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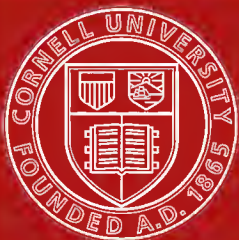

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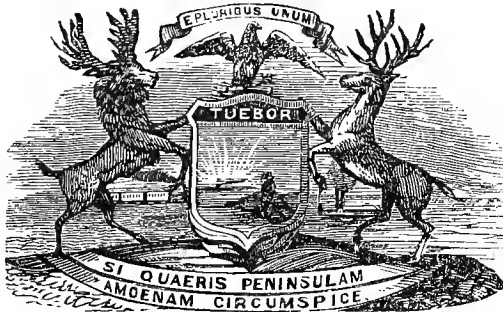

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CENSUS OF MICHIGAN, 1874.

The constitution of the State of Michigan declares (Sec. 4 of Art. IV.) that "The Legislature shall provide by law for an enumeration of the inhabitants in the year eighteen hundred and fifty-four and every ten years thereafter * *."

The following is the law under which the statistics of this volume have been collected and compiled:

CENSUS LAW.

AN ACT to provide for taking the census and statistics of this State, approved February 9, 1853, as amended by Act 101, Session laws of 1873, and Act 63, Session Laws of 1875.

SECTION 1. *The People of the State of Michigan enact*, That it shall be the duty of the supervisor of each township and ward, and assessor of each assessment district, at the time of taking a list of the taxable property, or between the first Monday of April and third Monday of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and every ten years thereafter, to go to every dwelling-house in their respective township ward or assessment district, and by personally inquiring of the head of every family, or some competent person, to ascertain and take an enumeration of all the inhabitants therein (except uncivilized Indians belonging to some tribe), in the following order, to wit: The names of all males of the age of twenty-one years and under forty-five (designating the married from the unmarried); the names of those of forty-five and under seventy-five; the names of those of seventy-five and under ninety; the names of those of ninety and under one hundred; and the names of those over one hundred; the number of females of the age of eighteen years and under forty (designating the married from the unmarried); the number of the age of forty and under seventy-five; the number of the age of seventy-five and over; the number of children under the age of five years; the number of the age of five and under ten (designating the males from the females); the number of males of the age of ten and under twenty-one, and the number of females of the age of ten and under eighteen; the number of colored persons; the number of blind; the number of deaf and dumb; and the number of insane persons and idiots; the number of marriages and the number of deaths the preceding year, as near as can be ascertained; and the occupation or profession of all males over twenty-one years of age.

SEC. 2. And it shall also be the duty of the supervisors and assessors of each city and township, at the time mentioned in the preceding section for taking the census of his township or ward, to ascertain and set down in a table prepared for that purpose the whole number of acres of taxable land; the whole number of acres of land owned by individuals and companies; the number of acres improved; the whole number of acres of land exempt from taxation, and for what cause, and its value; the number of acres sowed with wheat then on the ground; the number of acres and the number of bushels of corn harvested the preceding year; the number of acres harvested and the number of bushels of wheat raised the preceding year; the number of bushels of all other kinds of grain: the number of bushels of potatoes and the number of tons of hay the preceding year; the number of acres planted with the following varieties of trees: peach, pear, apple, plum, cherry; the number of acres planted with grape vines, with raspberry canes, strawberry plants, currant and gooseberry bushes; and the number of acres planted with melons and with garden vegetables, and the quantity of each of the following articles produced during each of the two preceding years: apples, peaches, pears, plums, cherries, grapes, strawberries, currants, gooseberries, melons and garden vegetables, and the value thereof as nearly as it can be

ascertained; the number of sheep, and the number of pounds of wool sheared the preceding year; and the number of sheep and the number of swine over six months old; and the number of pounds of pork marketed; the number of neat cattle (other than oxen and cows) one year old and over; the number of horses one year old and over; the number of mules; the number of work oxen and the number of milch cows; the number of pounds of butter and cheese made the preceding year; the number of pounds of sugar manufactured the present year; the number of pounds of fruit dried for market; the number of cans of fruit and vegetables canned for market during the preceding year; the number of cans of pickles manufactured for market; the number of pounds of peppermint oil manufactured the preceding year; the number of flouring mills, and the number of runs of stone in each; the number of barrels of flour made by each the preceding year; and the number of oil mills, and the number of gallons of oil made the preceding year; the number of breweries, and the number of barrels of beer made the preceding year; the number of distilleries, and the number of gallons of liquor made the preceding year; the number of gallons of wine made the preceding year; and the number of barrels of cider made the preceding year; and the number of barrels of fish caught the preceding year, and the amount of capital invested; the number of saw mills, and the number of feet of lumber sawed by each the preceding year, and the amount of capital invested; the number and kind of all manufacturing, the number of persons employed in each, the amount of capital invested, and the value of the products for the past year, designating the number of said mills and factories operated by steam and the number by water power; the number of mines worked, the amount of capital invested, and the number of men employed, specifying the kind of mineral, the aggregate quantity in pounds, and its valuation at the place of mining; the amount of capital invested, and the number of men employed; and the value of all the merchandise imported the preceding year for the purpose of sale.

