structure, which contains 900,000 volumes and many rare works of art, statues of bronze and marble, oil paintings, marble busts and many valuable historic relics of the city.

State Street previous to the revolution was King Street. In 1702 was proclaimed, in this street, the accession of Anne to be Queen of England. Opposite 28 State Street is the spot, marked by a circle in the pavement, where the citizens were killed and wounded by Captain Preston's soldiers, March 5, 1770. Down this street to the wharf, escorted by the U. S. Marshal and his thousand deputies, U. S. marines, regulars, and the entire state militia, one black man, in chains, was sent back to slavery. But in 1861-65 the Massachusetts Volunteers marched up State Street on the way to the South, to help free the black man.

28 State Street is the site of the Provincial Custom House, Royal Exchange Tavern and U. S. Bank. 27 State Street is the site of the first church in Boston, built in

1632 of logs, with thatched roof.

At the Southeast Corner of State and Washington Streets, Henry Knox, afterwards General and Secretary of War, was a bookseller's apprentice.

The Town Pump stood at the northeast corner of Washington and State Streets. On the northwest corner was the first store for the sale of merchandise in Boston, kept by John Coggan.

Craigie House—105 Brattle Street, Cambridge. Built about 1759, Washington's headquarters 1775-1776. Occupied by Jared Sparks, Ed-ward Everett, Joseph E. Worcester, of dictionary fame, and Henry Wadsworth Longfellow. Often called Longfellow house.

King's Chapel, corner of School and Tremont Streets, built of wood in 1688, rebuilt of stone in 1749-54, is a massive building, the walls constructed of Quincy granite. The portico was built in 1789 from funds partly raised by an oratorio in the chapel, at which General Washington attended "attired in a black velvet suit, and gave five guineas." The organ was purchased in England in 1756. The chapel has marble busts of its former pastors, Freeman, Greenwood, Peabody and Foote, and mural monuments of Apthorp, Appleton, Lowell, Oliver Wendell Holmes and Joseph May; a marble tablet in memory of General Stevenson, Col. Revere and twelve other members of the parish, who died in the army in 1861-65. The chevalier dc Saint Sauveur remains placed in a tomb September, 1778. Became first Unitarian Church in Boston, 1785. Open at services and other times to visitors.

Old South Meeting House-Washington and Milk Streets. Built 1729 to replace wooden church which had stood on this site. Gov. John Winthrop's home, since 1669. Here many town meetings were held in massacre and tea tax times. Used by British as a riding school, 1775. Use as church abandoned 1872. Revolutionary relies. 9 to 6. Fee 25 cents.

Japanese court, is of especial interest. Many acquisitions are shown for the first time, among them a Greek "throne" of the 5th century, a Greek head of the 4th century, an alabaster statue and alabaster portrait head of Mycerinus, a Persian lustre bowl of the 13th century, portrait group by I an Dyck-"King Charles I and his family." Pictures by Bellini, Miercvelt, Rubens, Soluria, and others have been lent for the opening exhibition.

POINTS OF INTEREST

Old North Church .-- More properly Christ Church. Salem Street, foot of Hull Street. Dedicated 1723. From its steeple were displayed Paul Revere's signal lanterns, April 18, 1775. Opened by sexton on application. Fee, 25 cents.

The New Court House, a massive granite structure completed in 1893, at a cost of \$4,000,000, stands at the head of Pemberton Square, two blocks from the State House.

The collections of the Museum of Fine Arts are among the first in the world, and illustrate the art of Egypt, Greece, Rome, the Orient, and modern Europe and America. The galleries contain paintings, sculpture, textiles, ceramics, iron and wood work, prints, together with

examples of precious objects. There are also numerous reproductions and an art library.

The Boston Public Library in Copley Square is one of the foremost architectural monuments of America, costing \$2,500,000. The architects were McKim, Mead & White; the sculptures by Augustus St. Gaudens and D. C. French. The mural paintings by Puvis de Chavannes, Edwin A. Abbey and John S. Sargent attract thousands of visitors to this beautiful structure, which contains 900,000 volumes and many rare works of art, statues of bronze and marble, oil paintings, marble busts and many valuable historic relics of the city.

State Street previous to the revolution was King Street. In 1702 was proclaimed, in this street, the accession of Anne to be Queen of England. Opposite 28 State Street is the spot, marked by a circle in the payement, where the citizens were killed and wounded by Captain Preston's soldiers, March 5, 1770. Down this street to the wharf, escorted by the U. S. Marshal and his thousand deputies, U. S. marines, regulars, and the entire state militia, one black man, in chains, was sent back to slavery. But in 1861-65 the Massachusetts Volunteers marched up State Street on the way to the South, to help free the black man.

