## LANDSCAPE GARDENING.

This is a very important subject, and one that should not be neglected or overlooked, especially when building up a new place.

It means that, with a good plan, you can lay out your place to all the advantages it commands naturally, besides making and developing features where the location is disadvantageous. The roads and walks should be laid out, not only to be practical, but also to be in harmony with everything adjacent.

The proper location of trees and shrubs, and the selection of the best and most desirable kinds, are very important, for you are planting for the future, and as it takes years for a shrub or tree to grow, you should plant only such as would be desirable and valuable when grown up. The same applies to the location of vegetable, flower, fruit, rock or wild garden borders or flower beds.

The grouping or massing of either trees, shrubs, plants or bulbs, to produce certain effects at special seasons, either in foliage, flower or fruit, can only be successfully accomplished by having full knowledge of the habits and character of such plants.

Many unsightly corners and spaces could be not only hidden, but actually made beautiful. Thus, outside the general flower garden, barren rocks and stumps of trees can be covered with luxuriant growth.

Dry and sandy hills, where even grass refuses to grow, with proper selection can be made as beautiful as where the soil is rich, while marshes can be turned into handsome objects, and ponds covered with showy water plants. In one word, it is the knowledge of the habits of plants and their adaptability to certain locations that brings the desired success.

Locating and designing greenhouses, graperies, pits or frames on a place are also very important; so are the proper details in the construction of greenhouses, which are generally left to architects, who do not take into consideration the practical points of the greenhouse or conservatory.

Do not lay out your place without a landscape gardener any more than you would build a house without an architect; and you cannot do better than consult

## BRUSSELS SPROUTS.

CULTURE.-Sow in May and transplant in July, about twelve inches apart in the rows, which should be eighteen inches to two feet apart.


## CABBAGE.

CULTURE.-Soil for cabbage should be a heavy loam. On such soil, well manured, excellent crops are sure to be grown. Sow the seeds in hotbeds in February and

March, or it may be sown about the middle of September and wintered over in coldframes. Transplant in spring as soon as the ground can be worked, in rows about two feet apart, and eighteen inches apart in the row.

CULTURE.-Sow in early spring in rows, where they are to remain, and thin them out to twelve inches apart. When full size, tie plants with matting, and earth up like celery to blanch.

CULTURE.-This is the same as cabibage, except that extra manure and plenty of water will pay upon this.


## CELERY.

CULTURE.-Sow in open ground as soon as it is fit towork in April. In June and July plant in rows ten to twelve inches apart, and set six inches apart in the rows. About the middle of August we begin the "earthing up" necessary for blanching. After the soil has been drawn up against the plant, it is pressed around each plant by the hand firmly enough to keep the leaves in an upright position, using care to prevent the soil fromfalling into the heart of the plant.

## CELERIAC, OR TURNIP-ROOTED CELERY.

CULTURE.-Sow in April. Before planting out manure the ground well. Set the plants in shallw drills twelve inches apart, watering freely. As the growth advances, draw the earth to the plants, by which the knotty roots will be blanched and made tencier.

## CHERVIL.

CULTURE.-Sow at any time in the spring in shallow drills twelve inches apart. The seed of the Tuberous: Chervil should be sown in the latter part of August, and treated like the carrot.


## CHICORY.

CULTURE.-Sow in June. Transplant roots in autumn into sand in a celler. Cultivate as recommended for carrots.


## CORN-SALAD, OR FETTICUS.

CULTURE.-Sow in the latter part of August in drills a quarter of an inch deep and eight to ten inches apart. Protect from frost by a light covering of litter.


## CRESS, OR PEPPERGRASS.

CULTURE.-Sow early in spring, very thickly in shallow drills, and in short intervals for succession, as it soon runs to seed.


## WATER CRESS.

CULTURE.-Sow in any moist situation, but will do better if sown by the edge of a running brook. The cress will be fit for gathering the second year.


## CORN, SWEET OR SUGAR.

CULTURE.-Plant in hills three feet apart each way, or in drills about four feet apart, and plants thinned out to eight or ten inches apart. Sow in succession every two weeks from the beginning of May until the middle of July, and by properly selecting the varieties a continuous supply can be had until killed by the frost.

