**PRESBYTERIES WILL REPORT GENERAL ASSEMBLY AND CHURCH UNION**

**More Men Needed for Work in West—College Methods Attacked**  
Halifax, June 8.—The Presbyterian General Assembly last evening, after an all day discussion, decided by a vote of 184 to 72 to push the cause of union with the Methodist and Congregational church on one step further. This was done by the adoption of the following resolution.  
"The assembly declare their approval of the documents agreed upon by the joint committee as a base upon which this church may unite with the Methodist and Congregational churches and they direct that this resolution with the above mentioned documents be transmitted to presbyteries for the judgment under the barrier act, instructing presbytery clerks to report the decisions arrived at to the clerks of the general assembly."

The assembly in the morning discussed finances and home missions. In the afternoon they decided to establish a new theological college in Edmonton and authorized the raising of a fund to endow a school in Alberta for the education of students. Dr. C. W. Gordon told the theological colleges that in not supplying more men for the mission fields they are "not on to their jobs." They should take steps to find more men for the ministry. In the evening, moral reform, evangelism, and systematic beneficence were discussed and resolutions based thereon were adopted.  
Hon. Tadpole Lemieux was commended for closing the corridors of the postoffice on Sunday and regret was expressed that the legislation asked for under the first Miller bill was not enacted. The assembly declared that it cannot rest satisfied while the criminal code legalizes the vice of gambling which debases thousands of lives. Rev. Dr. John Pringle was a speaker.

The report on evangelism was presented by Rev. Dr. C. W. Gordon, seconded by Geo. E. Ross. The systematic beneficence report and that on the laymen's missionary movement were presented.  
The moderator stated that two telegrams had come from Orange lodges asking the assembly to protest against changes in the Coronation Oath. He had referred it to the committee on bills and overtures which now asked that it be sent to a special committee.  
"If I had my own way with it I would lay it on the table for a year," said the moderator.

Dr. D. D. McLeod, of Barrie, opposed doing anything about the matter. It would only be introducing political questions into the assembly. The house called for a committee, however, and the moderator said he would name them as follows: Dr. J. F. MacLaren, Dr. McLeod, Dr. Turnbull, Dr. Sedgwick, Walter Paul and Pete Lyle.  
Dr. C. W. Gordon made an appeal for a committee to devise means for securing men for the home mission fields in the west and he attacked the methods of the theological colleges.  
"In the next five years," he said, "we will need from \$50 to 1,000 more men to undertake the work of the west if we are not to fall down before it."

The tremendous growth of the west was pictured by Dr. Gordon, 400,000 of an immigration being expected this year and the likelihood of 3,000,000 in 5,000,000 more people in the west than there are to-day.  
"This year," said he, "we are getting only 57 men out of the colleges and not one of them for the west, needing 250 men this year and with 1,200 vacant posts." Dr. Gordon told the assembly that he considered this the most solemn thing with which he had to deal. The theological colleges seem to have broken down. They are not meeting the needs of the case though they cost \$250,000 a year. He thought the same plan and the same professors should do far more. He did not see why every college professor and college man should not get right into the campaign. If the halls were overflowing, it would be different, but when we know that in some colleges there are almost more professors than students, he thought college men should "get on to their job" and dig up men.  
Dr. Gordon proceeded to attack the curriculum of the colleges. Latin, Greek and Hebrew are important but a more important thing is the preaching of the Gospel. Courses might be shortened to make it less of a burden to get through.

**BOXING CONTESTS PROHIBITED.**  
Norfolk, W. Va., June 8.—Neither prize fights nor boxing contests will be permitted at the Norfolk navy yard hereafter. An order by Capt. Parker, executive officer of the station, prohibits such contests in future. A contest between Jimmy Hill, of the St. Helen training station, and Bob Bracewell, of the battleship Virginia, was stopped by Capt. Parker. He has been ordered to prevent another match scheduled in June 11th.  
An appeal to Admiral Marshall, in command of the Norfolk navy yard, will probably be made by the enlisted men.

**ROOTENAY CENTRAL.**  
Windsor, June 8.—The contract for the construction of the Kootenay Central Railway has been awarded by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company to Foley-Welch & Stewart. The contract is for twenty-five miles, and calls for the completion of the line within one year. Work will be commenced shortly.

**NEW BISHOP OF WESTMINSTER ELECTED**

Rev. A. O. De Pencier, of Vancouver, Chosen as Successor to Late Bishop Dart

Vancouver, June 8.—Rev. A. O. De Pencier, D. A., rector of St. Paul's Anglican church, of this city, for the past three years, was yesterday chosen as successor to the late Bishop Dart, at a well attended meeting of the diocese of New Westminster, held in the Royal City.  
It was a keen contest between Archdeacon Pentreath, Canon Tucker, the former rector of Christ Church, Vancouver, and the successful contestant, whose selection was made unanimous after a fourth ballot. The selection remains to be confirmed by the House of Bishops and Primate of all Canada. Consecration will take place within the next two months.

