

> Cape Sable Seal Island Light .- The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. 'This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called Blonde Rock, lies about 31 miles. S. by W. by compass, from the Light House Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

> Brier Island Light .- In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point

thereof. A plain white light

Dighy Gut Light.—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed on the west side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin -A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machine, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a flash light-white-twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white

Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shouls, many of them always above water, and which extends Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

Head Harbour Light. - Next in order after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light, (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Hend Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquedy; it emples vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour it is a fixed white light. The building is painted White, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preau Lights.—Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet - Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and schite. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each. horizontally.

Bartridge Island Light.—This light at the entrance of the Riverand Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed white light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it ensolve them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. Quaco.—A revolving white light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. .. The Light House is painted white and red in horizontal stripes, who aid of ga

Cape Enrage Light .- On the point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain white light. The House is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark.

West Quoddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light-On Cape Forchu, on the western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova-Scotia), in lat. 43,39, N. long, 66,8, W. It exhibits a plain revolving light—visible one minute, and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is olevated 135 feet above the level of the sea.

RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Saint John—passed 3d August, 1848.

Five Shillings per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the Wharves; and Five Shillings per foot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, under and by Virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such Vessels, the sum of Ten Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing Vessels from any mooring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to another Wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding One Hundred Tons, Seven Shillings and Sixpence; for Vessels over One Hundred and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, Ten Shillings; for Vessels over Two Hundred and not exceeding Three Hundred Tons, Fifteen Shillings; and for all Vessels over Three Hundred Tons, the sum of Twenty Shillings.

First Distance.—From Patridge Island to Musquash Cove Head,

Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point LePreaux, bearing North West, Six Shillings and Threepence per foot.

Third Distance.—From Point Lepreaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West—or North Channel, bearing South East, Seven Shillings and Sixpence per foot.

RATE OF TOLLS FOR CROSSING THE SAINT JOHN SUSPENSION BRIDGE.—For every foot passenger, (excepting children under five years of age,) ld.; horse, mare, gelding, mule, ass, ox, cow, or other large animal, 3d, each; elephant or camel, 1s. 3d.; carriage, sleigh, waggon, cart, sled or other vehicle; drawn by one horse or heast of draught, with one person, with or without a load, fd.; horse or heast of draught, more than one, with a carriage or other vehicle, 3d. each; sheep, calf, hog, or goat, 1-2.

RATES AT THE PUBLIC WEIGHING MACHINES — Every load not exceeding One Thousand Pounds Weight, One Shilling; and One Penny for every additional Hundred Weight; payable, half by the seller, and half by the purchaser.

HACKNEY COACH FARES.—For conveying one passenger from any public stand to any part of the City, or from any one part of the City to any other part thereof, ls.; and for every passenger exceeding one, 6d. additional; and if any driver of any Carriage or other vehicle, shall be detained at any place by any passenger, or shall make any agreement for carrying any passengers by the hour, he shall be entitled to ask, and receive the following rates, viz:—For any time not exceeding half an hour, ls. 3d.; and in that proportion for every half hour that such Carriage, or other vehicle shall be detained or employed. Provided always, that in case any driver shall be required to cross the Ferry to Carleton, he shall, in addition to the foregoing fares, be entitled to demand and receive the ferriage for himself, his carriage and horses, both going and returning.

PUBLIC PORTERS AND HAND CART MEN—For leading carrying, and housing any goods, or any other article on any Hand Cart, from the Market Slip in King's and Quen's Wards, or from any other place within the limits of the first district, to any other place within the said several Five districts, the rates of prices are as follow:—For the first district 3d.; second district 3\frac{1}{2}d.; third district 4d.; fourth district 4\frac{1}{2}d.; fifth district 5d.

FISH MARKET DUES.—For every Salmon, 14d., Codfish, Pollock, Bass, or Shad, each 4d.; Hallibut, not exceeding 20 lbs. 1d.; exceeding 20 lbs., and for every 20 lbs., 1d.; every Lobster, 4d.; dozen of Haddock, 14d.; every 100 of Gaspereaux, Alewives, Herrings, or other small fish, 14d.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS—(near Saint John.)—The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the 100d, and about two and a half on the 200, so that they are pareable four times in twenty four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in prepertion to the height of them.

