

Selectmen's Report.

SCHOOLS AND SCHOOL-HOUSES.

The School Committee would recommend the following amounts for the ensuing year: Schools, \$10,000; Schoolhouses, \$500; Schoolhooks, \$500.

SERVICES OF TOWN OFFICERS.

We would recommend the usual appropriation of \$2500 for the present year.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The Engineers have made the following estimate for the ensuing year: \$2500 for running expenses.

STREET LAMPS.

The Lamp Committee ask for \$1000 for the expenses of that department the year ensuing.

HIGHWAYS AND BRIDGES.

The Selectmen would ask that the appropriation for Roads and Bridges be \$8000; Sidewalks, \$1000; Removing Snow, \$1000.

We recommend the amount of \$6000 for State Tax; also \$6000 for County Tax.

INTEREST ON NOTES.

\$2000 will answer for this purpose.

SPRING GROVE OEMETERY.

The Committee ask for the usual appropriation of \$300 and avails of sales of Lots, grass, etc.

PRINTING AND STATIONERY.

\$500 is recommended.

LIABILITIES AND ASSETS.

The Treasurer's Report will show all of interest in t department.

SHADE TREES.

\$100 is asked for this purpose.

MISCELLANEOUS.

If the Chief of Police is paid from this appropriation, \$1500 will be required.

Overseer's Report.

According to custom we herewith submit the Annual Report of the Pauper Department. There is little change to note at the Almshouse. It is now, as for years past, under the charge of Superintendent Allen and his assistants; and we will only say that, as far as this establishment is concerned, it is one with which the citizens of Andover may well be pleased.

The steam and water works give perfect satisfaction, and are of great value to the house. There has been very little sickness there the present year; and only three deaths, and all of those of persons over eighty years of age.

The outside relief has been very much more than we anticipated or asked for at the beginning of the year; the insane asylum bills alone being over \$1700. Therefore we have been obliged to exceed our appropriation over \$900. About \$300 of this amount was for bills contracted in 1885, but not presented for payment in time to come into last year's account. All bills for the insane have been paid to January 1, 1887. Of the amount paid, \$500 will be reimbursed by other cities and towns.

An appropriation of \$3500 will be required for the ensuing year.

Report of the Chief Engineer

OF THE

Fire Department.

TO THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN:

Gentlemen, — In accordance with the Regulations of the Fire Department I submit the following Report.

The force of the Department consists of five Engineers, sixteen members of Andover Steamer No. 1, sixteen members of J. P. Bradlee Steamer No. 2, and ten members of B. F. Smith Hook and Ladder company.

The apparatus consists of one third-class steam fire-engine, one sixth-class steam fire-engine, one hand-engine, with hosecarriages for each; also a one horse hose-carriage. There is at each house a supply of hooks, ladders, ropes, etc. We have about four thousand and four hundred feet of hose.

There has been added to the Department the past year one sixth-class steam fire-engine.

There have been seven alarms of fire during the year, as follows:

Jan. 15, 1886. Alex. Lamont, house.

Jan. 17, 1886. Mrs. Jeremiah Goldsmith, house, shed, and barn. Insurance paid on same and contents, \$3550 00

Feb. 28, 1886. Christ Church. Insurance paid, 6000 00

April 10, 1886. Pemberton Mill, Lawrence; to which the men and steamer responded and rendered good service. April 26, 1886. Brush fire in west part of Town.

Sept. 28, 1886. Craighead and Kintz Manufacturing Co.

Oct. 7, 1885. J. P. Bradlee Mills. Insurance paid.

The supply of water has been materially increased the past year, and as far as it reaches gives ample supply, with a natural pressure of about twenty-eight pounds. But we hope the Town will see the necessity of extending the system this current year, in accordance with the recommendation of the Water Committee.

There has been some extra expense on Andover Engine, such as new pump, broken piston-rod, and new piping, which entailed an outlay of about three hundred dollars. Consequently there are some outstanding bills against the Fire Department.

I would recommend that \$2500 be appropriated for the running expenses of the Fire Department the ensuing year.

Fifteenth Annual Report

OF THE

Trustees of Memorial Hall.

SINCE our last report Mr. John Smith, the original projector and founder of Memorial Hall, has passed away from this world, full of years. This is not the place to speak at length of him whom all have delighted to honor. His benevolent thoughts and actions are too well known to need rehearsing. But it is the privilege of the Trustees to speak of the peculiar satisfaction with which they have received and hung in Memorial Hall a life-like portrait of its worthy benefactor. At a meeting of the Town, held May 3d, 1886, a communication from Mr. Joseph W. Smith made known the following item in the will of his father: "I give and bequeath my portrait, to be presented by my executors, framed, to the inhabitants of Andover, as a token of my abiding interest in the town of my adoption." After some remarks, expressing the Town's high appreciation both of the gift and the giver, from the Rev. Charles Smith and others, it was voted that the portrait be accepted and placed in the Memorial Hall, under the care of the Trustees of that building. The picture, which is a most excellent work, painted a few years ago by Mr. Edgar Parker of Boston, was hung by the Trustees in the upper hall, on May 19th, the ninetieth anniversary of Mr. Smith's birth-day.

Another most appropriate gift has been received since our last report from Mr. George W. W. Dove. It consists of forty framed sketches, giving the actualities of campaign life in the War of the Rebellion. They are by an artist who had a keen feeling for the real, if sometimes unromantic, side of that which he drew. They are already in the possession of the Trustees, and as soon as the standards necessary for their exhibition are finished, they will be placed in the upper hall. A more valuable and interesting contribution to the history of the great struggle which our hall commemorates could hardly have been made.