28 State Street is the site of the Provincial Custom House, Royal Exchange Tavern and U. S. Bank.

27 State Street is the site of the first church in Boston, built in 1632 of legs, with thatched roof.

At the Southeast Corner of State and Washington Streets, Henry Knox, afterwards General and Secretary of War, was a bookseller's apprentice.

The Town Pump stood at the northeast corner of Washington and State Streets. On the northwest corner was the first store for the sale of merchandise in Boston, kept by John Coggan.

sale of merchandise in Boston, kept by John Coggan. Craigie House—105 Brattle Street, Cambridge. Built about 1759, Washington's headquarters 1775-1776. Occupied by Jared Sparks, Edward Everett, Joseph E. Worcester, of dictionary fame, and Henry Wadsworth Longfellow. Often called Longfellow house.

King's Chapel, corner of School and Tremont Streets, built of wood in 1688, rebuilt of stone in 1749-54, is a massive building, the walls constructed of Quincy granite. The portico was built in 1789 from funds partly raised by an oratorio in the chapel, at which General Washington attended "attired in a black velvet suit, and gave the guineas." The organ was purchased in England in 1756. The chapel has marble busts of its former pastors, Freeman, Greenwood, Peabody and Foote, and mural monuments of Apthorp, Appleton, Lowell, Oliver Wendell Holmes and Joseph May; a marble tablet in memory of General Stevenson, Col. Revere and twelve other members of the parish, who died in the army in 1861-65. The chevalier de Saint Sauveur remains placed in a tomb September, 1778. Became tirst Unitarian Church in Boston, 1785. Open at services and other times to visitors.

Old South Meeting House—Washington and Milk Streets. Built 1729 to replace wooden church which had stood on this site. Gov. John Winthrop's home, since 1669. Here many town meetings were held in massacre and tea tax times. Used by British as a riding school, 1775. Use as church abandoned 1872. Revolutionary relics. 9 to 6. Fee 25 cents.

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THINGS WORTH SEEING

THEATRES, PARKS AND TROLLEY TRIPS

Henry W. Savage begins a summer season at the Majestic this week with the world-famous operetta, "The Merry Widow."

The Lindsay Morison All Star Stock Co. offers Clyde Fitch's e medy, "Girls," at the American Music Hall. The offerings at Keith's are excellent.

Continuances are, "Three Million Dollars," at the Colonial.

Although the season is well advanced for out-of d or amusements, Paragon Park, Wonderland, Lexington Park and Norumbega Park present many of the best features yet offered.

Because of its excellent location for summer amusement, Paragon Park at Nantasket is known as "The City of Festivity by the Sea.

Wonderland at Revere Beach is entertaining great crowds of visitors with many startling features from 1 to 11 P. M. daily.

Norumbega and Lexington Parks are reached by long cool electric rides through the country and there is entertainment provided for all.

One of the most delightful of the many trolley trips which one can take is along the Atlantic coast where the landscape and shore views are unequalled. From Boston to Lynn, Salem, Gloucester and around Cape Ann, through the witch country and attractive resorts of the shore, the colonial and provincial history of the shore towns seen on this trip is well preserved. POINTS OF INTEREST

Old North Church.-More properly Christ Church. Salem Street, foot of Hull Street. Dedicated 1723. From its steeple were displayed Paul Revere's signal lanterns, April 18, 1775. Opened by sexton on application. Fee, 25 cents.

The New Court House, a massive granite structure completed in 1893, at a cost of \$4,000,000, stands at the head of Pemberton Square, two blocks from the State House.

The collections of the Museum of Fine Arts are among the first in the world, and illustrate the art of Egypt, Greece, Rome, the Orient, and modern Europe and America. The galleries contain paintings, sculpture, textiles, ceramics, iron and wood work, prints, together with

examples of precious objects. There are also numerous reproductions and an art library.

The Boston Public Library in Copley Square is one of the foremost architectural monuments of America, costing \$2,500,000. The architects were McKim, Mead & White; the sculptures by Augustus St. Gaudens and D. C. French. The mural paintings by Puvis de Chavannes, Edwin A. Abbey and John S. Sargent attract thousands of visitors to this beautiful structure, which contains 900,000 volumes and many rare works of art, statues of bronze and marble, oil paintings, marble busts and many valuable historic relics of the city.

State Street previous to the revolution was King Street. In 1702 was proclaimed, in this street, the accession of Anne to be Queen of England. Opposite 28 State Street is the spot, marked by a circle in the pavement, where the citizens were killed and wounded by Captain Preston's soldiers, March 5, 1770. Down this street to the wharf, escorted by the U.S. Marshal and his thousand deputies, U.S. marines, regulars, and the entire state militia, one black man, in chains, was sent back to slavery. But in 1861-65 the Massachusetts Volunteers marched up State Street on the way to the South, to help free the black man.