SEC. 3. The Secretary of State shall prepare proper blanks for taking the census and statistics, and shall transmit to the several county clerks of all the organized counties of the State a sufficient number for each township, ward, or assessment district in each county, on or before the first day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and every tenth year thereafter; and it shall be the duty of the county clerk to receive and retain the same in his office, and on or before the second Monday in April next thereafter, cause to be delivered to the supervisor of each township and ward, and assessor of each assessment district in the county, a sufficient number of said blanks for the supervisor or assessor to take the census of his township or ward, or assessment district (as the case may be), and to make a condensed statement thereof, as prescribed in the next succeeding section.

SEC. 4. It shall be the duty of each supervisor and assessor to condense the census and statistics of his township, ward, or assessment district, so as to show the aggregate number of each class, to write out distinctly the names of all males over the age of twenty-one years; and when so arranged he shall make duplicate copies, and personally deliver or forward the same to the county clerk of their respective counties, on or before the first day of July, next thereafter; and it shall be the duty of the county clerk to forthwith seal up one copy and send it by mail to the Secretary of State, and the other he shall file and carefully preserve in his office.

SEC. 5. If any supervisor or assessor shall be sick, or otherwise unable to perform, or omit to perform the duties required by this act, the township or city board shall immediately appoint a suitable person to do the duties of such supervisor or assessor, who shall take and subscribe the constitutional oath before entering upon the duties of his office.

SEC. 6. Any supervisor or assessor neglecting or refusing, without good cause shown, to perform all the duties prescribed in this act, shall forfeit the sum of one hundred dollars, to be recovered by an action of debt, in the name of the people of the State of Michigan, for the use of the county where such failure occurred.

SEC. 7. It shall be the duty of the county, township, or city clerk (as the case may be), to notify the prosecuting attorney of the county of any forfeiture under this act, who shall immediately commence a suit for the recovery thereof, and prosecute the same to a final termination.

SEC. 8. The supervisor of each township and ward, and the assessor of each assessment district, shall be allowed, in addition to the sum allowed by law for taking the assessment of his township, ward, or assessment district, two dollars for every one hundred persons by him returned, if the number shall exceed one thousand and five hundred; and two dollars and fifty cents per hundred for any number less; and ten cents per mile for conveying the returns to the county clerk's office, which shall be in full for all services performed under the provisions of this act; and the sum due each supervisor and assessor for services, shall be calculated at the rate aforesaid by the county clerk to which the proper returns are made, and his certificate of the amount due shall be paid by the treasurer of said county: *Provided*, That before a supervisor or assessor shall be entitled to receive any compensation, he

shall attach a certificate to each copy of said returns, signed by him, in the following form, to wit: "I do hereby certify that the census and statistics set forth in the schedule hereto annexed, has been consolidated and arranged from enumeration and statistical lists, made by actual inquiry at the dwelling, or personal inquiry of the head of every family, or of a competent person acquainted with the facts, by myself, in the township of _____, or ward number _____, in the city of _____, or assessment district in the city of _____ (as the case may be), and that the said schedule has been made in every respect in conformity with the act for taking the census and statistics for the year eighteen hundred and fifty-four, and every tenth year thereafter, and the amendments thereto, and is correct and true, according to the best of my knowledge and belief."

SEC. 9. The Secretary of State shall condense, in a tabular form, the census and statistical returns made to him, and, as soon as may be, cause six thousand copies to be published and bound, and transmit four copies to each organized township in the State, one for the use of the supervisor, one for the use of the township clerk, and two to be deposited in the township clerk's office; and twenty-five copies to the mayor of the city of Detroit, and ten copies to the mayor of every other city in the State, and two copies to the president of each incorporated village, for the use of the several city and village libraries. He shall also cause one hundred copies to be deposited in the State library of this State, and also transmit one copy to each of the members of this Legislature and its officers: *Provided*, That in counties having less than five thousand inhabitants, the supervisor in each town shall be entitled to three dollars for taking the census and statistics in his town, extra.

SEC. 10. In the city of Detroit the common council shall appoint a person in each ward to discharge the duties required by this act to be performed by the supervisor of each township or ward: *Provided*, There is no assessor elected in said wards.

SEC. 11. It shall be the duty of the persons required in this act to take said census, to have the several columns of figures footed, and the aggregate amount put down.

SEC. 12. That the Governor appoint marshals to take the census in the unorganized territory not otherwise provided in this act, who shall receive such compensation as the board of supervisors of the organized county to which such unorganized territory is attached for judicial purposes shall allow.

This act shall take effect immediately.

The publication of the census has been delayed, first, because of the great amount of labor required to complete and compile the returns; second, because of the press of legislative and other printing in the early part of this year; and third, because of the time required to set the type and read and correct the proofs of large tables of figures and make them accurate.

Suitable schedules for use in collecting the statistics, and blanks for aggregate statements were prepared and forwarded at the proper time by the State Department to the several county clerks for distribution to the supervisors and assessors. The county clerks and the enumerators were also furnished at the same time with a pamphlet copy of the census law, together with instructions for noting down the required information. Every possible precaution was taken to make the requirements of the law easily comprehended by the enumerators. The schedules, blanks, and instructions were prepared with the utmost care; yet, as was to be expected, out of one thousand and sixty-seven enumerators, but few of whom ever had any experience in collecting statistics, there were found many who misinterpreted the law, and failed to understand the schedules and instructions. Of the ten hundred and sixty-seven returns from as many townships, wards, and assessment districts, not one was correct in every item. Besides the usual number of clerical errors and oversights, the greater part of which were readily detected by an experienced compiler, there were very many instances of evident errors of judgment. Where simply enumeration was required,—as the number of inhabitants, the number of mills, the number of acres of taxable land, etc.,—the compiler has abundant reason to know that the returns were usually quite correct; but where estimates were necessary,—as the value of land exempt from taxation, the number of feet of lumber manufactured in a saw-mill, the value of products of manufacturing establish-

ments, etc.,—the most glaring errors and discrepancies were made in the returns.