## CUCUMBER.

CULTURE.-Cucumbers succeed best in warm, sandy loam. They should not be planted in the open air until warm, settled weather; in the vicinity of New York, towards the end of May. Plant in hills about four feet apart each way. The hills should be previously prepared by mixing thoroughly with the soil in each a shovelful of well rotted manure. When all danger from insects is passed, thin out the plants, leaving four of the strongest.


## ENGLISH CUCUMBERS FOR FRAMES AND GREENHOUSE.

## MUSHROOM SPAWN.

CULTURE.-Mushrooms may be grown under benches of the greenhouses or in cellars-wherever the temperature of 50 degrees can be kept during winter. Gather enough fresh horse dung, free of straw or litter, to form the desired size of bed, spreading it in an airy shed to dry. Mix same in equal proportion of loam taken from an old pasture; turn every day to keep from heating. Make this into a bed eight to ten inches thick, and pound down with the back of a spade. Leave this to heat through for a few days, and as soon as the heat subsides to 85 degrees, make holes in the bed about a foot apart each way, into which put pieces of spawn two or three inches in diameter, and cover up with the compost. At the end of a week or ten days, the spawn will have thoroughly diffused itself through the bed. Spread a layer of fresh soil over the bed to the depth of about two inches, and then cover with three inches of hay or straw. Take great care, if the bed gets dry, to dampen with water about the temperature of 100 degrees.

The main hall of the Palace is a veritable bower of palms, ferns, and beautiful flowers. The most conspicuous object is the "George Washington Palm," said to have been at one time in the possession of the first President.

OPENING OF THE FLOWER SHOW.

## A Fine Display of Plants and Bloom at the Grand Central Palace.

The Flower Show opened yesterday at Grand Central Palace, and the interior of that building from floor to roof was bedecked with multicolored foliage. The main hall, filled with every variety of palm and fern, resembled an African jungle, while in the adjoining alcoves and under the galleries was nearly every kind of flower that the florist knows. At this season of the year the chrysanthemum naturally predominates, and many varieties of the flower are shown.

The most interesting single exhibit is a palm tree, not more than six feet high, which stands in the centre of the main hall, upon a pedestal, about which is wrapped an American flag. It is said that this specimen is more than 200 years old, and was at one time the property of George Washington, and later of Samuel J. Tilden. It is in fine condition for so venerable a plant, and looks as though it might be good for 200 years more.

## Orchids.

These are undoubtedly the coming flowers, and every greenhouse or conservatory should have at least a few of these floral gems. They are of easy culture, and will grow in any ordinary greenhouse or conservatory, together with other common plants, such as geraniums, fuchsias, etc. Most of the varieties can be grown in baskets or on blocks, and suspended from the roof, thus not utilizing any bench room. Orchids, when in bloom and kept in cool places, will last from four to ten weeks in perfection, so that any one having a small collection of orchids will have some plants in bloom all the year round. Amateurs intending starting to grow orchids should write for list of such varieties as are best suitable for beginners. The following are a few cultural points: Orchids require a season of growth and a season of rest, corresponding with the wet and dry seasons of their native country. When they are making new growths, they should receive a liberal supply of water until the maximum is reached, when the new bulb is nearly full size; then it should receive just enough water to keep the bulbs from shriveling; as soon as it shows the sign of bloom, water it again until it has done flowering.

The Cattleyas are among the most beautiful of the whole Orchid family.

## HARDY HERBACEOUS PLANTS.

These are the old-time favorites found in every oldfashioned garden-plants that have been neglected for a number of years, but which of late are receiving again the proper recognition due them on account of their many good qualities.

In the first place, they are inexpensive plants, not only in their original cost, but considering that when once planted they grow and increase from year to year, while the cost of maintenance is very slight.

With a good assortment of Hardy Perennials a continuous show of flowers can be kept from the early spring until the frost cuts down all vegetation. With a judicious selection of these plants, not only can flower beds and border be made attractive, but when proper kinds are chosen the ponds and marshes can be turned into an admiring object. Barren rocks and sand hills alike can be made beautiful, while, if planted in an informal, careless way, the pleasing effect of a wild garden is produced.

CULTURE.-The best time for planting Hardy Herbaceous Plants is from March to May, and from September to November. They require good, rich, loam to grow them to perfection, while if the soil is perfectly drained, no protection is needed in the winter, with the exception of a slight cover to prevent the sudden thawing and freezing.