28 State Street is the site of the Provincial Custom House, Royal Exchange Tayern and U. S. Bank.

27 State Street is the site of the first church in Boston, built in

1632 of legs, with thatched roof. At the Southeast C rner of State and Washington Streets, Henry Knox, afterwards General and "ecretary of War, was a bookseller's apprentice.

The Town Pump stood at the northeast corner of Washington and State Streets. On the northwest corner was the first store for the

sale of merchandise in Boston, kept by John Coggan. Craigie House-105 Brattle Street, Cambridge. Built about 1759, Washington's headquarters 1775-1776. Occupied by Jared Sparks, Ed-ward Everett, Joseph E. Worcester, of dictionary fame, and Henry Wadsworth Longfellow. Often called Longfellow house.

King's Chapel, corner of School and Tremont Streets, built of wood in 1688, rebuilt of stone in 1749-54, is a massive building, the walls constructed of Quincy granite. The portico was built in 1789 from funds partly raised by an oratorio in the chapel, at which General Washington attended "attired in a black velvet suit, and gave five guineas." The organ was purchased in England in 1756. The chapel has marble busts of its former pastors, Freeman, Greenwood. Peabody and Foote, and mural monuments of Apthorp, Appleton, Lowell, Oliver Wendell Holmes and Joseph May; a marble tablet in memory of General Stevenson, Col. Revere and twelve other members of the parish, who died in the army in 1861-65. The chevalier de Saint Sauveur remains placed in a tomb September, 1778. Became first Unitarian Church in Boston, 1785. Open at services and other times to visitors.

Old South Meeting House-Washington and Milk Streets. Built 1729 to replace wooden church which had stood on this site. Gov. John Winthrop's home, since 1669. Here many town meetings were held in massacre and tea tax times. Used by British as a riding school, 1775. Use as church abandoned 1872. Revolutionary relics. 9 to 6. Fee 25 cents.





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

plication. Fee, 25 cents. The New Court House, a massive granite structure completed in 1893, at a cost of \$4,000,000, stands at the head of Pemberton Square, two 110cks from the State House.

The collections of the Museum of Fine Arts are among the first in the world, and illustrate the art of Egypt, Greece, Rome, the Orient, and modern Europe and America. The galleries contain paintings, sculpture, textiles, ceramics, iron and wood work, prints, together with

examples of precious objects. There are also numerous reproductions and an art library.

The Boston Public Library in Copley Square is one of the foremost architectural monuments of America, costing \$2,500,000. The architects were McKim, Mead & White; the sculptures by Augustus St. Gaudens and D. C. French. The mural paintings by Puvis de Chavannes, Edwin A. Abbey and John S. Sargent attract thousands of visitors to this beautiful structure, which contains 900,000 volumes and many rare works of art, statues of bronze and marble, oil paintings, marble busts and many valuable historic relics of the city.

State Street previous to the revolution was King Street. In 1702 was proclaimed, in this street, the accession of Anne to be Queen of England. Opposite 28 State Street is the spot, marked by a circle in the pavement, where the citizens were killed and wounded by Captain Preston's soldiers, March 5, 1770. Down this street to the wharf, escorted by the U. S. Marshal and his thousand deputies, U. S. marines, regulars, and the entire state militia, one black man, in chains, was sent back to slavery. But in 1861-65 the Massachusetts Volunteers marched up State Street on the way to the South, to help free the black man.

28 State Street is the site of the Provincial Custom House, Royal Exchange Tavern and U. S. Bank.

27 State Street is the site of the first church in Boston, built in 1632 of logs, with thatched roof.

At the Southeast C rner of State and Washington Streets, Henry Knox, afterwards General and "ecretary of War, was a bookseller's apprentice.

The Town Pump stood at the northeast corner of Washington and State Streets. On the northwest corner was the first store for the sale of merchandise in Boston, kept by John Coggan.

sale of merchandise in Boston, kept by John Coggan. Craigie House—105 Brattle Street, Cambridge. Built about 1759, Washington's headquarters 1775-1776. Occupied by Jared Sparks, Edward Everett, Joseph E. Worcester, of dictionary fame, and Henry Wadsworth Longfellow. Often called Longfellow house.