The effort to perfect these returns involved immense labor, necessitating the writing of not less than four thousand letters, and a vast amount of clerical labor in transferring the corrections from letters to the proper blanks. The work is not now claimed to be perfect,—perfection in statistics is perhaps unattainable—but it is believed to be nearer correct than statistical works of like kind usually are.

It may be considered not worth while to take time and space to point out defects in the present census law. Another State census will not be taken under the present law until 1884, and the Legislature eight years hence will not probably refer to this volume for the purpose of learning what the law ought to be. Yet the compiler will venture a few suggestions.

The classification of population by ages, as fixed by the census law, will be a constant source of annoyance and disappointment both to the statistician and others. The ages, as reported, are of little or no value further than dividing the population into children, those under, and those who have passed middle age. To most persons, if the age of each individual cannot be stated in a census, the most natural classification would be into military, voting, child-bearing, and school ages, but this classification is objectionable in that it affords no data of any value for calculating the death-rate. None of the above ages, except voting, are shown in the present census. The only right way to report the ages of the population is to state the age of each individual at last birth-day. This will enable every person to make such combinations as will serve his particular purpose.

The “number of acres of land owned by individuals and companies” is an item that has been a serious puzzle to the enumerators. Under the rulings of this Department it includes the total of the taxable and exempt lands, excepting those belonging to the State and the United States. It could be made much plainer to simply ask for the total area, exclusive of United States and State lands.

The number of acres of school-house and church sites, and perhaps of some other lands exempt from taxation, is a rude and unsatisfactory estimate, and could not well be otherwise. Most of these are small parcels, and their exact area is seldom known; besides many of them are located on the corner of farms, and are included in the “taxable land” both in the assessment rolls and the census returns. In the opinion of the compiler much more satisfactory information would be obtained by requiring the number of parcels of such exempt lands, rather than the area.

The statistics of fruit for the second preceding year are very unreliable. But few of our farmers keep any record of the quantity produced; and the quantities reported cannot be other than mere “guess work.” It will be a great saving of labor both to the enumerators and the compiler, and not detract in the least from the value of the census, if this item be omitted in the future.

The method of collecting the statistics for the State census has been subjected to no little adverse criticism. The compiler of the census of 1864 thought that the “object would be more fully met by classifying the State into districts, and the appointment of marshals to perform the work.” The compiler of this volume, at the commencement of the work of compilation, was of the same opinion, but in the preparation of the tables he has found good reasons for at least modifying his views. As the compiler of the census of 1864

says the supervisors are elected "without regard to the census returns," but numerous visits from them with special reference to the census, as well as their extended correspondence with this Department, has demonstrated that they are, for the most part, very intelligent and candid men, and have endeavored faithfully to perform the intricate duties of the correct enumerator. Whatever may be said of their inexperience will apply with equal force to any marshal that could have been selected to do the work.

The duties of enumerators as assessors require them to call upon every taxable person in their township or district, at his residence, boarding place, or usual place of business, making it very improbable that they would attempt to take the census without the personal inquiry required by the census law. A careful examination of the census schedules of 1870 for localities where the writer was well acquainted, brought to light a class of mistakes, that can be accounted for only on the supposition that the marshal made the enumeration while sitting in his office. This supposition is strengthened by the fact that a much greater population is reported at such ages as would naturally be mentioned were the enumerator guessing instead of speaking from actual knowledge, than at other ages. This fact is graphically exhibited in diagrams Nos. 3 and 4, Statistics of Michigan, 1870. These diagrams clearly show that the ages were stated approximately, rather than accurately. The result is many more are reported at the even than at the odd ages, excepting for the ages 25, 35, 45, etc. The greatest error occurs in reporting the ages 20, 30, 40, etc. "If we were to believe the returns," says the compiler of that census, "we should conclude that there were more than twice as many of either sex aged 40, than there were aged 41; more aged 50 than 51; more 60 than 61, etc., etc." Such errors as these would not be likely to occur were the ages given in reply to direct inquiries by the enumerators.

SUMMARY.

PART I.—POPULATION.

The total population of Michigan at the time of taking the census of 1874 (between the first Monday of April and the third Monday of May), was 1,334,031. This is exclusive of the population of the Manitou and Fox islands in Manitou county, and of the sparsely settled townships number 23 north, of ranges 3 and 4 east in Ogemaw county, the only territory in the State from which no returns have been received. The population of the islands in 1870 was 211, and we may perhaps estimate the population of the towns in Ogemaw county that have not reported at 58; these totals added to the above make an aggregate of 1,334,300. It is not safe to assume that the population of the Manitou and Fox islands was greater in 1874 than 1870, since the townships of Manitou county from which reports have been received show a slight decrease.

This aggregate will doubtless be a disappointment to such as have estimated the population from the increase as shown by the several United States censuses,—especially the average rate from 1860 to 1870.

The average annual rate of increase from 1860 to 1870 was a trifle less than 4.69 per cent. The time for taking the present census closed on the 18th day of May, 1874. Making no account of the thirteen days to June 1, but considering it four full years from the time of taking the United States census to the close of the time for taking the State census, the average annual rate of increase has been 3.0214 per cent. Had the increase continued from 1870 to 1874 at the same rate as from 1860 to 1870, the population June 1st, 1874, would have been 1,422,577,—a population greater by 88,546 than that reported.