Profits of Dairying.—My own dairy consists of 28 cows, 3 three-years-old heifers, and 2 two-years-old heifers. These five heifers I call equal to four cows, which would make thirty-two cows.

From these cows we have during this season, 17,435 lbs. cheese. The most of it has been sent to New-York, and sold by Ludlum & Leggett, commission merchants. Theirs I consider a first class house for selling good butter and cheese.

Some of my cows are native breed—a part of them a mixture of English—the remainder Ayreshire. The latter I consider preferable for the dairy, not only for the large quantity of milk they give, but for the richness of the milk, and their peculiar properties for holding out their milk late in the season.

There are some fifteen or more other dairies in this town alone, of over 10,000 lbs. each, besides many of lesser note. Several of these dairymen are improving their breed of cows, in order to increase their products.—*Granville*, N. Y.

Remedy for Lice in Poultry.—In answer to "A Subscriber." The best preventitive, is cleanliness. Infested as your house is with them, you should give it a thorough cleansing. Clear it thoroughly, and give it a good coat of white-wash, and scatter slacked lime on the floor and perches. Any kind of oil or grense will kill lice on fowls; but that which is thin, is most readily applied, and most readily spread over the body. Dipping the chicks in tobacco-water will kill the vermin, but is likely to make the fowls sick and drooping for a while. Snuff scattered among the feathers, will thin off the lice. Wood ashes should be provided for the fowls to dust themselves in, and if flour sulphur is mixed with the ashes, it will be useful. Sulphur scattered in the nests of setting hens will tend to prevent them from getting lousy.—

To Make Ewes Give Milk at Lambing Time.—Feed them for ten days previous with soaked bran and carrots, twice each day, and give them a good warm stable.

A Precoctous Puller.—A circumstance which occurred in this neighborhood during the past season, has been communicated to me, and as it appears to be thought somewhat singular, I forward you the facts. A person living about a mile from here at present,

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curred in this municated to ar, I forward re at present, raised a large flock of chickens, hatched first day of May last, of which flock several commenced laying when four months old; one of the chickens having completed a litter of eggs, commenced clucking, and the owner, in order to see the result, put the eggs under her. On the first day of November last, the hen being then six months old, had a broad of eleven chickens, hatched by herself from eggs of her own laying, the chickens being then eight days old. The statement is confirmed by several respectable persons living in the neighborhood. I saw the hen and seven of her chickeus about three weeks ago, four of the flock had died from cold and exposure. Six of the flock most strikingly resemble the mother, the seventh differed slightly in appearance from the rest. The hen is of the common dunghill breed of the country, with perhaps a slight cross of the Cochin China. Solace of Age.—Next to the hope of another world, a happy memory is the best soluce of age. We can imagine nothing so dreary; nothing so full of gloom and sorrow; nothing so much surcharged with the agony of hell, as a review and a recollection of a bad, or a mis-spent life. The man who is forced to look back upon a career of fraud and deceit, of falsehood and crime, of open or concealed treachery; whose life has been a persistent outrage upon truth, and justice, and right; who has followed his own selfish inclinations, deaf to every accusation of conscience, and every warning of God; who has hardened himself in his iniquity until iniquity has become his delight, the man, in a word, who has destroyed his best sensibilities, seared his conscience, and blinded his judgment, by habits of open or concealed sin, not only finds no satisfaction in the retrospect of life, but in the future he has nothing but a fearful looking for of judgment, when God shall ariso to punish all the wicked of the earth. We repeat, that nothing can be more dreary or melancholy than an old age of vice, in which every recollection is pain, and every emotion a source of distress. But even where life has not been passed in positive vice, but has been mis-spent or mis-employed; where it has been wasted in trifles or fretted away at aimless labors; where it has been used selfishly for the mere gratification of pampered appetites, or in dreamy reveries; there, too, must inevitably be found the material for sharp and bitter recollections in that period of life when man may be said to live more in the past than in the present. An old age, uncomforted by the memory of a well spent life, is like the Dead Sea, which is at once the grave and hiding-place of ruins, on which the seal of the Divino wrath is stamped. But how enviable is the state of those who, without pride, or vanity, or self-elation, are nevertheless able to say, on the most candid review of their lives, that they have not labored in vain, nor spent their strength for naught. It was in no spirit of self-laudation, that an apostle exclaimed, "I am now ready to be offered; I have fought a good fight; I have kept the faith." He could recall his perils, and