King's Chapel, corner of School and Tremont Streets, built of wood in 1688, rebuilt of stone in 1749-54, is a massive building, the walls constructed of Quincy granite. The portico was built in 1789 from funds partly raised by an oratorio in the chapel, at which General Washington attended "attired in a black velvet suit, and gave five guincas." The organ was purchased in England in 1756. The chapel has marble busts of its former pastors, Freeman, Greenwood. Peabody and Foote, and mural monuments of Apthorp. Appleton, Lowell, Oliver Wendell Holmes and Joseph May; a marble tablet in memory of General Stevenson, Col. Revere and twelve other members of the parish, who died in the army in 1861-65. The chevalier de Saint Sauveur remains placed in a tomb September, 1778. Became first Unitarian Church in Boston, 1785. Open at services and other times to visitors.

Old South Meeting House—Washington and Milk Streets. Built 1729 to replace wooden church which had stood on this site. Gov. John Winthrop's home, since 1669. Here many town meetings were held in massacre and tea tax times. Used by British as a riding school, 1775. Use as church abandoned 1872. Revolutionary relics. 9 to 6. Fee 25 cents.

POINTS OF INTEREST

Old North Church.—More properly Christ Church. Salem Street, oot of Hull Street. Dedicated 1723. From its steeple were displayed aul Revere's signal lanterns, April 18, 1775. Opened by sexton on ap-

lication. Fee, 25 cents. The New Court House, a massive granite structure completed in \$93, at a cost of \$4,000,000, stands at the head of Pemberton Square, wo blocks from the State House.

The collections of the Museum of Fine Arts are among the first in he world, and illustrate the art of Egypt, Greece, Rome, the Orient, and modern Europe and America. The galleries contain paintings, culpture, textiles, ceramics, iron and wood work, prints, together with

examples of precious objects. There are also numerous reproductions and an art library.

The Boston Public Library in Copley Square is one of the foremost architectural monuments of America, costing \$2,500,000. The architects were McKim, Mead & White; the sculptures by Augustus St. Gaudens and D. C. French. The mural paintings by Puvis de Chavannes, Edwin A. Abbey and John S. Sargent attract thousands of visitors to this beautiful structure, which contains 900,000 volumes and many rare works of art, statues of bronze and marble, oil paintings, marble busts and many valuable historic relies of the city.

State Street previous to the revolution was King Street. In 1702 was proclaimed, in this street, the accession of Anne to be Queen of England. Opposite 28 State Street is the spot, marked by a circle in the pavement, where the citizens were killed and wounded by Captain Preston's soldiers, March 5, 1770. Down this street to the wharf, escorted by the U. S. Marshal and his thousand deputies, U. S. marines, regulars, and the entire state militia, one black man, in chains, was sent back to slavery. But in 1861-65 the Massachusetts Volunteers marched up State Street on the way to the South, to help free the black man.

28 State Street is the site of the Provincial Custom House, Royal Exchange Tavern and U. S. Bank.

27 State Street is the site of the first church in Boston, built in 1632 of logs, with thatched roof.

At the Southeast C rner of State and Washington Streets, Henry Knox, afterwards General and "ecretary of War, was a bookseller's apprentice.

The Town Pump stood at the northeast corner of Washington and State Streets. On the northwest corner was the first store for the sale of merchandise in Boston, kept by John Coggan.

Craigie House—105 Brattle Street, Cambridge. Built about 1759, Washington's headquarters 1775-1776. Occupied by Jared Sparks, Edward Everett, Joseph E. Worcester, of dictionary fame, and Henry Wadsworth Longfellow. Often called Longfellow house.

King's Chapel, corner of School and Tremont Streets, built of wood in 1688, rebuilt of stone in 1749-54, is a massive building, the walls constructed of Quincy granite. The portico was built in 1789 from funds partly raised by an oratorio in the chapel, at which General Washington attended "attired in a black velvet suit, and gave five guineas." The organ was purchased in England in 1756. The chapel has marble busts of its former pastors, Freeman, Greenwood, Peabody and Foote, and mural monuments of Apthorp, Appleton, Lowell, Oliver Wendell Holmes and Joseph May; a marble tablet in memory of General Stevenson, Col. Revere and twelve other members of the parish, who died in the army in 1861-65. The chevalier de Saint Sauveur remains placed in a tomb September, 1778. Became first Unitarian Church in Boston, 1785. Open at services and other times to visitors.

Old South Meeting House—Washington and Milk Streets. Built 1729 to replace wooden church which had stood on this site. Gov. John Winthrop's home, since 1669. Here many town meetings were held in massacre and tea tax times. Used by British as a riding school, 1775. Use as church abandoned 1872. Revolutionary relics. 9 to 6. Fee 25 cents.

At the Shubert "The Belle of Brittany," is the offering. Frank Daniels makes this musical show entertaining to his audiences.



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
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THINGS WORTH SEEING


At the Castle Square is a presentation of "The Talk of New York," a play, interspersed with music, and both by George Cohan.

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THINGS WORTH SEEING