A census taken at a time or immediately following a period of prosperity, will show a large increase, while one taken at the time, or at the close of a period of depression, will show a smaller increase of population. If one census is taken at a time of depression, and the next succeeding at a time of general prosperity, the increase as shown will be astonishingly large.

This is clearly shown in Table 1. The average annual increase from 1860 to 1864 was only 13,637, while from 1860 to 1870 it was 43,516, and from 1864 to 1870 it was 63,436. The very small increase from 1860 to 1864 is attributable to its having been mostly a period of war. From 1865 to 1870 was a period of at least comparative prosperity, and the rate of increase as compared with the period of war preceding was prodigiously large,—so large that despite the depression occasioned by the war the rate of increase for the decennial period from 1860 to 1870 was greater than for any previous decennial period. From 1870 to 1874 was a period of "hard times," and the average annual increase was only 37,437, more than 6,000 below the average from 1860 to 1870, and 26,000 less than from 1864 to 1870.

It should be noted here that at the time of taking the State census of 1864 Michigan had nearly 36,000 soldiers in the army, and most of these were

absent in the field, and probably were not enumerated in that census. The compiler of the census of 1864 says: "It is clearly evident that thousands of our soldiers who are absent, in the camp and in the field, were not enumerated in the State census of 1864. From numerous townships where the name and occupation are given of every inhabitant, but few persons are enumerated as soldiers, and in the returns of many townships not a single inhabitant is thus designated." It is believed that had the soldiers been enumerated the population of 1864 would have been at least 839,000 instead of 803,661, as reported in the census.

Assuming that 839,000 was about the true population in 1864, the average annual increase from 1860 to 1864 would be about 22,500 instead of 13,667; from 1864 to 1870 about 57,500 instead of 63,436; and from 1864 to 1874 about 49,500 instead of 53,037. It is believed that these figures are nearer correct than those shown in the table. It can hardly be improbable that during the fierce conflict of 1861-5 the increase should fall from 40,000 per year, the average from 1854 to 1860, to an average of 22,500. With this assumption the teachings of the last three columns of the table may be summed up as follows: From 1840 to 1850 the average increase was but little greater than from 1830 to 1840. In 1850 population began to flow in upon us, and in 1854 had reached an average annual increase of 27,466—50 per cent more than for the preceding period. It increased more rapidly from year to year, until 1860, when the census showed an average for the six years of 40,265, or of 35,145 for the ten years from 1850. In 1861 the war opened, and for four years the increase was but 22,500 a year; for the next six years, including five years after the close of the war, it was 57,500, or, counting for the ten years from 1860, it was 43,516. For the next four years, or from 1870 to 1874, the average increase dropped to 37,437 per year.

The proportion of population at the different ages varies greatly at the time of taking the different censuses, as is shown in Table 4. This variation is doubtless largely attributable to inaccuracies in the enumeration in 1870, and to the failure to enumerate the soldiers in the field in 1864. The table shows that in 1864 the proportion of males aged 10 and under 21, and aged 21 and under 45, the ages from which the greatest number of our soldiers was taken, was considerably less than in 1854, 1870, or 1874. The proportion aged 45 and under 75 was larger than in 1854, 1870, or 1874, owing in part, probably, to the fact that the soldiers, but few of whom were taken from this class, not being enumerated, the basis upon which the per cent is calculated is too small, and the per cent consequently too large.

Reference has already been made to the fact that in 1870 a much greater population was reported at the even than at the odd ages, except for the odd ages 25, 35, 45, etc., and that astonishingly large numbers were reported at the ages 30, 40, 50, etc. This error becomes very apparent by comparing the proportion in each period of age in 1870 with the proportion for the corresponding period in 1874.

The table shows that the proportion of both sexes aged 5 and under 10 was less in 1870 than in 1874, mainly attributable to the fact that many aged 9 were, in 1870, reported 10. All such appear in the next period,—10 and under 21 for males, and 10 and under 18 for females,—and for these ages the proportion for 1870 is greater than for 1874. The proportion of males for 1870 in this period is also increased by some that were 21 years old but reported 20; and for this reason, and also because many that were only 43 and 44 were reported 45, the proportion of males in the next period, 21 and under 45, is less in 1870 than in 1874. Those that were aged only 43 and 44, but were reported 45, appear in the next period, 45 and under 75, and for this period the proportion in 1870 is greater than in 1874. The proportion of females aged 10 and under 18 would doubtless be much larger for 1870 than stated in the table, but that many aged 17 were reported 18, and appear in the next period, 18 and under 40. This, of course, would make the proportion stated for this period larger than the true proportion, were it not that many aged only 38 and 39 were reported 40. These last appear in the period 40 and under 75, and for these ages the proportion in 1870 is greater than in 1874.

The proportion of males aged 75 and under 90 has steadily increased since 1854, and the proportion aged 90 and under 100, and aged 100 and over, remains the same for the four censuses.

There has been a steady decrease of the proportion of females under 5 years of age since 1854; also, except the slight increase in 1874 referred to above, of those aged 5 and under 10. The proportion of females under 10 years of age has steadily decreased since 1830, as shown by the United States censuses. (See Table 2, Statistics of Michigan, 1870.) This decrease holds good, also, for the State censuses of 1854, 1864, and 1874, but at each State census the proportion is slightly greater than at the United States census immediately preceding. The proportion expressed in per cent is, for the United States censuses of 1850, 1860, and 1870, 31.08, 29.00, and 27.02 respectively, and for the State censuses of 1854, 1864, and 1874, 31.13, 30.23, and 27.23 respectively.