conflicts, and toils; and all seemed pleasant, as he surveyed them from that lofty height up which his all-conquering faith had led him. How consolatory to their last hours must have been the exercises of memory to such men as Howard, and Wilberforce, and Chalmers, and such women as Hannah More, and Harriett Newell, and Mrs. Winslow, and others who, like them, were "steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord." A bright and happy memory weaves a halo around "the hoary head," when found in the ways of righteousness.—Christian Intelligencer.

GROWTH OF CITIES .- Of the cities of Great Britain, the population of London in 1801 was about nine hundred thousand. By 1810 it had risen to more than a million; by 1820 to a million and a quarter; by 1830 to a million and a half; and finally, by 1850, to two millions and a third. But the growth of other English cities has been proportionately even greater. Manchester, in 1801, had a population of only eighty-four thousand; it numbers now over three hundred thousand. Liverpool, at the beginning of the century, had but eighty thousand inhabitants, while fifty years later they had increased to nearly four hundred thousand. Birmingham, in 1801, had a population of seventy-three thousand; in 1850 it had two hundred and fifty thousand. The chief cities of Scotland increased not less rapidly. Glasgow, which had but seventy-seven thousand inhabitants in 1801, had three hundred and sixty-seven thousand half a century afterwards. Even Ireland exhibits a growth, though to a less degree, in city populations. Dublin had but one hundred and eighty thousand inhabitants in 1800; in 1850 it had two hundred and fifty thousand.

American cities have of course "got along" a little faster. In 1800, the inhabitants of Philadelphia were but little over seventy thousand, whereas now they may be fairly computed above hulf a million. In 1800, New York had a population of sixty thousand, now it has six hundred and twelve thousand. Boston had twenty four thousand denizers half a century ago; in 1850 it had about one hundred and forty thousand. Pittsburgh had fifteen hundred in 1800; at present it has over fifty thousand, exclusive of Allegheny city, which is really a suburb of it. Cincinnati had seven hundred and fifty in 1800; it had one hundred and fifteen thou-

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sand in 1850. Baltimore had twenty-six thousand in 1800; it has over a hundred and seven thousand now. Buffalo was a wilderness in 1800, and even so late as 1810 had only fifteen hundred inhabitants; it has now more than forty-five thousand. In addition there are scores of towns in the West, which were not laid out even so late as twenty years ago, which have now ten or twenty thousand denizens.

Sports of Animals.—Small birds chase each other about in play; but perhaps the conduct of the crane and the trumpeter is the most extraordinary. The latter stands on one leg, and hops about in the most strange manner, and throws somersets. Hence it has been called the mad bird. Water birds, such as ducks and geese, dive after each other, and clear the surface of the water with erected neck and flapping wings, throwing abundant spray around. Deer often engage in a sham battle, or trial of strength, by twisting their horns together and pushing for a mastery. All animals pretending violence in their play stop short of exercising it. The dog takes the precaution not to injure by his bite; and the baboon in wrestling with his keeper pretends to throw him, and makes feints of hitting him. Some animals carry out in their play the semblance of catching their prey. Young cats, for instance, leap after every small moving object, even to the leaves strewed by the autumn wind; they crouch and steal forward, ready for a spring. The body quivering, and the eyes glaring with emotion, they bound on the leaf, and again spring forward to another. Birds of the magpie tribe are the analogies or monkeys, full of mischief, play, and mimicry. I once heard a story of a tame magpie that was seen busily employed in a garden gathering pebbles, and with much solemnity and studied air burying them in a hole made to receive a post. After dropping each stone it cried "Curraofi" triumphantly, and set off for another. On examining the spot, a poor toad was found in the hole, which the magpie was stoning for his amusement.—Home Companion.

