On November 13, a lecture meeting was held for women Child Welfare Commissioners in this jurisdiction to give instruction so as to capacitate them to perform their duties. Particular attention is being given for homeless juveniles but at present children of malignant nature can hardly be seen. Kodomo Minseijins are working hard for the welfare of children, keeping close contact with police stations and officials in charge.

Upon calling on officials in charge of this work in Horie mura it was found intuitively that they lacked in executive ability although they had enough knowledge of the work and all documents concerned are well prepared. Thoroughgoing direction and guidance toward the minor end organization is the first consideration. Therefore the squads of each town and village is endeavouring to do the best by holding lecture meeting from time to time.

No community organization was formed. For fund raising campaign all towns and villages made whole hearted cooperation to the Community Chest. The results is very good by the end of the month of November it reached 80% of the goal, much better than expected.

At the same time, measures were taken to diffuse on the person concerned methods by which child welfare can be smoothly enhanced and constant care can be paid.