Table 5 exhibits for the State and counties the population, and for the counties the relative rank as regards number of inhabitants, as shown by the censuses of 1874, 1870, 1864, and 1854. Table 6 exhibits the increase, and Table 7 the per cent of increase of 1874 over 1870, 1864, and 1854, and of 1864 over 1854. From tables 6 and 7 it appears that the population in 1874 was 149,749, or 12.64 per cent greater than in 1870, 530,370 or nearly 66 per cent greater than in 1864, and 826,510, or 162.85 per cent greater than in 1854. The population in 1864 was 296,140 or 58.35 per cent greater than in 1854. The increase of population in several of the counties in the ten year periods 1854-64 and 1864-74 has been very great, reaching in some cases for the latter period more than 500 per cent of the population at the beginning of the period.

Every census since 1850, compared with the last preceding census, shows a decrease in the population of some of the counties that were organized at the time of the preceding census. This decrease is shown in table 8.

This table shows that twelve counties contained less inhabitants in 1874 than in 1870, twelve contained less in 1864 than in 1860, three less in 1854 than in 1850, three less in 1870 than in 1864, and two less in 1860 than in 1854. It is impossible to determine just how far the decrease in 1864, as compared with

1860, is chargeable to the war, but it is worth noting that in five of the twelve counties which show a decrease, viz.: Cass, Cheboygan, Houghton, Ingham, and Jackson, the decrease is wholly of the male sex.

In six of the twelve counties that contain a less number of inhabitants than in 1870, there are cities that have fallen off in population. Of the 916 total decrease in Calhoun county, the cities of Battle Creek and Marshall lose 817, of the 2,824 decrease in Oakland, Pontiac city loses 1,221, and the cities of Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti lose 931 out of 2,717, the total loss in Washtenaw county.

The following table exhibits the decrease for each township and city in the counties that contained a less number of inhabitants in 1874 than in 1870:

There seems to have been but slight change in the proportion of the sexes since 1854. The proportion of males is, however, perceptibly less in 1864, both for the State and several of the counties, than in 1854, 1870, or 1874, which, doubtless, is directly chargeable to the war.

In 1864 there were 2,689 more married females reported than married males; in 1854, 616, and in 1874, 1,611 more married males than married females. The discrepancy in 1864 may be attributable to the war, but in 1854 and 1874 it is believed to be largely the result of difficulties in enumerating traveling men and persons temporarily absent from home at the time of the enumeration. Such persons are liable to be counted both at their homes and wherever they happen to meet the enumerator, and on the other hand they may not in some instances be counted at all.

The proportion of married people seems to be steadily increasing; it was 34.13 per cent of the total population in 1854, 36.24 per cent in 1864, and 38.86 per cent in 1874.

The conjugal condition of all males aged 10 and under 21 and of all females aged 10 and under 18 was reported, but it was not reported for 154 males aged 21 and over and for 90 females aged 18 and over. This is the first time that the proportion of single, married, and widowed and divorced persons in each class of ages has been ascertained and published for this State. The computations are based upon the totals in Table II. of Part I. of this work. The information cannot fail to be of value in future for purposes of comparison, also to the Superintendent of Vital Statistics in the preparation and study of the tables relating to births, marriages, and deaths. Expressed approximately, about 24 per cent of the males aged 21 and over are single, 72 per cent married, and 4 per cent widowers and divorced; for females aged 18 and over about 17 per cent are single, 74 per cent married, and 9 per cent widows and divorced; for males aged 10 and under 21 about 99 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent are single and a little more than one-half of one per cent married, and for females aged 10 and under 18 nearly 97 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent are single and more than 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent married. As a rule in the newer counties, a greater proportion of females aged 18 and over are married than of males aged 21 and over, while for the older counties the reverse is true. The exceptions are in Allegan, Chippewa, Ionia, Jackson, Kent, Ottawa, St. Clair, Lapeer, and Saginaw, nine in all, of the older, and Emmet and Grand Traverse of the newer counties. The proportion of married males aged 21 and over is generally greater in the older and less in the newer counties than the proportion for the State, but the proportion of married females aged 18 and over is usually less in the older and greater in the newer counties than the proportion for the State.

In the census of 1870 there were 33 persons,—16 males and 17 females,—reported aged 100 years and over. Table 17 shows 18 males reported in the present census. It is to be regretted that the law does not require the number of females of these advanced ages. Of the 16 names in the above table but three appear in the census of 1870, viz.: Samuel Bickley, Andrew Hartman, and Jacob Holstead. Each was stated to be 100 years old. Andrew Hartman, in 1870 reported from 4th ward Lapeer City, is now reported from the township of Lynn.

The occupations are presented in Table 20 very nearly as stated in the census returns. None have been omitted except those reported "unknown," and no combinations made except of identical employments.

The compiler has no means of judging of the accuracy of the returns, but would call attention to the fact that out of 362,026 males in the State 21 years old and over, the occupations of all but 3,746—a little more than one in a hundred—are reported. And yet there seems to be an error, more apparent however than real, arising from the fact that the enumerators have not been specific enough in their statements, preferring to use a general rather than a specific title; as "laborer" instead of "farm laborer," "saw-mill hand," etc.; "clerk" instead of "clerk in bank," "clerk in store," "clerk in woolen factory," etc.