AN INDIAN LEGEND.—Out of a pine in the Iroquois settlement, and about five feet from the ground, is growing up with the tree a ram's head, with the horn's still attached to it; and so fixed and imbedded is it in the tree that it must have grown up with it. Almost the whole of one of the horns and more than half of the head is buried in the tree; but most of the other horn and part of the head protrudes out at least a foot. We examined both, and found the tree scarcely two feet in diameter. Here we put up at an early hour, and called the place Ram's Horn Encampment. Our Flathead Indians related to us a rather strange story about the ram's head. Indian legend relates that one of the first Flathead Indians, who passed this way, attacked a mountain ram, as large and stout as a common horse; that, on being wounded, the fierce animal turned round upon his pursuer, who, taking shelter behind the tree, the ram came against it with all his force, so that he drove his horn through it; but before he could get it extricated again the Indian killed him, and took off the body, leaving the head as a memento of the adventure. All Indians reverence

the celebrated tree, which they say, by the circumstance related, conferred on them the power of mastering and killing all animals; hundreds, therefore, in passing this way, sacrifice something as a tribute to the ram's head; and one of the Iroquois, not to incur the displeasure of the god of hunters, hung a bit of tobacco on the horn, to make his hunting propitious.—The Fur Hunters of the Far West, by Alexander Ross.

THE NIGHTINGALE.

So does a well-known naturalist endeavour to express the wild und spiritual melody of this most exquisite of British song-birds, the Nightingale. And in truth it is perhaps as good a description as can be given without the aid of music. Even its own marvellous notes sound comparatively weak unless backed by the accompaniments of night and tranquility; for the inimitable song of this Mendelssohn among birds loses great part of its beauty when uttered by day, deadened and confused with other sounds.

In some counties of England it is never found, but in many its nightly strains are frequently heard. The fields and College gardens of Oxford are full of Nightingales, whose songs add greatly to the effect of the scene. Well may Isaac Walton say in his delightfully quaint language:

"But the Nightingale, another of my airy creatures, breathes such sweet, loud music out of her instrumental throat, that it might make mankind to think that miracles are not ceased. He that at midnight, when the very laborer sleeps securely, should hear, as I have very often, the clear airs, the sweet descents, the natural rising and falling, the doubling and redoubling of her voice, might well be lifted above earth, and say, 'Lord, what music hust thou provided for the saints in Heaven, when thou affordest bud men such music on earth!"

ADVANTAGES OF EXERCISE.—We like mischevious children, and for this reason, they are apt to make old men. Good boys generally die in their fifth year; not because they are good, but their quiet habits make them strangers to mud puddles, oxygen, dirt-pies and out-door exercise. When a friend tells us he has a little boy who "never wants to leave his books," the knob of his front door immediately becomes an object of intense interest to us; we know, as if we were blest with foreknowledge, that in less than a year a strip of black crape will be throwing a shade across his path that time will never cradicate.

CURE FOR HYDROPHOBIA.—We copy the following from The Post, published at Elizabethtown, Essex County, N. Y. It is

certainly worth being remembered and tried.

In one or another of our exchanges we almost every week meet with fearful accounts of deaths by Hydrophobia. Some three years ago we published in the Post a remedy for that terrible disease: but it seems credence was not given to our statement, for it was never copied, to our knowledge. Yet there are still living many evidences of its efficacy. It was first prescribed on a consultation of three Physicians, for an individual who had been bitten and budly torn by a dog known to be mad, and, we believe, after the individual had one or two of the spasms so fearful to behold in a person suffering with the Hydrophobia. The patient was cured and lived many years. Of the three Physicians but one still survives, a man of nearly eighty-five years, but he has had occasion to prescribe the same remedy, during a long term of fifty year's practice, for other persons bitten by rabid animals, and always with success. The last time was within our memory, between the years 1820 and 1824 we believe, when several children in the south part of Chesterfield or the north part of Willsborough, in this County, were bitten by a cat. Animals were bitten by the same cat, and went mad and died. We know not if any of the individuals bitten are still living in that neighborhood, but there are undoubtedly others who still remember the circumstances. A remedy so well known to have been proved a cure should be known to the medical profession and to the world; and we once more publish it, hoping that others may imbibe a portion of the faith we ourselves have in it; and again prove its efficacy should an occasion unfortunately offer.