The annual examination of the building and library have shown both to be in good order. Insurance for the usual time has been renewed this year.

In accordance with the above Vote the same was placed in the Memorial Hall in presence of the Trustees, May 19th, that day being the ninetieth anniversary of his birthday.



ESSEX, SS. To either of the Constables of the Town of Andover. GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Andover, qualified to vote in town affairs, to meet and assemble at the Town House in said Andover, on Monday, the seventh day of March, 1887, at 12 o'clock, M., to act on the following Articles, namely:

Article 1st. — To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2d. — To choose Town Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, a Board of Health, One member of the School Committee for Three Years, One Trustee of Memorial Hall for Seven Years, Constables, Fence Viewers, Field Drivers, Surveyors of Lumber, One or more Highway Surveyors, or a Board of Three Road Commissioners, Pound Keeper, Street Lamp Committee, and one or more Auditors of Accounts.

Article 3d. — To see what action the Town will take on the following question: "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this Town?"

Article 4th. — To see what action the Town will take in regard to unexpended appropriations.

Article 5th. — To see what sums of money the Town will appropriate for the use of the several Departments the current year, namely: Schools, School-houses, School Books and Supplies, Highways and Bridges, Sidewalks, Removing Snow, Town Officers, Town House, Fire Department, Street Lamps, Printing and Stationery, Spring Grove Cemetery, Memorial Day, State Aid, Indigent Soldiers and Sailors' Aid, Almshouse Expenses, Relief out of Almshouse, Repairs on Almshouse, Hay Scales, State Tax, County Tax. Adjustment of Taxes, Discount on Taxes, Abatement of Taxes, Interest on Notes and Funds, Insurance, and Miscellaneous.

Article 6th. — To see if the Town will authorize the Town Treasurer to hire money for the use of the Town when necessary, upon the approval of the Selectmen.

Article 7th. — To determine the method of collecting the Taxes the current year.

Article 8th. — To fix the pay of the Firemen for the current year.

Article 9th. — To see if the Town will revise and accept the List of names for Jurors, as prepared and posted by the Selectmen.

Article 10th. — To determine the disposition of the Dog-License money received from the County Treasury.

Article 11th. — To hear and act on the Reports of the Selectmen and other Town Officers.

Article 12th. — To hear the Report and recommendations of the Committee on the Centre Primary School and Schoolhouse, the Phillips School, and the proposed new Grammar School Building, and see what action the Town will take thereon, and what sum of money shall be appropriated therefor. [The consideration of the foregoing Article was postponed, and referred to this Meeting from the Town Meeting of May 3d, 1886.]

Article 13th. — To see if the Town will accept the provisions of sections 74, 75, 76, and 77 of Chapter 27 of the Public Statutes, relating to Road Commissioners, and determine the compensation of such officers, if the Town shall choose them.

Article 14th. — To see if the Town will accept and allow a way laid out by the Selectmen, on petition of Moses Foster, Rev. M. J. Murphy, John L. Smith, and others, leading from School Street, westerly, near to and nearly parallel with the Boston and Maine Railroad, to a point on Central Street near the house of T. F. Pratt, and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

Article 15th. — To see if the Town will accept and allow a way laid out by the Selectmen, on petition of William S. Jenkins, Edward Taylor, M. C. Andrews, E. K. Jenkins, and others, extending from the easterly end of Pike Street to a point on Chestnut Street, as a continuation or extension of Pike Street to Chestnut Street, and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

Article 16th. — To see if the Town will accept and allow a way laid out by the Selectmen, on petition of F. G. Haynes, Joseph Shaw, B. F. Haynes, and others, leading from a point on the Wilmington Road near the house of Alfred H. Hill, to the house of Joel Craig, near the Lowell Junction on the Boston and Maine Railroad, and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

Article 17th. — To see if the Town will vote to finish the graveling and grading of Maple Avenue which was begun in

1884, and appropriate a sum of money therefor, on petition of James Grosvenor, James Middleton, George S. Cole, H. A. Bodwell, and others.

Article 18th. — To see if the Town will vote to grade and repair Walnut Avenue, otherwise known as "Carmel Lane," and appropriate a sum of money therefor, on petition of J. M. Bradley, Francis H. Johnson, Moses Foster, and others.

Article 19th. — To see if the Town will vote to build a sidewalk Foot-bridge on the west side of the Main Street Bridge over the Shawshin River, and appropriate two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) therefor, on petition of George W. W. Dove, Joseph W. Smith, George H. Torr, William C. Donald, William H. Jowett, Joseph W. Poor, and others.

Article 20th. — To hear the Report and recommendations of the Water Committee, and see what sum of money the Town will appropriate in pursuance thereof.

Article 21st. — To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to introduce a system of Fire Alarm, for the purpose of increasing the power and efficiency of the Fire Department, on petition of Leverett Bradley, Horace H. Tyer, George S. Cole, Felix G. Haynes, and others.

Article 22d. — To see if the Town will authorize the Engineers of the Fire Department to sell the old Hand Fire-Engine "Shawshin," on petition of said Engineers.

Article 23d. — To see if the Town will vote to purchase an Excavator Tank-Wagon, and Apparatus for sanitary purposes, and appropriate a sum of money therefor, on petition of John H. Sochrens, Moses Foster, J. Tyler Kimball, Joseph A. Smart, S. K. Johnson, F. H. Johnson, George L. Abbott, and others. Article 24th. — To see if the Town will grant and vote a sum of money to be expended in planting shade trees on the public squares and highways of the Town.

Article 25th. — To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise by taxation to defray the necessary expenses the current year.

Article 26th. — To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, at the time and place of meeting.