This fact will explain the discrepancy in the "number of persons employed" in some branches of manufacture as stated in the tables of manufactories, and the number reported under the same titles in the occupation table.

PART II.—LAND.

The statistics of land presented in Part II. are the most extensive that have ever been collected and compiled for this State. The information was reported upon schedules with headings similar to those in the printed table, except that the value of exempt lands was reported for each kind separately. The taxable land of the several townships was copied from the assessment rolls, and may be presumed to be as accurate as the rolls themselves. In cities and villages, however, the acres of all kinds of land were necessarily estimated. In such cases the estimate of taxable land frequently includes streets, and, even in townships, it is probable that the highways were seldom excluded. In some instances, also, school-house sites and some other small parcels that are lawfully exempt from taxation, are reported with the taxable land.

The acres of school-house sites, church sites, and some other lands exempt from taxation are not in all cases correct, owing to the difficulty in estimating the area of such small parcels. There is a large amount of "railroad right-of-way" land that is not reported with the exempt lands. In some instances this is probably included with the taxable land, having been assessed as such, as highways were, along with the farms through which the roads pass. A careful estimate shows that 148 townships contained about 12,236 acres of such land, of which only 1,235 acres were reported.

It is clear that the value of land exempt from taxation, as reported, seldom includes the value of railroad tracks and beds, and for some other lands the value of buildings and other improvements was not reported. For 115 townships, as shown by the foot-notes, the value of school property was obtained from the reports of the school directors to the superintendent of public instruction.

The law requires a report of "the whole number of acres of land owned by individuals and companies." It is not very clear what this would include. In 1854 and 1864 it seems to have been held to cover land "not taxable." For this census it is made to include the total of the taxable and exempt lands, or, as expressed in the schedule upon which the reports were made, "all lands not owned by the State or the United States."

The statistics of land were not reported for the township of Edwards, in Iosco county, or the township of Higgins, in Midland county. The taxable land, as reported from Maple Grove township, in Saginaw county, probably does not include the non-resident taxable land.

The taxable land has increased 14,443,504 acres, or 119.49 per cent, since 1864. The increase from 1854 to 1864 was 4,165,103 acres, or 52.57 per cent. There are 451,882 acres, or 8.87 per cent, more improved land reported than in 1870, and 1,863,194 acres, or 56.62 per cent, more than in 1864. The increase from 1854 to 1864 was 1,563,660 acres, or 73.96 per cent.

Table 1 exhibits for the State the number of acres each of taxable and improved land, as shown in the censuses of 1874, 1870, 1864, and 1854, and the number of acres and value of land exempt from taxation, and the number and average area of farms, as shown in the census of 1874. Table 2 exhibits for the State and counties the taxable land as reported in the censuses of 1874,

1864, and 1854, and improved land as reported in the censuses of 1874, 1870, 1864, and 1854. The taxable land was not reported in the census of 1870. The improved land as reported in 1870 included only the improved land in farms; in the census of 1874, and probably in the censuses of 1854 and 1864, it covers all improved land, whether in farms or within the corporate limits of cities and villages.

PART III.—AGRICULTURE.

Wherever in the census law the words "preceding year" occur, they have been construed for the purposes of this census to mean the year ending December 31, 1873. The statistics of farm products are all for the preceding year, or for the crops harvested during the calendar year 1873. The fruit statistics are for the calendar years 1872 and 1873; the maple sugar reported was made in the spring of 1874, and the live stock statistics are for the spring of 1874.

Just how much reliance can be placed on these statistics it is impossible to determine. It is well known, however, that few of our farmers keep any record of crops raised, and, as regards the less important crops, the quantity frequently is not known even at the time of harvesting. The statistics of such must therefore of necessity be mere estimates.

It may be well to note here further that the harvests in Michigan begin with hay and wheat in June and July, and end with corn and potatoes in September and October. The census is taken in April and May of the following year, nine to ten months from the beginning, and six to eight months after the close of the harvests. This long delay from the time of harvest to the time of collecting the statistics increases greatly the liability to err in reporting the minor productions. On the other hand it should be borne in mind that the enumerators in the farming districts were in nearly every instance themselves farmers, and well qualified to assist the farmer in making his estimates, and, without doubt, to the enumerators is due the credit of whatever value the statistics of the lighter products possess.

The above remarks are in no way applicable to the statistics of the staple products of the State. It is believed that for these the statements possess a high degree of reliability. Such crops are usually harvested within the limits of a few days and marketed in large bulk, and, being the main source of income to the farmer, the quantity is impressed upon his mind and very readily recalled when questioned by the enumerator. Though a farmer may have little idea of the quantity of garden vegetables or small fruit produced in any year, he seldom forgets the number of bushels of wheat raised or pounds of wool clipped, at least until the products of the succeeding year are gathered.

The agricultural statistics for 1870 presented in the following tables are taken from the "Statistics of Michigan, 1870," and are for the year ending June 1. The statistics of horses, neat cattle, swine and sheep for this year, shown in Table 1, may not be for the same ages as in the State censuses. The assistant marshals were instructed not to report sucking pigs, spring calves, or lambs. No instructions were given relative to spring colts. The cattle classed in the table "Neat cattle, one year old and over (other than oxen and cows)," were classed "Other cattle" in the census of 1870. It should also be remembered that the statistics of live stock for 1870 includes only live stock on farms, while for 1874, and probably for 1864 and 1854, the live stock in cities and villages is included.