The new bishop came from Brandon, Manitoba, three years ago, and is one of the most prominent clergymen in British Columbia.  
The total of clergy present was 36, 19 being the necessary number to elect. The total of the lay delegates was 85, 43 being necessary to elect. The contest on the first three ballots was keen, but on the fourth, victory came to the popular rector of St. Paul's. Balloting proceeded at the same time in both houses. The clergy voted as follows: De Pencier, 23; Pentreath, 11; blank, 2. The laity voted: De Pencier, 47; Pentreath, 35, and Canon Tucker, 13.

Then Rev. C. C. Owen, Christ Church cathedral, Vancouver, moved that Rev. De Pencier be elected, which was unanimously carried.  
Archdeacon Pentreath, who presided, in his tribute to the new bishop said he had made a good rector, and would ably fill the high office.  
The bishop-elect will at once resign his rectorship of St. Paul's. Holy communion and service was held in the Holy Trinity cathedral, conducted by Archdeacon Pentreath, Canon D'Easum, Rev. Mr. Hoyle, vicar of Ashcroft, and Canon Hincheliff, vicar of Chilliwack.  
Rev. Mr. Hoyle made a brief but impressive address on the purposes of the gathering, and after they service the delegates adjourned to St. George's hall.

Rev. C. C. Owen rose to the point of order, and asked why the names of two recent members of the diocese had not been read.  
The archdeacon stated that he intended to enforce strictly the canon in regard to delegates because the election might otherwise be nullified. The rule was that no clergyman could vote for a bishop who did not produce his license, signed and sealed by the bishop of the diocese. Several delegates took exception to this ruling, including George H. Cowan, M. P. One clergyman said he had voted for the last ten years, and had not received a written license.  
Rev. C. C. Owen said the matter of a license had never before been insisted upon, and did not think that such a hard and fast ruling should be followed.

**EARL GREY'S TRIP TO HUDSON BAY.**  
Will Go by Way of Hayes' River and Board Steamer at York Factory

Ottawa, June 8.—The route by which Earl Grey will travel into the far north has been definitely decided upon. The governor-general will go by way of Hayes river and go on board the government steamer Earl Grey at York Factory. The trip down Hayes river will be made by canoe and His Excellency and party will be put through by mounted police and Indians. Hayes river has been decided upon because portages are fewer than on the Nelson river. There are 24 in all. The longest is about a mile and the shortest nothing more than single rock. Earl Grey sails to-day for England and the making of all arrangements has been left in the hands of Comptroller White, of the N. W. M. P. The date of departure will not be fixed until His Excellency returns from England, but it will be about the middle of August.

**BRITISH COLUMBIA LUMBER.**  
London, June 8.—British Columbia lumber interests which have several companies awaiting flotation are making elaborate efforts in the press. The Times yesterday published a whole page of illustrated matter advertising generally the lumber wealth of the province at a cost of \$500. The Daily Mail and Observer had similar pages the other day, costing \$1,500 and \$150 respectively.  
To further the campaign in progress, through the agency of the Harnsworth journals, in addition to the special advertisements, an expert is being sent to British Columbia at the promoters' expense.  
The congested condition of the market for semi-speculative Canadian securities still continues.

**L. A. STREETER ACQUITTED.**  
Ferne, June 8.—L. A. Streeter, charged with having caused the death of Lewis Riley, lumberman, on May 2nd, was brought up in court here yesterday and discharged. Considerable testimony was heard on camera, particularly that of Dr. Harold Anderson, who had made a complete post-mortem proving conclusively that death was in a very weak physical condition, his heart being abnormally dilated. Evidence was also heard to the effect that Riley was of a quarrelsome disposition, and had attacked young Streeter first, who simply struck back in self-defence. The grand jury returned no bill.  
The verdict met with universal approval.  
M. Marcel Henriot, aged 17, the youngest aviator in the world, made, at Rheims, a series of fine flights in a Hanriot monoplane. One of the flights lasted 21 minutes.

**AUTO FATALITY.**  
Expert Demonstrator Testifies at Trial in Seattle.  
Seattle, Wash., June 8.—Owen McCusker, expert automobile demonstrator, yesterday on the witness stand, told the story that the prosecution relies upon to send Ralph J. Leavitt, of Los Angeles, to the penitentiary for manslaughter, in the killing of a street sweeper July 10th, 1908, in Seattle.  
McCusker did not waver under a savage cross-examination. He told of Leavitt, his employer, C. C. Slaughter, a prospective purchaser, and James Hardman, starting on an automobile ride. McCusker said he drove the machine at a legal speed until the return from Lake Washington. When Leavitt told him to turn the car loose, "I said we should go to the race track if we wanted to show speed," said McCusker. "Go ahead and turn her loose, I'll pay the fine if there is any." Leavitt replied. The witness said he again objected, and Leavitt replied angrily, "Turn her loose, I told you I would pay the fine." McCusker said he obeyed orders. He described the efforts of the street sweeper to dodge the car as it approached at 40 miles an hour, and how the machine hit the man, and Leavitt's exclaiming, "My God, Mac, we've killed a man."