We give the recipe as written out for us many years ago.

Recipe for the Cure of the Bite of a Mad Dog or other Rabid Animal.—"Keep the sore running or discharging matter as long as possible with powdered verdigris dusted into the wound, and give one grain of Turpith Mineral at a dose three times in the day, in a little dry sugar rubbed very fine and washed down with warm tea or water, till the mouth is slightly affected with the mercury, then stop till the appearances of the affection of the mouth have disappeared; then repeat the course in the same way. Repeat the course three or four times in the course of six weeks, when I consider the patient out of danger."

THE STING OF WASPS, ACID.—We have never found anythin so efficacious for venomous stings, as a paste made of saleratus. A sting in the finger by a yellow wasp which felt as if it nearly pierced through, was entirely relieved of the swelling and of every other unpleasant feeling, in a short time, except the simple soreness of the puncture, like that of a needle, by this application. There may possibly be other alkaline applications better than this, but we do not know them.

In corroboration of the correctness of the theory on which this remedy is founded, we have lately observed an incident mentioned in the travels of James Backhouse, an eminent English naturalist and missionary in the Mauritius and South Africa. In passing through the forests, his hat came in contact with the naked combs of a large ochre-colored wasp, and one of them avenged himself by stinging him in the finger. "The burning pain subsided in a few minutes, on pressing out the poison, and sucking the part affected. The poison was distinguishably acid.

CROUP AND WHOOPING COUGH.—I send you the two following receipts for the cure of two of the most common diseases among children, viz.: Whooping Cough and Croup. The remedies cost nothing, can be administered by anybody, and are always at hand. The croup remedy will cure the patient in two hours. I ask the

credulous and incredulous to give them a trial.

Whooping Cough.—The best kind of coffee prepared as for the table, and given as a common drink to the child as warm as it can be drunk; and a piece of alum for the patient to lick as often as it may wish. Most children are fond of alum, and will get all they need without being urged, but if they dislike it, they must be made to taste of it eight or ten times in the course of the day. It will effectually break up the worst case of whooping cough in a very short time. To adults or children in the habit of taking coffee, the remedy is good for nothing.

Croup.—A piece of fresh lard, as large as a butter-nut, rubbed up with sugar, in the same way that butter and sugar are prepared for the dressing of puddings, divided in three parts, and given at intervals of twenty minutes, will relieve any case of croup not already allowed to progress to the fatal point.—N. Y. Ev. Post.

CRANBERRIES AND ERYSIPELAS.—The Niles (Michigan) Republican says: "A lady visited our family a few days since, and stated that her daughter had the crysipelas very bad. We called to mind the remedy recommended by a New Haven editor. On returning home in the evening she found the disease spreading rapidly—it had assumed a frightful appearance. She immediately applied a poultice made of cranberries, which seemed to arrest it at once, and the second poultice effected a complete cure."

FOR BURNS AND FROZEN FLESH.—It is said that an Indian meal poultice, covered with Young Hyson tea, softened with hot water, and laid over burns or frozen flesh, as hot as can be borne, will relieve the pain in five minutes.

This table and the accompanying remarks are the result of many years actual observation, the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the sun and moon, in their several positions respecting the earth, and will by simple inspection shew the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom or never found to fail

Observations.—1. The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, are to midnight, the fairer will be the weather during the seven days following.

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2. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till

two next morning.

3. The nearer to midday or noon, the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forencon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

5. The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e. from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table.

6. Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.

7. To prognosticate correctly, especially in those cases where the wind is concerned, the observer should be in sight of a good vane, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.