The following statement shows the estimated value of the several products named. The prices, except of fruit and garden vegetables, are obtained from the report of the Board of Trade of Detroit for 1874, and are the average of the highest rates that ruled in Detroit on the first day of each of the last five months of 1873 for wheat, on the first day of each of the last three months for corn, on the first and fifteenth days of the last three months for potatoes, on the first and fifteenth days of the last two months for pork, on the first and fifteenth days of the entire twelve months for butter and cheese, and on June 15th and the first and fifteenth days of August, November, and December for wool:

Table 1 exhibits, as concisely as possible, the totals of the agricultural statistics, yet it may be well to write out more fully the statistics for some of the more important products.

WHEAT.

There were 1,134,484 acres of wheat harvested in 1873, yielding 15,456,202 bushels. This is 34.43 per cent greater breadth than was harvested in 1863. The average per acre was 13.62 bushels. The average in 1863 was 11.48 bushels. The total yield was 839,570 bushels less than in 1869, and 5,767,575 bushels, or 59.52 per cent more than in 1863. The number of acres harvested was not shown in the census of 1870.

CORN.

There were 20,792,911 bushels of corn harvested in 1873 from 641,329 acres, an average of 32.42 bushels per acre. This is 6,418,273 bushels more than was harvested in the year ending June 1, 1870, and 9,785,618 bushels or 88.90 per cent more than was harvested in 1863. The average per acre in 1863 was 25.74 bushels.

ALL OTHER GRAIN.

In 1864 oats, rye, barley, buckwheat, and millet were included under the above heading. For the census of 1874 the strict letter of the law was followed and only the number of bushels of “all other grain raised” (*i. e.* all grain except wheat and corn) required or reported. Only the four kinds first named are thus classed in Table 1 for 1870, and it is not probable that much if any other grain was included in 1874. The total number of bushels reported under this heading in 1874 is 3,097,725, or 30.62 per cent more than the total of oats, rye, barley, and buckwheat reported in 1870.

POTATOES.

The yield of potatoes was 1,560,592 bushels greater in 1873 than in 1863, and 4,612,170 bushels, or 82.08 per cent less than was reported in 1870.

HAY.

The hay crop of 1873 exceeded the crop of 1863 by 290,731 tons, or 34.47 per cent of the former crop; and was 151,459 tons or 13.35 per cent less than reported for 1870.

WOOL—SHEEP SHEARED.

In 1873 the total wool clip of Michigan was 7,729,011 pounds, an increase of 6.44 per cent compared with the yield of 1863. The average yield per head was 4.61 pounds. In the introductory remarks to the statistics of 1864 the average per head in 1849 is stated at 2 pounds 11 4-5 ounces; in 1853, 2 pounds 12½ ounces; in 1859, 2 pounds 12¼ ounces, and in 1863, 3 pounds 8¼ ounces. If the whole number of sheep reported in 1870 were the number sheared in that year, the average yield per head was 4.46 pounds. The average yield per head for the six years stated in pounds and decimals of a pound is as follows:

The total clip in the State in 1870 amounted to 8,864,896 pounds. The number of sheep sheared in 1873 was 1,676,176; the whole number of sheep reported in 1870 was 1,984,964,—308,788 more than the number sheared in 1873.

The number sheared in 1873 has been estimated by the Secretary of State for 47 townships, cities, and wards, from which the reports showed the amount of wool but not the number of sheep sheared. The basis upon which the estimate was made for any locality, was the average yield per sheep in the townships of the same county from which full reports were received.

PORK MARKETED.

There were 15,298,504 pounds of pork marketed in 1873 more than in 1863,—an increase of 46.16 per cent.

BUTTER—CHEESE.

The number of pounds of butter made in 1873 exceeded the number of pounds reported in 1870 by 3,671,978, or 15.11 per cent of the production of 1870, and exceeded the production of 1863 by 14,136,665 pounds, or 102.17 per cent. The production of cheese in 1873 was 4,101,912 pounds, or 133 per cent greater than reported in 1870, and 2,520,967 pounds, or 159.45 per cent greater than the production in 1863. The common practice among dairymen of sending their milk to the cheese factory for manufacture, renders it not improbable, under the present system of taking the census, that some of the cheese may have been reported twice, once at the factory and once by the dairyman.

CIDER—WINE.

There were 182,347 barrels of cider made in 1873,—117,531 barrels, or 181.33 per cent more than was manufactured in 1863. Cider was not reported in the census of 1870. The wine product for 1863 was reported at 5,556 gallons, for 1873, 50,851 gallons, an increase of 45,295 gallons, or more than 8.15 per cent. The quantity reported in 1870 was 22,015 gallons. According to the present census there were four wine making establishments in the State in 1873,—one in Bertrand, Berrien county, one in the third ward, Monroe City, one in Holland City, and one in Paw Paw, Van Buren county. The statistics do not show the quantity manufactured at these establishments, but the aggregate amount reported from the townships, city and ward where they are located is 42,350 gallons, of which 31,500 gallons were reported from the third ward, Monroe City.

MAPLE SUGAR.

The maple sugar made in 1874 was reported at 4,319,793 pounds, in 1870, 1,786,641 pounds, and in 1864, 4,048,099 pounds. In 1860 the number of pounds reported manufactured was 3,973,780. The product of 1874 exceeded that of 1870 by 2,533,152 pounds, or 141.78 per cent, and that of 1864 by 271,694, or 6.71 per cent.

LIVE STOCK.

There were 281,394 horses in Michigan in 1874,—an increase of 52,147 over 1870, and 102,293 over 1864. The number of mules was 3,906,—1,544 more than in 1870, and 2,791 more than in 1864. The number of milch cows was 321,732,—70,456 more than in 1870, and 96,544 more than in 1864. The number of neat cattle (other than oxen and cows) one year old and over, was 307,554,—an increase of 22,105 compared with 1870, and 96,769 compared with 1864. The number of swine over six months old was 401,719. This is 2,982 less than in 1870, and 66,431 more than in 1864. The number of work oxen in the State in 1874 was 38,901,—2,419 more than in 1870, and 21,742 less than in 1864. The number of sheep over six months old was 1,651,899,—a decrease of 333,065 compared with 1870, and 401,457 compared with 1864.

FRUIT AND GARDEN VEGETABLES.

The fruit statistics of Michigan have not heretofore been collected and published either in the State or United States censuses. The totals for the State, both of the amount of land devoted to the production of fruit and garden vegetables, and of the fruit products of 1872 and 1873, as reported in the census of 1874, are presented in the following statements :

PART IV.—PRODUCTS OF INDUSTRY.

In the preparation of the manufacturing and mining tables, the aim of the compiler has been first, to make the data for the establishments reported complete and accurate, and second, to compile the returns in such a manner as to show for each locality the statistics of each industry as nearly as possible, as returned. How far he has been successful in the first object those interested in and acquainted with any branch in any locality must judge. Suffice it to say here that of the thousands of mistakes in the census returns probably three-fourths were in items under this heading. A protracted correspondence has corrected many of these mistakes, but the compiler well knows that many and serious ones remain.

The rule has been in this compilation to class such establishments as carry on more than one kind of manufacturing with the most important of the several industries when this could be ascertained, and explain by means of foot-notes what other industries were combined with it; as, where a mill was reported a "flouring and saw-mill," if the manufacture of flour was the main business, the establishment was compiled with flouring mills, and a foot-note inserted stating the fact that a saw-mill was connected with it. The lumber manufactured was compiled in the saw-mill table with a foot-note stating that the other statistics of the saw-mill were tabulated with flouring-mills. When the main business of an establishment of this kind could not be ascertained, the industry first named has been taken as such, and the establishment classed under that heading. If the various industries carried on in this class of establishments could have been separated and each compiled under its own proper heading, it perhaps would have been better, but as the statistics were reported for the whole establishment and not for each industry, this was impossible.*

The aggregate number of manufacturing and mining establishments reported is 4,401. The number of establishments of productive industry reported in 1870 was 9,515. This includes 243 fisheries. No statistics of fisheries, except capital invested and number of barrels of fish caught, were reported in the census of 1874. In 1870, 6,524 establishments were classed under "Miscellaneous Industries," leaving 2,991 classed under 20 different headings. The 4,401 establishments reported in 1874 are tabulated under 131 different headings. The great difference in the number of industrial establishments reported in 1874 and in 1870, is doubtless mainly due to the failure of the enumerators in 1874 to fully report the less important industries. A glance at the State totals of these will show the great disparity in the number of establishments reported, and the number that actually exist. The number of "Saddle, Harness, and Trunk factories" reported for the entire State is only 55; "Bakery and Confectionery establishments" 15; "Boot and Shoe Factories" 69, etc.

But there is also a less number of establishments of some of the more important industries reported. This was discovered at an early stage in the compilation and a comparison made by township and ward, and wherever a falling off of any importance was detected, a letter was written to the enumerator asking the cause. One hundred and twenty letters received in reply show

that out of 157 establishments reported in 1870 but not in 1874, about 22 per cent were overlooked at the first returns. Many of these were of small account, and the enumerators thought them not worth mentioning. They were, however, subsequently reported. About 29½ per cent had been “destroyed” or had “failed;” about 13½ per cent were reported under other titles,—as, many establishments that were classed “Foundries and Machine Shops” in 1870, were reported “Agricultural Implement Works” in 1874; about 32½ per cent were reported from other townships or wards, either because of actual removal or in consequence of a change in township or ward boundaries; and about 2½ per cent were stated to have been erroneously returned in 1870.

The above statements are authentic as regards 157 establishments. Dropping the 32½ per cent reported both years, but from different townships or wards, and there remain 106 establishments that did not appear in the State totals before the corrections were obtained. Of these, 35 establishments, or about 33 per cent, were overlooked; 46 establishments, or about 43 per cent, had been destroyed, or had failed; 21 establishments, or about 20 per cent, were reported under other titles; and 4 establishments, or about 4 per cent, were erroneously returned in 1870. If this statement admit of general application, then it may be asserted that about 33 per cent of the establishments reported in 1870, but not in 1874, were overlooked; about 43 per cent had been destroyed, or had failed; about 20 per cent were reported under other titles, and about 4 per cent are chargeable to error in the returns of 1870.

The first column in the original schedules contained the names of the land owners, agents, or managers, and the second showed the number of acres of taxable land owned or controlled by each. The corresponding columns in the table are headed "Number of Farms" and "Number of Acres in Farms," the number of names being taken as the number of farms, and the number of acres of taxable land as the number of acres in farms. Both the land owners and the taxable land in cities and villages have been excluded in compiling the table. The information is believed to be sufficiently accurate for all practical purposes, especially for the older portions of the State, where, outside of cities and villages, there is comparatively little taxable land that is not farm land.]
